

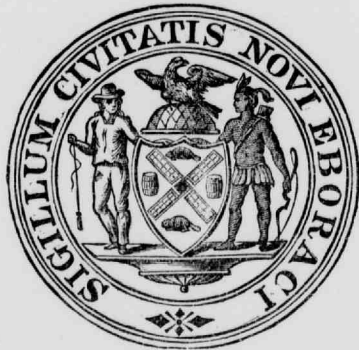

#### Notable Fires.

January 1.—7.57½ P. M. Nos. 241 to 245 Centre street. A seven-story brick building, 75 by 60 feet, occupied by dealers in shell goods and for various other kinds of business. The fire originated on the third floor and extended by the stairways and belt holes to the seventh floor, considerably damaging the building. Seventeen engine and five hook and ladder companies and one water-tower were in service, and the fire was under control in four and one-half hours. The cause of the fire was spontaneous combustion, and the loss was estimated at \$38,990.

January 2.—11.50 P. M. Nos. 29 and 31 West Twenty-eighth street. A three-story brick building, about 60 by 160 feet, occupied as the Fifth Avenue Theatre. The fire originated in the cellar under the auditorium, soon after the departure of the audience, and the building was destroyed. The fire extended to the following buildings: No. 28 West Twenty-ninth street, rear, a four-story brick building, 25 by 50 feet, occupied as dressing rooms for performers; Nos. 33 and 35 West Twenty-eighth street, a four-story brick building, 40 by 40 feet, occupied as a dwelling, which were slightly damaged; Nos. 33 and 35 West Twenty-eighth street, rear, a three-story brick building, 20 by 40 feet, connected with the stage of the theatre and used for storage of scenery, which was destroyed; Nos. 1185 to 1193 Broadway, a row of four-story buildings, 85 by 75 feet in all, occupied for various business purposes, slightly damaging the roof and the rear portion of each building; No. 1195 Broadway, a three-story brick building, 45 by 100 feet, occupied as Hermann's Theatre; damage to the building and contents trifling. The high wind carried a large number of burning brands against the upper part of the hotel known as the "Sturtevant Home," a five-story brick building, occupying the entire front on the east side of Broadway, from Twenty-eighth to Twenty-ninth street. The roof and part of the fifth story of the building, which forms the mansard and has a slate front with dormer windows upon a wooden frame, and a hanging ceiling, was also damaged.

Twenty-two engines, eight hook and ladder trucks and one water-tower were in service, and the duration of the fire was four and one-half hours. The cause was carelessness of supernumeraries in smoking, and the loss was estimated at \$172,745.

January 14.—1.12½ A. M. Nos. 387, 388 and 389 West Eleventh street, corner of Thirteenth avenue, a six-story brick building, 75 by 75 feet, occupied as a grain elevator and storehouse. The fire originated on the sixth floor, in cupola, and extended, before the alarm was given, through the many grain shutters throughout the building, which was considerably damaged. The building was surrounded with telegraph poles, carrying about 250 wires, greatly obstructing the work of the force. Twelve engines, two fire-boats and three hook and ladder trucks were in service, and the fire was under control in about two hours. While this fire was burning, two other fires occurred, the first at Nos. 193 and 194 West street, running through to Nos. 7 and 9 Caroline street, and the second at Nos. 100 and 102 Bethune street, both of which are described in subsequent paragraphs. The cause of the fire was friction of machinery, and the loss was estimated at \$125,000.

January 14.—1.44 A. M. Nos. 193 and 194 West street, running through to Nos. 7 and 9 Caroline street. A six-story brick building, 50 by 125 feet, occupied as a lithographing establishment. The fire originated on the third floor and extended (before the arrival of the force) to the sixth floor, considerably damaging the building. No. 10 Caroline street, a five-story brick building, was slightly damaged by heat and a portion of the roof of the building No. 192 West street was carried down by the falling of the top of the south wall of the building on fire. The fire required the services of thirteen engine and three hook and ladder companies and one water tower, and it was under control in about two hours. The cause was not ascertained, and the loss was estimated at \$71,325.

