

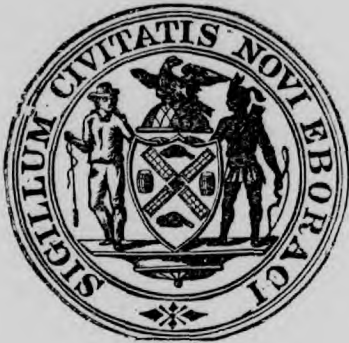

PETITIONS.

By the President—

Petition of residents of Long Island City, in relation to the fare on the Thirty-fourth Street Ferry.

To the Hon. WM. SAUER, President of New York Board of Aldermen:

At a meeting of the German-American Citizens' Association, held at Koch's Broadway Hall, on Saturday, October 14, 1882, we learned, with regret, that the resolution passed by your Honorable Body on the 26th day of September last, instructing the Sinking Fund Commission to insert a clause that there should be no more than two cents charged for foot passengers on the Thirty-fourth street ferry after November 1, when their lease expires, was vetoed by our fellow-townsmen of Queens County, and Mayor of your city, Wm. R. Grace. It was

Resolved, That we petition your Honorable Body to pass over the Mayor's veto, your resolution as it was reported from the Committee on Ferries and Franchises, of your body. After carefully hearing arguments in the ferry company's behalf through their counsel and officers, against it, and the people's representatives for its adoption, it was unanimously and favorably reported to you and adopted by your Honorable Body. We respectfully petition you to sustain the Committee's report and your own action, notwithstanding the Mayor's objection; your action was just to the people of your city and ours, and the Mayor's action unjust; we did not ask you to do anything unjust to the ferry company; they charge more for the truckage on their boats than any other company in your city; this we did not interfere with, although we know that in all fairness they should be reduced also. Our efforts for reduction of fare on this route are historical; we applied, as did your people, to the Legislature of the State, and the popular branch always granted the sought-for relief, notwithstanding the attempted bribery of some of its members, who resisted the temptation, but who were generally punished afterwards by this company. A notable case is that of Hon. John Keegan, our Assemblyman of 1878, who passed this bill by a vote of seventy-eight in its favor; but he has been severely punished since that time by this company for his efforts in our behalf, and because he would not become a slave to that corporation. That company has run the politics of this place as they do their boats, and to make all the profit they can from both. We requested a hearing from the Sinking Fund Commission, by writing to them and requesting them to name a day, so that we could be represented by those whom we could trust and have faith in; our request was handed to Mr. Storrs, Deputy Comptroller, who stated that he would submit it to the Sinking Fund Commission; he informed us that they had no regular day of meeting, but held meetings at will, generally at the Mayor's office. We knew nothing of the hearing granted by the Sinking Fund Commission to the gentlemen who spoke for this city, until we saw it in the papers. You will remember that the Sinking Fund Commissioners sent a protest last winter to the Senate against the bill introduced by the Hon. J. J. Cullen for reducing the fare upon this route. We do now beg you for your kindness and friendship, as we are in poverty, and we might say in ruin—in fact, we are more oppressed than we were in Germany, more than they are in Ireland, and our townsman, your Mayor, should feel for the oppressed, as we understand that he, too, is an exile from poverty and ruin and misery, that weighed so heavily upon the land that gave him birth. There is more cause for revolt against this company than there was when the Fathers of this Republic arose in their might and threw off the British yoke that dared to tax our tea, while this company taxes our bodies. We ask you, for God's sake, to come to our assistance and stand by us in our honest efforts. Our condition is deplorable. We are charged for coming into this place, charged for going out of this place—at Ninety-second street ferry, five cents; at Thirty-fourth street ferry, four cents; at Seventh street ferry, four cents, and at James Slip ferry, six cents, each way. So you can see we are better surrounded in the shape of ramparts than are the Chinese with their historical wall. We cannot earn a living in this place. We must do that in your city. It is only a lodging for us and our children. Our city has a funded debt of a million dollars, a floating debt no man in this city can tell what it is; not one street curbed, guttered, or sewered, out of this debt; not one public building, we are tenants in all our public places, even to the Treasurer's Office; in one ward of our city we had an independent government, in the shape of an Improvement Commission, they gave us some streets fully fixed up, but with that they also gave us a debt of more than two million of dollars. We would respectfully state to you, if his Honor, our townsman, your Mayor, would die in your city, and his friends would attempt to bring his body to his home at Great Neck, Long Island, they would be compelled to pay tribute to the ferry company; and if at any time his friends from New York would come here to say a prayer upon his grave, they too would have to pay tribute to this ferry company, and after saying the prayer and returning to New York, would again pay tribute, as we and our children have to do when going to and from your city, where we earn our daily bread; and all must pay tribute in this way, even to supporting a stud of horses and a race-course in New Jersey, when we are driven to despair by poverty and wrongs. We hope you will excuse us for this lengthy communication. Your City received for this valuable franchise only \$800.00 a year, up to the year 1878, when our Assemblymen at that time called the attention of the public to its value, and since that time your city receives \$5,800 for it, an increase of \$20,000 in the four years, which is due to his efforts. The Long Island papers are claiming that your Mayor, our townsman, is friendly to the measure—we will submit an extract from our official

