To Sylvia De Giorgio, a Teacher in Public School 12, Manhattan, to visit Public School 166, Manhattan, without loss of pay, for the remainder of the current school term, in order that she may study means of curing defects of speech, and suspending any provisions of the By-Laws inconsistent therewith.

Expressing sorrow at the death of Jefferson Davis, Janitor of Public School 146, Brooklyn, which occurred on September 23, 1912, he having been in the employ of the Board of Education for upwards of sixteen years, during which time he rendered faithful and satisfactory service.

Communications requesting the use of public school buildings for political meetings, received from the New York Social Center Committee for the use of the auditorium of Public School 63, Manhattan, for four campaign meetings; Mrs. Mary K. Simkhovitch and others for the use of the auditorium of the DeWitt Clinton High School for a meeting of the Progressive Party on October 12, 1912; The National Progressive Party for the use of the auditoriums in sixteen public school buildings in Manhattan and The Bronx for political meetings on sundry dates in October and November, 1912, were presented, and in connection therewith a resolution authorizing the Committee on Care of Buildings, under such regulations as it deems proper to permit the use of the auditoriums of not to exceed seven school buildings for such meetings, two in Manhattan, two in Brooklyn, and one each in The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, to be apportioned by said Committee as equally as possible among the existing political parties, and also for meetings of civic organizations of the district in which the school is located, provided that such meetings do not conflict with the activities of the school or any organization connected therewith, was adopted, and also a motion that it is the sense of the Board that the Committee on Care of Buildings should arrange for the employment of suitable persons to report regarding the character of the meetings, the attendance, the behavior of the audiences, etc., as is done in connection with the public evening lectures, the compensation of such persons to be paid by the organizations using the buildings.

Report of a Special Committee.

In reference to the resolution adopted on September 18, 1912, directing the City Superintendent to submit reports received by him from members of the Board of Superintendents and others, and the action taken by the Board of Education relative thereto on September 25, 1912, Mr. Churchill submitted a report with resolutions attached providing that the following items of immediate consequence in said reports be referred to the designated Committees of the Board of Education:

To the Committee on Elementary Schools:

That the greatest confusion imaginable prevails in the organization of departmental teaching (Edson).

That too often the supervisory work is such as can be performed by the Clerk or Janitor (Edson).

That clerical work and general supervisory details absorb too much of the time and attention of the Principals and Supervisory Assistants (Edson).

That the official class Teacher have her own class for at least three periods of a day (Edson); and his six steps recommended to improve departmental teaching.

That appointments and transfers are too frequent (Meleney).

That young Teachers need closer supervision than they now receive (Meleney).

That supervision of ungraded classes is inadequate (Meleney).

That clerical work and incompetence of clerical force hamper Principals (Meleney).

That Teachers be nominated only at the beginning of each term and in the middle of the fall term (Meleney).

That the substitutes in the several districts be chosen from those on the eligible lists whose names may be reached, September appointments being made from those who substituted during the spring term, etc. (Meleney).

That special advancement classes are effective (Straubenmuller).

That "academic work was wasted" upon 22 per cent. of advancement classes reported (Straubenmuller).

That a number of removals were made from ungraded classes to graded classes (Farrell).

That 170 schools did not reply to the circular asking for reports as to mentally defective children (Farrell).

That 97.25 per cent. of 6,299 children in study rooms received promotion who would not otherwise have received it (Stitt).

That advancement classes be extended to 8B (Straubenmuller).

That backward children should be allowed to do not more than one grade's work in a term (Straubenmuller).

That kindergartens be organized with a head kindergarten, an assistant and a substitute (Curtis).

That a study be made of February promotions with a view to abandoning them as both futile and harmful (Curtis).

That an hourly notation of temperature be made by the Teacher as a means of regulating ventilation and heat (Crampton).

Whether a thoroughgoing investigation should be made to test Dr. Crampton's statement that motor dullards are most often mentally deficient, and if such tests should be begun by Teachers.

Whether a comprehensive test should not be made both of examination questions used and results alleged (Meleney).

Whether facts as to group teaching and departmental teaching in all divisions should be called for similar to those reported for The Bronx (Edson).

