

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#### BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVE-MENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Thursday, September 15, 1892, at 11 o'clock A. M., pursuant to the following notice:

SIR—You are respectfully requested to attend a special meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, to be held in the Mayor's office, at the City Hall, on Thursday next, September 15, 1892, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Whereas, The Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth

Whereas, The Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards has prepared for adoption certain changes and revision of maps in the Twenty-third Ward, which will be submitted to this Board for its concurrence and approval, in pursuance of chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, in reference to which changes and revision the said Commissioner gave a public hearing on the 28th day of March, 1892, in pursuance of chapter 721 of the Laws of 1887, and chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890.

Notice is hereby given, that this Board will, at the Mayor's office, in the City Hall, in the City of New York, on the 15th day of September, 1892, at eleven o'clock A.M., hear and consider all statements, objections and evidence that may be then and there offered, in reference to such contemplated changes, the general character and extent of the same being a revision of the street system in that portion of said Ward, bounded by Third avenue, Westchester avenue, Robbins avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Prospect avenue, Home street, Westchester avenue, the Bronx river, the Long Island Sound, Harlem Kills and the Harlem river.

The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—5.

The reading of the minutes of September 7, 1892, was dispensed with.

The Commissioner of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards then submitted a map showing a revision of the street system in that portion of the Twenty-third Ward bounded by Third avenue, Westchester avenue, Robbins avenue, East One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Prospect avenue, Home street, Westchester avenue, the Bronx river, the Long Island Sound, Harlem Kills and the Harlem river.

Whereupon Judge Hawes, on behalf of the estate of John J. Crane, argued at length in opposition to the changes made in that section of the district, comprising Beekman, Crimmins, Trinity and Powers avenues, between One Hundred and Thirty-eight and One Hundred Forty-first street, cast of St. Apply argumes. east of St. Ann's avenue.

After a full discussion of the points of objection raised by Judge Hawes, and no other objectors appearing in answer to the Board's invitation, on motion, the Board declared the hearing closed. Permission, however, was granted, for filing in writing with the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, within 10 days from date, of any objections, upon the expiration of which time a special meeting of the Board would be called, for final action upon the revised map or plan now submitted.

The special meeting of the Board then adjourned.

Hon. Hugh J. Grant, Chairman, Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

Dear Sir—In the matter of the petition to open certain streets in the Twelfth Ward, viz.:

Terrace View avenue, Kingsbridge avenue, Jansen avenue, Wicker place, Jacobus place, Leyden street, Teunissen place, Van Corlear place, Ashley street, Hyatt street, Muscoota street; also to close and discontinue certain old roads, streets or lanes, which petition was referred to me for report at your meeting of 7th instant., I have the honor to report:

The streets and avenues which the petitioners ask shall be opened were laid out by the Department of Public Parks and the maps thereof filed as required by law March 13, 1886, without, however, giving lengths, angles, curves, etc., so as to make a complete and comprehensive map for

ever, giving lengths, angles, curves, etc., so as to make a complete and comprehensive map for future use. The evident object of the petitioners is to have a proper map made and filed so that the streets may be legally opened and the property improved. A number of houses are now being built on the line of the streets, and other improvements are in progress. I recommend that the proper maps, giving grades, lines, dimensions, etc., and all other necessary information be made and filed.

The Commissioner of Public Works then offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York deem it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of 'he City of New York, by laying out, opening and extending certain streets, roads and avenues in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York, more particularly described as follows:

TERRACE VIEW AVENUE.

A street of the first class, to be known as Terrace View avenue, from Kingsbridge road or Broadway, in a westerly, southerly and easterly direction, returning to Kingsbridge road or Broadway at a point in the westerly line of said road, distant 701.85 feet southerly from the northerly end-Beginning at a point in the westerly line of Kingsbridge road or Broadway, distant 18,817.14 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence in a northerly direction and at an angle of 48 degrees, 58 minutes and 52 seconds with the westerly line of said road, distant 284.87 feet; thence in a curve to the left, radius 199.99 feet, distance 143.18 feet; thence westerly and tangent thereto, distance 343.80 feet; thence in a curve to the left, radius 410 feet, distance 644.03; thence southerly and tangent thereto, distance 375 feet; thence southerly and easterly and curving to the left, radius 410 feet, distance 406.69

feet; thence southerly and tangent thereto, distance 189.47 feet; thence easterly and curving to the left, radius 208.20 feet, distance 204.08 feet; thence easterly and tangent thereto, distance 182.97 feet; thence easterly and in a curve to the right, radius 1,341.06 feet, distance 406.25 feet to a point in the westerly line of Kingsbridge road or Broadway, distant 18,005.10 feet northerly from the southerly line of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; thence northeasterly along said westerly line of the Kingsbridge road or Broadway, distance 60.28 feet; thence westerly and curving to the left, radius 1,401.06 feet, distance 430.26 feet; thence westerly and tangent thereto, distance 182.97 feet; thence westerly and northerly and in a curve to the right, radius 148.20 feet, distance 292.27 feet, to Jansen avenue; thence westerly and diagonally across Jansen avenue, where the width of Terrace View avenue changes from 60 to 50 feet; thence northwesterly and at an angle of 56 degrees 49 minutes and 57 seconds with Jansen avenue and parallel with the westerly side of Terrace View avenue, and 50 feet easterly therefrom, distance 44.14 feet; thence northerly and easterly and in a curve to the right, radius 360 feet, distance 357.09 feet; thence northeasterly and tangent thereto, distance 375 feet; thence easterly and in a curve to the right, radius 360 feet, distance 375 feet; thence easterly and tangent thereto, distance 375 feet; thence easterly and to a point in a diagonal line, distance 61.38 feet to the easterly line of said Jansen avenue and to a point in a curve whose centre is the same as the last described curve, and whose radius is 350 feet. to a point in a curve whose centre is the same as the last described curve, and whose radius is 350

DEAR SIRS - Herewith I submit the applications of the Empire City Subway Company of the 8th inst., asking for the authorization of subway construction in certain screets for the Edison service,

with a map attached.

Also the application of the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company of the 8th inst., asking for the authorization of a subway to be constructed in Second avenue, from Forty-second to Eighty-sixth street, for the service of high-tension current, being the only requests for subway construction in my possession, and I recommend that you order the same constructed during this second.

It has been the custom of the Board when ordering subway construction to authorize their Engineer to increase or diminish the number of ducts in each instance should the necessity arise.

I would recommend that when you have authorized either of the construction companies to build a subway in any street or avenue, that some one have the authority to order the other company to add their construction in the same trench should it seem desirable, thereby saving disturbing the paving again and the necessary expense and inconvenience attending such work.
