COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the President, Borough of Queens:

No. 982.

President of the Borough of Queens—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$122,571.75, Being the Estimated Cost of Repairing and Rendering Sanitary an Open Drain from Water St. to Beaver St. to South St. and Thence to Baisley's Pond, in the Jamaica Section of Said Borough.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, October 8, 1914.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I hereby request your approval in accordance with subdivision 8 of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter of an issue of Special Revenue Bonds amounting to \$122,571.75, the estimated cost of repairing and rendering sanitary an open drain from Water Street to Beaver Street to South Street and thence to Baisleys Pond in the Jamaica section of this Borough.

The Department of Health on May 5, 1913, submitted a detailed report regarding the offensive condition of this drain and recommended that it be declared a public nuisance. The drain is almost continually obstructed and is a receiving basin for rubbish and dead animals and when it is obstructed and a storm occurs the foul smelling liquid filth from the same flows over low adjoining lands and after the water recedes deposits of filth are left in many small depressions on the land, where it remains until it is dried up by the sun, the heat of which on the same adds to the nuisance.

Not only is this open drain a nuisance and a detriment to health but it is also a menace to the small house owners south of South Street, whose homes adjoin it for the reason that the cellars become flooded when it overflows, causing foul odors within.

The estimate submitted contemplates the building of a covered drain or wooden flume from Beaver Street to South Street at a cost of \$17,424.75.

From South Street to Baisleys Pond, a distance of 6,730 feet, it is proposed to grade and clean this ditch and replace the existing culverts, which are too small, with larger ones, and put the ditch in a sanitary and sightly condition, the estimated cost of which is \$105,147.00.

The estimate is based upon a careful survey of the conditions by the Bureau of Sewers of this department and I would be pleased to have them appear before you or your committee at any time, and would be pleased to furnish you with any additional information you may desire.

"To turn out promptly the great number of work specifications for all classes of City service now being prepared by this bureau, there is need of the services of either several additional Typewriting Copyists and the purchase of typewriting machines, or a well operated printing machine. The latter is the more economical. The multigraph machine now owned by the bureau is the best adapted machine in general commercial use to turn out clean copies of specifications in sufficient numbers. To operate this machine, however, the services of a specially trained man are necessary. The rate of \$3 per day is the minimum generally paid in private employment for this type of work. The bureau does not need the services of an operator permanently, but periodically for limited time."

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On September 1, 1914, the Municipal Civil Service Commission requested the establishment for its office of certain additional grades of positions in accordance with Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter. On September 21, 1914, the request was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon, under date of October 6, 1914, as follows:

"It is requested that the following additional grades be established:

"The purpose of these establishments is not to increase the present force of the Commission but to provide appropriate titles for the employees filling these positions who had the title of Monitors and were paid on a per diem basis.

"The position of Custodian at \$1,500 is requested for Mrs. Hahn who is now receiving \$5 per day. Mrs. Hahn is in charge of the Question Room. She gives sample questions to applicants and is responsible for the safe keeping of examination papers while in the hands of applicants who have asked permission to review them. A salary of \$1,260 is the maximum allowed for this work.

"The position of Tabulator at \$1,050 is requested for Miss Rivola, who is now receiving \$3.50 per day. Miss Rivola computes the final marks on examination papers and tabulates them. The requested compensation of \$1,050 is reasonable.

"The position of Attendant at \$900 is requested for Mr. Cavanaugh, who is now receiving \$3 per day as a Monitor. The position of Monitor is temporary. Mr. Cavanaugh, however, is steadily employed and it is therefore desired to put him into the regular service under an appropriate title. The requested compensation of \$900 is reasonable.

"The five positions of Investigator at \$1,500 are requested in order to enable the Commission to appoint five men in place of Monitors who have formerly performed this work and who have been laid off. The function of these employees is to investigate the statements of experience of all applicants and to make such other investigations as may be deemed necessary to ascertain whether or not applicants are eligible to take examinations. The Commission at the present time has seven regular Investigators and the additional five are necessary to properly perform this work. The requested compensation of \$1,500 is reasonable."

