## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 3, 1877: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,145, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 637 tenement-houses, 65 private dwellings, 6 other dwellings, 2 manufactories and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 1 dangerous building, 2 markets, 6 other nuisances, 5 sunken and vacant lots, 38 yards, courts, and areas, 41 cellars and basements, 116 waste-pipes and drains, 74 privies and water-closets, 16 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 1 cesspool, together with 38 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 435.

During the past week 71 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

41 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

18 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 31 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 30 houses, 30 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, February 3, 1877, there were 452 deaths reported as having occurred in this city, being an increase of 11, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 114 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending January 27, was 460, which is 62.4 below the average mortality for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.34 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,070,578.

There was an increase during the past compared with the preceding week of 1 death from small-pox, 1 from measles, 2 from puerperal diseases, 1 from cancer, 1 from marasmus and scrofula, 10 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2 from diseases of the nervous system, 5 from Bright's disease and nephritis, and a decrease of 4 deaths from scarlatina, 3 from diphtheria, 1 from membranous croup, 1 from whooping cough, 1 from typhus fever, 4 from phthisis pulmonalis, 3 from bronchitis, 3 from pneumonia, 3 from diseases of the heart.

The mortality for the week included 1 death from small-pox, 1 from measles, 21 from scarlatina, 15 from diphtheria, 8 from membranous croup, 6 from whooping cough, 4 from malarial fevers, and 3 from cerebro-spinal fever.

During the month of January there were 0 deaths reported from small-pox, 4 from measles, 108 from scarlatina, 72 from diphtheria, 37 from membranous croup, 23 from whooping cough, 19 from malarial fevers, and 10 from cerebro-spinal meningitis.

The tenement houses furnished more than their proportion of the mortality from contagious diseases during the month. In this class of dwellings 73 deaths were reported from scarlatina, 44 from diphtheria, and 18 from whooping cough.

The mortality for the week ending January 27, is distributed in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 9; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 17; Eighth, 20; Ninth, 20; Tenth, 24; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 41; Thirteenth, 5; Fourteenth, 7; Fifteenth, 4; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 22; Eighteenth, 17; Nineteenth, 86; Twentieth, 30; Twenty-first, 35; Twenty-second, 38; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 5.

The accompanying abstracts will give the principal facts connected with returns of births, marriages, still-births, and deaths during the week:

During the week ending February 3, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 452 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transitu, and 41 for interments of still born infants. There were recorded 452 deaths, 111 marriages, 495 births, 41 still births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 39 returns of deaths and still births from the coroners. There were 36 searches of registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 5 transcripts of birth records, 2 of marriages, and 29 of deaths were issued from this Bureau.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 16th day of January, 1877, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That section 166 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following, viz.:

"Unless the whole of such material shall be entirely fresh, clean, and inoffensive in the morning of each day during which the same shall be used or placed in such railroad car, and such straw or hay when used for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned, shall be wholly renewed at least once each day."

Resolved, That the said ordinance, as amended, be duly published in the CITY RECORD for the period and in the manner required by law.

Resolved, That the following ordinance, known as section 181 of the Sanitary Code, be and is hereby repealed, viz.:

SECTION 181. That each of the several persons and companies that run or cause to be run any car drawn by horses for the transportation of passengers in any part of the City of New York, do cause both the front entrances from the street upon the platform of the fore end of each of said cars to be effectually barred or closed by gate or otherwise while said cars are in motion, so as to prevent access to any portion of the said platform or the hand rails or the steps thereof by any person not upon such car.