Whether special instructions have been circulated this fall to Principals and Teachers regarding special advancement classes, grading according to ability, etc., emphasized in Mr. Straubenmuller's report.

Why seven ungraded classes authorized last year were not organized, in face of the fact that at least 285 more classes were needed (Farrell).

Whether the possibilities of outside co-operation emphasized by Miss Farrell have been exhausted in case of dispensaries, hospitals, psychopathic clinics, etc.

That nominations be made only after the fitness of the candidate has been determined, as by trying out substitutes (Meleney).

That provisions be made for candidates on the eligible list for practical teaching in the schools before appointment (Meleney).

Whether the Academy of Medicine Committee on Hospitals and Health, etc., should be asked to explain what it means by its recent report against transferring physical examination from the Health Department to the schools on the ground that co-operation between the two departments has never yet been tried out (Crampton).

Whether this Board should provide for exhibiting in New York the physical training exhibit prepared at the Board's expense and the school hygiene exhibit prepared by the Board of Health for the International Congress in Hygiene mentioned by Dr. Crampton.

To the Committee on High Schools and Training Schools:

That kindergartens be opened for practice, teaching and observation by students of outside training schools (Curtis).

That model kindergartens be organized in the girl's high schools (Curtis).

That applicants for license No. 1 are often unable to make intelligent use of the dictionary and fail to get the meaning of what they read (Hervey).

That 35 per cent. fewer children dropped out of eight high school sections classified according to physiological age than from four corresponding sections not so classified, 35 per cent. fewer dropping out than in the average run of classes, and that the reason for not reclassifying schools to effect wholesale reductions in dropping out is that they had already organized the classes and did not want to make the readjustment (Crampton).

That a post-graduate course in manual training be provided in training schools for Teachers now in the system (Hervey).

To the Committee on Elementary Schools and also to the Committee on High and Training Schools:

Whether Dr. Crampton's statements as to the value of physiological age are trustworthy, and what, if any, steps have been taken to extend the benefits to other classes. (Report dated July 17th, received August 2d in ample time to have effected such organization of classes this year) (Crampton).

What steps or follow-up methods are being employed to attend to 90 per cent. of children even in high schools who are said to have four or more rotting molars more commonly than a perfect set of teeth (Crampton).

That there be a glee club and orchestra in each school (Rix).

Whether the principle of local supervisors worked out successfully in physical

training will apply to other special branches (Crampton).

That a higher standard be required for instruction in instrumental music in kindergartens and for entrance to training schools (Curtis, Rix).

To the Committee on Studies and Text-books:

That clerical work absorbs too much of the time and attention of the Principals and supervisory assistants (Edson).

That the present course of study does not recognize natural variations of children (Meleney).

That a system of classes with a six-year course be provided to give a well-rounded education for wage-earning life (Meleney).

Whether the committee be urged to try out in different parts of the city proposed changes in the curriculum or policy, as is reported for physical training by Dr. Crampton.

To the Committee on Vocational Schools:

That the plan of employment of vocational Teachers first as substitutes has vindicated itself (Smith).

That less than two-thirds of the girls remained in the Manhattan Trade School throughout the year (Marshall).

That, to keep the girls longer, positions are found only for those who stay, despite the claim that girls leave before the term "through absolute necessity of partial self-support" (Marshall).

That the gratifying results of the Trade School for Boys are confined to the field of printing, which is next to last in popularity (Straubenmuller).

That the summer course for girls be given up to making garments for themselves during the summer (Marshall).

That trade school records show what and how the pupils are doing who graduate from school, how many leave school and do not enter the trades or work for which they partially prepared, causes of leaving (Straubenmuller).

That an association be formed of pupils who will attend to the follow-up work, such as recording data of the children who have left, obtained employment, etc. (Straubenmuller).

That the school year for the Girls' Trade School be the same as for day schools and that during the summer term girls make garments for themselves (Marshall).

That all excess of sales above the cost of materials up to \$3 per girl be set aside for the manufacture of clothing for the girls' own use (Marshall).

That the circular for elementary school graduates include special mention of the Trade School for Boys (Straubenmuller, Pickett).

