Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Sept.

26, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,194, as follows: 5 public buildings, 959 tenement houses, 16 private dwellings, 190 other dwellings, 18 manufactories and workshops, 60 stores and warehouses, 105 stables, 2 markets, 47 slaughter-houses, 2 public sewers and drains, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 10 fat-rendering establishments, 3 manure dumps, 60 sunken and vacant lots, 5 dumping-ground 2 piggeries, 66 yards, courts, and areas, 169 cellars and basements, 59 waste-pipes and drains, 148 privies and water-closets, 57 street-gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 41 other nuisances, together with 34 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 676.

During the past week 68 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 69 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 58 houses, 58 privysinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have disinfected 142½ miles of streetgutters in the following Wards, viz.: First, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, and Twentieth. They have also disinfected 3,994 privies and water-closets, 209 yards, courts, and areas, and 89 cellars and basements.

26 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital and I dead body to the morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 76 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

105 permits were granted Scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy vaults.

The following number of cases of contagious disease were reported for the week ending September 26, 1874: Typhoid fever, 14; scarlet fever, 22; diptheria, 38; small-pox, 43; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1.

333 loads of night-soil were removed by the Scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food: Cattle, 2 carcasses; Calves, 15 carcasses; sheep, 2 carcasses; beef, 160 pounds; poultry, 38 pounds; antelope, 270 pounds; fish, 3,375 rounds

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending September 26, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 529 burial permits for city deaths, 27 for bodies in transitu, and 34 for the interment of still-born infants. There and 34 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 529 deaths, 139 marriages, 498 births, 34 still-births, 27 applications for transit permits, and 40 returns from Coroners. There were 24 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 7 transcripts of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 25 of death were issued from this Bureau; 2 cases of death were referred to the Coroners. to the Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—In the week ending on Saturday, the 26th inst., there were 529 deaths reported in this city, against 540 which were verified in the previous week. There was a decrease of 17 deaths from diarrhoeal diseases, and a still greater decrease of

mortality in children under five years of age. The death-rate, which, in the week ending on the 19th inst. was equal to 27 in the 1,000 inhabitants yearly, decreased last week to 26.45. The death-rate by diarrheal diseases was e jual to 6.75 and 5.90 per 1,000 yearly in the successive weeks. There was a marked decrease of fatality from diphtheria and scarlatina, but there were 11 deaths from small-pox, against 4 in the previous week, and an average of 7 deaths per week by that disease in the past three months. The resumption of the duty of vaccination, with greatly increased facilities, by the Board of Health, is timely. The increase of infants and other persons susceptible to small-pox in the tenement population of New small-pox in the tenement population of New York is at the rate of about 2,000 each month.

All the maritime cities of the United States, as well as those of the interior, continue to report their freedom from epidemic diseases, and in most of them the death-rate is lower than in the pre-

vious two years.

The chief cities of Europe report as follows The chief cities of Europe report as follows: In London, the week ending September 12, the equivalent of the yearly rate was 19 in the 1,000 inhabitants, and in the 21 chief cities and towns of Great Britain, 23 in the 1,000. In Paris, the rate was 21; in Munich, the previous week, 30; in Vienna only 21, and in Berlin, the previous week, 31; and in Rome, the same week, 32 per 1,000. In the latter city, which has for more than two thousand years, witnessed the sanitary necessities and the benefits of thorough drainage, 19 of its 179 deaths, the last week in August, were from pernicious intermittent fever.