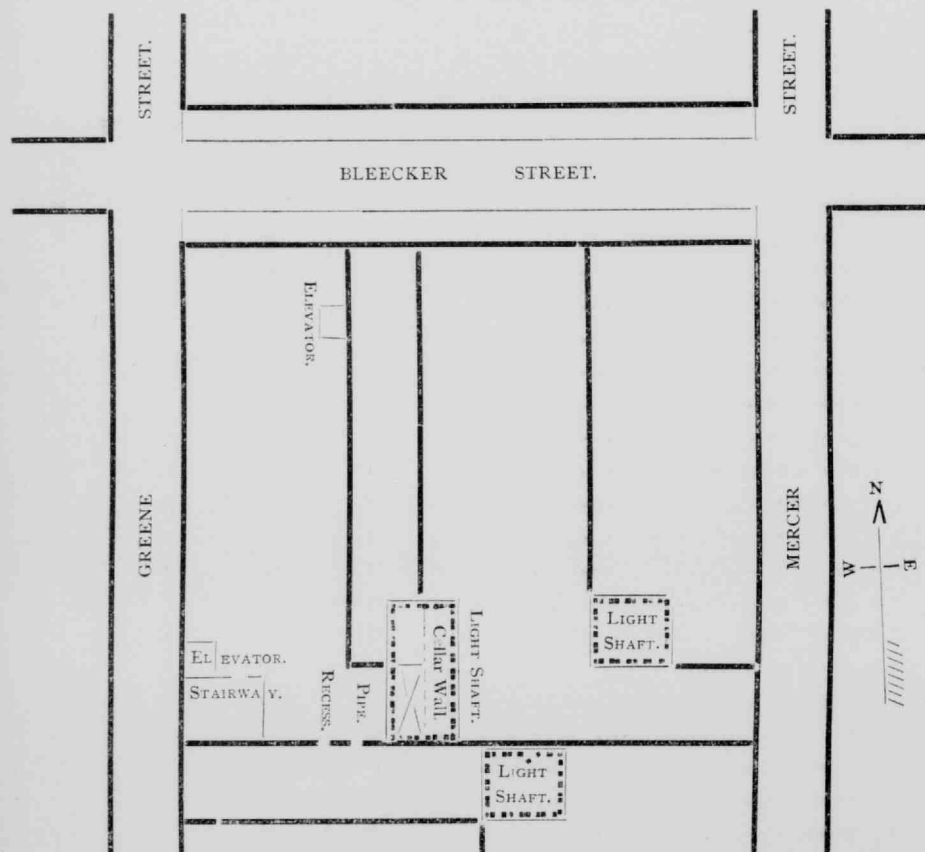
January 14.—3.30 A. M. Nos. 100 and 102 Bethune street. A five-story brick building, 50 by 200 feet, occupied as a storage warehouse. The fire originated on the fourth floor and extended (through open hatchway) to the fifth floor, slightly damaging the building. Fifteen engine and five hook and ladder companies were in service at the fire (of which eight engine and two hook and ladder companies were sent by verbal orders from the fire at Nos. 387 to 389 West street). The fire was under control in about four hours. The cause of the fire was sparks from the fire at Nos. 387 to 389 West street, entering through opening in iron shutter, and the loss was estimated at \$119,126.

Altogether, the three last described fires required the services of twenty-nine engine and eight hook and ladder companies, two floating engines and one water tower.

March 5.—3.19 P. M. Pier 24, East river. Steamboat "City of Richmond," length 345 feet, breadth of beam 60 feet, and depth of hold 10 feet, which was used by the Hartford Line to transport freight. The fire originated amidship and extended throughout the upper portion of the vessel, considerably damaging it. It also extended slightly to the frame sheds on Pier 24 and 25, and to the freight on Pier 24. The fire required the services of two floating engines, nine engine and four hook and ladder companies, and it was under control in about two hours. After the fire was extinguished the body of a colored man (an employee of the line) was found on the main deck, and after the boat was pumped out and raised, the bodies of two other colored employees of the line were found between decks. This was the first fire (on the river front) at which the new floating engine "The New Yorker" (Engine 57) was used, and the working of the machinery and pumps was most satisfactory. The cause was sparks from a passing tug boat lodging in cotton bale while on lighter, and the loss was estimated at \$165,000.

