

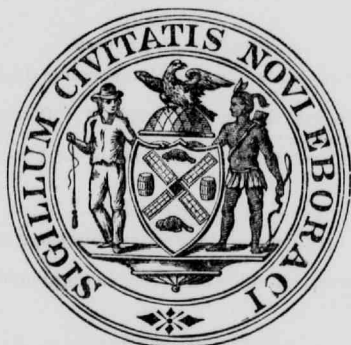

### ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 27 CHAMBERS STREET,  
FRIDAY, June 8, 1883—2 o'clock P. M. }

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—Commissioners Edward Cooper (Chairman), John Kelly, and Daniel Lord, Jr.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register" of June 7 and 8, 1883, showing the publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meeting held on June 5, 1883, were read and approved.

#### Motions.

T. H. Baldwin, Esq., attorney, moved that, under the decision made by the Commissioners, on December 26, 1882, reducing the assessment for One Hundred and Seventeenth street regulating, grading, etc., between Seventh and Eighth avenues, a certificate of award issue in favor of Sarah Cochrane, George Moore et al., executors, etc. (No. 4470), who paid, prior to June 9, 1880, assessments on property for said improvement.

After hearing A. B. Johnson, Esq., attorney, on behalf of Sarah Cochrane, executrix, etc. (No. 5038) the Clerk was directed to issue a certificate of award in favor of The Estate of Samuel Cochrane.

A. B. Johnson, Esq., attorney, moved to amend the petition of Isaac I. Stillings, (No. 1658), for the reduction of assessment for Boulevard regulating, grading, etc., between Fifty-ninth and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets, by inserting lots known as Block No. 1193, Ward Nos. 55, 56, and 57.

After hearing the counsel representing the city in opposition, the motion was laid over.

The weekly reports of Assistant Sanitary Engineers on the plumbing and drainage of new houses were received and ordered on file.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 2, 1883:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,529, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 625 tenement-houses, 114 private dwellings, 61 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 36 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 packing-house, 49 sunken and vacant lots, 58 yards, courts, and areas, 99 cellars and basements, 174 waste pipes and drains, 192 privies and water-closets, 15 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 4 cesspools, and 7 other nuisances.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 566.

During the past week 201 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

106 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

199 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 110 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 110 houses, 110 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

6 cases of contagious disease were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

## Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 542 births, 36 still-births, 233 marriages, and 634 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 2, 1883. This shows an increase of 99 births and 33 marriages and a decrease of 10 still-births and 9 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1882, there was an increase of 56 births and a decrease of 6 still-births, 25 marriages, and 85 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from whooping-cough, decreased 3; erysipelas, 10; typhus fever, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 6; alcoholism, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 3; pneumonia, 9; aneurism, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 10; Bright's disease and nephritis, 17; premature and preterm births, 8; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 2; and drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 1; scarlatina, 2; diphtheria 6; croup 3; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 1; heart diseases, 13; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 7; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; convulsions, 6; direct effect of solar heat, 1; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 22; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1. The number of deaths from malarial fevers and gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 113 were in institutions, 345 in tenement houses, 148 in houses containing three families or less, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, 26 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 120 on the first, 174 on the second, 107 on the third, 57 on the fourth, 27 on the fifth, 625 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 9 non-residents; 71 were stated to be single, 163 married, 71 widowed, and the condition of 329 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 634; still-births, 36; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 542 births; 223 marriages; 36 still-births; 634 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 86 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 47 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 2, 1883, was 67.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.901, the mean humidity was 61, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,312, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.15 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 583 deaths and still-births, or 87.01 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 10; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 239; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 79; Greenwood (undenominational), 31; Lutheran (undenominational), 93; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 27; Evergreen (undenominational), 29; Woodlawn (undenominational), 28; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 13; Machpelah, L.
