An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 4 of Section 149 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Stands Within Stoop Lines and Under Elevated Railway Stations, Effective July 13, 1916. By Alderman McManus—

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 4 of section 149 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to stands within stoop lines and under elevated railway stations, effective July 13, 1916.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Subdivision 4 of section 149 of article 13 of chapter 23 of the Code

of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows: 4. License fees; term. The annual license fee for a stand under the stairs of an elevated railroad station shall be \$10. All stands within the stoop line shall be classified, and the annual license fee therefor shall be fixed and collected as specified in the schedule following:

(a) Stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, \$5; Stands for the sale of fruits, or soda water or both, \$10;

Stands for the sale of cigars, or cigarettes, or tobacco, or the three, \$5;

Stands for the sale of candies or confectionery articles, or both, \$5: (e) Boot black stands, each chair, \$5.

A license may be issued in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this section, and in the discretion of the commissioner, covering the sale of any combination of the classes of goods mentioned above, to be sold, however, from only one stand not exceeding the legal size hereinafter prescribed in this section; except that where boot black chairs are included in the combination, the space hereinafter prescribed for boot black chairs may be allowed in addition to the stand for the sale of other articles. The fees to be paid for such combination licenses shall be calculated in accordance with the above schedule for each kind of article permitted to be sold, or for each boot black chair to be operated.

No license shall be required for stands within stoop lines for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, or both, in cases when such stands are conducted by dealers who are the owners or occupants of the premises or stores in front of which the same are situated. Licenses for stands within stoop lines or under the stairs of any elevated railway station shall be issued as of December 1, and shall expire on the 30th day of November next succeeding the date of issuance thereof [.], excepting that applicants for licenses in the interim between the license year shall be charged by fee in proportion to the months of occupancy, fractions of months, however, not to be taken into consideration.

The economic situation concerning flour and bread is of such a character that the people of New York City should have the advantages of an ordinance regulating the sale of bread through such a method as to deal fairly with them, as well as to relieve purveyors of bread of existing perplexities under existing laws with which they are obliged to meet.

In the opinion of Weight and Measure Officials in the United States as well as LINS, JAMES R. FERGUSON, WILLIAM H. BURNS, CHAS. H. HAUBERT, in Europe, bread should be sold on the basis of a standard weight loat, using the pound-sixteen (10) ounces, as the standard; the public to buy their bread by the pound, or any part of the pound, or any excess of the pound, suiting their purchases to the quantity desired as well as the price they can afford. The people of this City should have an ordinance which will permit of their being convenienced to buy what bread they please at a weight according to the price they can afford.

An ordinance of similar character is in existence in many large cities of the United States, and has proven satisfactory to the consumer as well as to the baker. No more equitable method exists than that of establishing a standard weight from which divisions of that weight may be established, and upon which weight the price may be regulated through competition in the trade.

I most respectfully urge upon you the enactment of this ordinance as part of the organic law of the City of New York.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "snow and ice," as amended. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "Snow and Ice," as amended May 11, 1915, and July 16, 1915,

respectively, is hereby further amended to read as follows: §21. Property owners' duties. 1. Must clear sidewalks. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall within [4] 24 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter[, the time between 9 P. M. and 7 A. M. not being included in the above period of 4 hours]; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the commissioner of street cleaning, or by the borough president of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said commissioner of street cleaning, or of said borough president of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow and ice, dirt or other material; except that in the boroughs of Queens or Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant, or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said [4] 24 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

[Whenever] Any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved who shall [fail] have failed to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, shall, upon conviction thereof be punished by a fine of not more than \$3. In the event that any of the persons above named shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow and ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lots abuts, the president of the borough in which such building or vacant lot is located may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said borough president to the comptroller, and the board of estimate and apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such snow and ice [and snow], dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the comptroller, as provided

The said borough president shall, as soon as possible, after the work of such removal is done, certify to the corporation counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each [piece of property] lot of ground affected.

