Pending roll-call the Vice-Chairman of the Council appeared in the chamber and assumed the chair.

The Chairman then directed that the report of the Joint Committees on Finance be read.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly:

The Committees on Finance of the Council and the Board of Aldermen, to whom were referred the assessment-rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York for the year 1900, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 31, 1900, transmitting the Budget for the year 1900, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts of the appropriations authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1900, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submit the following

REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1900 is ninety million seven hundred and seventy-eight thousand nine hundred and seventy-two dollars and forty-eight cents (\$90,778,972.48), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating eleven million five hundred and seventy-seven thousand two hundred and nine dollars and twenty-two cents (\$11,577,209.22).

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from city purposes. Compliance with this provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY PURPOSES BY ONE GENERAL RATE.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the budget which is to be raised by taxation at an uniform rate throughout the whole city:

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Municipal Assembly to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your Committees have conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1900, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2%) of the amounts to be collected by taxation be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted last year and almost exactly the figure which, having prevailed in The City of New York prior to consolidation for over twenty years, has been found by experience to offset with substantial accuracy the deficiencies in the product of the tax resulting from vacated and modified assessments, uncollectible personal taxes, etc., etc.

COUNTY CHARGES AND EXPENSES: THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

The County charges and expenses included in the budget are as follows:

It is to be noted that included in these amounts is the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties. Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

The provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estate of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for county taxes.

On the other hand, in the County of Queens certain property of the Pratt Institute is exempt from local taxation by chapter 398 of the Laws of 1887, but not exempt from taxation for State purposes. This makes it necessary to fix a rate of tax on the assessment of this institution (\$1,148,300) which will produce only its proportionate share of State taxes.

The assessment-rolls for the year, transmitted to the Municipal Assembly on July 3, 1900, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which, together, constitute New York County, and, as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

The assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint stock companies or associations which have been found to be exempt under section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 from taxation for State purposes in the year 1900, as appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Department of Finance, is as follows:

Your committee recommend that in fixing the total tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fraction of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., so any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the complexity of compiling the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$425.95 in the whole tax levy of \$22,542,175.79.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax rolls of the city and county taxes, your committee recommend that the aggregate thereof, or in other words, the total tax rate in each borough, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1900. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Municipal Assembly.

SHORT AGREEMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN TO BE COMPLETED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 314 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 235 of the Laws of 1890, for flagging, gutters, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Lots); and

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flushing), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 314 of the Laws of 1886.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 314 of the Laws of 1886, as amended.

Fourth—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 314 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, gutters, guttering and paving certain streets in the Thirtieth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Utrecht).

The amount to be raised for the payment of interest on the New Lots bonds is twenty-two thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$22,892.22); the amount of the Gravesend sewer installment is thirty-four thousand eight hundred and eighty-four dollars and twenty-three cents (\$34,884.23); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is forty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-two dollars and twenty-three cents (\$42,172.23); and the amount of the Thirtieth Ward flagging tax is fourteen thousand one hundred and twenty dollars and ninety-three cents (\$14,120.93).

Your committee recommend that these assessments and installments be confirmed in the tax levy ordinance and levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDER NOW to provide the necessary means for the support of the Government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the state taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1900.

Be it Enacted by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of sixty-nine millions three hundred and forty-six thousand four hundred and ninety dollars and fifty-five cents (\$69,346,490.55), to pay the expenses included in the budget for the year 1900 for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the city debt, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the budget for the year 1900, amounting in the aggregate to ninety millions seven hundred and seventy-eight thousand nine hundred and seventy-two dollars and forty-eight cents (\$90,778,972.48), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of eleven millions five hundred and seventy-seven thousand two hundred and nine dollars and twenty-two cents (\$11,577,209.22), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, including the state taxes due from said counties, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of nine millions eight hundred and fifty-five thousand two hundred and seventy-two dollars and seventy-one cents (\$9,855,272.71), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated May 31, 1900, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the budget for the year 1900, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said budget are as follows:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
May 31, 1900.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly.