To the Committee on Special Schools:

That persons who have failed in the examination for license as Principals of the evening schools have been later nominated by the Board of Superintendents and employed by the Board of Education as Teachers in charge of these very schools (Smith).

That 97.25 per cent. of 6,299 children in study rooms received promotion who would not otherwise have received it (Stitt).

That too much time has been spent on examining candidates for vacation school positions who are wholly unfit (Smith).

To the Special Committee on Records and Reports:

That the official record and testimony of principals and superintendents afford but a slender basis of determining those fit and those unfit, and the reports now used differ greatly in definiteness and discrimination (Hervey).

Whether this Board should ask for reports from its representatives to national and international meetings such as are mentioned by Dr. Crampton.

Whether there are other opportunities throughout the school system to reduce error and to make it possible for the report on certain licenses to be issued three months earlier than usual (Byrnes).

Whether more adequate records are needed of causes for leaving schools of all kinds, as urged by Mr. Straubenmuller for the Vocational School for Boys.

To the Committee on By-Laws and Legislation:

That Principals be compelled to allow pupils to use text-books of the new grade during vacation (Stitt).

That the date for opening and closing recreation centres be fixed by By-Law (Stitt).

To the Committee on Supplies:

That sanitary soap containers and individual towels be supplied in all schools, and that all floors be treated twice a year with sanitary floor dressing (Crampton).

The report also referred to the Board of Superintendents the following items:

That requirements for Teachers in elementary schools be relaxed (Smith).

That the requirement of three years' experience for Teachers in music and physical training be relaxed (Smith); referred all items contained in the report to the Board of Superintendents, and provided for a Special Committee of Three, consisting of the Chairman of the Committee on Elementary Schools, the Chairman of the Committee on High Schools and a third member to be appointed by the President, to investigate the allegation of dishonesty and of excessive absence contained in the report upon "The Operation of the Retirement Law"; the absences of Superintendents, and the advisability of a by-law governing absence deductions and refunds for others than members of the teaching staff who are entitled to payment from the Retirement Fund.

The President appointed Mr. Churchill as the third member of the Special Committee of Three.

A communication from the City Superintendent of Schools, dated October 9, 1912, with reports of Associate City Superintendent Walsh and Mr. Felix Arnold, Principal of Public School 30, Manhattan, attached, in reply to a publication in certain of the daily papers of this City of what purported to be an abstract of a report on "Over-age and Method of Determining Over-age" prepared by Dr. Frank P. Bachman, "Educational Expert" for the Committee on School Inquiry, was ordered to be printed in the Minutes, and also as a separate document.

On motion, the Board adjourned at 6.20 o'clock p. m.

2. Certificates of death will be returned for

additional information, which give any of the following diseases, without explanation as the sole cause of death:

Abortion, cellulitis, childbirth, convulsions, erysipelas, gangrene, gastritis, hemorrhage, meningitis, metritis, miscarriage, peritonitis, phlebitis, pyemia, septicemia, tetanus.

(Any of these may be the result of an injury, and thus be subject for investigation by a Coroner. If it is not, the certificate should make that fact plain.)

3. No certificate will be accepted which gives a mere symptom as the sole cause of death (such as "asphyxia," "debility," "droopy," "heart failure," etc.), unless accompanied by a satisfactory written explanation.

Resolved, That the following rules and regulations for the conduct of poultry slaughter houses, which are issued by authority of the Board of Health, be and the same are hereby adopted:

1. The floors of the premises must be swept, flushed and deodorized at the close of business each day.

2. All parts of the walls and ceilings must be kept in a clean condition, and painted or whitewashed as often as may be required by an Inspector of the Department of Health.

3. All parts of cages and gutters must be kept in a clean condition, and painted as frequently as may be required by an Inspector of the Department of Health. The floors of all cages must be scraped and cleaned immediately after emptying.

4. Cages shall not be used continuously for the storage of poultry for a longer period than three days without emptying and cleaning.

5. The sides of the killing-room, the absorption box and the gutter beneath the same shall be thoroughly cleaned with a solution of washing soda (one-half pound of washing soda to a pailful of hot water) and thoroughly flushed at the close of business each day.

