Bricklayers' and Masons' Unions of Greater New York—Suggesting the Setting
Aside of the Arsenal in Central Park for a Permanent Exhibit of Safety
Devices.

Council of Women's Organizations of New York City—Directing Attention to
the Patriotic Program of the Federal Children's Bureau and Suggesting That
the Board of Aldermen Initiate Some Action Looking to the Carrying Out
of the Same.

Council of Women's Organizations of New York City, 4 East 39th Street, March
16, 1918.

President of the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Conference Board of the Council of Women's
Organizations on February 28th, I, as secretary, was instructed by that Board to write
you calling the attention of the Board of Aldermen to the patriotic program of the
Federal Children's Bureau.

This program, as you may know, calls for a campaign for the reduction of infant
mortality as a war measure. Thousands of babies die needlessly each year and the
Federal Children's Bureau calls attention to the fact that in war time the country
cannot afford this waste of life. The Federal Children's Bureau states that 100,000
infants—lives should be saved in the United States this year and it has apportioned a
quota which should be saved in each State and the larger cities of the country. As
you may know, New York's quota is 4,000. This means that we must reduce the
infants' death rate in New York City to a considerable degree.

We believe that the City of New York through its established government should
accept this challenge and determine to save these infants' lives. The program for
doing this includes: (1) An increase in the amount of medical care provided for
mothers before children are born; (2) an increase in the nursing and educational work
directed toward the improved care of new-born infants; (3) an increase in the effort
for providing proper food for infants, and (4) the radical reduction in the price of
milk, which is the only food for babies.

We suggest to you that the Board of Aldermen initiate some action looking to the
carrying out of the program of the Federal Children's Bureau. Yours very truly,

Stone Industry of Greater New York and Vicinity—Request for Amendment of
the Code Relative to Specifications for the Improvement and Construction of
Streets.

Stone Industry of Greater New York and Vicinity, Headquarters, Labor Temple,
243 East 84th Street, New York.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York
City:

Dear Sir—The Stone Cutters' Unions of Greater New York respectfully ask your
favorable action in having inserted in all Specifications for the Improvement and Con-
struction of Streets, Avenues and Highways the following:

Section 1. The City of Greater New York do ordain that in all contracts entered
into throughout Greater New York, on and after May 1st, 1918, with any one for the
improvement and construction of streets, avenues or highways, where the placing of
stone for curbing, crosswalks and headers stone, that the work of cutting, dressing
and preparing such stone shall not be in excess of the price paid for like work
under private contract.

Section 2. The department shall instruct to have all proposals for work in the
construction and improvement of streets, avenues or highways, where stone curbing,
crosswalks and headers as are intended for municipal use so worded as to inform
intending bidders that the mentioned stone to be used in municipal work must be cut
and dressed within the boundaries of Greater New York.

This request conferring upon municipal corporations the right already possessed by
private corporations of deciding each for itself where the work involved in any of its
enterprises shall be done.

This request does not regulate or confer the power to regulate labor, trade or
manufacturing. What it attempts is to authorize expressly the regulation of the
municipality of the Commonwealth for itself of certain of its own business.

This request does not affect the business of the community at large, but relates
merely to its own business and is nothing more than the regulations of its domestic
affairs. It no more interferes with labor, trade or manufacturing than does the de-
cision of one about to erect a house for himself, that it shall be built in the manner
prescribed by him.

It is true that those who labor on stone dressing in Greater New York and who
reside here may be particularly benefited by such an expenditure of money. Pro-
visions of this kind in the specifications benefit the community at large. All political
economists agree that labor is the source of wealth. The City must advance to wealth
in which all must find work who are willing and able to do it. The promotion of pros-
perity of the community through encouragement of home industries by causing the
City work to be done where the money that pays for it is raised is surely a matter of
public interest.

It might be said that those whose stone establishments are outside of the boun-
daries of Greater New York would by this action be prevented from competing on
an equal footing with local bidders for supplying dressed stone for the City's public
work, because under it they may not prepare the stone at their own yard.

These provisions do not require the stone to be prepared by citizens or residents
of Greater New York, all that these provisions provide is that the stone shall be cut
and dressed within the City limits, and any one may do the work if they only do it

in Greater New York. If he or they come here they will stand on an equal with all others.

This does not attempt to regulate the traffic in dressed stone, or to interfere with the rights of any American citizen to ship stone of any kind or in any stage of its preparedness to Greater New York or to any other point for sale, nor does this prevent the general public from buying such stone.

This request is the making of merely a domestic arrangement that touches nothing but what may be designated the private business of the City and bringing the government closer to the people, in saying in what manner and in what way that public work shall be performed. Respectfully submitted,

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Commissioner of Public Markets:

No. 362.

Commissioner of Public Markets—Request on the Board to Ask the State Food Commission to Grant Power to the City to Buy and Sell Ice.

Office of the Commissioner of Public Markets, Municipal Building, New York, February 26, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Gentlemen—I attach herewith copy of a letter addressed to me by the Secretary of the State Food Commission, which is an answer to an oral request which I made to the State Food Commission to grant power to the city to buy and sell ice. The State Food Commission agreed to grant the power to the city to purchase, store, distribute and sell ice to the inhabitants of The City of New York.

However, in order to make it entirely legal they require that written application be made by the proper authorities. I desire, therefore, to request your Honorable Body to to-day pass a resolution asking the State Food Commission to grant The City of New York power to buy and sell ice and that you name the Department of Public Markets as the agency of the city to buy and sell ice.

This will then be in perfect harmony with the petition which The City of New York made last November to buy and sell food and fuel, and also in harmony with the resolution passed by the Board of Aldermen naming this department as the city's agency to buy and sell and to carry out the power granted by the State Food Commission. New York State Food Commission, Please Reply to Albany, N. Y., February 20, 1918.

Dr. JONATHAN C. DAY, Commissioner of Markets, Labor Temple, 2nd Ave. and 14th St., New York City:

Dear Dr. Day—In regard to your oral application to the State Food Commission, asking that the Commission declare ice to be a necessity and grant the City of New York the right to buy, store and sell the same, on looking the matter up, the Attorney for the Commission reports that it is necessary for you to make a written application to the Commission, in order to comply with the law.

Deputy Attorney Robinson's statement on this subject reads as follows:

"February 19, 1918.

"Report of Mr. Robinson, Counsel to State Food Commission.

"Section 14 of chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917 provides that when any municipality desires to purchase food and fuel with municipal funds and on municipal credit, because of an actual or anticipated emergency on account of the deprivation of necessities it must procure the consent of the State Food Commission in writing, and the Mayor, if any, and the governing body or bodies of any such municipality shall file with the State Food Commission a resolution and certificate stating that such a necessity has arisen in said municipality and otherwise satisfy the said Commission that such a necessity exists, and thereupon the Commission shall act upon the application as in its judgment the public interest requires.

"Although an application was made in November, 1917, by the City of New York to purchase food and fuel with municipal funds and on municipal credit, and such consent was given, there was nothing in the application made by the city or in the consent given by the State Food Commission about the purchase, sale and distribution of ice. The State Food Commission may, under section 8 of the same Act, declare ice to be one of the necessities defined in section 3 of said Act. Still, I believe that before consent can be given to the City of New York to buy and sell ice an application must be made by the municipality in the form prescribed by the statute and then this Commission may pass a resolution declaring ice to be one of the necessities defined in section 3 and grant its consent to the City of New York to purchase and sell ice with municipal funds and on municipal credit."

