BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

FIFTH DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Meeting in Room 1, Borough Hall, at 4.30 P. M., Friday, April 7, 1899.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names:
Edward M. Grout, President, in the chair, Councilman Doyle and Aldermen Kenney, Keegan, and Hennessy.

The President submitted the following:

(No. 50.)

Petition of John Beet and others, transmitted by Daniel Monyahan, Secretary of the Committee of Property-owners, for the paving of Second avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Sixty-fifth streets.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a letter, dated February 6, from your Secretary, and to submit proofs on the following proposed improvements, as requested:

Paving Second avenue, from Thirty-ninth to Sixty-fifth street.

Upon inspection it is found that this avenue, from Thirty-ninth street to Fifty-eighth street, has been regulated and graded, curbed and guttered, and that the railroad company has paved the space between its tracks with block pavement. From Fifty-eighth street to Fifty-ninth street the roadway is already paved. In the latter part of February two inspections were made at different times, and the street has been divided into two sections:

A. Second avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Fifty-eighth streets. The curb should be reset, the roadway outside the tracks paved with asphalt, and the railroad company requested to lay a substantial granite-block pavement between its tracks and rails. The estimated cost of this improvement is \$37,000, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$1,902,390.

B. Grading and curbing that part of Second avenue from the northerly side of Fifty-ninth street to the southerly side of Sixty-fifth street. The roadway outside the railroad tracks to be paved with asphalt on concrete foundation, and the railroad company to be called upon to lay a substantial granite-block pavement between the railroad tracks and rails. The estimated cost of the improvement is \$16,200, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$152,610.

The block on Second avenue, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, is already paved with stone pavement, and beside the railroad tracks there are a number of turnouts leading into the car-house of the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company. It would therefore not be advisable to lay an asphalt pavement on that block, particularly on the easterly side.

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Fifth District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 7th day of April, 1899, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that proceedings be initiated to pave Second avenue, between Thirty-ninth street and Fifty-eighth street, with asphalt pavement, outside of the railroad tracks located on said avenue, and that the owner of said tracks be required to lay granite-block pavement between its tracks and rails along said avenue, and that curbstones along said avenue be set or reset where necessary.

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Fifth District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 7th day of April, 1899, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that proceedings be initiated to grade and pave Second avenue, between Fifty-ninth street and Sixty-fifth street, with asphalt pavement, outside of the railroad tracks located on said avenue, and that the owner of said tracks be required to lay granite-block pavement between its tracks and rails along said avenue, and that curbstones along said avenue be set or reset where necessary.

Petition of William H. Reynolds, for closing Eleventh avenue, between New Utrecht avenue and Forty-third street.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Fifth District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 7th day of April, 1899, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that Eleventh avenue, from Forty-third street to New Utrecht avenue, be closed.

Petition of William Z. Dowling, of Eighty-third street and Third avenue, and others, for opening Third avenue, between Sixtieth street and the Shore driveway.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Fifth District, Borough of Brooklyn, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that proceedings be initiated to open Third avenue, between Sixtieth street and the Shore driveway, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Petition of H. M. E. Tharmann and others, for the grading and paving of Fifty-fourth street, between Seventh avenue and Fort Hamilton avenue.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a letter, dated February 6, from your Secretary, and to submit reports on the following improvements, as requested:

Curbing, grading, etc., Fifty-fourth street, between Seventh avenue and Fort Hamilton avenue.

The estimated cost of regulating, grading, curbing, laying gutters and crosswalks, and flagging the sidewalks, is \$17,700, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$27,780.

Section 947 of the Charter provides that the assessors shall in no case assess any house or lot, improved or unimproved lands, more than one-half the fair value of such house, lot, or unimproved lands. If by "fair value" is meant the assessed value, the assessment for this improvement would amount to more than one-half of the total assessed value, and would thus be greater than allowed by the Charter. To comply with the provisions of the Charter, the estimate could be reduced by omitting the flagging, which would cost \$4,000, thus making the total estimated cost \$13,700.

