BOARD OF ELECTRICAL CONTROL.

Minutes of a meeting of the Board of Electrical Control, held at the office of the Mayor, in the City of New York, on Monday, April 25, 1892, at 12 o'clock M.
Present—Mayor Hugh J. Grant, President; Commissioners Jacob Hess, Theodore Moss, Walton Storm.
The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.
The Engineer submitted the following report:

NEW YORK, April 25, 1892.

To the Board of Electrical Control:

GENTLEMEN—On March 28 I sent to all the companies operating electrical conductors in the city the notice of the resolution of the Board, as follows:

"Resolved, That the Engineer ascertain from the various electrical companies operating wires in the city what accommodations are required for their service in what is known as the Third Proscribed District, lying between Eighth street and Canal street, Eighth avenue, Bank street, Greenwich street and Bowery, and make a recommendation to this Board at its next meeting; and, after ascertaining from the Commissioner of Public Works what streets he intends paving outside of the Third Proscribed District, make such recommendations as will insure the construction of subways in those streets where application is made in accordance with the rules of the Board."

I have received replies from Mount Morris Electric-light Company, United States Illuminating Company, United Electric-light and Power Company, Edison Electric Illuminating Company and Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company, all of which is herewith attached.

And I recommend that the Board authorize the construction of subways, as indicated in the various requests, excepting any street that was paved last year.

I have also received from the Commissioner of Public Works a list of streets that he proposes to repave during the season of 1892, and am advised that there will probably be another list to follow soon.

As most of the streets so designated are outside of the Third Proscribed District, I recommend that your Board authorize the two Construction Companies to provide subways before the paving begins in all streets wherever application is made immediately, and in accordance with the rules of the Board, on the order of the Engineer.

I have also to recommend the construction of subways in the following streets and avenues, to connect existing subways, if not applied for by any electric-light company previous to the work of paving for this year:

- Eighth avenue, from Thirteenth street to Greenwich street.
- Third street, from Broadway to University place.
- Park place, from Broadway to West street.
- Battery place, from Greenwich street to West street.
- Greenwich street, from Morris street to Battery place.

Judge Kelly complained that the Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Subway Company had refused to allow the East River Electric-light Company to use the subway on Fourth avenue, between Fourteenth and Thirty-fourth streets, on the ground that the balance of an account, amounting to one thousand dollars, had not been paid. He stated that payment had been made at the rate of nine hundred dollars on account of this subway and accepted by the company, and claimed that the company should not be allowed to prevent the use of the cables which they had been allowed to draw into the subway on Fourth avenue.

Mr. Lauterbach stated, for the Consolidated Telegraph and Electric Subway Company, that the East River Electric-light Company had failed to keep an agreement made to pay the thousand dollars rental due on the subway, and they were justified in refusing to allow the use of this subway, the rental of which had not been paid.

Mayor Grant suggested that, as Judge Kelly claimed, that nine hundred dollars per mile was the proper rate, such payment should be accepted on account until the matter was settled, and the East River Company should be allowed to use the Fourth avenue subway on making such payment.

Mr. Lauterbach—This refers to this specific instance, to this Fourth avenue duct?

Mayor Grant—Certainly.