After Attorney Robinson made his report the Commissioner expressed a willingness to grant your request as soon as a written application is made, in conformity to the provisions of law. Yours very truly,

President, Borough of Manhattan—Request for Amendment of Special Revenue Bond Issue, \$10,000, to Replenish Fund for Repairing Street Pavements Between Railroad Tracks.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, Municipal Building, March 12th, 1918.

Honorable ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—Under date of February 13, 1918, the Board of Aldermen passed a resolution authorizing an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$10,000 (which resolution was approved by the Board of Estimate on March 8, 1918) for the purpose of replenishing the account R. P. M.—32A, Repairing Street Pavements between Railroad Tracks, Borough of Manhattan.

This resolution reads "Repairing Street Pavements," which is incorrect. The resolution should be amended to read as follows:

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the purpose of replenishing account R. P. M.—32A, Repairing Street Pavements between Railroad Tracks, Borough of Manhattan."

Will you be good enough to take the proper steps to have this amendment put through and oblige, Yours very truly,

President, Borough of Queens—Request for Approval of a Site for a Disposal Plant.

Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, March 13, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—On April 2, 1917, I requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue corporate stock for the acquisition of land adjoining the Jamaica Disposal Plant, under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Sewers. This was necessary on account of the limited space now owned by the City adjacent to the plant and used for the disposal of sludge. This sludge overran the surrounding property and resulted in a suit against The City of New York.

At a later date it was deemed advisable to acquire the property between the Disposal Plant and the conduit, operated by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, but that Department advised the purchase of property to the south and east of the existing plant.

We have been unable to agree as to the price for this land and propose to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the acquisition of this necessary land by condemnation.

I am sending under separate cover five white prints of the proposed acquisition and request your approval for acquiring this additional land for the purpose as set forth in communication. Yours very truly,

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, Manhattan:

Sir—To meet the conditions of the segregated budget appropriation of this commission for the year 1918, it will be necessary to amend the following resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen January 3, 1916:

"Resolved, That, for the purpose of defraying incidental expenses incident to the correspondence, etc., of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Secretary of said commission may by requisition draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750) drawn from several or all of the following accounts:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 13, 1918, the Commissioner of the Fire Department transmitted a request from a Molder and a Coremaker for increase of wages from \$4.50 to \$5 per diem each from January 1, 1918. This was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades (Item 37, Calendar of February 21, 1918). The Committee reports as follows:

The 1918 budget provides for one Molder and one Coremaker in the Fire Department at \$4.50 per diem for 27½ days a year each. There are no others of these two trades employed by the City. The increased annual cost involved is \$277.50.

The minimum rate paid to Molders and Coremakers in private employ is \$4.75. This rate went into effect January 1, 1918, in accordance with an agreement signed by a majority of employers in large foundries in Greater New York and the Molders' Union. The rates paid per diem to Molders and Coremakers and the number employed in some of the large foundries in Greater New York are as follows:

A majority of the Molders and Coremakers employed in Greater New York are paid at the \$4.75 rate. Those who are paid \$5 or over per diem are the highest type of skilled workmen and are competent to render service in all branches of the trade. Many of them are men who have become specialists in their trade.

The Molder and Coremaker employed in the Fire Department were appointed to their positions over ten years ago after passing a rigid and practical civil service examination. They are all around first class workmen and they turn out all the molding, casting and coremaking work required in making iron-work repairs for the department in the five boroughs. They are responsible for all the work turned out by the foundry attached to the repair shop.

The rate paid at present to Molders and Coremakers at the New York Navy Yard is \$4.88 per diem. As these men have considerable overtime, their weekly earnings are large. Mechanics in City employ are not paid for overtime.

Certain employers admitted that, in view of present economic conditions, they expected soon to be called upon to pay \$5 per diem as a minimum rate to Molders and Coremakers.

Because of their skill, efficiency, length of service and practical knowledge of Fire Department repair work, an increase to the \$5 rate for these two men would not be excessive.

Recommendation—The Committee recommends that the rates for the molder and the coremaker employed in the Fire Department be fixed at \$5 per diem each, effective as of January 1, 1918, by adoption of attached resolutions. Respectfully,

Sheriff, Bronx County—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$2,000, for the Purpose of Making Improvements to the County Jail.

Sheriff's Office, Bronx County, Bergen Building, Tremont and Arthur Avenues, March 16, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Dear Sir—I desire to place before your body a request for the issuance of special revenue bonds in the sum of two thousand dollars, under the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter.

I have recently assumed the office of Sheriff of Bronx County and upon an inspection of the jail, which is under my care, found two conditions which called for immediate correction, in view of the responsibility which I have of keeping prisoners in safe custody.

The jail, as your body knows, is located in the Bergen Building, a privately owned building leased by The City of New York. Under my construction of the lease the obligation to make repairs is upon The City of New York, and the obligation to make new improvements is likewise upon The City of New York, and this judgment has been concurred in by the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York.

In December, 1917, there was a convict here who was sentenced to five years in prison. He made an effort to escape from the prison, and when sentenced confessed before the County Judge of this County that he received from the outside the saw with which he attempted to escape. The opportunity for outside aid comes from the fact that the cell windows are in the outer walls of the building, and, while the jail is surrounded by a high wall and fence, the fence is so close to the jail that any outsider could with the aid of a pole pass a pistol or blackjack or other weapon into any prison cell.

In view of the fact that this opportunity does exist, and that it was recently taken advantage of by the prisoner referred to, to whom a saw was passed by means of a rope, I feel that it is my duty to correct this condition.

I have accordingly determined to place around each one of the 131 windows in the prison a wire mesh, set in an iron frame, the size of which is 4 feet by 6 feet. I have bids from several reputable contractors, and base the estimate set out below upon their figures.

A short time ago there was left in a cell of one of the prisoners two metal spoons, the handles of each of these spoons were so remodelled by some one that it was possible to turn the cell lock with the aid of the spoon. If the man had escaped from the cell and tier, and if he was successful in evading or overpowering the guards, and then shot the keeper upon the main gate by means of a gun obtained

from the outside, as above shown, there might be, if the other prisoners assisted in the escape, a jail delivery.

To correct this situation I have determined to place an iron door at the foot of the stairway and an iron door around the elevator, with a gate in each of these doors, the turn-key of each of these two new gates should always be with the man upon the main gate, and any escape as above described would be impossible.

To further prevent the bringing of contraband goods into the jail I have determined to erect a wire screen behind which all visitors must talk to prisoners. The present facilities in the jail are entirely inadequate in this respect.

In the face of such conditions we cannot long hesitate to correct these dangers and I would therefore request your Honorable Board to issue special revenue bonds to cover the cost of making the improvements above outlined, and thus aid me in the discharge of my duty; said cost will be two thousand dollars.

Department of Health, Bureau of Food Inspection, March 17, 1918.