March 17.—5.19½ P. M. Nos. 104 and 106 Bleeker street, southeast corner of Greene street. A ten-story brick and iron building, 60 by 125 feet, occupied by clothing manufacturing firms. The fire originated in the sub-cellar in a bin of cloth and silk clippings and extended by stairway, elevator shafts and pipe recesses in the walls throughout the entire building, causing its destruction. The cause was spontaneous combustion of cloth clippings and the loss is estimated at \$1,463,784.

The diagram here inserted shows the building with the light shafts and pipe recesses:



The fire also extended through windows facing light shaft on the rear to the following buildings:

No. 102 Bleeker street, a four-story brick building, 25 by 80 feet, occupied by feather dealers, destroying it.

Nos. 98 and 100 Bleeker street, a six-story brick and iron building, 50 by 100 feet, with an L at No. 197 Mercer street, 15 by 100 feet, occupied as a wholesale clothing manufactory, considerably damaging it.

No. 170 Greene street, a six-story brick and iron building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied as a button manufactory, considerably damaging it.

Nos. 171 to 177 Greene street, a six-story brick building, 100 by 100 feet, occupied by importers, slightly damaging it.

Nos. 97 and 99 Bleeker street, a six-story brick building, 50 by 80 feet, occupied by dealers in hats, slightly damaging it.

No. 179 Greene street, a three-story brick building, 30 by 50 feet, occupied by dealers in hats, trifling.

No. 181 Greene street, a three-story brick building, 30 by 20 feet, occupied as a cigar store and dwelling, slightly damaged.

The walls, in falling, caused great damage to the telegraph wires running in front of the building. Many lengths of hose were also destroyed by the falling walls. The fire required the services of twenty-nine engine and five hook and ladder companies and one water tower, and was under control in about five hours. Several members of the Department received slight injuries, and a member of Insurance Patrol No. 2, named John Spellman, was suffocated while on duty on the third floor of No. 197 Mercer street. His body was found on the following day.

At 6.22 P. M., while the Bleeker street fire was at its height, a second fire occurred at Nos. 28 and 30 Leonard street, which required the services of six engine and four hook and ladder companies for about two and one-half hours.

At 11.19 o'clock P. M. a third fire occurred at Nos. 236 and 238 West Seventeenth street, requiring the services of ten engine and three hook and ladder companies for about one and one-half hours.

At 3.14 o'clock A. M. on March 18, a fourth fire occurred at Nos. 37 and 39 Allen street, requiring the services of nine engine and two hook and ladder companies for about two hours. Four persons were burned to death before the arrival of Department's forces, their bodies being found after the fire was extinguished, and four were injured—only one of them, however, after the fire-

men reached the scene. The first company found the stairway on fire from cellar to roof, and many of the inmates were driven to the fire-escapes, whence they were taken down by the members of Hook and Ladder Company No. 6 with ladders.

In addition to those above mentioned, nine other fires occurred in various parts of the city prior to 4 o'clock A. M. on the 18th, which were extinguished by individual companies.

For service at the first five fires, fifty-six engine and seventeen hook and ladder companies were called within a period of eleven hours, during which nine other engine and two hook and ladder companies were out of quarters, either responding to alarms or covering localities left uncovered by companies in service elsewhere, making the aggregate calls for sixty-five engine and nineteen hook and ladder companies. Only ten engine and six hook and ladder companies of the entire land force were not called out of quarters during the time specified.

March 21.—5.38½ P. M. No. 652 Broadway. A five-story brick and stone building, 30 by 100 feet, occupied by clothiers. The fire originated on the third floor, in water-closet, and extended by the stairways and through ceiling to the fifth floor, considerably damaging the building. The fire required the services of eight engine and four hook and ladder companies and one water tower, and was under control in one and one-half hours. This fire was discovered and sent out by an automatic instrument located in the building. The cause was carelessness of an employee with a lighted match, and the loss was estimated at \$76,000.