Section 247 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the comptroller of said city of New York to prepare and submit to the municipal assembly, at least four weeks before their annual meeting, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement, setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts by the city treasury during the then current year, from all the sources of revenue of said general fund, including surplus revenues from the sinking fund, available in accordance with law, other than surplus revenues of the sinking fund for the payment of the city debt, and the said municipal assembly are hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order, and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised, by tax only, the balance of said aggregate amount, after making such deduction."

Section 902 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the municipal assembly as above provided, in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings and Richmond, respectively, and the sum or sums which should be paid for like purposes by that part of Queens county included within the city; and the municipal assembly is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties and part of county, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county or part of county; to the end that each of said counties and said part of Queens county shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county or part of county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

1. The budget in detail for the year 1900.
2. The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said budget, and to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by said section 902 of the Charter.

In this connection your attention is called to the fact that since the enactment of the Charter the County of Queens has been subdivided that the whole of said county as now existing lies within the territorial limits of The City of New York.

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the municipal assembly to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 909 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the Assessment Rolls, and also to the provisions of section 911 of the same act, designating the first day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said city.

III.—In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.15873 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.34216 per centum.

IV.—In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.06353 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.22073 per centum.

In addition to the sums mentioned in preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of thirty-four thousand eight hundred and eighty-four dollars and twenty-three cents (\$34,884.23), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioner of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successors; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements, for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892 and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of forty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-six dollars and twenty-three cents (\$42,176.23), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirtieth Ward (late Town of New Utrecht), in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, under authority of chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purpose, the sum of fourteen thousand one hundred and twenty dollars and ninety-three cents (\$14,120.93), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the flagging districts established by the flagging Commissioners of said town.

Vice-President McCall of the Board of Aldermen moved that the further reading of the report be dispensed with and that the report and accompanying ordinance be adopted.

QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING JUNE 30, 1900.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work under my charge and supervision during the quarter ending June 30, 1900.

NORTH RIVER.

Pier "A," N. R.

By resolution of the Board, March 20, 1900, an extension to Pier "A" was authorized. A contract, No. 684 for the work of preparing for and building an extension to the building has been awarded to N. W. Ryan, and work will shortly be begun thereunder. The preparation of the foundation for this extension is being made by the force of this Department.

Breakwater, Pier "A," N. R.

Under resolution of the Board of January 10, 1899, work has been in progress on the construction of a permanent breakwater at Pier "A." Tiles have been driven and the concrete blocks will shortly be set.

Pier, near 16, N. R.

A shed is being erected on this pier by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit from the Board, and also on the bulkhead between Piers 16 and 17, by the same company.

Pier, near 18, N. R.

A shed is being erected on the bulkhead by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company under permit from the Board.

Pier, new 26, N. R.

The extension of this pier to the pierhead-line was practically completed during the previous quarter, but some slight work has been done on it during the present quarter.

Pier, new 29, N. R.

The extensions to the outer end of the pier has been entirely replanked by the force of the Department.

Debrosses Street Section.

The wall at this section is being built by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks. No work on the wall proper has been done during the quarter, but the railroad company has been engaged in removing old pier structures and placing new ferry buildings, in accordance with the terms of their agreement.

Pier, new 31, N. R.

A shed is being erected on the pier and on the bulkhead by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit from the Board.

Pier, new 32, N. R.

A shed is being erected on the pier by the New Jersey Steamship Company, under a permit from the Board, and a temporary roadway built across the earth filling.

Canal Street Section Extension.

This section has been completed during the quarter by the laying of siding and the placing of backing logs. A new wharfage room has, however, been made.

Pier, new 40, N. R.

Tracks have been laid across the marginal shed and on the pier by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit from the Board.

Pier, new 45, N. R.

A shed is being erected north of the pier by the Clyde Steamship Company, under a permit from the Board.

Pier, new 47, N. R.

An extension is being built to this pier by the force of the Department, under a resolution of the Board.

Improvement of Water Front between Pier, new 46, and Greenpoint Street.

The bulkhead-wall at the Greenpoint Section was completed from about the northerly side of Ferry street, to the southerly side of Greenpoint street during the previous quarter. Work has been in progress on the lower portion of this section during the present quarter, extending from the northerly side of Greenpoint street and of Pier, new 46, to Greenpoint street. About 83 linear feet of new wharfage room was made during the quarter. The water overflow is being built at West Tenth street.

