On motion of Alderman Seaman, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

On motion of Alderman McClave, the Board went into Committee of the Whole, for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1883, being number 534 on the list of General Orders.

And the President called Alderman Hawes to the chair.

After some time spent therein, the Committee, on motion of Alderman Wells, arose, and the President resumed the chair.

Alderman Hawes, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported as follows:

The Committee of the Whole, having had under consideration the Provisional Estimate for conducting the public business of the City and County of New York for the year 1883, have made hereto the following amendments, which I am instructed to report to the Board for adoption, viz.:

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Salaries of Captains, Sergeants, etc., \$94,000; increased to \$98,303.
Maintenance Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—Maintenance and government of public places, streets, roads, etc., \$60,000; increased to \$80,000.
Add item for rebuilding Hotel of Mount St. Vincent, \$25,000.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Police Fund (Salaries of Commissioners, Superintendent, etc.)—For salaries of Patrolmen of all grades and of Detective Sergeants, \$2,746,000; increased to \$2,793,795.67.
Add 50 additional Patrolmen at \$800, \$40,000.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

For purchasing and procuring sites for, and erecting new buildings, etc., etc., \$400,000; increased to \$550,000.

MISCELLANEOUS PURPOSES.

Add, for expenses of Centennial Celebration of the Evacuation of the City of New York by the British army, on the 25th day of November, 1783, \$100,000.
Support of Prisoners in County Jail—Add \$300 for medicine; \$12,500 increased to \$12,800.

The Surrogate's Office—Add, for contingent expenses, \$1,000.

Shepherd's Fold (Chap. 269, Laws of 1871)—Item of \$5,000 stricken out.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending November 11, 1882.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 1882.—ADJOURNED MEETING—9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe.
Commissioner Wales in the chair.

At the hour of half-past nine o'clock, the Comptroller of the City being present and the meeting open to the public, in the presence of the Comptroller and such of the parties making proposals as were present, the Estimate-box was publicly opened and the estimates or proposals which had been received in pursuance of advertisements duly published in the CITY RECORD, for the following works :

For building the superstructure of the Madison Avenue Bridge over the Harlem river.

For regulating and grading Alexander avenue and also setting curb-stones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, and paving the roadway therein with trap-blocks, from the Southern Boulevard to North Third avenue.

For regulating and grading East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, and also setting curb and gutter stones and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide therein, from Willis avenue to Brook avenue.

For regulating and grading One Hundred and Forty-third street, and also setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide therein, from Willis avenue to Brook avenue.

For regulating and grading, laying crosswalks, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, and setting curb and gutter stones in Depot place, between Sedgwick avenue and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad.

For flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, and setting curb and gutter stones on the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, from Courtland avenue to Morris avenue, and laying a crosswalk in said street at the southern intersection of College avenue.

For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalks four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in Clifton street, from the easterly curb-line of St. Ann's avenue to the westerly curb-line of Union avenue.

For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalks four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between the easterly curb-line of Boston road and the westerly curb-line of Union avenue.

For building the iron superstructure of the Madison avenue bridge over the Harlem river.

The opening of the proposals Nos. 4 and 6 for regulating and grading One Hundred and Fifty-first street, and regulating and grading Morris avenue, was postponed until the next meeting, and the Secretary was directed to confer with the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to the same.

The following resolution was adopted :

Resolved, That permission be and the same hereby is given to the Old Guard to erect, under the supervision of the Superintendent of Parks, around the flag-staff on the Battery, a temporary platform to be used in the celebration of the ensuing anniversary of Evacuation Day.

Pay-rolls, amounting to \$20,736.48, were approved and sent to the Finance Department for payment.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending November 18, 1882.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 1882.—REGULAR MEETING—9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe.

On motion of Commissioner Wales, Commissioner MacLean was called to the chair.

Mr. Storrs, the representative of the Comptroller, being present, the Board proceeded to open bids for the following-named works, which were received on Saturday, 11th instant, and the opening postponed until to-day, the Counsel to the Corporation having decided that it is the duty of the Department to open said bids :

Regulating and grading Morris avenue, and also setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide therein, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street.

Regulating and grading One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and also setting curb and gutter stones and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide therein, from Elton avenue to Courtland avenue.

The president of the Keystone Bridge Company and the president of the Passaic Rolling Mill Company, appeared before the Board, and were heard in relation to the proposals opened on the 11th instant, for the iron superstructure for the Madison avenue Bridge.

A communication was received from the Counsel to the Corporation in relation to the action commenced by the New York Elevated Railroad Company, against the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, and the Commissioner of Public Works, restraining the defendants from interfering with said company in the work of erecting a station at Battery place and Greenwich street, and desiring to be instructed whether or not the Department desires to have the application opposed.

