BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
NEW YORK CITY, April 22, 1887.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 3 P.M., at the office of his Honor Mayor Hewitt.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, and Colonel Emmons Clark.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and amended by adding that the architect, Mr. James E. Ware, agreed to pay one-half the expense of straightening and counterbalancing the walls of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, on Sixty-first street and Ninth avenue, said amount, \$495, to be deducted from his fees for services.

The minutes were then approved as amended.

A letter was read from the Comptroller giving his approval of the sureties on the contract of Thomas J. Dunn, for paving about the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building. The Secretary presented the contract that had been executed in triplicate, and stated that a copy had been forwarded to Comptroller.

His Honor Mayor Hewitt reported having signed them as President of the Armory Board.

Colonel Emmons Clark offered the following:

Resolved, That this Board endorse and confirm the action of the Mayor, as President of the Armory Board, in signing the contract of Thomas J. Dunn, for paving the sidewalk and curbing and guttering the streets about the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, dated the 7th of April, 1887.

The resolution was carried by the following vote: The Mayor, aye; The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye; The Commissioner of Public Works Department, aye; Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, aye, and Colonel Clark, aye.

The bill of Messrs. Gardner & Co., for chairs for the Twelfth Regiment Armory, furnished on two orders, was presented and approved as correct.

General Fitzgerald moved that a voucher be drawn for the amount of \$1,032.55, and that the same be forwarded to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence.

The motion was adopted by a unanimous vote.

Certificates were received from the architect stating that the iron-work contractors on the Twelfth Regiment Armory had fully complied with the terms of their contracts and were entitled to their last payments in full, viz.: on contract dated December 29, 1884, \$1,672, and on contract dated November 13, 1885, \$734.32.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following:

Resolved, That vouchers be drawn for the amounts and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote.

A certificate was received from the architect that The Archer and Pancoast Manufacturing Company, contractors for the gas-fixtures for the Twelfth Regiment Armory, had completed their contract dated August 19, 1886, and that they were entitled to their payment of \$6,040 in full.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following:

Resolved, That a voucher be drawn for the amount and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

A certificate was received from the architect that John Renehan, the contractor for the plumbing on the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, was entitled to his last payment on his contract dated December 29, 1884, the amount being in full \$3,644.50.

Colonel Clark offered the following:

Resolved, That a voucher be drawn for the amount and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

A bill was received from Charles Crawford for oiling the floors of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building; accompanying was the architect's certificate stating that he was entitled to his payment in full.

General Fitzgerald offered the following:

Resolved, That a voucher be drawn for the amount, \$390, and that the Sinking Fund Commissioners be asked to concur in the payment of the same by the Comptroller.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

A certificate was received from the architect, stating that Gillis & Geoghegan, contractors for the steam-heating work in the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, were entitled to their last payment on contract dated December 27, 1884, amounting to \$2,797.20, and being in full.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following:

Resolved, That a voucher be drawn for the amount and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

A letter was received from Gillis & Geoghegan, which was read and ordered on file.

Hon. MICHAEL COLEMAN, Esq.:

DEAR SIR—We are in receipt of a communication from Mr. James E. Ware in relation to the Twelfth Regiment Armory, in which he states that you desire double doors put on the boilers.

We shall be pleased to do so, if we can be relieved of the responsibility of providing automatic regulation of the draft, the object which the present doors were put on.

The payment to Messrs. Mahony Brothers of part of the last payment on their contract for carpenter work on the Twelfth Regiment Armory, as recommended by the architect at a previous meeting, was now recommended by an additional certificate from the architect, stating that less than \$100 worth of work remained undone.

General Fitzgerald offered the following:

Resolved, That a voucher be drawn for the last payment (less \$200) on contract dated November 13, 1885, in favor of Mahony Brothers, the amount being \$6,136, and that the same be forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The resolution was unanimously carried.