For printing, approximately \$3,000 will be required until January 1, 1915, and \$2,400 for postage.

The Board of Estimate will act next week on a request to transfer \$1,150 to the necessary order for printing. The transfer of children from school to school will be at its height for the next two months, and even now the necessary blanks have not yet been received. When received, these blanks will last only through the first week in October. Stamps we are now compelled to borrow. For September and October at least \$1,250 should be available for postage.

Dear Sirs—On or about August 10, 1914, a deed from the City of New York to the State of New York of the premises on Clarkson Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, upon which the Long Island State Hospital is built, including also Potter's Field, for the burial of unclaimed dead for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, adjoining on the east, was executed, delivered and recorded. On August 11, 1914, we received notice from Dr. Elbert M. Somers, Superintendent of the Long Island State Hospital, that in view of the transfer of title of these premises to the State, for whom he was acting, he would ask this Department to cease burying bodies in this Potter's Field. This notice was wholly unexpected to us, and we do not know what provision was made in the prior negotiations for the exchange of this land as to future burials of pauper dead for these Boroughs; but, by negotiation with Dr. Somers, we succeeded in getting him to extend the time when this prohibition should take effect to September 1st, and we are endeavoring to get him to grant us a further extension to October 1st. An immediate inquiry satisfies us that the only way in which this service can be taken care of is to transport the bodies from the City Morgue, Brooklyn Division, to the City Morgue, Manhattan Division, for transportation thence and burial in the Potter's Field on Harts Island, like bodies coming from the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. In view of the small size and inadequate accommodations of the City Morgue, Brooklyn Division, on Clarkson Avenue, which must act as a collecting place for these bodies, it will be necessary for us to arrange for the transportation of bodies to Manhattan not less than three days a week. At the present moment the Department is without a single piece of equipment, vehicle, automobile or horse, which is not in full service, and which could be diverted to or required also to take care of this transfer service. Under the circumstances, therefore, I see no solution except to ask for funds sufficient to purchase an automobile hearse, which, I am satisfied, would be the most serviceable and economical method of con-

ducting this service, and which, I understand, can be purchased of a suitable character for approximately \$2,500. I think that in view of the unanimous experience of City Departments and the reasons which customarily have influenced your Committee to grant the necessary permission, it will be cheaper, as it certainly will be quicker, to permit us to make the purchase of this automobile hearse without requiring advertisement and the submission of bids therefor.

Will you please, therefore, kindly grant an issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$2,500 for the purpose of purchasing, without public letting, for the use of the Department of Public Charities, one automobile hearse? Very truly yours,

Gentlemen—On June 19, 1914, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requested the amendment of the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 26, 1913, authorizing the issue of \$10,000 corporate stock for the construction of a roof classroom for anaemic children at the Public Bath in East 54th street, Manhattan, by reducing the authorization to \$9,000. No plans have been prepared for the roof classroom. The estimate of \$10,000 was approximate only. The work necessary to provide the roof classroom can be completed for \$9,000.

Public School 135 is located at East 51st street and First Avenue. It is proposed to alter the corner room on the third floor into an open air classroom by constructing a window on the 51st street side and enlarging the window on the First Avenue side. The sum of \$1,000 will be sufficient to cover the cost of this work and provide the necessary equipment and furniture.

It is quite probable that the construction of this classroom will render unnecessary the construction of the roof classroom on the Public Bath Building which is located at East 54th street, between First and Second Avenues, little more than three blocks distant.

Present—Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Louis H. Hahlo, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, and Lawson Purdy, President, Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held September 17, 1914, were approved.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN. Regulating, Etc., W. 215th St.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and constructing steps in W. 215th street, from Broadway to Park Terrace East, and objections thereto, was brought up for action by the Deputy Acting Comptroller, having been laid over for one week at meeting of September 17, 1914, to permit Mr. Wiener to file a brief.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN. Regulating, Etc., Metropolitan Ave.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of the assessment for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Metropolitan avenue from Grand street to Borough line, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, the hearing in regard to which was held September 17, 1914; decision reserved and Mr. Isaacs granted permission to file a brief.