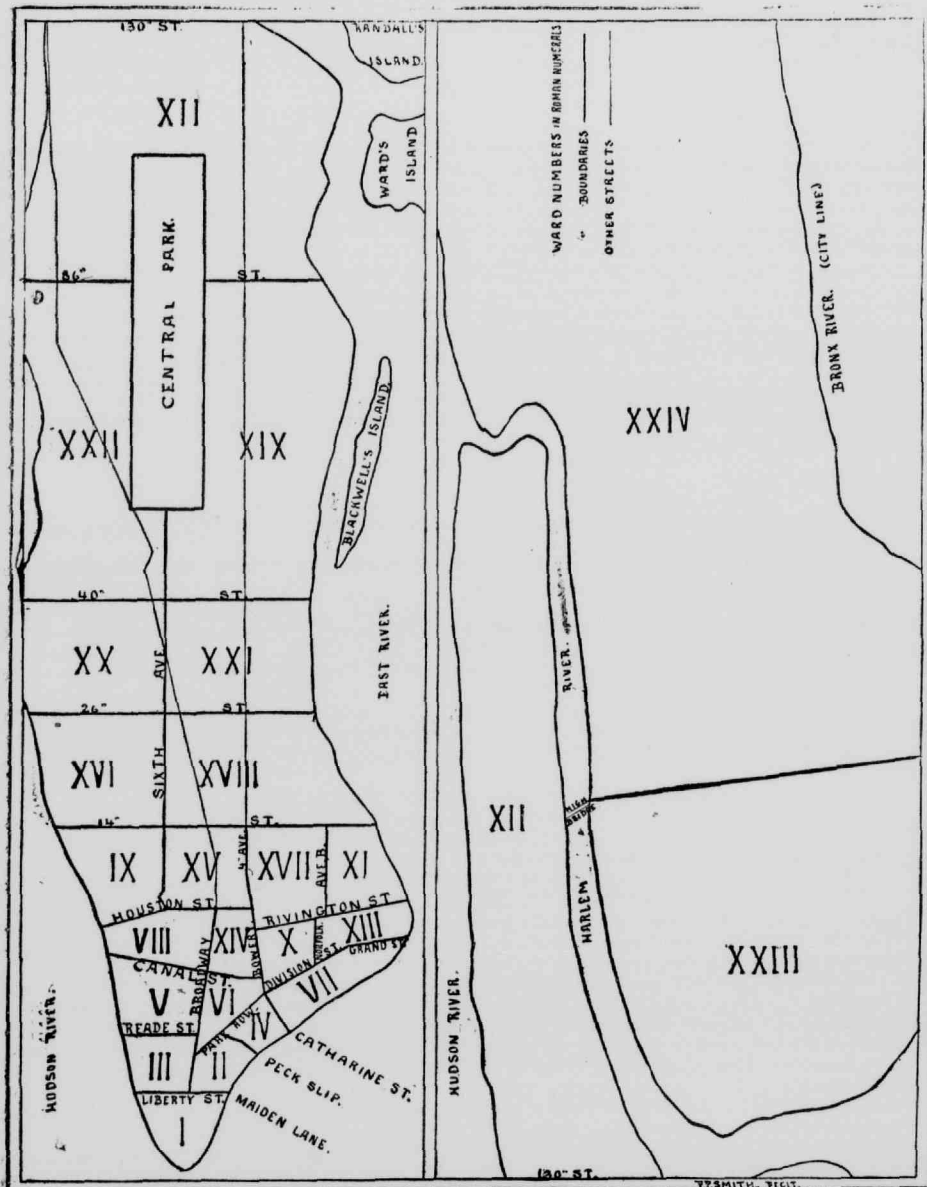

The 907 deaths represent a death-rate of 27.70, against 29.70 for the previous week and 24.73 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a decrease for the week, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever being respectively 127, 120, 221 and 10, against 121, 156, 211 and 8 for the previous week, a total of 478 against 496. Diphtheria increased on the east side of the city as far up as Eighty-sixth street, decreasing or varying slightly on the west side and above Eighty-sixth street. Measles increased between Division street and the river, and between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, the decrease being most marked between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, west of Avenue B, and above Fortieth street, East and West. Scarlet fever increased between Canal and Fourteenth streets, west of Broadway, between Division and East Twenty-sixth streets, and in the lower part of the annexed district, the most marked decrease being between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West.