paper, the Long Island Courier, of October 7, 1882. We beg of your Honorable Body to stand by us in the right, and we will ever pray for your prosperity in this world, and that you may have a happy home and light tolls to pay to get to it in the next.

REDUCED FERRIAGE.

A COMMITTEE OF CITIZENS BEFORE THE NEW YORK SINKING FUND COMMISSION.

Yesterday a number of citizens of this city, headed by Senator Covert and President Gleason of the Board of Aldermen, were granted an audience before the New York Sinking Fund Commission, for the purpose of being heard on the resolution of the New York Board of Aldermen asking to have the rates of ferriage across the Thirty-fourth street ferry reduced to two cents. The first speaker was Mr. Covert, who, in his usual flowery style, stated the grievances under which the poor people were working under the exorbitant rates charged by the East River Ferry Company across the Thirty-fourth street ferry. This city, he said, was not unknown to fame, and although it had become notorious of late for pool-selling, still there were lots of poor honest people who earned their bread by hard toil and could ill afford to pay the ferriage rates demanded by the ferry company. The ferry company, he stated, had conceded to be making enormous profits out of the Thirty-fourth street ferry, but that they were losing money on the Seventh street and James Slip ferries. This, he said, was no argument, for if the same company were running a line of steamers to Europe and another to a remote part of South America, how could they justify themselves in trying to make one offset the other?

He was followed by Alderman Gleason, who exhibited a statement of the company's earnings and expenses for years past, and also a diagram of the property accumulated by them ever since their organization.

Mr. Higgs followed, but the Commission thought that they had heard sufficient on the subject and cut him off abruptly.

The citizens present do not speak very encouragingly of the prospect of the proposed reduction, for while they were assured by Mayor Grace, one of the Commission, that every consideration would be given to the matter, still some of the other members acted at least somewhat peculiar. The present lease of the ferry company expires on November 1st next.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without my approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted October 3, 1882, directing the Commissioner of Public Works to take immediate measures for opening, and keeping open constantly, the mains leading to and from the Murray Hill reservoir, at Fifth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, in order to maintain therein a full head of water, etc., for the reason, that in obedience to chapter 456, Laws of 1881, which directs the discontinuance and

removal of this reservoir, the Department of Public Works has disconnected it from the water-mains which supplied it, and was making further progress in the work when a decision was issued by the Supreme Court, declaring the Act of 1881 unconstitutional, and restraining the Department of Public Works from proceeding further in the matter. I believe a question involving the constitutionality of a statute is always carried to the highest Court, the matter cannot, therefore be regarded as definitely settled, and it does not appear to me proper to incur any expense to restore the connections with the water-mains and undo the work done in pursuance of an act of the Legislature, until the question of the constitutionality of the act is finally determined. I would also state that it has always been held that under existing laws the Department of Public Works has exclusive control of the water supply and the structures and property connected therewith, and that such action as is taken in the resolution under discussion would be without legal effect.