Pursuant to request made to you by Mr. Janssen and his committee, I beg to report the following as result of surveys made during the summer of 1917 by this bureau. These surveys were designed to cover the general question of conservation in the city and took note also of the waste in trade in foods and of family food wastes. Summary of the findings as to family food waste are about as follows:

There is very little or no waste on the lower East Side, the material thrown away here being tops of green vegetables and the like, which have a use, but only under conditions of pressure, such as we are likely to experience later. A little further up town on the East Side, where living conditions are not so acute, the waste is a little larger. A certain amount of meat, fish, rice and potato skins is wasted here. In the Seventies, where a survey was made between Columbus and Amsterdam Avenues, the family food waste was worst of all and included a large amount of bread and other bakery products. All of these materials could have been used when they went into the garbage pail and it is sheer criminal waste to throw away bread, meat and fish. An estimate was made of the value of the material when it went into the garbage pail. This showed as follows:

Location.	Approximate Value.
Lower East Side.....	1.4c. per lb.
Pike, Jackson, Grand and East River.....	2.8c. per lb.
The Seventies, from Columbus to Amsterdam Ave.....	3.05c. per lb.

The greatest family food waste, therefore, is apparently in those parts of the town where the woman of the house does not do the cooking. I have estimated that there is about \$16,000,000 worth of food thrown away in New York City in a year, which is sufficient to foot the food bill for 136,000 people. About one-third of this is bread and about one-sixth is meat. In bread alone there are about 60,000,000 pounds, equivalent to 964,000 bushels of wheat. In view of the stringency of the wheat situation, due to the U-boat ravages, it is very evident that this wheat waste should be saved, if it is at all possible.

In hotel and restaurant kitchens there is, I believe, considerable improvement since the war began. A large hotel cannot run if the waste is considerable. It is, therefore, proper to call attention to the fact that many of the small restaurants may waste food and this is particularly applicable to some of those downtown, especially in the Chinese quarter.

In view of the efforts now being made by State and National authorities to conserve every ounce of wheat, I am of opinion that the city could, with profit to itself, pass an ordinance making such waste as I have described a misdemeanor. The waste in the families of the more well-to-do element is still taking place, as we know from recent observation. I am of opinion that in no other way can the wasters be effectively reached than by legislation.

Whereas, A report from the Department of Health of the City of New York has been submitted, disclosing that in particular sections of the City of New York there exists, and has existed for some years past, a condition which results in an excessive amount of wholesome food fit for human consumption being destroyed; that this destruction is due to carelessness and negligence; that due care and diligence could prevent such destruction; that the high cost of foods, particularly bread, meat, etc., under the present existing war conditions and the necessity of conserving such products render it necessary that some regulatory action by the local authorities of this City which would tend to limit such destruction should be inaugurated, whereby such destruction might be prevented and the field not governed by State or Federal regulation covered in such manner and to such an extent as to be of aid to the Nation in the present emergency, and the willful destruction of food by persons, firms and corporations, whose action is not controlled by any law or ordinance at the present time prohibited; and

Whereas, A number of independent city organizations and individual citizens called attention to the Board of Aldermen to similar conditions existing in the City of New York and requested that said Board exercise such authority and jurisdiction as might be vested in it to enact an ordinance which would curtail and limit the wanton destruction of food and supplement the activities of the Federal and State Governments, in so far as such authority and jurisdiction might be properly exercised in supporting the Nation during the war; and

Whereas, From a consideration of the conditions hereinbefore cited, the need is evident of providing a more direct method, whereby the local authorities of the City of New York may more effectively co-operate with the Federal and State authorities in preventing waste of food and provide an ordinance whereby summary action might be taken against persons, firms and corporations, who willfully destroy food for the purpose of enhancing the price or restricting the supply thereof, or who intentionally destroy the same for any purpose whatsoever; and

Whereas, It is reported that many households do not utilize food which could be used to advantage and considerable food is wasted in the home; and

Whereas, It is further apparent that the citizens of the City of New York as an entity have supported the Government to the utmost, contributing vast sums of money, willingly acceding to the various requests made by the duly constituted authorities to conserve the necessities of life, and given every evidence of their loyalty and united support accorded the Government throughout the whole United States; and

Whereas, It further appears, however, that the authorities of various local communities throughout the United States, including the City of New York, can further aid and assist the Nation, by using their local authority for the purpose of educating their citizens to the need and necessity of conserving the necessities of life, preventing waste and more fully utilizing food of all kinds, by adopting local ordinances which will not conflict or contravene the Federal and State Food Conservation Laws or invade the jurisdiction of the Federal and State Governments, but shall supplement and cover a field wherein unnecessary waste and destruction of food exists, which is not regulated and controlled by virtue of the Federal and State statutes; it is therefore

Resolved, That an ordinance to amend article .. of the Code of Ordinances, by inserting therein a new section in relation to the willful destruction of foods, be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter .. of the Code of Ordinances by inserting therein a new section in relation to the willful destruction of foods.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Article .., chapter .. of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

§... Willful destruction of food prohibited; term "food" defined; exception. No person, firm or corporation shall willfully waste or destroy, or cause, suffer or allow

to be willfully wasted or destroyed, any wholesome food fit for human consumption. The term "food," as herein used, shall be taken to mean and include meats, pork, fowl, vegetables, bread and bread rolls. Provided, however, the provisions of this section shall not apply where the willful destruction and waste of such food is regulated or controlled by the provisions of the United States Food Control Laws, or the New York State Food Control Laws. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of fifty dollars (\$50), or imprisonment for ten (10) days, or both.

Sec. ... This section shall take effect immediately and shall continue in force during the time the United States is at war and thereafter until the Mayor of the City of New York shall declare that the emergency causing the enactment thereof no longer exists.

City of New York to buy and sell food and fuel to the inhabitants of The City of New York; and

Whereas, the Board of Aldermen and the Mayor have named the Department of Public Markets as the agency for such purchase and sale; and

Whereas, the time has arrived when considerable quantities of foodstuffs would have to be purchased in order to get as nearly production prices as possible; and

Whereas, legally, the Department of Public Markets is without power to make purchases without money available to pay the amount obligated; and

Whereas, cash payments greatly facilitate purchases and cheapen prices,

I therefore respectfully request your Honorable Body to issue special revenue bonds in the amount of \$50,000 for use in purchasing for immediate consumption or for storage to be sold to consumers later, any foodstuffs which this department may find feasible or advisable to purchase; that the money so created be put into a special account for the use of the Department of Public Markets, either in the Department of Finance or as a special account in the Department of Public Markets, subject to direct oversight and audit by the Department of Finance; that I, as Commissioner of Public Markets, be put under bond in such amount as your Honorable Board may deem sufficient for the protection of the City to guarantee on my part faithful handling of such funds; that I be allowed to make such purchases direct and pay such commissions for purchase and sale as in my judgment may be just and proper.

No. 344—Request of the Commissioner of Public Markets for Special Revenue Bonds, \$50,000, for Use in Purchasing any Foodstuffs Which the Department May Find Feasible and Advisable to Purchase.

Sir—As requested in your communication of March 14, 1918, I have caused an investigation into this matter and below I give the facts in relation thereto.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 19, 1917, adopted the following resolution, in which the Board of Aldermen concurred on October 23, 1917:

"Be it resolved and certified, pursuant to the provisions of section 14 of chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917, that on account of the deprivation of necessities of life in the City of New York, by reason of a shortage in the supply of, and excessive charges for, milk, meats, other foods and fuel, an emergency exists which requires that the City of New York purchase milk, meats, other foods and fuel and provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants."

