### Borough of Richmond.

Local Board, Staten Island District. Meeting July 8, 1913, 7.30 p. m. Present, Aldermen Fink, O'Rourke, Cole; President Cromwell. The minutes of the meeting of June 24 were approved.

No. 1345. Petition. First hearing. To pave or repair sidewalks in 2d ave., Ward 1, between Bismarck ave. and Jersey st. Laid over to September.

No. 1346. Petition. First hearing. To construct curb and gutter, where not done, in 4th ave., Ward 1, between Bismarck ave. and Jersey st. Laid over to September.

No. 1347. Petition. First hearing. To construct curb and gutter on the south side of Richmond road, between Moore st. and the top of the grade, near the northerly property line of St. Andrews Church rectory. Laid over to September, three Aldermen voting in the affirmative and President Cromwell in the negative.

No. 1336. Petition. Fourth hearing. To regulate and grade Clinton ave., Ward 3, between Richmond ave. and Lafayette ave. Laid over to September.

No. 1343. Petition. Second hearing (Resolution 98, 1912-1913). The following resolution was adopted by full vote:

To regulate and grade Heberton ave. from a point about 195 feet north of the north house line of Ann st. to Richmond terrace, in the 3d Ward, and to pave the roadway thereof with bituminous macadam (preliminary) pavement, build concrete retaining wall, set bluestone curb in concrete, lay vitrified brick gutter three (3) feet wide (permanent pavement) on a six (6) inch concrete foundation, construct cement walks, lay granite block dish gutter (permanent pavement) on a six (6) inch concrete foundation at the intersection of Richmond terrace, reset old curbstone and relay old sidewalk.

No. 1249. Proposal. First hearing. Resolution 48 for sidewalk, curb and gut-

ter in Warren st., Ward 2, having been recalled from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and a proposal for more extensive improvement being laid before the Board after due advertisement, it was laid over to September.

No. 1150A. Proposal. First hearing. (Resolutions 99, 100). Resolutions adopted in 1911, and the Engineer's statement accompanying them having been found to describe Southside boulevard as extending between Parkinson ave. and Centre st. (or Rosebank ave.), whereas the map showed an additional sketch of road beyond Parkinson ave., the matter was laid before the Board after due advertisement, with Engineer's estimate, and the following two resolutions were adopted by full vote:

To open Southside boulevard from the easterly line of Parkinson ave. to a point about 1,050 feet southerly therefrom, in the 4th Ward.

To regulate and grade Southside boulevard from the easterly line of Parkinson ave. to a point about 1,050 feet southerly therefrom, with the necessary facilities for drainage, in the 4th Ward.

No. 1324. Petition. Third hearing. (Resolution 101) The following resolution was adopted by full vote:

To open for public use as a recreation park the property shown on a map or plan of The City of New York entitled "Map of proposed park at Richmond terrace and Church st., 1st Ward, Borough of Richmond," and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northerly line of Richmond terrace, as shown on map of Richmond terrace, from Nicholas st. to Westervelt ave., January, 1896, Theodor S. Oxholm, Village Engineer, 443.3 feet, more or less, easterly from the intersection of the easterly line of Church st., produced with said northerly line of Richmond terrace, on the line separating the property now or formerly of George Harding from that of Louise C. Rockwell.

1. Thence northerly along said property line 112.5 feet, more or less, to a point 6.5 feet southerly from the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad.

2. Thence westerly parallel with and distant 6.5 feet southerly from the southerly line of the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad 281 feet, be the same more or less.

3. Thence westerly curving to the left on the arc of a circle of 955.37 feet radius, be the same more or less, 416 feet, more or less, to an angle in the southerly line of the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad.

4. Thence westerly along said southerly line of the right of way of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad 227.2 feet, more or less, to the division line separating the property of Chas. Rosenberg from the estate of John M. Pendleton.

5. Thence southerly 8 feet, more or less, along said division line to the northerly line of Richmond terrace, as above mentioned.

6. Thence easterly along said northerly line of Richmond terrace to the point or place of beginning.

—and be it further  
Resolved, That it is the sense of the Local Board of the Staten Island District that a major portion of the cost of acquiring the above described property should be borne by the City at large, and that such portion as shall be assessed locally be spread over a large area; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate the physical improvement of said area as a recreation park, and asks that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment assume for the City at large a major portion of the expense, and assess over an area similar to that decided on for the acquisition of the property, such portion of the expense as it may be determined must be collected locally.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

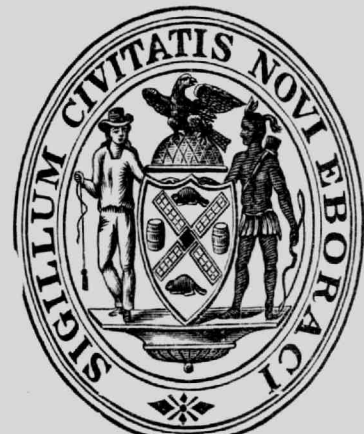

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