Mr. Isaacs' brief was received and on motion the matter was again laid over and Mr. Isaacs requested to file an additional brief.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of the assessment for paving Flatbush avenue (as extended), from Fulton street to Concord street, and objections thereto, the hearing in regard to which was held September 17, 1914, and decision reserved.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX. Sewers in Lafayette Ave.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in Lafayette avenue between Longwood avenue and Tiffany street, together with all work incidental thereto, and objections of the New York, New Haven & Hartford R. R., filed by Chas. M. Sheafe, Jr., attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of August 21, 1914, the hearing in regard to which having been adjourned one week at meeting held September 17, 1914.

Mr. Sheafe, by representative, was heard in opposition to the assessment. On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

Regulating, Etc., Westchester Ave.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up the matter of the assessment for regulating, grading, building approaches, erecting fences, laying vitrified pipe, lumber, steel rods in place, constructing receiving basins and manholes in Westchester avenue, from Main street (West Farms road) to the Eastern Boulevard, at Pelham Bay Park, except at Westchester Creek. The portion between Blondell avenue and Pelham road to be regulated and graded only to a width of sixty (60) feet in the center thereof; also completing Westchester avenue, from Main street to the Eastern Boulevard. Together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade and objections thereto, the hearing in regard to which was held September 17, 1914, and decision reserved.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, the Deputy and Acting Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments voting in favor thereof, the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel not voting.

Regulating, Etc., Boston Road.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary in Boston Road between White Plains Road and the north line of the City. Bureau of Highways.

The total mileage of pavement in the Borough on June 30, 1914, was 179,176 miles, of which 0.282 miles were Medina Block; 47,530 miles Granite Block; 51,042 miles of Sheet Asphalt; 60,621 miles Asphalt Block; 4,376 miles Wood Block; 0.094 miles Brick; 1,545 miles Iron Slag Pavement; 0.077 miles Trap; 14,609 miles Bituminous Pavement.

The total amount of pavement laid was 4,616 miles, as follows: Granite Block, 1.332; Sheet Asphalt, 0.522; Asphalt Block, 0.000; Bituminous Pavement, 2.762; total paved during quarter, 4.616; Asphalt Block decrease, 0.087; net increase during quarter, 4.529 miles.

Bureau of Sewers.

Ten thousand four hundred and ninety-five 10-100 feet, equalling 1,937 miles, of vitrified pipe sewers from 12 inches to 30 inches in diameter; 6,708.94 linear feet, equalling 1.271 miles, of concrete sewers from 29 inches by 40 inches in diameter to double 10 feet by 8 feet, making a total of 17,204.04 linear feet, or 3,258 miles, were built, thus making the total mileage of the sewerage system 339,312 miles.

Forty-three basins were built, making a total of 3,803 basins connected with the sewerage system.

Highways, Maintenance.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices expended \$5,785.52 on supplies, equipment, etc., furnished to the several public buildings of the bureau.

Local Boards.

Ninety-four petitions were considered by the Local Boards of Morrisania, Chester, Crotona and Van Courtlandt, as follows: Acquiring title, 19; discontinuing proceedings for acquiring title, 2; fixing a date when title will vest to streets for which proceedings have been initiated for acquiring title, 1; extending area of assessment for acquiring title, 1; regulating, grading, setting curbstones, etc., 16; regulating, grading, building approaches, erecting fences, etc., 1; regulating, grading, building steps, etc., 2; regulating, grading and paving with bituminous concrete on a cement concrete foundation (preliminary pavement), 1; reregulating, regrading, etc., 1; regulating and grading only, 1; constructing receiving basins and appurtenances, 3; constructing sewers and appurtenances, 13; constructing drain, 1; paving with sheet asphalt on a concrete foundation (permanent pavement), 1; paving with granite blocks on a sand foundation (preliminary pavement), 1; paving with bituminous concrete on a cement concrete foundation (preliminary pavement), 3; repairing cement sidewalk, 1; setting curbstones and flagging, 1; filling in sunken lots, 2; erecting fences, 1; erecting guard rail, 2; flagging sidewalks, 3; change of street lines, 1; change of grade of streets, 3; change of grades and lines of street, 1; laying out streets on the map of The City of New York, 3; laying out on the map of The City of New York a reduction of width of streets, 3; discontinuing and closing street on the map of The City of New York, 1; removal of encroachments or encumbrances, 2; relief of the congestion at transfer station, 1; change of street names, 1; erecting a fire station, 1—94.