Commissioner Post moved that the approval of the minutes of the meeting held on the 14th instant be postponed until all the Commissioners are present, as there were omissions and irregularities in the records which should be corrected.

President Cram moved, as an amendment, that the minutes of the meetings held January 14 and 16, 1892, be approved, but his motion was not seconded.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Finance Department—Reporting that the bonds of Dock Masters Fleming and Walsh have been approved, and requesting a list of all officers, clerks and employees who are required by the By-Laws of the Department to file bonds for the faithful performance of their duties. The Secretary directed to furnish the information.

From the White Star Line—Requesting dredging in the half slip adjoining the north side of Pier, new 45, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for dredging.

From J. Milton Goetchius—Requesting the Department to construct narrow piers adjoining the ferry racks foot of Thirtieth and Fourteenth streets, North river, for the accommodation of vessels that now occupy Pier, old 42, North river, during the time the Department are engaged in building the sea-wall thereat. Mr. Goetchius, being present, was informed that the Department are unable to comply with his request, but upon application will endeavor to set apart a berth in the vicinity for his use.

From William Oliver—Requesting permission to erect an addition to his present boat-house located foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, Harlem river, under permit dated March 27, 1890. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From Cecil Campbell Higgins, attorney—Accepting on behalf of his client, James A. Striker, the terms and conditions of the preambles and resolutions adopted on the 14th instant. The Counsel to the Corporation requested to prepare the necessary agreement.

From the Knickerbocker Ice Company:

1st. Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted on the 14th instant for the purchase of the Pier foot of Forty-third street, North river. The Counsel to the Corporation requested to prepare the necessary agreement.

2d. Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted on the 14th instant for the lease of the new pier to be erected foot of Forty-third street, North river, the lease to commence when said new pier is finished.

From Joseph Cornell—Applying for a lease of one-half of the proposed extension to the Pier foot of West Eleventh street, North river, for a period co-terminous with the existing lease of said pier. Notify Mr. Cornell that it is the intention of the Board to dispose of said lease by public sale.

From W. W. Rossiter—Reporting that alongside the bulkhead on Thirteenth avenue, north of Twenty-sixth or Twenty-seventh streets, North river, no Croton water-mains are laid and requesting the Board to take suitable action thereon.

On motion, it was directed that the attention of the Department of Public Works be called to this fact in order that the necessary steps may be taken by said Department to afford the desired relief.

From Turner, McClure & Rolston, attorneys—Requesting on behalf of their client a revocation of the order dated October 8, 1891, requiring dredging at the bulkhead between Piers 48 and 49, East river. Notify said attorneys that the order referred to was revoked on the 14th instant.

From Smith Ely—Requesting to be informed as to whether the cost of constructing the sea-wall foot of One Hundred and Fourth street, East river, is to be assessed on the adjacent property. The Secretary directed to reply.

From Stuart F. Randolph, attorney—Requesting a postponement of the proceedings for the condemnation of the property of Smith Clift, north of West Thirty-eighth street, North river, until February 1, 1892. Time extended as requested.

From George Ehret—Requesting permission to repair his salt-water pipe foot of Ninety-third street, East river. Permit granted.

From Sheridan & Byrne—Requesting the Department to drive fifteen spring-piles at the Pier foot of Fifth street, East river, and agreeing to pay the cost thereof. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive said piles and report cost for collection.

The communication from Brown & Fleming, respecting the rent due for the use of the land covered by a dump and float, between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, East river, tabled on the 14th instant, was,

On motion, taken from the table, ordered to be placed on file, and the said parties notified that their application for a reduction of rent was denied.

From the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company—Submitting an approximate estimate of the amount of their freight and passenger business for one year, and in view of its importance to the City, requesting the Board to reconsider its action of the 14th instant and not to interfere with their occupancy of Pier, old 29, North river, until the Department is prepared to grant the said company a lease of some other pier. Referred to Commissioners Post and Phelan.

The President moved that the proposition of the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company for a lease of Pier, new 22, North river, when completed, be accepted, but his motion was not seconded.

From John Gillies—Requesting that the time for the completion of the contract for extending and widening the Pier and approach foot of Twenty-first street, North river, under Contract No. 391, be extended until January 12, 1892, whereupon,

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of Contract No. 391, made by this Department with John Gillies, for extending and widening the Pier and approach at the foot of West Twenty-first street, North river, be and the same is hereby extended to the 10th day of January, 1892.