Section 14, referred to in the above mentioned resolution, reads as follows:

"14. Purchase and sale of food and fuel by municipalities. Any municipality in this state may, in case of an actual or anticipated emergency on account of a deprivation of necessities, by reason of excessive charges or otherwise, purchase food and fuel with municipal funds or on municipal credit, and provide storage for and sell the same to its inhabitants in such manner and through such agencies as it may determine, but before the exercise of any such power or authority by any municipality it shall have the consent in writing from the state food commission to exercise such power. The mayor, if any, and the governing body or bodies of any such municipalities shall file with the state food commission a resolution and certificate stating that such a necessity has arisen in said municipality and otherwise satisfy the state food commission that such a necessity exists. The state food commission shall act upon the application as in its judgment the public interest requires and may prescribe such regulations and restrictions as it deems wise.

"Special revenue bonds may be issued by the city comptroller for the purpose of this section in any city which issues such bonds, and the same shall be issued in the manner provided by the city charter or other act applicable thereto."

Pursuant to the application mentioned above the State Food Commission on November 1, 1917, granted the application with the following restrictions:

"(1) Such consent is granted until further order of the Commission.

"(2) The City of New York shall make monthly, or oftener if required by the State Food Commission, a report of its operations pursuant to the foregoing consent to the State Food Commission. Such report shall be in such form as shall be prescribed by the Commission."

The Board of Aldermen, at a meeting held on January 7, 1918, designated the Commissioner of Public Markets of the City of New York as the agency for the purchase, storage and sale to the inhabitants of the City of food and fuel under authority of the above mentioned law.

The Commissioner of Public Markets, in order to alleviate the conditions as set forth in the resolutions of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, requests that the sum of \$50,000 be provided by the issue of special revenue bonds as a fund to permit him to purchase food and fuel for immediate sale to the public or for storage, to be sold later to the public. The Commissioner has stated that the plan of the Department of Markets for bringing food to New York and selling it to the public at the lowest possible prices will develop in its practical details, as the various conditions to be met might arise.

The Commissioner has been able to sell food sent to him on consignment and some acquired on credit, which was paid for out of the proceeds of the sales. In order that he might take advantage of the low prices afforded in cash sales and also to permit the purchase of food for storage at a time when low prices are afforded, to be sold later when public interest would be served, it would be desirable that such a fund be created.

It is suggested that the usual restriction in the resolutions recommending special revenue bond appropriations "that all obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1918," be eliminated. The purpose of this is to permit the account to be a continuing one so that all credits might be applied back to the fund and without new authorization next year.

The procedure for the audit of bills for purchases and for the sale of food and fuel acquired is now being worked out by the Department of Finance.

It is questionable whether, under the provisions of section 14, above quoted, action by the Board of Aldermen is necessary, as the Comptroller appears to have power to issue special revenue bonds, but such action by your Board will remove any question in the matter. AN ORDINANCE selecting a site to be acquired for use as a refuse destructor in the Bureau of Street Cleaning, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby selects as a site to be acquired for use as a refuse destructor in the Bureau of Street Cleaning, under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Queens, the following lands described in metes and bounds, as follows:

All that certain parcel of land situated in Jamaica, Fourth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, bounded on the Southeast by Catharine Street, on the Northeast by Church Street, on the Southwest by the South Side Railroad and upon the Northwest by the line dividing Lots 19 and 20, as the aforesaid streets and these lots are shown upon Map of Lots situated at Jamaica, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, N. Y., belonging to I. B. Remsen; surveyed October 11, 1898, by E. W. Conklin & Son; filed at the Queens County Clerk's office June 27, 1899, as No. 444, being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the Northwesterly line of Catharine Street with the Southwesterly line of Church Street; running thence Southwesterly for 185.80 feet along the Northwesterly line of Catharine Street to the Northeasterly boundary line of the right-of-way of the South Side Railroad; thence Northwesterly for 170.24 feet along said boundary line of the right-of-way to the Northwesterly line of Lot No. 20; thence Northeasterly for 168.61 feet along the

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York, N. Y.:

Sirs—Some time since corporate stock was made available for the acquisition of a site for the construction of a Refuse Destructor at Jamaica, efforts have been made from time to time to determine upon a site which would meet the least objection and not conflict with the City Ordinances as to zoning restrictions. Many sites have been looked into, but for one reason or another I have been unable to determine upon a desirable location for the proposed destructor until recently.

I submit herewith for your approval, in accordance with the Charter provisions, the selection of a site located on the corner of Catherine Street and Church Street, Jamaica, running about 180 feet on Church Street and about 175 feet on Catharine Street.

Report of the Committee on Salaries and Offices in Favor of Filing an Ordinance Establishing a Division of Day Nurseries in the Department of Health.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices, to which was referred on February 26, 1918 (Minutes, page 485), the annexed ordinance establishing a division of Day Nurseries in the Department of Health, respectfully

REPORTS:

That your Committee gave this matter careful consideration. There appeared before the Committee in favor of the proposed amendment Aldermen Calman, Braunstein and Palitz, who stated there was need for such nurseries. Mrs. Seidenberg, representing the Emanuel Day Nurseries, also favored the ordinance; Miss Josephine Wade, representing Mrs. Guggenheim, appeared as favoring the establishment of a day nursery on the west side of Manhattan for colored children.

There appeared in opposition to the ordinance Mr. Henry G. MacAdam, of the Board of Health, who opposed the ordinance for several reasons—a sufficient number of day nurseries to care for all needs are now in existence—attendance at nurseries now in existence is falling off instead of increasing. It is a needless expenditure of City funds.

Miss Mary Wood, representing New York State and New York City Federation of Women's Clubs, and Mrs. Jane Powell, representing the Women's Council of National Defense, opposed the ordinance as being unnecessary. Attached hereto is a communication from the Commissioner of Health dealing in detail with the subject, in which he disapproves of the proposed ordinance.

Your Committee therefore believes that the purpose of the proposed ordinance in establishing a division of day nurseries, under the jurisdiction of the Board of Health, is unnecessary, and it recommends that the said ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE establishing a Division of Day Nurseries in the Department of Health.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. A Division of Day Nurseries is hereby established in the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Department of Health.

Section 2. The staff of the said Division shall consist of a Superintendent and such other employees as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this Act, the same to be appointed in accordance with the provisions of section 124 of the City Charter, and their salaries to be fixed pursuant to section 56 of the City Charter.

Section 3. The said Division is hereby authorized and empowered, under the direction of the Bureau of Child Hygiene and of the Board of Health, to establish and maintain as many model day nurseries in the City of New York as the needs of its inhabitants demand and circumstances permit.

Section 4. The said Division shall immediately upon its organization establish at least three (3) such model day nurseries and shall make application to the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the funds necessary for such establishment.

Section 5. The Board of Health shall determine the fees, if any, to be charged by the nurseries for their service.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

Department of Health, City of New York, Office of the Commissioner, March 12, 1918.

Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—Referring to the ordinance establishing a Division of Day Nurseries in the Department of Health, as introduced by Aldermen Braunstein and Calman, it is the opinion of this Department that the establishment of such division under the control of the Bureau of Child Hygiene of this Department is unnecessary for the following reasons:

1. At the time we entered the war it was felt by many people who are connected with day nurseries that they were destined to be a large factor in the social problems of the next few years because of the possibility of a large number of women going into industry and leaving the children to be cared for in shelters of this kind.

2. Tentative plans were made by the day nursery organizations to meet the need, but up to the present time the need has not materialized and there does not seem to be any more insistent demand for day nurseries to-day than there was five years ago. The day nurseries at present are not overcrowded, so far as I have been able to find out, and they seem well able to accommodate the number of children who need their care. A condition similar to this occurred in England at the beginning of the war. There the day nurseries had extended their facilities only to find that they were not needed.