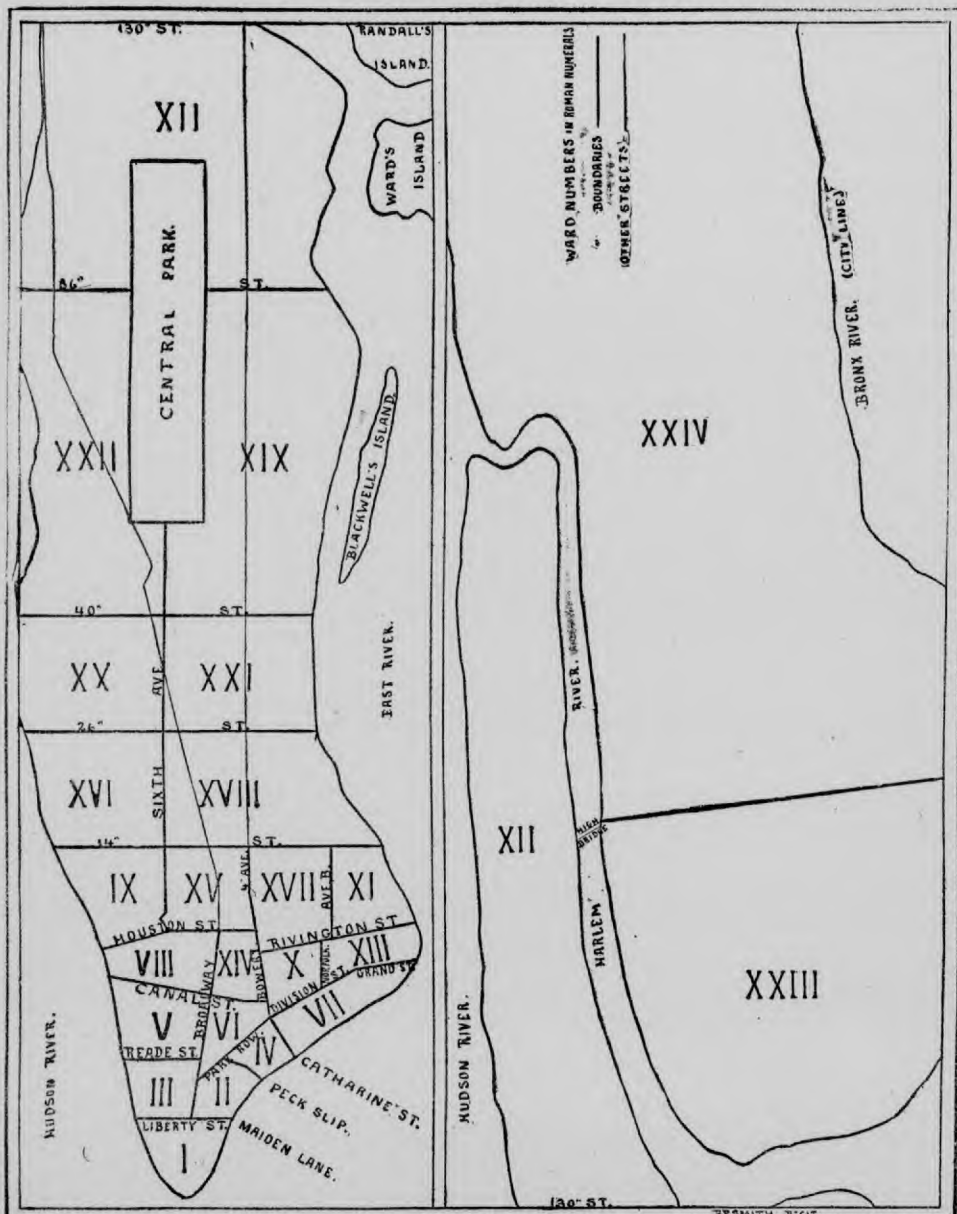

The 950 deaths represent a death-rate of 27.28, against 25.87 for the previous week and 29.98 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a decided increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 123, 628, 267, 10, 2 and 11, against 118, 529, 244, 8, 3 and 28 for the previous week, a total of 1,041 against 930. Diphtheria increased between Division street and the East river, between Broadway and the Bowery, below Canal street, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, east of Avenue B, between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, east of Sixth avenue, and in the lower part of the annexed district, decreasing or varying little elsewhere. The increase of measles was most marked below Liberty street, between Grand and Rivington streets, east of Norfolk, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, west of Avenue B, between Canal and Eighty-sixth streets, on the west side, above Eighty-sixth street, from river to river, and in the lower part of the annexed district, with slight variations elsewhere. Scarlet fever increased most noticeably between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, West, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, above Eighty-sixth street, from river to river, and in the annexed district, while there was a marked decrease between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, East; 9 of the 11 cases of small-pox were above Fourteenth street and 7 were between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, on the east side.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, April 28, 1892.

