

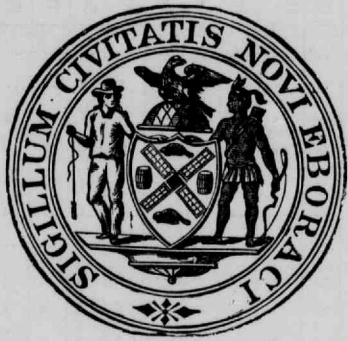

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

CHAPTER 476.

AN ACT to provide for the payment of certain certificates of indebtedness of the Metropolitan Gas Light Company of the city of New York.

Passed June 8, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The Metropolitan Gas Light Company of the city of New York, in order to provide for the payment of the outstanding scrip certificates of the company, issued March twenty-fourth and November thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy, may, by resolution of the board of directors of the company, issue its bonds to an amount not exceeding the sum of nine hundred thousand dollars, payable within twenty years, the money so provided, by the issue of the bonds of the company, as herein provided, to be applied to the payment of the said certificates outstanding, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 477.

AN ACT to provide for the taxation of banks and of moneyed capital engaged in the business of banking, receiving deposits or otherwise.

Passed June 8, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Every Corporation, company, or joint-stock association, created under the laws of any other state or country and which receive deposits, loan money, sell bills of exchange, or issue letters of credit, or in any other manner are engaged in business as bankers in this state, and the officers, managers or agents of any such corporation, company or association shall annually, on or before the first day of February in each year pay to the comptroller a state tax, as a tax on its or their business in this state, at the rate per centum hereinafter specified on the average of all sums of money received on deposit and of all sums of money received by each corporation, company or association in connection with or on account of such business, or used or employed in such business in this state, during the year ending the preceding thirty-first day of December, and for each and every year, one-half of one per cent, computed as above provided.

Sec. 2. Every corporation, company or joint-stock association, and the officers, managers or agents thereof, and all individual bankers mentioned in the first section of this act, liable to pay a state tax, shall make a return to the comptroller in writing on or before the first day of February of each year, in which return shall be set forth the amount of the state tax to and for which they are liable, and of the average of deposits in and of moneys received and used in or on account of such business in this state, respectively, on which such tax is based, which return shall be verified by oath or affirmation; and for any neglect or failure to make such return, or pay said tax, a penalty of ten per centum on the amount of the tax is hereby imposed; and such tax and penalty may be recovered by the people of this state, in an action to be brought in any court of competent jurisdiction, by the attorney-general at the instance of the comptroller.

Sec. 3. The managers or agents of any corporation, company, or joint-stock association mentioned in the first section of this act shall keep at all times in the office where the business of such corporation, company, or joint-stock association is transacted in this state, a full and accurate account of the moneys used or employed in said business and of the deposits therein; and such account shall be subject to the inspection of the comptroller or of any clerk designated by him to inspect the same during business hours of any day on which business may be legally transacted.

Sec. 4. The stockholders in every bank or banking association organized under the authority of this state, or of the United States shall be assessed and taxed on the value of their shares of stock therein; said shares shall be included in the valuation of the personal property of such stockholders in the assessment of taxes at the place, city, town, or ward where such bank or banking association is located, and not elsewhere, whether the said stockholders reside in said place, city, town, or ward or not, but in the assessment of said shares, each stockholder shall be allowed all the deductions and exceptions allowed by law in assessing the value of other taxable personal property owned by individual citizens of this state, and the assessment and taxation shall not be at a greater rate than is made or assessed upon other moneyed capital in the hands of individual citizens of this state. In making such assessment there shall also be deducted from the value of such shares such sum as is in the same proportion to such value as is the assessed value of the real estate of the bank or banking association, and in which any portion of their capital is invested, in which said shares are held, to the whole amount of the capital stock of said bank or banking association. Nothing herein contained shall be held or construed to exempt the real estate of banks or banking associations from either state, county or municipal taxes, but the same shall be subject to state, county, municipal and other taxation to the same extent and rate, and in the same manner according to its value as other real estate is taxed. The local authorities charged by law with the assessment of the said shares shall, within ten days after they have completed such assessment, give written notice to each bank or banking association of such assessment of the shares of its respective shareholders, and no personal or other notice to such shareholders of such assessment shall be necessary for the purpose of this act.

Sec. 5. There shall be kept at all times in the office where the business of each bank or banking association organized under the authority of this state, or of the United States, shall be transacted, a full and correct list of the names and residences of all the stockholders therein, and of the number of shares held by each; and such list shall be subject to the inspection of the officers authorized to assess taxes during the business hours of each day in which business may be legally transacted.

Sec. 6. When the owner of stock in any bank or banking association organized under the laws of this state, or of the United States, shall not reside at the same place where the bank or banking association is located, the collector and county treasurer shall, respectively, have the same powers as to collecting the tax to be assessed by this act as they have by law when the person assessed has removed from the town, ward or county in which the assessment was made, and the county treasurer, receiver of taxes or other officer authorized to receive such tax from the collector may, all or either of them, have an action to collect the tax from the avails of the sale of his, her or their shares of stock, and the tax on the share or shares of said stock shall be and remain a lien thereon from the day when the property is by law assessed, till the payment of said tax, and if transferred after such day, the transfer shall be subject to such lien.

