MESSAGE FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor: No. 776.

City of New York-Office of the Mayor, }

June 18, 1904. To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—You have been called together at this special meeting to take action upon and give expression to the sorrow caused by the lamentable disaster to the steamer "General Slocum" on Wednesday, the 15th of this month.

In that disaster many hundreds of persons lost their lives by drowing and burning. These losses are peculiarly sad because they consist almost exclusively of women and

The public-spirited citizens of this City have already undertaken, systematically, the relief so far as possible of the victims of this disaster, and their families, and some fifteen thousand dollars have already been contributed for that purpose.

Sickles, Alderman from the Fifth District, in speaking to the resolution, suggested that the Committee on Laws and Legislation should investigate the powers of the Board of Aldermen and ascertain if they had not concurrent jurisdiction with the Government of the United States in the matter of excursion steamers, so that human life might be safeguarded in the future. so that human life might be safeguarded in the future.