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copies of ordinances and resolutions adopted by said Board and approved by the Mayor.

From the Mayor, transmitting a copy of a resolution of the Board of Aldermen, requesting the Commissioners of this Department to fix the pay of laborers at \$2 per day, and desiring information in relation thereto.

From F. L. Talcott, in relation to the necessity of laying a crosswalk from the southwest to the southeast corner of Fifty-ninth street and Fifth avenue.

From August Braun, applying for the privilege of hiring skates and chairs on the Central Park lakes during the coming skating season.

From Foreman Charles E. B. Coffin, asking to be allowed pay for Sundays.

Mr. W. H. H. Moore, on behalf of the Life Saving Benevolent Association, appeared before the Board and presented to Gatekeeper Gilbert Higgins a silver medal and \$25 in money, as a token of appreciation of his heroic services in saving the life of a woman from drowning in the lower lake, Central Park, on the morning of September 21, 1882.

Charles Schwarz, the lessee of the High Bridge Hotel, was authorized to make the necessary repairs to the roof of the same, under the direction and supervision of the Architect, at an expense not exceeding \$270.

Philip Holden, laborer on parks, was dismissed from the employ of the Department.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted :

Whereas, H. B. Claffin, W. S. Dunn, Wm. Post, executors, etc., of Charles L. Anthony, etc., N. P. Bailey and Mary A. Peck, property-holders in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, have petitioned that they themselves may do the work of opening the proposed extension of Sedgwick avenue, in said city, between its point of intersection with the Old Boston road and its intersection with the Kingsbridge road in the said Twenty-fourth Ward, under the supervision of a proper inspector and engineer, at their own expense, including the charges of the inspector and engineer ;

Resolved, That the prayer of said petitioners be granted, and they themselves allowed to do such work, upon the following terms, conditions and stipulations :

I.—The work shall be under the immediate supervision of the Acting Engineer of Construction of the Department of Public Parks. It shall conform strictly to the grades and lines heretofore established for said portion of Sedgwick avenue, in accordance with law.

II.—The amount of "surveyor's fees," namely, ten cents per lineal foot for 3,683.36 feet, \$368.34, to be deposited with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks.

III.—The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks to appoint an inspector to supervise the execution of the work, to be paid \$3 per diem. The petitioners to deposit with the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, before work is actually begun, a sum sufficient to pay said inspector, at the above-named rate, for twice the time agreed upon by their contractor for doing the work ; and if this sum should prove insufficient, then, from time to time, upon five (5) days notice, such additional sum as the said Commissioners may determine to be necessary to pay said inspector, to be deposited with said Commissioners.

IV.—The regulating and grading shall extend over the full width of the avenue. Slopes in excavation and embankment to extend over adjacent private property.

V.—Proper, easy, and safe connections to be graded from the new work to the present roadway at Kingsbridge road and Boston avenue.

VI.—Any destruction of, or injury to, gas or water pipes or appurtenances thereof, or any loss or damage to the city arising from the work, to be paid for by said petitioners.

VII.—No estimate to be paid to any contractor of said grading until the same has been approved by the Engineer of the Department of Public Parks.

VIII.—The Engineer of the Department of Public Parks not to be called upon to give an exact estimate of work until its final completion ; nor to give approximate estimates oftener than once a month, and then only when the amount of work done since previous estimate would amount to at least \$1,000.

IX.—The specifications included in the contract for doing the work to be approved by the Engineer of the Department of Public Parks.

X.—This permit shall be void after the expiration of two (2) years from date.

XI.—And that the said work shall be done in all respects according to law, and the said petitioners shall indemnify and save harmless the City of New York and the Department of Public Parks, and the Commissioners thereof, of and from all loss and damage, liability and claims arising out of, or in any way connected with said work.

Resolved, That contracts for work, for which proposals were opened on the 11th instant, be awarded as follows :

No. 1. For regulating and grading Alexander avenue, and also setting curb-stones, flagging the sidewalks, laying crosswalks, and paving the roadway therein with trap-blocks, from the Southern Boulevard to North Third avenue ; to James H. Perkins, at \$36,313.

No. 2. For regulating and grading East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, and also setting curb and gutter stones and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide therein, from Willis avenue to Brook avenue ; to James H. Perkins, at \$5,108.54.

No. 3. For regulating and grading One Hundred and Forty-third street, and also setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging the sidewalks four feet wide therein, from Willis avenue to Brook avenue ; to James H. Perkins, at \$4,817.65.

No. 4. For regulating and grading, laying crosswalks, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, and setting curb and gutter stones in Depot place, between Sedgwick avenue and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad ; to Thomas Murray, at \$1,537.84.