Earth filling is being placed in rear of this wall.

The Greenpoint Street, N. R.

This pier has been completed during the present quarter by the force of the Department, 703 linear feet of new wharfage room being made.

Pier, new 54, N. R.

An extension to the water end of this pier was constructed by the force of the Department, 128 linear feet of new wharfage room being made.

West Forty-second Street Section.

The Board by a resolution passed on the 27th of June, when called the construction of the bulkhead-wall between Forty-second and Forty-third streets on the North River. Work was begun on this section, but was temporarily suspended on account of an injunction restraining the Department from proceeding with the work. The work, however, has been resumed and during the present quarter considerable progress has been made.

West Forty-third Street Section Extension.

This section is in the same condition as the preceding one. Considerable progress has been made during the quarter. A sewer is being laid at the foot of West Forty-third street.

West Forty-third Street Section.

Some slight work has been done at this section during the quarter.

The West Fifty-seventh Street, N. R.

It is proposed to clarify extend the water end of this pier and test piles have been driven preparatory thereto.

Bronx River, new 40 and 41, N. R.

A transfer bridge has been erected between these piers by the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company under permit from the Board.

*NEW RIVER.**Front River Section.*

The Board at a meeting held December 22, 1899, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Wharf street and Pier, new 7, on the East River and the construction of two new piers. Piers, old 5 and 6, were removed during the previous quarter and work on this section is still under way. A lot of granite for the "E" course have been set. Pier, new 5 and 6, are being built under contract and substantial progress towards completion has been made.

Coastwise Section, E. R.

Work on this section has been temporarily suspended. No work has been done during the quarter, the work having been completed as far as can be until further property has been acquired.

Market Section.

Pier, old 40, East River, is being removed to make way for the construction of a new pier to be known as Pier, new 36, East River.

Switzer Section.

Substantial progress has been made in the work on this section. Coping has been set on the wall and filling placed to the rear of the wall. About 53 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made.

Pier, new 3, E. R.

The old pier is being removed to make way for the construction of the new pier in place thereof and the new pier is in course of construction under contract.

Pier, new 35, E. R.

The work of constructing a new pier west of Rutgers street was completed during the quarter under Contract 667. The new wharfage room at this pier was reported last quarter.

East Twenty-fifth Street Section.

Work has been in progress at both ends of this section and about 281 feet of new wharfage room made. Coping has been set and set on the "E" course and earth filling is being placed in rear of wall.

Pier Twenty-second Street, E. R.

The reconstruction of the new wooden pier at the foot of the street by the force of the Department, under resolution of the Board, July 16, 1900, was completed during the quarter.

East Thirty-eighth Street Section.

The Board, by a resolution passed on the 4th of May, 1900, authorized the construction of a new section in the vicinity of Thirty-eighth street, East River. Preparations have been made for the building of the wall, the outer end of the East Thirty-eighth Street Pier being removed to make way for construction.

East Seventy-fourth Street Section.

The Board having authorized the construction of a wall at this section by a resolution passed the 11th of May, 1900, test piles have been driven and excavations made to determine the nature of the river bed.

At the foot of Eightieth Street, E. R.

Filling is being placed in the rear of the crib-bulkhead recently built between Eightieth and Eighty-first streets, East River.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street and Park Avenue, E. R.

Filling is being deposited along the water-front at these premises by Frank Buckley, under a permit from the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, West of Grand Avenue, E. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by Jordan L. Mott, under a permit from the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John Cromwell.

One Hundred and Forty-seventh Street and Lenox Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited to a grade of five feet above high water, between One Hundred and Forty-seventh and One Hundred and Fiftieth streets, and from Lenox to Seventh Avenue, by J. D. Crummins, under a permit from the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-seventh Street, H. R.

A coal pocket is being erected about 450 feet east of the Madison Avenue Bridge by John S. Conabear, under permit from the Board.

Spuyten Duyvil Creek, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity and a retaining structure erected by J. C. Rogers, under a permit of the Board. A crib-bulkhead is being erected in this vicinity by T. W. Thom & Co., under a permit of the Board.

Morris Heights, H. R.

