RECOVERY BUDGET: REVENUE

Stimulus has increased revenue growth & will supercharge economic growth over time

Increase in revenue is now \$1.5B in FY21 and FY22 over the January forecast \$1.37B in FY21 \$164M in FY22

RECOVERY BUDGET: SAVINGS

Strong fiscal management

Total of almost \$3.9B in savings across FY21-FY22 since June (personnel, programs previously suspended due to COVID & debt service)

Includes \$603M in savings in this Executive Budget

RECOVERY BUDGET: HIRING MANAGEMENT

Actual headcount is currently 313,875

~13,000 lower than high of ~327,000 in September 2019

We project an actual headcount of **319,100** for FY22

• Growth primarily due to expansion of 3K for All, New Family Home visits and launching the City Cleanup Corps

Today: moving from 3:1 to 2:1 hiring policy to allow for recovery hires while maintaining strict hiring rules



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CAPITAL BUDGET

TEN-YEAR CAPITAL STRATEGY

Our Ten-Year Capital Strategy is \$133.7B

Support affordable housing by adding \$1.9B to fully fund Your HomeNYC

Keep our water safe and clean by investing \$1.4B in water and sewer system maintenance and upstate reservoir work

Repair roads by investing **\$1.4B** to resurface **1,150** miles of lanes - including 50 miles of bike lanes - annually over the next **10** years

Prevent damage from climate change and severe weather by adding funding for the Brooklyn Bridge to Montgomery (\$318M) and East Side (\$326M) Coastal Resiliency projects

Safer streets for pedestrians and cyclists by adding \$161M for Vision Zero projects

CAPITAL STRATEGY: COMPLETE THE MANHATTAN GREENWAY BY 2029



Most-traveled bikeway in America; when completed, will provide over 1,000 acres of public open space, more than Central Park

- **\$723M** in capital will fund completion of:
- Inwood: Harlem River waterfront from Sherman Creek to University Heights Bridge
- ✓ Harlem & Washington Heights: Harlem River waterfront from 145th St to Highbridge Park
- ✓ UN Esplanade: East River waterfront from 41st to 53rd Streets
- ✓ East River Pinch Point: 13th to 15th Streets
 Design and procurement underway this year with construction starting in 2023

CAPITAL STRATEGY: PUBLIC HEALTH CAPITAL OF THE WORLD

Expand LifeSci NYC Initiative beyond Life Science Avenue (Manhattan's East Side) to include the Bronx, Brooklyn and Manhattan's West Side and increase lab space across NYC: \$300M

Better prepare for next health emergency with focus on health inequities with the Pandemic Response Institute: \$20M