There is no record in the office of the Deputy Commissioner of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn, to show that the part of Fifty-fourth street, between the old city line, or the line between the Eighth Ward and the Thirtieth Ward, has been opened. A deed of cession is recorded in the Register's office under date of March 28, 1892, for that part of Fifty-fourth street, between Seventh avenue and the Eighth Ward line, which is only about half a block, but there is no record to show that the balance of the street has been opened. This matter should be carefully looked into, as it may be necessary to have the street legally opened before steps are taken toward improving it.

DEAR SIR—In compliance with the request conveyed to me by a communication dated the 2d ultimo, from your Secretary, I respectfully submit reports relative to the following contemplated public improvements:

Grading lots on Forty-eighth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

These lots are about fifteen feet above grade, and if they are to be graded, Lots Nos. 9 to 13, inclusive, and Lot No. 1, should be included. The lots are situated on the east side of Fifth avenue, between Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets; on the south side of Forty-eighth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues; and on the north side of Forty-ninth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues; and are known as Lots Nos. 3 to 13 inclusive, No. 1, and Nos. 42 to 68 inclusive, Block 225, Eighth Ward Map. The estimated cost of the work is \$18,000, and the assessed value of the lots is \$18,930.

I could not recommend the grading of the lots at an estimated cost only \$930 less than the assessed value of the lots. Section 947 of the Charter provides that the Board of Assessors shall in no case assess any house or lot, improved or unimproved lands, more than one-half the fair value of such house or lot, improved or unimproved lands.

The estimated cost of a close board fence six feet in height is \$50, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$1,200.

DEAR SIR—In compliance with a request conveyed to me in your communication of January 12, I submit estimates of cost and assessed values of real estate within the probable areas of assessments, in the following matters:

Flagging sidewalk on the west side of Second avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, in front of Lot No. 41, Block 1, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$266, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$27,000.

Flagging sidewalk on the south side of Thirty-ninth street, between Second and Third avenues, and on the east side of Second avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, in front of Lots Nos. 1 to 6 inclusive, 67, 84 and 85, Block 3, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$250, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$10,300.

Flagging in front of lots on the south side of Thirty-ninth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, and on the north side of Fortieth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 8 to 17 inclusive, 55, 57 and 59 to 63 inclusive, Block 28, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$510, while the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$13,800.

Flagging sidewalk on the north side of Thirty-ninth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 8, 9, 11, 12, 13, 15 to 18 inclusive, 20, 24 and 25, Block 29, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$396, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$15,000.

Flagging in front of lots on the south side of Fortieth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, and on the north side of Forty-first street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 36 to 40 inclusive, 68, 69, 67, 63, 47 to 52 inclusive, 8 to 18 inclusive, 58, 59, 64, 65, 60 and 25 to 29 inclusive, Block 195, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$1,376, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$24,270.

Flagging in front of lots on the south side of Fortieth street, between Second and Third avenues, and on the west side of Third avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, in front of Lots Nos. 1, 92, 94, 58 to 61 inclusive, 37, 36, 86, 87 and 88, Block 159, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$570, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$17,170.

Flagging the sidewalk on the west side of Second avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, in front of Lot No. 51, Block 139, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$265, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$65,000.

Flagging the sidewalk on the south side of Forty-first street, between Third and Fourth avenues, and on the north side of Forty-second street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 1, 66, 99 to 120 inclusive, 59 and 90, Block 194, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$800, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$19,800.

Flagging the sidewalks on the south side of Forty-first street, between Second and Third avenues, and on the west side of Third avenue, between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, in front of Lots Nos. 58, 59, 67, 68, 66, 8, 57, 72, 71 and 63, Block 158, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$818, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$20,250.

Flagging sidewalk on the west side of Third avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, and on the north side of Forty-third street, between Second and Third avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 34, 7, 8, 60, 61, 62, 13 to 22 inclusive, 24 to 28, inclusive, 64 and 65, Block 157, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$877, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$30,800.