3. Another point of view has apparently contributed to the lessening of the need for day nurseries in England. It was realized that the baby that is best cared for is the one that is kept with its own mother, so when women went into industry a large number of the big factories provided rest rooms or day nurseries in connection with the plants, where babies might be kept and where the mothers were relieved at regular periods to go and nurse them. This, I believe is an excellent plan.

4. Just at the present time I do not believe there is an urgent need for the city to take over day nurseries or to establish new ones. I do believe, however, that the day nursery situation could be met a little better if the city would treat them as it does the hospitals run under private control, that is, to pay a certain per capita rate per day for every baby cared for on a free basis, as far as the nursery is concerned. Such a plan would not cost the city nearly as much as the idea of municipalization and, at the same time, would place the burden of the care of the indigent poor where, in my opinion, it belongs—on the community.

5. If the establishment of model day nurseries as outlined in the ordinance is proposed for the purpose of showing the highest type of day nursery, such need has already been filled. There are in the city several nurseries which are ideal in every way and which could be used as models. Very truly yours,

Reports of the Committee on State Legislation Affecting the City of New York—

No. 377.

Report of the Committee on State Legislation Affecting the City of New York on the Ottinger-Adler Terminal Commission Bills.

To the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on State Legislation of the Board held a public hearing in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, on Monday morning, March 18, 1918, at 10:30 a. m., on the Ottinger-Adler Terminal Commission bills, notice of which hearing was given in the City Record and in the public press generally.

The Ottinger-Adler bill above referred to provides for the creation of a Terminal Improvement Commission for the City of New York. The Commission is to consist of the Mayor and Comptroller, two members of the Public Service Commission, First Department, designated by the Governor, and three other members appointed by the Governor, one of whom is to be designated as chairman.

The Commission is given most broad powers to alienate and dispose of the City's water-front and other properties, to enter into agreements with the New York Central Railroad and other transportation corporations on behalf of The City of New York, for the improvement of the freight and terminal facilities. The Commission is given power to cancel and modify existing contract obligations of any of the said transportation corporations, including the New York Central, and to make contracts binding upon The City of New York, for which such expenditures by the City are to be made, unlimited in amount, as the Commission may deem necessary for improvements to be made in connection with the tracks and terminal facilities of the New York Central or other railroad corporations.

Powers are given to this State Commission which even the governing bodies of this City never had any right to exercise.

At the public hearing the bill was opposed by the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, Corporation Counsel, Dock Commissioner and numerous representatives of taxpayers and civic organizations.

The bill, while ostensibly being of general application and applying to cities of over one million inhabitants, in fact affects only The City of New York, that being the only city of the State having that population.

It is drafted in this misleading general form so that it need not come to the Mayor of the City for his approval. We regard this method of legislation as an unwarranted subterfuge, and condemn it accordingly.

If necessary, the Constitution of this State should be amended so as to prevent a recurrence of this abuse.

The Ottinger-Adler bill is an unnecessary and unwarranted interference with the affairs of this municipality. It takes from the people of this City, acting through their duly elected officers, and places in the hands of a State commission not responsible to our people, great powers affecting the vital interests of the City.

The bill should be defeated, and in the name of the city the members of the Legislature and the Governor of the State should be urged to oppose its passage. We attach herewith a form of resolution which we strongly urge the Board to adopt, carrying these recommendations into effect. Respectfully submitted,

Whereas, For a period of upwards of two centuries prior to 1870 private ownership of waterfront of the City of New York grew to such an extent that the commerce of the City was throttled thereby; and

Whereas, In 1870 and 1871 legislation was enacted creating a department of docks and authorizing and directing the City of New York to acquire from private ownership the waterfront that had passed into private ownership, so that thereby the commerce of the port might be developed, and the supremacy of the Port of New York established; and

Whereas, Huge expenditures of public funds have been made by the City of New York for the acquisition of waterfront privately owned pursuant to the policy adopted in 1870 and 1871; and

Whereas, Upon the formation of the greater City of New York, by the consolidation of the various municipalities therein, it was recommended by the Commission on Charter Revision, consisting of able and representative men, that the lands and lands under water and waterfront of the City of New York should be inalienable, and that the supremacy of the Port of New York and the development of its commerce would thereby be conserved and established; and

Whereas, By the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, adopted pursuant to the recommendations of said Commission, the rights of the city in and to its water front, ferries, wharf property, land under water, public landings, wharves and docks are declared to be inalienable; and

Whereas, For nearly 70 years the New York Central Railroad and its predecessors have, without the payment of any consideration therefor, occupied great

extents of the streets and public ways of the City of New York, and, based upon such free occupancy has become one of the richest and most powerful railroads in the world; and

Whereas, For more than 10 years past the said railroad company has persistently endeavored to possess itself of the ownership of great extents of the commercial waterfront of the City of New York on the Hudson River, and in its efforts to consummate such desire has continuously delayed and interfered with needed public improvements; and

Whereas, In legislation at various times sponsored by the said railroad company power has been granted to the municipal authorities to make an exception in the Charter provisions so as to permit the waterfront of the City of New York to be granted in perpetual ownership to the New York Central Railroad Company in exchange for the surrender of so-called real estate or rights to surface occupations of the City's streets for indefinite periods by the said railroad company; and

Whereas, All such plans and the principle thereof have received the disapproval and condemnation of the public and the citizens of New York and its responsible authorities; and

Whereas, There is now pending in the Legislature a bill known as Senate Int. No. 288, Pr. No. 278, and Assembly Int. No. 335, Pr. No. 346, by the provisions of which a special commission is to be created, having power without the consent of the City of New York, or its local authorities, to alienate to the New York Central Railroad Company the lands and lands under water constituting the waterfront of the City of New York, and having power to close and discontinue streets and grant the ownership of the land therein to the said railroad company, and having power to release the said railroad company from any and all obligations heretofore assumed by it to the City of New York, whether by lease, contract, or in whatever manner, and having power to make new contracts binding upon the City of New York for such expenditures as the said commission may deem necessary, and unlimited in amount, for improvements to be made in connection with the tracks and terminal facilities of said railroad company and others that may be affiliated with it or operated in connection therewith; and

Whereas, The principles of said bill are contrary to sound public policy and detrimental to the welfare of the City of New York in that its vast and valuable waterfront could thereby be conveyed into the private ownership of the New York Central Railroad Company, which in substance would permit the said railroad to levy a toll upon all the commerce at any time passing through the Port of New York, wherever originating in State or Nation, and would permit the capitalization of said waterfront in the hands of the New York Central Railroad and permit said Railroad Company, in case of federal ownership of railroads, to receive payment upon valuations fixed in condemnation proceedings or otherwise for property now owned by the City of New York; and

Whereas, The powers to close streets and grant the land therein to the said railroad company would enable the said commission to circumvent the provisions that have been contained in the Constitution since 1875, forbidding any grant of a franchise to use the streets of the City of New York except by the municipal authorities, and to confer upon the New York Central Railroad Company the perpetual ownership and control of such streets for its own enrichment; and

Whereas, The powers given to said commission to cancel obligations of the said railroad company to the City of New York would inure to the benefit of the said railroad company and to the detriment of the City of New York to the extent of millions of dollars; and

Whereas, The power given to said commission to contract for and incur obligations on behalf of the City of New York is subject to grave abuse and would permit the diversion to railroad and terminal purposes of public funds imperatively required for public schools, hospitals, police and fire protection, and other necessary and vital matters; and

Whereas, The said legislation is a pernicious and unwarranted intermeddling with the property and affairs of the City of New York in the interest of said New York Central Railroad Company; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the City of New York, acting in and by the Board of Aldermen thereof, does hereby unreservedly condemn and disapprove of the said legislation and of any and all legislation that tends to deprive the City of New York of the ownership and control of its waterfront and the release of railroad corporations from their obligations to the City of New York and the use of public moneys in the direct or indirect aid of railroad purposes; and, be it further

Resolved, That each member of the Legislature be requested to oppose the passage of the foregoing bill and any like legislation, and that a copy of these preambles and resolutions be transmitted forthwith to each senator and assemblyman in the State Legislature and to the Governor of the State of New York.