Sec. 7. For the purpose of collecting the taxes to be assessed under sections four, five, and six of this act, and in addition to any other law of this state, not in conflict with the constitution of the United States, relative to the imposition of assessment and collection of taxes, it shall be the duty of every such bank or banking association and the managing officer or officers thereof to retain so much of any dividend or dividends belonging to such stockholder as shall be necessary to pay any taxes assessed in pursuance of sections four, five, and six of this act, until it shall be made to appear to such officer or officers that such taxes have been paid.

Sec. 8. All obligations, liabilities, and taxes heretofore incurred or imposed under chapter five hundred and ninety-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty are saved and shall be enforced as if this act had not been enacted.

Sec. 9. The taxes imposed by sections one and two of this act shall be paid into the treasury of the state, to be held for the objects specified, that is to say: for the general fund, and the payment in every successive fiscal year of the expenses, claims, and demands which shall be a lawful charge upon that fund while such taxes shall continue to be laid.

Sec. 10. All assessments for taxes levied and imposed upon shareholders in state or national banks during the year eighteen hundred and eighty, as the same appear on the assessment-rolls of the several cities, towns, wards, or villages in this state, or upon the other books and records thereof, so far as such assessments are not in conflict with the constitution of the United States, are hereby confirmed, assessed, and levied upon such shareholders, whose names now appear on such assessment-rolls or other books and records thereof as assessed upon their bank shares, and may be collected from the shareholders of said banks in the manner authorized by law for the collection of other personal taxes in addition to all the remedies by law prescribed for the collection of taxes assessed against shareholders in such banks.

Sec. 11. This act shall take effect immediately.

Resolutions.

Resolved, That order 9445 on premises 1015, 1017, and 1019 on First avenue, be and is hereby extended to October 15, 1881.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to Joseph D. Jones to work up the material now in tanks at 380 South street within the next twelve days.

Resolved, That order 12402 on premises 132 West Twenty-second street, be and is hereby suspended for reinspection, and report whether the concreting of cellar is necessary.

Resolved, That order No. 12345 on premises 277 West Sixtieth street, be and is hereby suspended for reinspection and report whether order can be suspended until March 1, 1881.

Resolved, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Comptroller for the following sum of money which is required to enable the Board of Health to pay to the Board of Police the amount of the salaries of thirty policemen detailed to the service of the Board of Health, pursuant to the provisions of section 5, chapter 399, Laws of 1880, being one-twelfth part of the amount estimated, levied, raised, and appropriated for the support and maintenance of the Sanitary Company of Police for the current year, to wit: 30 patrolmen, \$3,000.

Action of the Board on Tenement-House Plans.

Resolved, That the following plans for light and ventilation of tenement-houses, be and are hereby approved upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 1046-3, for two four-story tenements, each 26 feet 8 inches by 61 feet, on lots 26 feet 8 inches by 102 feet, on the north side of East Eighty-seventh street, beginning 80 feet east of Fourth avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1076-3, for two four-story tenements, each 30 feet by 68 feet, with an extension 22 feet by 18 feet deep, on lots 30 feet by 100 feet 5 inches, on the south side of Sixty-first street, beginning 190 feet west of Ninth avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1085-2, for one four-story tenement, 40 feet by 68 feet, with an extension 18 feet deep and 24 feet wide, on a lot 40 feet by 101 feet, on the south side of Sixty-first street, 150 feet west of Ninth avenue, to be occupied by nine families.

Plan No. 1120, for three four-story tenements, each 28 feet by 60 feet, on lots 28 feet by 75 feet, two on the west side of Third avenue, 20 feet north of Ninetieth street, and one on the north side of Ninetieth street, 72 feet west of Third avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1121, for two four-story tenements each 27 feet 6 inches by 60 feet, with an extension 20 feet wide and 18 feet deep, on lots 27 feet 6 inches by 102 feet 2 inches, on the north side of Ninetieth street, beginning 100 feet west of Third avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1122, for two four-story tenements, each 20 feet by 60 feet, on lots 20 feet by 102 feet 2 inches, one on the northwest corner of Third avenue and Ninetieth street, and one on the north side of Ninetieth street, 155 feet west of Third avenue, each to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 1126-2, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 96 feet, on a lot 25 feet by 100 feet, on the northeast corner of Third avenue and Thirty-first street, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 2127, for two five-story tenements, each 25 feet by 64 feet, on lots 25 feet by 94 feet, at Nos. 393 and 395 East Eighth street, each to be occupied by eleven families.

Plan No. 1130, for three five-story tenements, of irregular dimensions, on a plot of ground 100 feet by 100 feet 11 inches, on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Sixth avenue, two to be occupied by ten families each, and the other to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 1131, for one five-story tenement, of irregular dimensions, on a lot of irregular dimensions, on the northwest corner of Twelfth street and Eighth avenue, to be occupied by five families.