6. Poultry shall be killed only in that part of the premises set apart for the purpose, except that when desired galvanized iron water-tight cans may be used in any part of the premises provided the blood is properly absorbed by sawdust.

7. Sawdust which has been used for the absorption of blood or other purposes, and all refuse of every kind whatsoever, shall be deodorized and removed from the premises at the close of business each day.

8. Empty crates must not be stored on the premises except in such places as may be designated by an Inspector of the Department of Health.

9. The accumulation of disused barrels, boxes, crates, or other offensive material or refuse upon the premises, is prohibited.

10. Poultry shall not be allowed at large upon the premises.

11. A PERMIT TO CONDUCT A POULTRY SLAUGHTER HOUSE DOES NOT INCLUDE THE PRIVILEGE OF SELLING LIVE POULTRY, AND NO LIVE POULTRY SHALL BE SOLD FROM ANY POULTRY SLAUGHTER HOUSE UNLESS IN ACCORDANCE WITH A SPECIAL PERMIT ISSUED THEREFOR.

NOTE—Any violation of these rules and regulations may be followed by prosecution for the recovery of a penalty or may be deemed sufficient cause for the revocation of the permit to slaughter poultry.

TO TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY.

Burial Permits.

1. No burial permit for a person deceased in The City of New York will be issued except in exchange for a proper certificate of death.

(If a permit already issued has been lost or mislaid, a duplicate will be issued only in exchange for an affidavit of the undertaker that the first one has been lost, and that, if found, it will be returned to the Department of Health.)

2. Certificates of death must be filled out with black ink.

3. No certificate will be accepted which has been corrected, interlined or altered in any way so as to change its meaning.

4. No certificate will be accepted which is imperfectly filled out (except for foundlings or the unknown dead) or which is illegible.

5. No earth burials are allowed below 130th st. No vault below that street shall be opened for the deposit of a body, without the approval of the Sanitary Superintendent or Assistant Sanitary Superintendent.

6. If a permit is issued for burial in the City Cemetery, the coupons are removed and retained by the Bureau of Records. If a change in the place of burial renders it necessary to use the coupons, they can be procured at the Permit Office on showing the original permit and making a written statement of the change.

(Every change in the place of burial from that originally given when the permit is issued must be reported at the Burial Permit Office and the permit exchanged for a new one.)

Transit Permits.

1. Transit permits will be issued for the burial in or passage through the City of bodies of persons who died outside of The City of New York only in exchange for the papers and evidences of identity and of the cause of death which have accompanied the body from the place of death, and upon a written statement (on blanks furnished by the Department) of the persons applying for such permits.

2. Such permits will be required in every case, excepting when the body is accompanied by a permit issued by the proper health officer, under the laws of the State of New York, New Jersey or Connecticut, a transit permit issued in either of those States having the same effect in The City of New York as one issued by this Department.

3. Transit permits will not, in any case, be issued in advance of the arrival of the body, whether by ship, boat or railroad, nor will such permit be issued when the death was due to yellow fever, Asiatic cholera or smallpox, excepting by express permission of the President of the Department, on personal application to him.

4. Transit permits will be issued for the removal of a dead body from one portion of the City to another, for the convenience of the family or the undertaker. Such permit will have no coupons, and must be returned to the Department of Health when the burial permit is applied for.

Disinterment Permits.

1. Permits for the disinterment of bodies already buried within the limits of The City of New York will be issued upon written application (on blanks furnished by the Department of Health) of relatives of the deceased, or other persons who furnish sworn evidence from such relatives that they have been authorized by them to apply for such permit.

2. Permits for disinterment must be countersigned by the Sanitary Superintendent or the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent.

3. Bodies which are disinterred must be placed in hermetically sealed caskets or coffins, unless otherwise ordered by the Sanitary Superintendent or Assistant Sanitary Superintendent.

Cemeteries.
Superintendents and keepers of crematories or cemeteries must not receive permits upon which alterations have been made as to the name, age, place and cause of death, or place of burial.

Fifth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said supplemental and amended abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 11th day of April, 1913, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing supplemental and amended abstracts of estimate and assessment, or to either of them, the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but not to be applied at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and it is further

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