SPECIAL ORDERS.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to steam railroads crossing on grade public highways in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows :

Section 1. It shall be the duty of every person, company, or corporation operating or controlling any railroad in the City of New York, upon which cars are drawn by locomotive engines, other than those known as "dummies," to erect and maintain suitable and substantial gates or doors on each and either side of said railroad, at every point in said city at which its road or tracks cross any public street, road, or avenue at the grade thereof. Such gates or doors shall be kept well painted and in good repair, and be attended, at all times during the approach and passage of cars or trains, by sober, careful, and experienced men, whose duty it shall be to keep the tracks clear of all horses, cattle, and vehicles, to properly warn all persons against crossing said tracks during the approach of any train, locomotive, or car, and to close said gates or doors at least one minute before the passage of any locomotive, engine, or car over said public street, road, or avenue.

Sec 2. It shall not be lawful for any person, company, or corporation operating or controlling any railroad in the City of New York, to run, or allow to be run, any locomotive, or locomotive and tender without cars, across any public street, road, or avenue in said city, unless the gates or doors at such street crossing are closed or down, or to permit any locomotive, or steam engine, car, carriage, wagon, or vehicle, of any kind whatever, to stand for a longer time than two minutes on the intersection caused by the crossing of such railroad and any public street, road, or avenue at the grade thereof.

Sec. 3. Every failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance on the part of the president, directors, superintendent, or other officers of any company or corporation, or on the part of any person or persons operating or controlling any such railroad, shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and the person or persons so offending shall be punished on conviction before any of the police magistrates of the City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of sections 20 and 21 of chapter 11, Laws of 1833, entitled "An act relative to the powers of the Common Council of the City of New York, and the police and criminal courts of said city," and to the provisions of section 5 of article 4 of chapter 228 of the Laws of 1853, entitled "An act in relation to the Police Department of the City of New York."

Sec. 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Waite moved to amend the second section of the ordinance by striking out the word "two" before the word "minutes," and inserting in lieu thereof the word "five."

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 7, 1882.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,766, as follows, viz.:

3 public buildings, 805 tenement-houses, 126 private dwellings, 52 other dwellings, 18 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 61 stables, 25 slaughter-houses, 2 lodging-houses, 1 mill, 1 coal yard, 1 public sewer, 47 sunken and vacant lots, 70 yards, courts and areas, 97 cellars and basements, 187 waste-pipes and drains, 205 privies and water-closets, 22 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 7 cesspools, 11 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 433.

During the past week 153 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

75 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

71 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

This Disinfecting Corps have visited 51 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, 38 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

5 cases of contagious disease were removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 601 births, 38 still-births, 221 marriages, and 594 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 7, 1882. This shows a decrease of 5 births, 8 still-births and 11 marriages, and an increase of 47 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 96 births and 20 marriages, and a decrease of 13 still-births and 16 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from erysipelas decreased 1; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 7; bronchitis, 6; heart diseases, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 5; scarlatina, 3; whooping cough, 1; typhoid fever, 2; malarial fevers, 12; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 1; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; pneumonia, 10; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 4; convulsions, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; premature and pretermatural births, 2; drowning, 3. The number of deaths from diphtheria and croup was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 129 were in institutions, 310 in tenement-houses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 119 on the first, 153 on the second, 96 on the third, 50 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 582 were stated to be residents of New York City and 12 non-residents; 68 were stated to be single, 154 married, 70 widowed, and the condition of 302 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 594; still-births, 38; bodies in transit, 13. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 62 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 601 births, 221 marriages, 38 still-births, 594 deaths, 13 applications for transit permits, were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 90 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 38 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 7, 1882, was 60.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.113, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 635, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.09 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 540 deaths and still-births, or 85.44 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 233; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 77; Greenwood (undenominational), 31; Lutheran (undenominational), 76; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 15; Evergreen (undenominational), 33; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 6; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 7; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 9; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The actual mortality for the week ending September 30, 1882, was 574; this is 171 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 21.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.15 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,288,784.