Flagging the sidewalk on the south side of Forty-second street, between Third and Fourth avenues, and on the north side of Forty-third street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 29, 59, 61, 57 and 58, Block 193, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$142, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$18,300.

Flagging the sidewalk on the south side of Forty-third street, between Second and Third avenues, and on the west side of Third avenue, between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, in front of Lots Nos. 5, 1 and 53 to 62 inclusive, Block 156, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$350, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$11,200.

Flagging the sidewalks on the north side of Forty-fifth street, between Second and Third avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 34, 35 and 36, Block 155, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$60, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$1,200.

Flagging the sidewalks on the south side of Forty-fifth street, between Second and Third avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 69, and 52 to 56 inclusive, Block 154, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$150, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$11,000.

Flagging the sidewalks on the west side of Fourth avenue, between Forty-fifth and Forty-sixth streets, in front of Lot No. 63, Block 186, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$156, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$14,000.

Flagging the sidewalks on the south side of Forty-seventh street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lot No. 4, Block 184, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$15, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$1,000.

Flagging the sidewalk on the west side of Fourth avenue, between Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth streets, in front of Lot No. 8, Block 179, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$12, and the assessed value of real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$600.

Flagging the sidewalk on the south side of Forty-eighth street, between Second and Third avenues, and on the north side of Forty-ninth street, between Second and Third avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 68 and 72, Block 151, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$326, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$17,500.

Flagging the sidewalk on the south side of Forty-ninth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, and on the north side of Fiftieth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 50, 7, 14, and 17 to 24 inclusive, Block 178, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$320, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$4,900.

Flagging the sidewalk on the west side of Third avenue, between Forty-ninth and Fiftieth streets, in front of Lots No. 13 and 14, Block 150, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$50, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$2,500.

Flagging the sidewalk on the south side of Fiftieth street, between Second and Third avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 30 and 31, Block 149, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$40, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$800.

Flagging sidewalk on the south side of Fiftieth street, between Third and Fourth avenues, on the west side of Fourth avenue, between Fiftieth and Fifty-first streets, and on the north side of Fifty-first street, between Third and Fourth avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 3 and 4, Block 177, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$670, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$39,000.

Flagging sidewalk on the south side of Fifty-first street, between Third and Fourth avenues; and on the west side of Fourth avenue, between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, in front of Lots Nos. 39, 93, 94, 51 to 63 inclusive, 102, 68 and 69, Block 176, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging five feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$725, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$19,360.

Flagging the sidewalk on the north side of Fifty-second street, between Second and Third avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 62 to 71, inclusive, and Lot No. 85, Block 148, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging 5 feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$505, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$17,600.

Flagging the sidewalk on the southeast corner of Fifty-second street and Second avenue, in front of Lots Nos. 54 to 58, inclusive, Block 147, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging 5 feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$235, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$2,800.

Flagging the sidewalk on the south side of Fifty-third street, between Second and Third avenues, and on the north side of Fifty-fourth street, between Second and Third avenues, in front of Lots Nos. 74, 75, 41, 23 and 24, Block 146, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging 5 feet in width.

The estimated cost of this work is \$318, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$10,300.

Flagging the sidewalk at the northwest corner of Fourth avenue and Fifty-fourth street, in front of Lot No. 3, Block 170, Eighth Ward Map, with bluestone flagging 5 feet in width.

The estimated cost of this improvement is \$238, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$2,800.

Petition of William L. Gladiss and forty-five others was read.

On motion of Alderman McGrath, the Local Board, Twenty-first District, hereby urges the Board of Public Improvements to give immediate consideration to the question of paving the Southern Boulevard, from Westchester avenue to Boston road, as the improvement of this thoroughfare has been petitioned for more than once by many property-owners, and this Board recommends the paving of Southern Boulevard, from Westchester avenue to Boston road, on petition of William L. Gladiss and others, dated April 20, 1899.

Alteration of Final Map in the Vicinity of Madison Avenue Bridge, over the Harlem River, at East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, etc.