The minutes of the meeting held the 21st instant were read and approved.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 11682, as to the application of Warren C. Barber for permission to erect a hopper on Pier 44, East river, and the application of Jefferson Hogan for a lease of Pier, new 59, North river, were tabled until May 5, 1892; the matter of the execution of the agreements for the purchase of property between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, North river, Augustus W. Cruikshank, attorney, was tabled until May 12, 1892, and the communication from the Engineer-in-Chief respecting Alexander Goge, Draughtsman, was tabled for one month.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Counsel to the Corporation—Transmitting proposed lease with the New York Horse Manure Company for the Pier foot of Forty-fifth street, North river. The officers of the Board authorized to execute said lease in the form as approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

From the Health Department—Requesting that Phillips & Cannon be permitted to remove the boat-house and float at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to a position about fifteen feet distant from its present location. Permit granted.

From the Department of Public Works—Stating that orders have been issued to repair the two fire hydrants on the bulkhead between Seventy-seventh and Eightieth streets, North river, reported on the 14th instant.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Informing the Board that a meeting of said Commission will be held in the Mayor's office, Friday, 22d instant.

From the Finance Department—Transmitting a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 22d instant, approving change of lines of Pier, new 14, North river. The plans ordered to be filed in the office of the Engineer-in-Chief and the resolution ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

"Whereas, The Board of Dock Commissioners, at its meeting of April 14, 1892, adopted a resolution advising the change of the width of Pier, new 14, between Fulton and Vesey streets, North river, from the width thereof as laid down on the plans approved by the Board of Dock Commissioners August 7, 1890, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 18, 1890, and requested the consent and approval of this Board to the change; and

"Whereas, The change recommended is that the width of said Pier, new 14, to be one hundred and twenty-five feet instead of seventy-five feet, as on the aforesaid plan approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund November 18, 1890; therefore

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby consent to and approve of the change in the width of Pier, new 14, between Fulton and Vesey streets, from the width thereof as laid down on the plan approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on November 18, 1890."

2d. In reference to the substitution of surety on the estimate of M. Engle for building a new pier, etc., at the foot of East Third street, under Contract No. 415.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the substitution of William P. Greenlie, as surety in place of Hobson Halliday, on the estimate of M. Engle for building a new wooden pier foot of Third street, East river, etc., under Contract No. 415.

From the Fire Department—Reporting that no objection exists to transferring the fire-boat "Zophar Mills" to a berth at Pier, old 57, foot of Bogart street, North river.

On motion, the permit granted the Fire Department, July 25, 1883, to use for the berthing of the fire-boat "Zophar Mills" the outer 125 feet on the south side of the pier at Thirteenth street, North river, and to place and locate thereon a structure about 6 feet square for the use of the necessary telegraph apparatus to connect the said boat with the fire-alarm system, was revoked and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Fire Department of the City of New York to use for the berthing of the fire-boat "Zophar Mills" the outer one hundred and twenty-five feet on the north side of the pier foot of Bogart street, North river (Pier, old 57), and to place and locate on said pier a structure about six feet square for the use of the necessary telegraph apparatus to connect the said boat with the fire-alarm system, the same to be located and placed under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; the permission hereby granted and the maintenance of the structure on said pier to continue only during the pleasure of this Board.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting the Board, in making repairs to the Dock at Randall's Island, to provide a gangway for the landing of passengers. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do said work.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting the Board to take action on their application of March 3, 1892, for the removal of their dump, from Rivington to Stanton street, East river. Referred to Commissioners Post and Phelan.

From Henry P. McGowan—Requesting permission to fill in his property situated 513 feet east of First avenue, between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, a space fifty feet in width. Permit granted.

From Frank C. Meehan—Requesting a renewal of his permit to use and occupy a berth at the bulkhead, between Piers, new 54 and 55, North river, for the purpose of discharging ice. Permit granted, to remain only during the pleasure of the Board; compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of \$3.50 per day.