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) in cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than six hundred dollars (\$600).

During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than seven hundred dollars (\$700).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

(c) In addition to the above payments the Company shall pay to the City an annual payment of ten cents (\$0.10) for each linear foot of pipe (where separately constructed) or conduit

constructed within the limits of any street, avenue, highway or other property belonging to the City, excepting, however, such pipes or conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue, highway or other property belonging to the City.

The annual charges shall commence from November 1, 1914.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between November 1, 1914, and December 31, 1914, shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of the City providing for the abatement of such charges or payments for franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of the City to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, or within the districts hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sub-let in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything therein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination or forfeiture of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the pipes, conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets, avenues or other property of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days notice from the Board, remove any and all of its pipes, conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets, avenues or other property of the City shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Should the Company at any time discontinue the use of any pipes or conduits at any time constructed or used by it within either of the districts specified in this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, immediately on such discontinuance remove such pipes or conduits from the streets and restore the surface of the streets to its original condition.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said pipes or conduits, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets, avenues or other property of the City in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City and should the said pipes or conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, avenues or other property of the City, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the pipes, conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the pipes or conduits and the appurtenances thereof.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes hereby authorized whether laid within conduits or separately whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and

Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and endorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates for refrigeration to be furnished to boxes properly insulated at a temperature not lower than 32 degrees Fahrenheit:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

These rates shall not apply to boxes located above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the minimum and maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within District Number 1, or if such district be extended as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended district, shall extend its pipes or conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.

Nothing contained in this subdivision shall affect the obligations of the Company, as hereinbefore contained, to extend its conduits and pipes outside the present boundaries of District Number 1, so as to furnish refrigeration to the premises of the Steel-Drake Baking Company, known as 42, 43, 44, 45, 159, 160 and 162 Wallabout Market.

Sixteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1915, showing the exact location of all pipes, conduits and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such pipes and conduits.

On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished to the Board showing all pipes and conduits laid during the preceding year.

Seventeenth—The pipes and conduits hereby authorized shall be used only by the Kings County Refrigerating Company, and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.

Eighteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than February 1, in each year, for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

- 1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. Number of feet of pipe and conduit now laid.
12. The total amount expended for same.
13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.
14. The total amount expended for same.
15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.
16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.
17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.
18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.
19. Number of outside consumers supplied.
20. Amounts paid by Company for damages to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
21. Total expenses of operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of pipe and conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the pipes and conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith. Any false entry in the books of the Company or false statement in the reports to the Comptroller as to a material fact knowingly made by the Company shall constitute such a violation or breach or failure to comply with the provisions herein contained as to warrant the forfeiture of the franchise.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its pipes, conduits and appurtenances as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon fail-

ure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board in case such pipes, conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any act or default of the Company.

Twenty-third—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation, which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any default made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. These provisions for the recovery of penalties are in addition to the right to forfeit the franchise conferred by Section 3, Twentieth, of this contract.

Twenty-fourth—The grant of this franchise, so far as it shall affect the Wallabout Market lands, is and shall be subject to such further conditions, restrictions, agreement or consent as the Comptroller may see fit to impose or require, pursuant to the authority and control over the lands of the Wallabout Market vested in him by the Charter of the City.

Twenty-fifth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-sixth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," included in the districts hereinabove described, and under the surface of or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct or maintain its pipes or conduits.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

SECTION 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the party of the first part by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the contract and the security deposited for the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
