DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board governing the Department of Docks, held May 3, 1875, for the purpose of electing a President and Treasurer for the ensuing year, present—Commissioners Westervelt and Wales, the following action was had:

Organization, Appointment, etc.

May 3—Henry F. Dimock, appointed a Commissioner of Docks on the 1st inst., by his Honor the Mayor, to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Commissioner Budd, appeared and presented his credentials, and stated that he had taken the oath of office and was prepared to assume the duties of a Commissioner of Docks, and thereupon took his seat as a member of the Board.

Commissioner Dimock was chosen Chairman and called the meeting to order.

Commissioner Wales was unanimously elected President of the Board for the ensuing year.

Commissioner Westervelt authorized to act as Treasurer pro tem., and to perform all the duties pertaining to that office, until the election of a permanent Treasurer.

Section 3, article 5, of the By-laws, which requires the Treasurer to give bonds for the faithful performance of his duties, suspended.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

SEALED PROPOSALS WILL BE RECEIVED at the office of the Clerk of the Board of Education, corner of Grand and Elm streets (and nowhere else), until Monday, May 24, 1875, at 4 o'clock P. M., for supplying the coal and wood required for the public schools in this City (including that portion of Westchester County recently annexed thereto), for the ensuing year—say nine thousand five hundred (9,500) tons of coal, more or less, and one thousand and six hundred (1,600) cords of oak, and one thousand (1,000) cords of pine wood, more or less. The coal must be of the best quality of white ash, furnace, egg, stove, and nut sizes, clean and in good order, two thousand two hundred and forty (2,240) pounds to the ton, and must be delivered in the bins of the several school buildings at such times and in such quantities as required by the Committee on Supplies.

The proposals must state the mines from which it is proposed to supply the coal (to be furnished from the mines named, if accepted), and must state the price per ton of two thousand two hundred and forty (2,240) pounds.

The quantity of the various sizes of coal required will be about as follows, viz.: Seven thousand two hundred (7,200) tons of furnace size, one thousand two hundred (1,200) tons of stove size, five hundred (500) tons of egg size, and six hundred (600) tons of nut size. The oak wood must be of the best quality, the stick not less than three (3) feet long.

The pine wood must be of the best quality, Virginia, and not less than three (3) feet six (6) inches long. The proposals must state the price per cord of one hundred and twenty-eight cubic feet, solid measure, for both oak and pine wood, and also the price per cord for sawing and splitting per load, the quantity of oak wood to be split only as required by the Committee on Supplies. The wood will be inspected and measured under the supervision of the Inspector of Fuel of the Board of Education, and must be delivered at the schools as follows: Two-thirds of the quantity required from the 10th of June to the 15th of September, and the remainder as required by the Committee on Supplies; said wood, both oak and pine, must be delivered sawed, and, when required, split, and must be piled in the yards, cellars, vaults, or bins of the school buildings as may be designated by the proper authority. The contracts for supplying said coal and wood to be binding until the 1st day of June, 1876. Two sureties for the faithful performance of the contract will be required, and each proposal must be accompanied by the signatures and residences of the proposed sureties. No compensation will be allowed for delivering said coal and wood at any of the schools, nor putting and piling the same in the yards, cellars, vaults, or bins of said schools.

Proposals must be directed to the Committee on Supplies of the Board of Education, and should be indorsed "Proposals for Coal," or "Proposals for Wood," as the case may be.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ORDINANCE of the Common Council "In relation to the burial of strangers or unknown persons who may die in any of the public institutions of the City of New York," the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction report as follows:

At Morgue, Bellevue Hospital, May 8, 1875, from Pier 47, North river—Unknown man; 5 feet 7 inches high. Was dressed in dark pants, blue flannel shirt, gray ribbed undershirt and drawers, brown woolen socks, brown knit jacket. On his person was found sheath knife and belt, with name Herman Johansen on handle, and fifty cents in cash.