The corporation counsel is hereby directed and authorized [to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with \$3 penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over] to immediately thereafter prepare and file in the office of the clerk of the county in which the particular lot of ground is located, a notice of lien in favor of The City of New York for the amount paid for the removal of such snow and ice, dirt or other material, and in addition thereto the further sum of \$3 penalty for each offense against the particular lot of ground affected; said lien to remain such against said property until paid. The corporation counsel shall serve or cause to be served by mail upon the owner of the property affected a copy of said notice of lien, contained in a securely closed post-paid wrapper, addressed to such owner at his last known place of residence. Upon payment of such lien the corporation counsel shall execute and deliver a satisfaction piece of such lien and turn over the amount so received and collected by him to the city chamberlain to the credit of the general fund of The City of New York for the reduction Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

on November 16, 1916, reports thereon as follows: On November 2, 1916, the Police Commissioner requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer accruals in the sum of \$17,260 to meet estimated deficiencies in many of the same accounts for which revenue bonds are here requested.

It is therefore necessary to consider these two requests together. A careful examination of the accounts, the stock records and the actual stock on hand, indicates that the supplies and materials necessary for the remainder of the year are as follows:

The deficiency in these accounts is mainly due to the increased cost of all kinds of supplies and material. There has also been an increased consumption of many of the different kinds of supplies on account of the carmen's strike.

The accounts to be credited in the issue of special revenue bonds, with the total amount requested in both transfer and revenue bonds, together with the facts in each case, are as follows:

Code 1611, Fuel Supplies, \$2,955. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of gasoline used in the Police launches and the increased cost of coal used in the steamer "Patrol."

On November 9, 1916, this account showed a balance of \$6,939.14 unencumbered, but this will be hardly sufficient to buy the necessary coal for precinct station houses for the remainder of the year. The sum of \$2,955 is reasonable for gasoline for

launches and coal for steamer "Patrol."

Code 1612, Office Supplies, \$11,000. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of this class of supplies generally, and especially paper.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$336.96 in this account. However, it has been necessary to already obtain forms, record books and paper which were absolutely essential in the police procedure and there are many supplies of a like nature that will be necessary before the end of the year, such as paper for finger print forms, typewriter paper and ribbons, and photo plates for the Detective Bureau, all of which will cost approximately \$9,500.

Code 1615, Motor Vehicle Supplies, \$8,100. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of gasoline and to the additional equipment which has been put into service since August of this year.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of only \$31.80 and gasoline, lubricating oil, batteries, grease, patches, etc., amounting to approximately \$7,500.

will be needed for operation till the end of the year.

Code 1617, Office Equipment, \$250. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of filing cabinets for which the special revenue bonds were authorized on September 29, 1916.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$771 in this account.

There is no urgent need for funds in this account. Code 1621a. Motor Vehicles and Equipment, \$1,800. The deficiency in this code is due to the increase in motor equipment put into service since August, 1916.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of approximately \$300, and there will be needed in addition to this before the end of the year approximately \$1,500 for tires for motorcycles and automobiles.

Code 1624, General Plant Material, \$2,470. The deficiency in this code is due to the high cost of materials and to the increased number of motor vehicles put into service.

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$21.62. The sum of \$2,000 will be needed for parts for automobiles, motorcycles and bicycles which will have to be overhauled before the end of the year.

Code 1632, General Plant Service, \$4,900. The deficiency in this code is principally due to the maintenance of gas lights by the Welsbach Co., which was not provided for in the budget. It was presumed by the budget examiner that this maintenance was unnecessary-should be discontinued and the department maintain the lights with their own employees. The Police Commissioner states that he was advised at the budget making that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity would look after the lights, but that when requested to do so they did not act in the matter and therefore outside service was continued.

There is no reason why the police employees should not maintain these lights at much less expense than the outside service is now costing and the department has agreed to do this after November 30, 1916. The sum of \$4,600 is needed for past service bills, rentals of premises, storage of motor patrols, storage of motorcycles to the end of the year.