Plan No. 1132, for one four-story tenement, 23 feet by 66 feet, with an extension 9 feet deep and 13 feet wide, on a lot 23 feet by 100 feet, on the west side of Third avenue, 23 feet south of Eighteenth street, to be occupied by three families.

Plan No. 1133, for three four-story tenements, each 25 feet by 43 feet 6 inches, with an extension 17 feet 6 inches by 34 feet 6 inches, on lots 25 feet by 105 feet, at Nos. 231 to 235 West Fifteenth street, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1134, for one four-story tenement, 25 feet by 62 feet, with an extension 5 feet 4 inches deep, on a lot 25 feet by 102 feet, on the south side of Eighty-sixth street, 75 feet west of First avenue, to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1135, for three four-story tenements, each 17 feet 2 inches by 60 feet, with an extension 12 feet by 15 feet, on lots 17 feet 2 inches by 100 feet 11 inches, on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, beginning 175 feet east of Eighth avenue, each to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 1136, for twenty-one four-story tenements, each 60 feet deep, and one 30 feet wide, and twenty 20 feet each, on lots of the same width, respectively, and 100 feet deep on the north side of Sixty-ninth street, beginning 80 feet west of Second avenue, the double house to be occupied by eight families, and each of the single houses to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 1137, for four five-story tenements, one 19 feet 8 inches by 71 feet, and three 19 feet 1 inch by 61 feet each, on lots of the same width, respectively, and 75 feet deep, on the east side of Third avenue, beginning on the south-east corner of Thirteenth street and Third avenue, each to be occupied by four families.

Plans Disapproved.

Resolved, That the following plans for light and ventilation of tenement-houses be and are hereby disapproved:

Plan No. 1126-3, for one four-story tenement proposed to be built on the northeast corner of Thirty-first street and Third avenue; and

Plan No. 1138, for three five-story tenements proposed to be built on the east side of Third avenue, beginning 77 feet south of Thirteenth street.

Plan No. 1128, was laid on the table pending an inspection and report on premises.

The Weekly Report of inspections of new tenement-houses was received and ordered on file.

Plumbing Plans and Specifications.

Resolved, That plan and specifications No. 1, for the plumbing and drainage of the building to be erected on the east side of Ninth avenue, 60 feet south of Forty-sixth street, be and is hereby approved by this Board, provided that the ventilating pipes be constructed of cast or wrought iron, but not of galvanized sheet iron; that the vent pipes of the water closet traps be not less than 2 inches in diameter, and for traps under other fixtures not less than 1½ inches; that the leaders which are placed within the house be constructed of cast iron, caulked with lead, in the same manner as the soil pipes; and provided further, that in case the Croton water does not rise so as to constantly supply water for the said house a proper pump or pumps be provided, and also a proper tank.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 16, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1611, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 684 tenement-houses, 79 private dwellings, 57 other dwellings, 14 manufactories and workshops, 27 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 42 slaughter-houses, 2 packing houses, 2 lard rendering establishments, 3 head pickling, 1 lime kiln, 1 mill, 1 smoke-house, 19 sunken and vacant lots, 74 yards, courts, and areas, 117 cellars, 184 water-pipes and drains, 218 privies, 17 street gutters, 9 dangerous stairways, 9 smoky chimneys, 1 gas-main, 1 public drain, 3 cesspools, and 5 other nuisances.

The number of reports therein received from the Inspector was 578.

During the past week 354 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors.

Permits have been granted to the consignees of 77 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

184 permits have been granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 147 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 136 houses, privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

23 cases of contagious diseases were removed to hospital.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 459 births, 47 still-births, 169 marriages, and 990 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 16, 1881; this shows an increase of 75 births, and a decrease of 3 still-births, 55 marriages and 154 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 75 births and 2 still-births, and an increase of 5 marriages, and 177 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 7; scarlatina 7; whooping cough, 3; typhus fever, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 74; inanition, 5; alcoholism, 5; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 9; heart diseases, 8; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 12; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; convulsions, 12; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 12; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 17; puerperal diseases, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; suicide, 1; while the deaths from typhoid fever, increased 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; malarial fevers, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; direct effect of solar heat, 1; apoplexy, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 16; premature and preterm births, 2; drowning 1. The number of deaths from diphtheria, croup, erysipelas, rheumatism and gout, and cancer was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 429 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 540 under two years, 624 under five years, and 38 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 155 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 63.03 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 135 were in institutions, 606 in tenement-houses, 229 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 18 were on the basement floor, 199 on the first, 265 on the second, 195 on the third, 106 on the fourth, 59 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth. 985 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents; 61 were stated to be single, 147 married, 65 widowed, and the condition of 717 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 990; still-births, 47; bodies in transitu, 16. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 82 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 459 births, 169 marriages, 47 still-births, 990 deaths. 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 53 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 1 of marriage, and 40 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 16, 1881, was 75.5 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.920, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 841, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.12 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act.

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4.