From James Stephens & Son—Request permission to erect a derrick mast on the west side of the Mott Haven Canal, between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets. Permit granted, to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

From Patrick Kerrin—Offering to sell to the City the shed on Pier, old 56, foot of Gansevoort street, North river, for the sum of one hundred dollars. Offer declined.

From the International Navigation Company, lessee—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolution adopted March 31, 1892, for the widening of Pier, new 14, North river, and requesting the Board to proceed with the work of widening as speedily as possible.

On motion of the President, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of an addition of fifty feet in width to the southerly side of Pier, new 14, North river, upon the lines of said pier, as changed by the Department of Docks, April 14, 1892, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 22, 1892, and with all blasting and removal of rock from the bottom that may be necessary for the same; and that all the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as provided by section 714 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor and material as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the materials, tools and dredging necessary therefor, and not heretofore contracted for, or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

From George Ferris—Requesting a renewal of permit to maintain a watchman's house on the bulkhead between Piers 61 and 62, East river. Granted.

From Delmar & Howden—Requesting a test of one barrel of Portland cement, and enclosing \$10 to pay the cost. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make said test.

From William Cruikshank—Acknowledging receipt of communication of the 21st instant respecting the purchase of Piers 6, 8, 9, 10 and 11, North river, and reporting that the matter will receive prompt attention.

From S. J. Nelson and others—Reporting that the approach to the pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river, requires planking. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair, if necessary.

From the Cedar Hill Ice Company—Requesting permission to retain the platform on the bulkhead between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, North river. Notify them that a permit was granted the Delamater Iron Works for said platform.

From the New England Terminal Company—Requesting a permit to make the necessary repairs to Pier, old 45 and new 36, East river. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Consumers' Ice Company—Requesting a renewal of permit for ice bridge, and to dig a trench about 18 inches deep across the dock foot of Horatio street, for the purpose of putting in a piece of shafting. Permit granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, the said shafting to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

From Patrick Connolly—Requesting a permit to use and occupy the northerly half of Pier 56, the southerly half of Pier 57, East river, together with the intervening bulkhead. Notify the applicant that the lease of the premises in question will be sold at public auction May 9, 1892.

From William J. Sparks—Requesting a renewal of permit for tally-house to be hereafter located on Pier 9 instead of Pier 10, East river. Permit granted.

From the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company—Requesting permission to repair the outer end of Pier, old 29, North river, damaged by one of the Pavonia Ferry boats. Permit granted.

From M. McDermott—Requesting permission to erect a waiting room on the Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirty-third street, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, lessee—Requesting permission to erect a shed on the platform between Piers 51 and 52, East river. Permit granted, the same to remain only during the pleasure of the Board; the plans referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, and the rate of compensation to be fixed by Commissioners Post and Phelan.

From the Audubon Yacht Club—Requesting permission to erect a boat-house at One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, North river. Permit granted, to remain only during the pleasure of the Board, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

From Benjamin J. Hall—Requesting a renewal of permit for hoisting engine on Pier 19, East river. Permit granted, to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the New York, Lake Erie & Western Railroad Company, lessee—Requesting a renewal of permit for tally-house on Pier foot of Forty-ninth street, North river. Permit granted, to remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that \$5 per day (Sundays included), payable weekly when due to the Dock Master of the district, be charged M. C. Dexter for the privilege of locating his swimming-bath at south side of Pier foot of Thirty-fifth street, North river, in accordance with permit granted April 21, 1892. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that \$15 per week, payable weekly when due to the Dock Master of the district, be charged James O'Reilly to use and occupy a berth on the south side of Pier foot of Fifty-sixth street, North river, in accordance with the conditions of the permit granted April 14, 1892. Recommendation adopted.

3d. Recommending that the owners or occupants of all boat-houses and floats located on city property be directed to obtain permits and pay as compensation the rate of ten cents per square foot per annum for the use of the land under water covered by said structures.

Whereupon, on motion, the following resolutions were adopted :
Resolved, That the owners or occupants of boat-houses and floats located on city property be required to pay for the use of same at the rate of ten cents per square foot per annum from May 1, proximo, payable monthly to the Dock Master of the district in which such boat-houses or floats are located.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