Code 1633, Motor Vehicle Repairs, \$2,300. The deficiency in this code is due to the increase in equipment put into service and the extra amount of service constantly maintained since August, 1916. There is a balance of only \$2.34 in this account. The sum of \$2,300 is needed for repairs to two cars which have already been repaired on account of emergency at a cost of approximately \$500 each, two cars which are now under repair at an estimated cost of \$800, and several cars that will have to undergo repairs during November and December.

It will be seen from the foregoing that there appears to be need for an authorization of special revenue bonds to the extent of \$14,495, as follows: Code 1611 Fuel Supplies Code 1612 Office Supplies Code 1615 Motor Vehicle Supplies 4,200 00 Code 1621a Motor Vehicles and Equipment..... The deficiency in these accounts is mainly due to the increased cost of all kinds of supplies and material. There has also been an increased consumption of many of the different kinds of supplies on account of the carmen's strike.

The accounts to be credited in the issue of special revenue bonds, with the total amount requested in both transfer and revenue bonds, together with the facts in each case, are as follows:

Code 1611, Fuel Supplies, \$2,955. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of gasoline used in the Police launches and the increased cost of coal used in the steamer "Patrol."

On November 9, 1916, this account showed a balance of \$6,939.14 unencumbered, but this will be hardly sufficient to buy the necessary coal for precinct station houses for the remainder of the year. The sum of \$2,955 is reasonable for gasoline for launches and coal for steamer "Patrol."

Code 1612, Office Supplies, \$11,000. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of this class of supplies generally, and especially paper,

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$336.96 in this account. However, it has been necessary to already obtain forms, record books and paper which were absolutely essential in the police procedure and there are many supplies of a like nature that will be necessary before the end of the year, such as paper for finger print forms, typewriter paper and ribbons, and photo plates for the Detective Bureau, all of which will cost approximately \$9,500.

Code 1615, Motor Vehicle Supplies, \$8,100. The deficiency in this code is due

to the increased cost of gasoline and to the additional equipment which has been

put into service since August of this year. On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of only \$31.80 and gasoline, lubricating oil, batteries, grease, patches, etc., amounting to approximately \$7,500,

will be needed for operation till the end of the year. Code 1617, Office Equipment, \$250. The deficiency in this code is due to the increased cost of filing cabinets for which the special revenue bonds were authorized

on September 29, 1916. On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$771 in this account.

Code 1624, General Plant Material, \$2,470. The deficiency in this code is due to the high cost of materials and to the increased number of motor vehicles put into

On November 9, 1916, there was an unencumbered balance of \$21.62. The sum of \$2,000 will be needed for parts for automobiles, motorcycles and bicycles which will have to be overhauled before the end of the year.

Code 1632, General Plant Service, \$4,900. The deficiency in this code is principally due to the maintenance of gas lights by the Welsbach Co., which was not provided for in the budget. It was presumed by the budget examiner that this maintenance was unnecessary-should be discontinued and the department maintain the lights with their own employees. The Police Commissioner states that he was advised at the budget making that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity would look after the lights, but that when requested to do so they did not act in the matter and therefore outside service was continued.

There is no reason why the police employees should not maintain these lights at much less expense than the outside service is now costing and the department has agreed to do this after November 30, 1916. The sum of \$4,600 is needed for past service bills, rentals of premises, storage of motor patrols, storage of motorcycles to

the end of the year. Code 1633, Motor Vehicle Repairs, \$2,300. The deficiency in this code is due to the increase in equipment put into service and the extra amount of service constantly maintained since August, 1916. There is a balance of only \$2.34 in this account. The sum of \$2,300 is needed for repairs to two cars which have already been repaired on account of emergency at a cost of approximately \$500 each, two cars which are now under repair at an estimated cost of \$800, and several cars that will have to undergo

repairs during November and December. It will be seen from the foregoing that there appears to be need for an authoriza



No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The contract must be bid in separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids

or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon applications therefore at the office of the Department for