President Haffen suggested that final action be taken upon this matter, which was laid over from the meeting of March 30 last, whereupon, on motion of Councilman Murray, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That this Board, in view of the fact that no request has been made to or by the city authorities for a new bridge at East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, crossing the Harlem river at that point, considers the proposed changes of the approaches as presented in the sketch dated February 24, 1899, of the Chief Topographical Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements, as premature; and be it further

Resolved, That if the proposed changes as indicated in the said sketch should be eventually deemed expedient, it is our opinion that the cost involved in making such changes, whether in the acquiring of title or in change of grade, should be borne and paid for by The City of New York; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends that steps be immediately taken to provide a new bridge at East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street over the Harlem river to connect with Madison avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, and that it further recommends that the cost involved in making any changes or in acquiring of title, or in the change of grade, be borne and paid for by The City of New York.

East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street (Tremont Avenue) Widening, from Bathgate Avenue to the Bronx River.

The Secretary announced that the proposition came up for consideration on the report of the Chief Topographical Engineer, which report had been forwarded to the President of the Borough by the Board of Public Improvements. The report of the Chief Topographical Engineer, published heretofore in the CITY RECORD, was read, as was also the letter of transmittal from the Board of Public Improvements. Written protests against the proposed widening, from Messrs. C. P. Roos and Peter Coughlin, were also read.

Rev. Dr. D. J. McMahon, Pastor of St. Thomas of Aquinas Church, West Farms, spoke in opposition. He said that at a meeting of the property-owners of that section held recently, the opposition was almost unanimous to the project, it being believed that the assessment would be burdensome, and that stagnation of business would also ensue; they favored, he said, a narrowing of the sidewalks in the manner that the sidewalks west of Third avenue were reduced. Fordham Morris said that things should stay as they are, and that the present width of the street was sufficient.

Ex-Alderman R. R. Randall, M. J. McDermott, J. E. Kirby, William A. Cammeron, Malicha Kelly, James O'Toole and William C. Bergen, were among the other property-owners in opposition.

Mr. M. J. McDermott submitted resolutions adopted by the Tremont Taxpayers' Association, on the 13th instant, disapproving of the widening. A communication from Mrs. Rachel Purdy, per W. K. Syne, attorney, owner of premises southwest corner of Tremont and Vyse avenues, was also received in opposition to the proposition.

The only property-owner appearing in favor of the widening was L. N. Levy. He said he owned two lots fronting on Tremont avenue. He was of the opinion that the general public interest should prevail and not the interest of the property-owners immediately interested. In answer to the question of another property-owner he admitted that he owned the property immediately in the rear of his lots fronting on One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street. After brief discussion by the Board, the following preamble and resolutions were presented by Alderman Geiger and unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The Local Board of the Twenty-first District received from the Board of Public Improvements a communication from the Secretary of the said Board, dated March 30, 1899, inclosing communication from the Chief Topographical Engineer suggesting that East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street be widened from 75 to 100 feet, between Bathgate avenue and the Bronx river, and referring said Chief Engineer's communication to the Local Board of the Twenty-first District; and

Whereas, A map showing said proposed widening was also submitted; and

Whereas, Due notice was given in the CITY RECORD that a hearing would be had by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District, on April 20, 1899, at 2 P. M., in the Municipal Building, Crotona Park; and

Whereas, Such hearing was held by the Local Board of the Twenty-first District this day, and at such hearing only one property-owner owning about two lots frontage appeared in favor of said change, while a large number of property-owners representing themselves individually as well as taxpayers' organizations opposed strenuously the widening of Tremont avenue on the ground that it would result in a burdensome assessment and in stagnation of business, it is hereby

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Twenty-first District hereby expresses its disapproval of the change of width of Tremont avenue as proposed by the Chief Topographical Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements, as submitted to this Board by the Board of Public Improvements, and for the reasons stated we cannot now recommend such change, believing it to be inimical to the interest of those immediately affected.