RULES AND REGULATIONS ESTABLISHED for the government and proper care of piers, bulkheads, slips, and other wharf property, under the provisions of subdivision 7 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, by the Board of the Department of Docks, and published, to take effect on and after

MAY 1, 1882.

The said subdivision 7, among other things, provides as follows:

"The violation of or disobedience to any rule, regulation, or order of said Board shall be a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, on complaint of said Board."

And every person guilty of a violation of or disobedience to any of the following rules or regulations, in addition to the penalties thereby fixed and imposed, to be recovered in civil actions, is liable to be prosecuted for a misdemeanor and to be punished by such fine and imprisonment, or by both.

No. 1.—No piles shall be driven, nor shall any platform be erected, nor shall any filling-in of any kind be made on any part of the water-front of the city, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars, for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant of any pier or bulkhead, or of any water-front property or right, who shall cause or permit any such work to be done upon his premises before such permit therefor has been obtained, and under the further penalty of fifty dollars for each and every day which shall elapse before any piles so driven, or platform so erected, or material so filled-in, without such permit being first obtained, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time which may be allowed for such removal, by a notice served upon such owner, lessee, or occupant, by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, to be also recovered from such owner, lessee, or occupant.

No. 2.—No shed, building, office, tally-house, or other structure shall be erected, nor shall any derrick, hoisting-mast, coal-hopper, sign, or advertising device, or other erection or obstruction of any kind be placed or

maintained upon any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, nor upon any reclaimed land, without a written permit therefor being first had and obtained from the Board; and if the owner, lessee, or occupant of any such premises, or the owner, lessee, or agent, of any such structure, erections, or obstructions, shall fail to comply with a notice served by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district to remove any such structure, erection, or obstruction, after the expiration of the time allowed by such notice for the removal, such owner, lessee, occupant or agent, shall forfeit and pay a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day, which shall elapse before any such structure, erection or obstruction, shall be removed, after the expiration of the time for the removal thereof specified in said notice.

No. 3.—No cargo shall be discharged from any vessel upon any bulkhead or wharf structure, at which such vessel is being unloaded, after service by the Corporation Wharfinger for the district, upon the owner, consignee, master or other officer, or stevedore, of such vessel, of a notice that such bulkhead or structure will be endangered by the placing of additional cargo thereon, under a penalty of two hundred and fifty dollars for every such offense, and a further penalty equal in amount to the damages of every description which shall be caused by the further discharging of cargo upon such bulkhead or wharf structure, after the service of the said notice, both of such penalties to be recovered from such owner, consignee, master or other officer or stevedore, severally and respectively.

No. 4.—All goods, merchandise, and materials of every kind, landed or placed on any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or upon reclaimed land, must be removed therefrom without unnecessary delay, and within twenty-four hours after the Corporation Wharfinger for the district shall have served upon the owner, shipper or consignee, of such cargo, a notice to remove the same, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day for each and every day, during which any part of said cargo shall remain upon such pier, bulkhead, structure, or land, after the expiration of the said twenty-four hours, to be recovered from such owner, shipper, or consignee, severally and respectively.

No. 5.—All goods, merchandise and materials of every kind, lumbering any pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, or reclaimed land, after the time designated for the removal thereof shall have expired, will be liable to be removed by the Board to any warehouse or yard, at the sole risk and expense of the owner of any such property, and all expense incurred for such removal and storage or otherwise, shall be and become a lien thereon, and such goods, merchandise and materials will not be delivered to the owner until the expense of such removal and storage has been paid.