From Dock Master Coye—Reporting that the lower side and outer end of Pier 19, East river, is settling and in addition it appears as if the pier is breaking in the middle. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From Dock Master Abeel—Reporting that the sheathing on the inner end of the approach to Piers, new 46 and 47, North river, requires repairing. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and repair if necessary.

From Dock Master Carson—Reporting repairs required to the fender chocks at the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, also at the Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, Harlem river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and repair if necessary.

The minutes of the meetings of the 14th and 16th instant were read and approved.

G. G. Haven and J. W. Miller, representing the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company, being present, stated that inasmuch as their company have for the past sixteen years been in possession of Pier, old 29, North river, they would request the Board to reconsider its action of the 14th instant revoking the permit of April 2, 1891, for the use and occupation of said pier, and allow their company to remain in possession thereof until such time as the Board are in a position to designate another pier in the vicinity for their use.

On motion, the time specified in the resolution adopted by the Board January 14, 1892, requiring the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company to vacate Pier, old 29, North river, was extended until May 1, 1892.

"Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to notify the lessees of Piers, new 36 and old 45, East river, to comply as speedily as possible with the conditions and requirements of the permits granted by this Department August 1, 1889 (which conditions were accepted by said lessees), to admit of the free public use of the roofs of the sheds erected on those piers for recreation purposes.

"Resolved, That all permits granted by this Department for the construction of sheds on piers or bulkheads on the East river, coming within the requirements of said chapter, shall provide for the free access of the public to the roofs of such proposed structures for the purposes of public resort and recreation, and in case of the failure of the owner or lessee of any pier or bulkhead to whom such permit has been granted, to make suitable provision for the free access of the public to the roof of same, then this Department shall adopt such measures as may be necessary to enforce a prompt compliance with the terms and conditions of such permit.

Each person making an estimate shall inclose it in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for furnishing Stationery," and with his name and the date of its presentation.

Each estimate shall state the name and place of residence of the person making it; if there is more than one such person, their names and residences must be given; and if only one person is interested in the estimate it must distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the preliminary security required, and in the proposals stated, over and above all his debts of every nature and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by law. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered will be subject to approval by the Comptroller of the City of New York after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

The amount of security required upon the execution of the contract will be in each case fifty per cent. of the estimated cost of the articles awarded to each contractor; the amount of preliminary security to be given until each award, and in which the sureties shall justify, shall be ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS.

Should the person to whom the contract may be awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or proposal, and that the adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered has been approved by the Comptroller, or if he accept but do not execute the contract and give the proper security, he shall be considered as having abandoned it and as in default to the Corporation, and the contract will be readvertised and relet, as provided by law.

No estimate will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation, and no estimate will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person not having at the time of making his estimate full, suitable and sufficient facilities for performing the work specified in his estimate.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the National or State Banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money, to the amount of fifty per centum of the amount of the preliminary security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the Supervisor of the City Record, who has charge of the estimate-box; and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said Supervisor and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same, within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

Permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any bid or estimate, and the right is expressly reserved by the undersigned city officers to reject any or all bids which may be deemed prejudicial to the public interests.

A separate contract will be made with the lowest bidder for each and every class of stationery involving an expenditure of more than five hundred dollars, and the Board of City Record expressly reserves the right to make a contract with the lowest bidder on any class involving the expenditure of a lesser sum.

The Stationery is to be put up in packages according to schedules to be furnished to the contractors by the Supervisor of the City Record, and according to the most approved methods followed in the stationery trade for the preservation of goods. The contractors must complete the delivery of the goods at the office of the

CITY RECORD within twenty days from the execution of the contracts.

#### DESCRIPTION OF ARTICLES.

For particulars as to the quantities and kinds of Stationery, reference must be had to the specifications, copies of which may be procured from the Supervisor of the City Record, or may be seen in the Department of Public Works, where they are on file with certain samples. When the description of an article is not complete in the specifications, and no sample is on file in the Department of Public Works, the contractor must supply an article in every respect like that in use in the Department making the requisition.