The Honorable Board of Aldermen, Municipal Building, New York City:

Dear Sirs—The Bureau of Street Cleaning of the Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond employs three motor trucks for hauling clinker from refuse destructors, and in its refuse collection service. The trucks are: A 5-ton gasoline Pierce Arrow, a 3½-ton electric General Vehicle and a 3½-ton electric Lansden. One of these trucks, the Lansden, has been in use for nearly six years, and having outlived its usefulness, should be replaced. In addition, our experience for the past three years has demonstrated that three cars are inadequate for the work, that a fourth truck should be added to the equipment engaged in the removal of clinker and in the collection of household refuse. Thousands of tons of clinker have accumulated at the destructors in consequence of insufficient motor equipment and the presence of these huge piles of clinker in the destructor yards greatly increases the cost of wheeling clinker from the buildings to the piles and seriously interferes with the effective operation of the plants, and several of the other activities of the Bureau of Street Cleaning are periodically disrupted by reason of assignments therefrom to the wheeling of clinker at the destructors.

The solution, as we see it, is the acquisition of two motor trucks, one to replace the Lansden herein mentioned, the other to be added to the equipment engaged in this work.

I therefore respectfully ask the Board of Aldermen to issue Special Revenue Bonds amounting to \$12,683 to be used for the purchase of two (2) Pierce Arrow 5-ton motor trucks. Respectfully, CALVIN D. VAN NAME, President of the Borough.

No. 125—President, Borough of Richmond—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$12,683 to purchase two five-ton motor trucks.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—The Borough President stated in his request that the Bureau of Street Cleaning employs three motor trucks, a 5-ton gasoline, a 3½-ton electric General Vehicle and a 3½-ton electric Lansden; that the Lansden truck has been in use for nearly six years and, having outlived its usefulness, should be replaced, and that, as the three present trucks have proved inadequate, fourth truck is necessary.

An Engineer detailed by me to examine this request reported to me that the electric trucks had failed to do the work of which they were capable, because they had been allowed to stand idle for long periods unnecessarily and that they appeared to be in good condition, except that the storage batteries were weak. The Lansden truck has the same battery which was furnished with the truck when it was delivered. The battery was guaranteed for four years of service and it is now old. Since the power used for propelling the electric trucks is obtained from the incinerators practically without cost, a proposal to discard one of the electric trucks and replace it with a gasoline propelled truck should be carefully considered.

In my report to you dated February 18, 1918, I therefore suggested that before making a decision on the request the electric trucks should be tested with new batteries, as such a test could be made without cost to the City.

It is now stated that such a test has been made during the past week. This office was not represented at the test, not having been notified of the intention of the Bureau of Street Cleaning that the test was to take place.

The Bureau of Street Cleaning reports that the Lansden truck loaded with 3 tons 645 pounds of clinkers after covering 15 miles in 2 hours 50 minutes, failed to make a hill on the route selected for the test.

I am inclined to accept the result of this test as proof that an electric truck is not well adopted for the purpose desired, that is, carting clinker to any part of Staten Island where it is desired to improve the road surface, and other long continuous hauls, especially since the Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond, desires to obtain the Lansden electric truck. He states that his department is greatly in need of a truck and can use an electric truck to good advantage in the comparatively level territory in Manhattan Borough.

The Assistant Commissioner of Public Works of the Borough of Richmond states that the records show the production of clinker at the incinerators for the past six months to be at the rate of 32 to 34 tons per day, which is roughly seven five-ton loads per day. He states that it will be satisfactory to the Borough President if an appropriation is authorized sufficient to purchase one new five-ton gasoline truck, thus giving the Bureau of Street Cleaning the use of two 5-ton gasoline trucks with the General Vehicle electric 3½-ton tractor for use on the less hilly roads of the borough. Upon the approval of this arrangement the Borough President will turn over the Lansden electric truck to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, so that it can be transferred to the Department of Parks, Manhattan.

An appropriation of \$6,341.50, which is one-half the amount requested for the purchase of two trucks, will be sufficient to purchase one 5-ton gasoline truck of any make on the market, provided the purchase is made before another advance takes place in the prices of such trucks. Very truly yours,

Dear Sir—I hereby request the approval of your Honorable Board for the issue of special Revenue Bonds amounting to \$12,500.00 as follows:

Emergency Repairs Steamer "Correction".....	\$10,000 00
Emergency Repairs Steamer "Riker's Island".....	1,000 00
Emergency Repairs Steamer "Hart's Island".....	1,500 00

\$12,500 00

The lowest estimate which the Department has been able to secure for the repairs to the hull of the Steamer "Correction" has been \$8,750.00. This does not include the repairs to propeller or boilers which will increase the cost for this boat to at least \$10,000.00.

The repairs to the Steamer "Riker's Island" have been placed by the very lowest estimate at \$1,000.00. This boat is sunk at the dock at Hart's Island and it is impossible to estimate the exact cost of hull repairs and boiler work which will be necessary before she can again be placed in commission. I am, however, hopeful of keeping the cost within the amount requested.

The Steamer "Hart's Island" is in immediate need of a recaulking of her entire hull and extensive boiler work in addition to other repairs. This boat has been in the service of the Department of Public Charities for two years and none but minor repairs have been made during that time. It is imperative that she be placed in immediate seaworthy condition as she is the only boat on which this Department can depend for relief in case an emergency withdraws either of the other boats from commission. The very lowest estimate at which the Department has been able to arrive for a complete overhauling of this boat is \$1,500.00.

This Department was allowed \$6,000.00 in the 1918 Budget for the repair of the above steamers. On January 14 the Steamer "Correction" accidentally struck the Steamer "Thomas M. Mulry" of the Department of Public Charities while attempting to land at the City Hospital Dock on Blackwell's Island. The damage resulting therefrom has amounted to upward of \$2,600.00 which this Department will be called on to pay as the Department of Public Charities has no allowance within its budgetary appropriations for emergency repairs in the sum mentioned. The balance of this amount (\$3,400.00) will be needed to raise the Steamer "Riker's Island" and maintain the launches of the Department and for other minor repairs throughout the year.

The weather conditions which have governed the shipping transportation in New York Harbor during the past three months have been the worst in its history and are entirely responsible for the emergency repairs which are necessary at this time. It is only by keeping the floating equipment of the Department in good repair that the functions of the institutions can be properly carried out. It is also a wise economy when it is considered that the boats in their present condition are more of a liability than an asset; being liable to founder at any time with passengers aboard.

No. 255—Commissioner of Correction, Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$12,500, for Emergency Repairs to Certain Steamers.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In accordance with your request of February 21, 1915, I have made an examination of this matter.

