### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT,  
CITY OF NEW YORK,  
Thursday, December 31, 1874.

The Board of Commissioners met this day. Present—President Joseph L. Perley in the chair, and Commissioners Roswell D. Hatch and Cornelius Van Cott.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

#### Resolutions Adopted.

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Supplies be and he is hereby directed to purchase such quantity of forage as will be necessary to supply the wants of the Department until a contract for furnishing the same can be completed by this Board.

Resolved, That the shop-engineer, machinists, copper-smiths, boiler-makers, blacksmiths, wheelwrights (except one wheelwright who will be paid at the rate of four dollars and fifty cents per day), painters, harness-makers, collar-maker and hose-repairer, employed in the repair shops of this Department, be paid from and after the first proximo, at the rate of three dollars per day; and it was further.

Resolved, That from and after the 1st proximo, the machinists' helpers employed in the Repair Shops of this Department be paid at the following rate per annum: Two machinists' helpers, at six hundred dollars, and one machinists' helper, at four hundred and fifty dollars; and it was further.

Resolved, That from and after the 1st proximo, the helpers, cartmen, night and day watchmen, and laborers employed in the Repair Shops of this Department, be paid at the rate of two dollars and fifty cents per day.

Resolved, That from and after the 1st proximo, the carpenters, tinsmiths, and caulkers employed in the Combustible Bureau of this Department, be paid at the rate of three dollars and fifty cents per day; and it was further.

Resolved, That from and after the 1st proximo, the assistant plumber and janitors employed in the Combustible Bureau of this Department, be paid at the rate of two dollars and fifty cents per day.

Resolved, That from and after the 1st proximo, the officers and employees of the Fire Marshal's Bureau, be paid at the following rate per annum: Fire Marshal, two thousand five hundred dollars.

One Assistant Fire Marshal, one thousand five hundred dollars.

Three Assistant Fire Marshals, one thousand dollars each.

Clerks, one thousand two hundred dollars each.

Resolved, That from and after the 1st proximo, the salaries of the Assistant Chief of Department and Chiefs of Battalion of this Department, shall be fixed at the following rate per annum: Assistant Chief of Department, two thousand seven hundred dollars.