No. 6.—No person shall construct or maintain any engine-house, tally-house, or other small structure, under a permit of the Board, on any unshedded pier, or other wharf structure, unless the same be placed on wheels so as to admit of easy removal thereupon when required, and to prevent the accumulation of dirt or refuse thereunder, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars per day for each and every day which may elapse before the discontinuance of such offense.

No. 7.—No vessel of any kind shall be loaded or discharged by horse power, nor shall stones or similar cargo be discharged from any vessel, upon any pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure, unless proper planking be provided to protect the surface of such pier, bulkhead or other wharf structure from injury consequent upon the travel of the horse, or the throwing of the stones or similar cargo thereupon, under a penalty of five dollars a day for each horse so employed, and of twenty-five dollars for each offense of discharging such stones or like cargo, upon such pier, bulkhead, or other wharf structure, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered for using horses, or discharging stones or similar cargo, upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 8.—No sand shall be discharged from any vessel unless canvas or similar material be extended from the vessel's side to the bulkhead or wharf structure at which such vessel is being unloaded, to prevent the falling of the sand into the water, and if the surface of any such wharf structure is not sufficiently tight to prevent the sand dumped thereon from going through into the water, then no sand shall be discharged thereon from any vessel, unless canvas or similar material be first laid thereon to receive the sand, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, consignee, master or stevedore of any such vessel, severally and respectively; and if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property belonging to the Corporation, under lease, it shall be paid to the lessee thereof, but if such penalty be recovered on account of sand discharged upon wharf property not owned by the Corporation, it shall be paid to the owner thereof.

No. 9.—The owners, lessees and occupants of every pier, wharf and bulkhead in the City of New York shall keep the same in good repair, and the slips adjacent thereto properly dredged; and whenever, in the judgment of the Board, it shall be necessary so to do, written notices, signed by the President or Secretary of said Board, shall be served upon the owners, lessees or occupants, or collector of wharfage of any such pier, wharf or bulkhead, or the slip adjoining the same, on or in which repairs or dredging are required by said Board, specifying the nature and extent of the repairs or dredging so required, and the time within which such repairs must be made, or such dredging done; and in case the owners, lessees or occupants so notified, fail to comply with the terms and requirements of such notice, they shall forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars per day for every day which shall elapse before they comply with such notice.

No. 10.—No ashes, refuse, offal, fruit, vegetables or any other substances, shall be thrown into the waters surrounding or adjacent to any pier or bulkhead, or any other part of the water-front of the city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee, or occupant, severally and respectively, of any pier, bulkhead, wharf structure, or other property, from which any such substance shall be thrown, or from the person actually throwing the same; or if any such substance be thrown from any vessel lying in waters within the jurisdiction of the Department, whether berthed or not, then such penalty to be recovered from the owner, consignee, or master of such vessel, severally and respectively.

No. 11.—No snow or ice shall be dumped into the waters adjacent to the water-front of the city, except from the piers, bulkheads and other places designated from time to time, by the Board, for such dumping, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for each offense, to be recovered from the owner, lessee or occupant of any pier, bulkhead or other wharf property, from which any such snow and ice shall be dumped, or from the person actually dumping the same, severally and respectively.

No. 12.—All lumber, brick, or other material in bulk discharged on any bulkhead not shedded, shall be at once removed, or, if not so removed, shall be placed at least twenty feet from the edge of the bulkhead, pending removal, under a penalty of fifty dollars per day, for each and every day such lumber, brick or other material shall remain on the bulkhead, to be recovered from the owner or consignee of such lumber, brick or other material, or from the person placing, or causing the same to be placed, on such bulkhead, severally and respectively.

No. 13.—The charges for wharfage and dockage of all vessels admitted to any of the piers or bulkheads constructed under the new plans adopted by the Department shall be at the same rates as are now, or shall hereafter be fixed and established by laws of this State, until otherwise ordered by the Board.

No. 14.—The term "Board," when used in the foregoing rules and regulations, shall be taken to mean "The Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York," and the term "Corporation," when so used, shall be taken to mean "The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York."