No. 5. For flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, and setting curb and gutter stones on the southerly side of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, from Courtland avenue to Morris avenue, and laying a crosswalk in said street at the southern intersection of College avenue ; to Thomas Murray, at \$984.

No. 6. For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalks four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in Clifton street, from the easterly curb-line of St. Ann's avenue to the westerly curb-line of Union avenue ; to B. C. Murray, at \$23,077.50.

No. 7. For regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, flagging the sidewalks four feet wide, and laying crosswalks in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between the easterly curb-line of Boston road and the westerly curb-line of Union avenue ; to James H. Perkins, at \$10,279.60.

—they being the lowest bidders for said several works ; that the proposals of said lowest bidders be

sent to the Comptroller for his approval of sureties, and when so approved that contracts be entered into with the aforementioned parties for doing said works, and that Commissioner MacLean be and he is hereby authorized and designated to sign said contracts for and on behalf of this Department of Public Parks.

Resolved, That the communication from the Mayor be received and answer made thereto: that the appropriations at the disposal of this Department are insufficient to warrant at this time an increase of the pay of laborers to \$2 per day.

Resolved, That the Superintendent Architect, the Superintendent of Parks and the Acting Engineer of Construction report to this Board, at its next meeting, what changes and reductions can be made in the force under their charge without detriment to the service.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and hereby is respectfully requested to transfer the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500) from the appropriation for "Walks, City Parks (other than Central Park), 1882," which is not required for the objects and purposes thereof, to the appropriation for "Laying New and Repairing Old Walks, Central Park, 1882," which is insufficient.

Resolved, That the Chairman, upon consultation with the Topographical Engineer, be and he is hereby authorized to appoint one Assistant Engineer and two assistants, to be employed on tax maps, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, at a compensation the same as now paid persons of similar rank and grade.

Resolved, That Thomas Duggan, double team, be and he is hereby restored to duty in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards, he to drive his own team.

Resolved, That Thomas Cullen and John Reynolds be and they are hereby promoted to the rank and pay of Steam Engineers.

Resolved, That James McVey and Patrick Cummings be and they are hereby restored to duty as laborers on the parks.

Resolved, That when this Board adjourns, it do adjourn to meet on Wednesday next, 22d instant, at 9.30 o'clock, A. M.

Resolved, That Thomas J. McCarthy be and he is hereby appointed a Gatekeeper on the force of the Department.

Cash to the amount of \$1,248.55 was deposited with the Comptroller.

Bills amounting to \$25,101.82 were audited and sent to the Finance Department for payment.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 11, 1882.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1452, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 628 tenement-houses, 107 private dwellings, 55 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 1 lodging-house, 1 swill-house, 1 pier, 1 brewery, 20 sunken and vacant lots, 77 yards, courts and areas, 73 cellars and basements, 165 waste-pipes and drains, 181 privies and water-closets, 5 street-gutters, 11 dangerous stairways, 2 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, and 5 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 486.

During the past week 91 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

52 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

82 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 59 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 59 houses, 59 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 547 births, 55 still-births, 247 marriages, and 563 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 11, 1882. This shows an increase of 10 births and 7 marriages, and a decrease of 11 still-births and 16 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 29 births, 8 still-births and 23 marriages, and a decrease of 54 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the

preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 3; croup, 2; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 15; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis, 6; suicide, 2; and drowning, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 4; whooping cough, 6; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; alcoholism, 5; pneumonia, 11; heart diseases, 10; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; premature and preterm births, 4; surgical operation, 1. The number of deaths from measles, erysipelas, inanition, bronchitis and convulsions was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

SIR—There were 582 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 18, 1882, which is an increase of 19, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 97 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending November 11, 1882, was 594, which is 76.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.89 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,292,334.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 124 were in institutions, 295 in tenement-houses, 133 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 5 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 103 on the first, 127 on the second, 113 on the third, 57 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 558 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents; 50 were stated to be single, 151 married, 51 widowed, and the condition of 311 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 563; still-births, 55; bodies in transit, 22; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 69 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 547 births; 247 marriages; 55 still-births; 563 deaths; 22 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 67 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 0 transcripts of the birth record, 2 of marriage, and 67 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 11, 1882, was 44.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.129, the mean humidity was 82, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 914, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.09 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Potter and others to erect and construct a foot-bridge, with a suitable draw, across the Harlem river, at or near Two Hundred and Seventh street, not to exceed five feet in width, in accordance with the plan submitted therefor, which has been approved by this Board, said structure to be erected under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to remain only during the pleasure of the Board; provided, however, that the same shall be removed by said parties whenever required by the United States Engineer in charge of the improvement of the Harlem river, and provided that the United States Engineer now in charge of said improvement certify in writing that there is no objection to the construction of said bridge.
