# DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board governing he Department of Docks, held May 3, 1875, for he purpose of electing a President and Treasurer or the ensuing year, present — Commissioners Westervelt and Wales, the following action was

Organization, Appointment, etc.

May 3—Henry F. Dimock, appointed a Commissioner of Docks on the 1st inst., by his Honor the Mayor, to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Commissioner Budd, appeared and presented his credentials, and stated that he had taken the oath of office and the commissioner buddless of a Commissioner Budd was prepared to assume the duties of a Commissioner of Docks, and thereupon took his seat as a member of the Board.

Commissioner Dimock was chosen Chairman and called the meeting to order.

Commissinner Wales was unanimously elected President of the Board for the ensuing year.

Commissioner Westervelt authorized to act as Treasurer pro tem., and to perform all the duties pertaining to that office, until the election of a permanent Treasurer.

Section 3, article 5, of the By-laws, which requires the Treasurer to give bonds for the faithful performance of his duties, suspended.

The President appointed the following Com-

mittees for the ensuing year:

Executive Committee—Commissioners Dimock and Westervelt. Auditing Committee—Commissioners Wester-velt and Dimock.

# APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the 1875.

Resolved, That the room in the City Hall, known as the old Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, be and is hereby designated as a temporary office for the use of the Counsel to the Corporation, until more suitable offices can be obtained by this Board; and the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby requested to remove the office furniture used by the Corporation Counsel to aforesaid room in the City Hall immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 1, 1875. Approved by the Mayor, May 1, 1875.

Resolved, That the second story of the building in the City Hall Park, at the corner of Chambers street and Centre street, now occupied by the Civil Court for the First District, be and is herebyassigned to the Commissioner of Jurors for a public office; that the third floor of said building, now occupied by Parts III. and IV. of the Marine Court, be and is hereby assigned for the uses of

the District Court, for the First District, and designated as the place for holding said Court; that the changes herein indicated shall be made when the Marine Court shall have been provided with another and more suitable location; and the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to clean, repaint, refit, and refurnish the offices hereby assigned, using, in all cases where available, the present office-fixtures and furniture. Also, that he cause a sky-light to be constructed in the roof of the building earther score to be used as the ne cause a sky-light to be constructed in the roof of the building over the room to be used as the Court-room of the District Court, for the purpose of improving the light and ventilation of said room; that he cause the other provisions of this resolution to be carried into effect, and charge the expense to the appropriation for "Public Buildings—Construction and Repairs."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29, 1875. Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute a léase, on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, from the Trustees of the New York Dispensary, of the building situated on the northwest corner of Centre and White streets, except such portion of the said premises as are now occupied and used by the New York Dispensary, for a period of five years from the first day of May, 1875, at an annual rent of nine thousand five hundred dollars, payable quarterly, and the said premises when so leased to be occupied and used by the Department of Charities and Correction as a Reception Hospital.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29, Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to re-lease the apartments in the Daily News Building, No. 19 Chatham street, now occupied by the Board of Assessors, and the Surveyor for the Department of Taxes and Assessments, for a period of three years from the first day of May, 1875, at an annual rental of \$3,600, payable quarterly, on the usual quarter days, and from the proper appropriation. priation.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29, Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby requested to repair the carriageway on Forty-ninth street, between the Eighth and Ninth avenues, the same being in a dangerous condition.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29, Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That Robert H. Patten Tighe be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds, in place of George W. Gibbons, who has resigned. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29,

Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That Daniel P. Hays 'be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in place of Charles Sherwood, resigned.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29, 1875. Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to J. H. Schenck to erect and maintain an ornamental clock on sidewalk in front of Conrad ornamental clock on sidewalk in front of Conrad Van Gerickten's premises, No. 1222 Broadway, written permission having been had from said Van Gerickten, which is hereto attached, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29, Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Charles Robinson to place a watering-trough in front of his premises on Madison avenue, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty-sixth streets, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 29, Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That the resolution and ordinance Resolved, That the resolution and ordinance flagging the sidewalk on the west side of Berrian avenue, from Kingsbridge road to Isaac street, a space four feet wide, which was approved by the Mayor April 29, 1875, be and is hereby amended by striking from the said resolution and ordinance, wherever they occur, the words "Commissioner of Public Works," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Department of Public Parks."

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 1, Approved by the Mayor, May 5, 1875.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to submit to this Board a statement showing the condition of the appropriation for erecting lamp-posts and lighting lamps, both on this island and in the

annexed territory to May 1, 1875, with a view of ascertaining if any more work of this description can be ordered by the Common Council without exceeding the amount appropriated for this year.

Resolved, That Boulevard lamps be lighted on the block of ground occupied by the Normal Col-lege, Lexington and Fourth avenue, Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, from Third to Lex-ington and from Fourth to Fifth avenues, and in Seventieth street, from the Third to the Fifth ave-nue, the approaches to the said Normal College, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public under the direction of the Commissioner of Public

Resolved, That Thirty-sixth street, from the Elev enth avenue to the North river, be paved with Bel-gian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several gian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.
