

During the three months ending December 31, 1884, eight thousand five hundred and eightyeight (8,588) permits were granted for burials. During the same period one hundred and sixty-six (166) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and hirtyseven (737) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and seventeen (917) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand four hundred and thirtyseven (1.437) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and seven hundred and eighty-seven (787) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and three (103) of marriages and ninety-two (92) of births from said records were issued. There were six thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight (6,758) persons registered as married during the quarter, and seven thousand nine hundred and twenty-eight (7,928) children were born during the same period.

OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY-NOTICES OF THE BOARD.

The notices of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. During the three months ending December 31, 1884, the number of notices issued by the Board was 5,537. These notices call the attention of owners, lessees, and agents to violation of the Sanitary Code in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repair, cleaning, and improvement of the premises named within five days from the receipt of the notice. If, upon re-inspection, it is found that the requirements of the notice have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under section 82, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.