Filling is being deposited and a retaining fence erected by the Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury & Co., Consolidated, under a permit from the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-ninth to One Hundred and Fortieth Streets, Fort Morris.

A crib-bulkhead is being erected by B. P. Jones, under a permit of the Board.

Willow Avenue, Bronx River.

The filling at above premises is being extended and a rip-rap retaining structure erected by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, under a permit from the Board.

Westchester Avenue, Bronx River.

A temporary bridge was erected across the river at these premises by the Department of Street Improvements, under a permit of the Board.

Oak Point, Bronx River.

Filling is being deposited and other improvements made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, under a permit of the Board.

Clason's Point, Long Island Sound.

The salt meadows at this point are being filled in and pier is being built by Clinton Stevens, under a permit from the Board.

Piers 3 and 4, Wallabout Basin, Brooklyn.

The work of constructing this pier, begun during the previous quarter, has been completed during the present quarter under Contract No. 659 and 2341 linear feet of new wharfage room being made.

Bulkhead, Wallabout Basin.

A granite pavement has been laid in the rear of the wall under Contract No. 671.

Pier, North Second Street, Brooklyn.

The work of building a recreation structure on this pier has been in progress under Contract No. 671 and is rapidly approaching completion.

Timber Basin, Forty-third Street, South Brooklyn.

The work of constructing a timber basin for the reception of old material has been in progress at the above locality.

Shoephead Bay, Brooklyn.

The Manhattan Beach Hotel and Land Company are pumping sand and depositing same at Manhattan Beach.

Coney Island.

A breakwater is being constructed at Sea Gate by the Atlantic Yacht Club. Filling is being placed behind the bulkhead at Coney Island creek by Charles Hart and a jetty is being constructed at West Twelfth street by Frank S. Griffin.

Forty-third Street, Bensonhurst.

A crib-bulkhead is being constructed by Frederick Lemken.

Forty-second Street, South Brooklyn.

An extension to this pier has been erected and a shed is being placed thereon by The Bush Company, Limited.

Stapleton, Staten Island.

A crib-bulkhead was constructed by Ichabod T. Williams under a permit from the Board.

Port Richmond.

A crib-bulkhead was constructed by William J. Quiglan under a permit of the Board, a shed erected on the bulkhead by the American Linseed Oil Company and extensive repairs to the pier at the yard of the Star Line Ship-Yard and Iron Works.

Midland Beach, Staten Island.

A platform was constructed at the foot of Red Lane by John Hinchliffe and a shed erected on the pier recently built by the same party under a permit of the Board.

City Island, Long Island Sound.

Test piles have been driven preparatory to building a new pier at this locality.

PAVING MARSHAL STREET, N. R.

Asphalt pavement has been laid at various places along the North River, under Treasurer's Orders therefor, including between Piers, old 42 and new 35, new 35 and 39, new 40 and 42 and new 54 and 55.

Also, granite pavement has been laid at various places, under several Treasurer's Orders, including between Barclay and Warren streets, at vicinity, Pier, new 29, between Debrosses and Canal streets, and between Twenty-seventh and Thirtieth streets.

TIMBER BASIN, NORTH RIVER.

At the timber basin timber received under various orders and contracts has been received and cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

PILE BASIN ON THE NORTH RIVER.

Pile basins between One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets and between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Fifty-ninth streets, on the North River, have been maintained in good order and condition.

DEPARTMENT YARD AT WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH AND EAST TWENTY-FOURTH STREETS.

At the Department Yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of material and the issuance of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

FLOATING PROPERTY.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and has been repaired from time to time.

SPURVEYING PARTY.

Surveys of the water-fronts and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, have been made.

A detailed survey of the easterly shore of the Bronx River, extending from Oak Point to Long Island Sound, is in progress.

An extensive survey of the water-fronts of the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

All the lines, levels, grades, surveys, soundings and examinations have been made and given as required.

DREDGING.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or by private parties.

REPAIRS.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Board of Docks.

Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work, by private parties under order or permit from the Board of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief, the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work; plans for the improvement of the water-front; plans and specifications for new piers and repairs; change of lines, examinations of plans submitted by private parties; solar printing and general office work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 5,422 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased 125,475 square feet. The total increase of wharfage room made by private parties has been 4,802 linear feet.