In the 1918 budget the sum of \$26,410 was allowed to the Department of Correction under "Code 2674, Contract or Open Order Service, Repairs and Replacements." Of this amount the sum of \$6,000 was included for the repairs to the steamers of that department.

On January 14, 1918, one of the boats of the Department of Correction accidentally rammed the steamer "Thomas M. Mulry" of the Department of Public Charities. The cost of these repairs, \$2,655.86, is to be defrayed by the Department of Public Charities from funds to be transferred from the \$6,000 appropriated to the Department of Correction and referred to above. The balance of the \$6,000 will be required by the department to meet emergency repairs during the balance of the year.

The \$12,500 now requested in special revenue bonds is made up as follows:

Steamer "Correction."	\$12,500 00

Owing to the unusually heavy ice encountered in the waters adjacent to the City during this winter, the copper sheathing of the Steamer "Correction" has been badly damaged, some of it having been stripped off, entirely exposing the planking to the action of the ice. This has resulted in serious damage to the planking and has caused the vessel to leak. All the blades of the starboard propeller have been broken off and new bushings will be necessary for both propeller shafts. The vessel was drydocked on February 8, 1918, to permit an examination and determination of just what repairs are necessary. Four estimates for the work on the hull were obtained, the lowest of which is for the sum of \$8,750. An estimate of \$970 for the outboard work on the propellers and shafts was also obtained.

It was necessary to return the boat to service pending the securing of permission to expend the sum required for repair. The estimate of \$10,000 for necessary repairs to this vessel is reasonable.

Steamer "Riker's Island."

This boat was crushed by the ice and sank at the Hart's Island Dock. The vessel was submerged for about two months and has recently been floated by the Department of Correction. She will require drydocking and extensive repairs to the hull, including new planking and sheathing. The guard on the starboard side has been loosened for about thirty feet. New copper sheathing will be required. It is impossible to determine the exact amount of work necessary until the vessel is drydocked for examination. The upper works have been badly damaged by ice and by the cables used for raising the vessel. The boiler and steam pipe covering will have to be removed and renewed and the machinery overhauled. All fittings, electric wiring and furnishings will require overhauling. The cost of repairing the vessel to meet the requirements of the United States Steamboat Inspection Service, in order to receive a license to carry passengers is estimated at not less than \$5,000. This vessel was built in 1910, is 72 feet long and of 66 tons gross.

Steamer "Hart's Island."

This boat was built in 1910, is 67 feet long and of 85 tons gross. It is now operating between City Island and Hart's Island. It is stated by the Department of Correction that she had only minor repairs for the past two years, having been loaned to the Department of Public Charities for the greater part of the time. An examination of the vessel shows that repairs are needed to the hull and planking and that the rudder is badly bent, rendering steering difficult. The heavy ice of the past winter has stripped much of the copper sheathing. Drydocking is necessary to make the proper repairs. The estimate of \$1,500 for this work is reasonable.

The amount requested for these repairs appears reasonable, and in the event that a larger amount should be necessary, the excess may, for the present, be charged to the appropriation for general repairs.

It is possible that sufficient funds will be available later for transfer from salary accruals for the purpose of this request, but they are not now available.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Snow and Ice.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on January 22, 1918 (Minutes, page 152), the annexed ordinance to amend article 1 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances relating to snow and ice respectfully

REPORTS:

The proposed ordinance is to harmonize the provisions of subdivision 1 of section 217 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to snow and ice, with the provisions of the ordinance under consideration, so that the matter of removal of rubbish and snow in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx shall be performed by the Street Cleaning Commissioner and not by the Borough Presidents of the respective boroughs. In consideration of the foregoing your Committee recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 1 of Article I of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to snow and ice.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of Article I of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Reimbursement for removal of rubbish or snow.

§1. Reimbursement for removal of rubbish or snow.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person, having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place, where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with any of the provisions of this chapter for the removal of snow [and] or ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter on the side of the street on which said building or lot abuts, the commissioner of street cleaning, or the borough president of Queens or Richmond, as the case may be, may cause such removal to be made, meeting such expense from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund. Thereafter, the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the commissioner of street cleaning, or by the president of the borough of Queens or Richmond, to the comptroller, and the board of estimate and apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required, for the removal of the snow [,] or ice, dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, or, instead, in the borough of Queens or Richmond, to the special fund for restoring and repaving in said boroughs, if the presidents thereof so elect, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds, which shall be sold by the comptroller as provided by law. [The commissioner of street cleaning, or borough president of Queens or Richmond, as the case may be, shall, as soon as possible after the work is done, certify to the corporation counsel the amount of expense therefor, chargeable against each piece of property, who shall sue and recover the amount of such expense from the owner of such property, together with a penalty of \$3 for each offense.]

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting Substitute Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Snow and Ice."

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on January 15, 1918 (Minutes, page 112), the annexed ordinance to amend subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "snow and ice," respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee heard the introducer of the proposed ordinance and also the Hon. Frank L. Dowling, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Commissioner of

Street Cleaning, Mr. A. C. MacStay; Mr. T. J. Murphy, representing the Corporation Counsel, and Dr. A. Korn, President of the Harlem Property Owners' Association, who favored the ordinance, and there were no appearances in opposition. It is the contention of those favoring the proposed ordinance that the provision relating to snow and ice, as formerly existed, should be re-enacted, because of the innumerable serious and fatal accidents that have occurred by neglect or failure of householders to remove snow as required by ordinance.

Your Committee is of the opinion that the proposed ordinance is desirable, but feeling that it should be modified, herewith presents a substitute ordinance, which it recommends for adoption.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to snow and ice.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§21. Property owners' duties.

1. Must clear sidewalks. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person, having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city, abutting upon any street or public place, where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within 4 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow [and] or ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in the above period of 4 hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow [and] or ice from the roadway by the commissioner of street cleaning, or by the borough president of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said commissioner of street cleaning or of said borough president of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow [and] or ice, dirt or other material; except that in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other persons who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow [and] or ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said 4 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the city for the removal of snow [and] or ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or vacant lot abuts, the [president of the] commissioner of street cleaning or [in which such building or vacant lot is located] president of Queens and Richmond, as the case may be, may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal, as to each particular lot of ground, shall be ascertained and certified by the said commissioner of street cleaning or the borough president of Queens and Richmond to the comptroller, and the board of estimate and apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required, for the said removal of such snow [and] or ice, [and snow] dirt, or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds, which shall be sold by the comptroller as provided by law.

The said commissioner of street cleaning or the borough president of Queens or Richmond, as the case may be, shall, as soon as possible after [the] such work is done, certify to the corporation counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property. The corporation counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, [together with \$3 penalty for each offense,] and, when so recovered, the amount shall be turned over to the city chamberlain, to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall, upon conviction thereof by any city magistrate, be fined for such offense not less than One Dollar (\$1) and not more than Three Dollars (\$3) and in default of payment thereof may be imprisoned for a period of one day.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the City for the removal of snow, [and] ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or vacant lot abuts, the President of the Borough in which such building or vacant lot is located, may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Borough President to the Comptroller, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such ice [and] or snow, dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the Comptroller, as provided by law.

The said Borough President shall, as soon as possible, after the work is done, certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property.

