11. Sales of waste material.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Article 1 of Chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to the Riding of Passengers on Rear-end Platforms of Trains.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Article 1, Chapter 19, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto after section three of said article, new sections as follows:

§4. Passengers riding on rear-end platforms of trains. No passenger on any elevated railroad train, whether operated over, upon or under the surface, in the City of New York, shall ride on the rear platform of the rear car, where such rear platform is not enclosed by vestibule. Provided, however, that the term "passenger" shall not include, or be construed to include, any officer, agent or employee of such elevated railroad, or any public officer or public employee, whose duties may require the riding on any such rear platform. Any person who shall violate any provision of this section shall, upon conviction therefor, be punished by a fine of not more than \$10, or by imprisonment for not exceeding 10 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 20, Article 2, Chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Fires and Fire Prevention," and in Particular to "Fire-alarm and Fire-extinguishing Appliances."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 20 of article 2 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fires and fire prevention," and in particular to "fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§20. Fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances. The owners and proprietors of all manufactories, hotels, tenement-houses, apartment houses, office buildings, boarding and lodging-houses, warehouses, stores and offices, theatres and music halls, and the authorities or persons having charge of all hospitals and asylums, and of the public schools and other public buildings, churches and other places where large numbers of persons are congregated for purposes of worship, instruction or amusement, and all piers, bulkheads, wharves, pier sheds, bulkhead sheds or other water-front structures, shall provide such means of communicating alarms of fire, accident or danger to the police and fire departments, respectively, as the fire commissioner or the police commissioner may prescribe, and shall also provide such fire hose, fire extinguishers, buckets, axes, fire hooks, fire doors and other means of preventing and extinguishing fires as the fire commissioner may direct. (Ord. effective Jan. 1, 1912.)

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