A certificate was received from the architect, stating that Moran & Armstrong, the contractors for the mason-work on the Twelfth Regiment Armory, are entitled to the balance of their last payment on contract dated December 29, 1884, amounting to \$5,249.07.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following:

Resolved, That a voucher be drawn for the amount and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Commissioner Coleman then offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the contracts of A. R. Whitney & Co. for materials and iron work in the erection of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, dated December 29, 1884, and November 13, 1885, be and are hereby extended to April 25, 1887.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the contract of the Archer and Pancoast Manufacturing Company for materials and work in furnishing gas-fixtures for the Armory Building for the Twelfth Regiment, dated August 19, 1886, be and is hereby extended to April 25, 1887.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the contract of John Renehan, for materials and plumbing work in the erection of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, dated December 29, 1884, be and is hereby extended to April 25, 1887.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the contracts of Messrs. Mahony Bros., for carpenter work on the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, dated December 30, 1884, November 13, 1885, and August 20, 1886, be and is hereby extended to April 25, 1887.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the contract of Messrs. Moran & Armstrong, for materials and mason work in the erection of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building, dated December 29, 1884, be and is hereby extended to April 25, 1887.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Secretary offered the following:

The Armory Board, having recommended leasing the premises at Forty-fifth street and Broadway for the use of the Seventy-first Regiment on and after May 1, next, and also that the Eighth Regiment, at the same time, move into the premises now occupied by the Seventy-first Regiment; and,

Whereas, The Sinking Fund Commissioners have concurred in the above action, it is proper that the officers of the several organizations should receive directions as to their movements;

Resolved, That the matter be referred to Brigadier-General Louis Fitzgerald, with power.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following was offered by General Fitzgerald:

Resolved, That the Commanding Officer of the First Brigade, N. G. S. N. Y., be notified that the armory at the corner of Sixty-second street and Ninth avenue may be occupied by the regiment assigned to it, provided such occupancy shall not be considered as the final acceptance of said armory from the contractors.

The resolution was unanimously passed.

The Secretary desires to call the attention of the Board to the action of the Sinking Fund Commissioners on the resolution passed on March 9, 1887, in relation to the bill of J. R. Thomas, architect, which was as follows:

A bill was received and read from J. R. Thomas, architect, for preparing and furnishing plans and specifications for the Eighth Regiment and Second Battery Armory, as agreed upon, for \$5,000. On motion of Commissioner Coleman, seconded by Colonel Clark, it was resolved that an appropriation from the General Armory Fund for the amount be made, and that a voucher for the same be forwarded to the Comptroller for payment; and that the Sinking Fund Commissioners be asked to concur in such action.

The Sinking Fund Commissioners, at a meeting held March 22, 1887, enacted the following:

Whereas, The Armory Board have passed a resolution to pay J. R. Thomas, architect, for preparing and furnishing plans and specifications for an armory for the Eighth Regiment and Second Battery, the sum of \$5,000 as agreed, and have requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to concur in such action; and

Whereas, A resolution was adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, December 30, 1886, concurring with the Armory Board in making an appropriation of \$300,000, including architect's fees, for the construction of said armory;

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of chapter 487, Laws of 1886, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby concur in the resolution of the Armory Board for the payment of the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to J. R. Thomas, architect, for preparing preliminary drawings for the Fifth Regiment and Second Battery Armory, and also for preparing working plans, detail drawings and specifications for the same, as requested by the Armory Board and certified by them as correct.

Which were adopted by a unanimous vote.

The bill remains unpaid because the resolution as modified by the Sinking Fund provides for its payment from a fund which is not yet created.

The following was offered by General Fitzgerald:

Resolved, That all assignments of armories and instructions relating thereto, between commanding officers of regiments and the Board, be made through the commanding officer of the National Guard in the City of New York.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Commissioner of the Public Works Department reported the necessity of a new boiler in Armory at No. 221 West Twenty-sixth street, and that the present boiler, aside from its imperfections, was insufficient in size for the purpose.

A communication from the executors who have the property in charge, was handed to the Secretary and ordered on file.

The meeting then adjourned.

Any person making an estimate for the above shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for furnishing the illuminating material for, and lighting and maintaining, cleaning, repairing, and maintaining the public lamps," and also the name of the person making the same, and the date of its presentation.

But no payment to such bidder, on account of any such lamps, will be made for the time so allowed, nor until the same shall have been connected with the mains or conductors of such bidder, nor except for the time during which all the requirements herein mentioned shall have been fully performed.

Bidders proposing to furnish electric lights must state the kind or system of light they propose to furnish (whether the Voltaic Arc or Incandescent); also the candle power of the electric light by photometric test made in one direction, and which for arc lights shall be made at an angle of 30 degrees.