The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of said expense, [together with Three Dollars (\$3) penalty for each offense,] and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall, upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, be fined for such offense not less than One Dollar (\$1) and not more than Three Dollars (\$3) or be imprisoned for a period not exceeding one day, or may be both fined and imprisoned.

Every such company shall carry for a single fare upon such car, without change therefrom, each and every passenger to any regular stopping place desired by him, upon said car's route, in the direction of the destination so designated; and for every violation of this section [the company so offending shall be liable to a penalty in the sum of \$100.] *the company so offending shall be liable to each passenger injured or aggrieved thereby to a penalty of \$100 and each passenger so injured or aggrieved may sue for the said sum in his or her own name;* but this section shall not apply to a transfer made to a connecting line going in a different direction from that in which such car may be going, nor where by reason of any accident, unavoidable blockade or open drawbridge, compliance with this section is rendered impossible.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, Feb. 5, 1918, at 3:30 p. m.

Present — Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Stern, Sachs and Farley, Trustees, and Mr. Coler, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, ex-officio. Excused: Mr. Paulding and Mr. Wright, Trustees.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

At Gouverneur Hospital there are only four men on the House Staff available for ambulance service, and during January there were 572 calls. Miss Stowers asks that Dr. Bergenfeld, who went on duty Jan. 1, and who has substituted at Fordham, be given permission to ride regularly, and that Drs. Goldberg and London be permitted to take transfers only.

The north wall of the tunnel at 29th st. is badly cracked. Bids for the repair of this wall were opened on Nov. 8, 1917, but were in excess of the funds available for that year, and were therefore deferred. The Budget Committee did not approve of our request for this item in the budget for 1918, as the tunnel is not in use, and temporary supports had been put up which would prevent the wall from falling for an indefinite period. As the wall must ultimately be replaced, it is desirable to request the Board of Aldermen for funds in the amount of \$12,500 to permit the letting of contracts for repairs to this wall.

Dr. Norris, Director of Laboratories, appointed Medical Examiner Jan. 31, asks for a leave of absence of six months. If this request be granted I would suggest that Dr. Symmers, Assistant Director, be made Acting Director during the absence of Dr. Norris.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to see that all nurses exposed to diphtheria receive the Shick Test.

Authorization was granted Dr. Bergenfeld at Gouverneur to ride regularly on ambulances and Drs. Goldberg and London to take transfers, this permission being granted subject to the approval of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital.

After discussion and consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Aldermen for an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$12,500 for the reconstruction of the north wall of the tunnel at the foot of E. 29th st.

Dr. Norris' request for leave of absence, considered in connection with his letter of Jan. 30 relating thereto, was approved for a period of six months, without salary, and at the same time Douglas Symmers was made Acting Director of Laboratories during the absence of Dr. Norris.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President presented a tabulation of bids received at Bellevue Hospital on January 31 for the installation of screens

at Fordham Hospital as follows: Alexander Johns, \$7,490; Chamberlain Metal Weather Strip Co., \$7,875; Bernard Knopf, \$7,945; J. M. Knopp, \$10,400. The Chairman of the Building Committee presented reports relating thereto from the Supervising Engineer and also from the Chief Clerk and Auditor under date of Feb. 5. The budget for 1918 allowed \$7,800 for this work, but as the plans, specifications and estimate of cost were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the sum of \$4,500, it was moved, seconded and carried, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, to defer action and request that Board for a re-estimate of the cost.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at Bellevue Hospital on Jan. 31 for the following alterations at Harlem Hospital: Enlarging the ambulance platform; converting stable into a garage; enclosing north and south balcony ends; reconstruction of entrance to nurses' home; moving vacuum tanks; installing sump pump; installing ash hoist and new area. Reports relating thereto were presented by the Chairman of the Building Committee from the architect, Joseph H. Freedlander, under date of Feb. 5 and also from the Chief Clerk and Auditor under date of Feb. 5. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action on these bids pending a re-estimate of the cost by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as the bids received were in excess of the amounts approved by that Board. Inasmuch as the funds in Code C. B. H. 13G for additions to the power house and ambulance station are not sufficient to meet the charge for plumbing and heating contracts, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Estimate to make this a charge against Repairs and Replacements in the budget for 1918. As the lowest estimate for the installation of the sump pump was in the sum of \$1,125, it was moved, seconded and carried to also request the Board of Aldermen for permission to enter into a contract for the installation of this pump without public letting, as the style desired is patented and is the same type as the one now at the hospital.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at the office of the Central Purchase Committee on Feb. 4, for drugs, chemicals and hospital supplies; household ware, and eggs. On the recommendation of the Committee on Supplies, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders except as hereinafter noted. Bids on Class A for Household Ware were rejected on account of the high prices, purchases in the open market being authorized. Bids on Class D, which were informal, were rejected. Action was deferred on lines Nos. 82 to 87, inclusive, of the schedule for drugs, chemicals and hospital supplies pending the result of tests of the samples submitted.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital, recommended the appointment of Victor William Anderson as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was approved and the appointment made accordingly.

On the recommendation of the Medical Board and the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital the following appointments were approved: Louis Bonvincino as Resident Obstetrician from Feb. 1 to June 1, 1918; Wesley Grove Vincent as Provisional Assistant Visiting Surgeon; Arthur S. Tanner as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Eye Clinic; Nathan Zommick as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Made Medical Clinic. The creation of the position of Provisional Assistant Visiting Gynaecologist for the duration of the war, and the appointment of Dr. Henry C. Falk to the place, were also approved.

After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, a request was authorized to the Board of Aldermen asking for permission to purchase, in the open market, without public letting, a dishwashing machine at an estimated cost of \$1,650, for which funds were provided in the budget for 1918.

Mr. Sachs referred to a pamphlet issued by the Women's Municipal League of the City of New York entitled "The Facts About New York's Underfed School Children." After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to bring the subject up at the next meeting.

Mr. O'Keeffe referred to the incivility and courtesy on the part of employees, and requested the General Medical Superintendent to put up in a prominent place in each hospital of the department a sign to the following effect:

"Visitors are requested to report to the superintendent any courtesy or inattention on the part of employees. Feb. 5, 1918. Board of Trustees."

COMMUNICATIONS.

An application, dated Jan. 31, was presented from J. M. Knopp, contractor for the drainage of roadways around pavilions L and M, applying for payment

of the retained 2 per cent, amounting to \$33.48, on his contract. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, this payment was authorized.

A letter, dated Jan. 31, was presented from the Bureau of Franchises of the Board of Estimate regarding the proposed form of resolution granting consent to the Trustees of Bellevue and Almed Hospitals to install a 12-inch pipe connecting Gouverneur Hospital with the new building for the Out Patient Department. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Bureau of Franchises of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the proposed resolution meets with the approval of the Board of Trustees.

An application, dated Jan. 31, was presented from Charles Schmidt for the payment of the retained 2 per cent, amounting to \$50.62, on his contract for the painting of the walls and ceilings of pavilions A and B. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, this payment was authorized.

A letter, dated Jan. 25, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, calling attention to section C of the budget for 1918, that no position shall be filled until a certificate is issued by the Committee on Salaries and Grades of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

A communication, dated Jan. 28, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting City departments not to increase or advance salaries of officers, clerks or employees involving the issue of special revenue bonds to meet such increases. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

NEW BUSINESS.

In accordance with the rules adopted on May 8, 1906, the election of a President and Secretary was declared in order. On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, John W. Brannan was re-elected President, and John G. O'Keeffe re-elected Secretary.




