#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR, August 28, 1895.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—I return herewith, for amendment, resolution of your Honorable Body, permitting James McClenahan to keep a watering-trough at No. 500 Canal street, on the ground of the report of the Commissioner of Public Works that this resolution should be amended so as to provide that the proposed watering-trough shall be of iron.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—I return herewith, for amendment, resolution of your Honorable Body, permitting James McClenahan to keep two hitching-posts at No. 500 Canal street, on the ground of the report of the Commissioner of Public Works that this resolution should be amended to state the exact dimensions of the proposed hitching-posts, as it will then be possible to report whether they would constitute an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk.

Jacobs & Son to place and keep a storm-door and show-case in front of Nos. 174 to 180 East Fourth street, on the ground of the report of the Commissioner of Public Works that a storm-door and show-case of the dimensions prescribed would constitute illegal obstructions.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to E. Jacobs & Son to place and keep a storm-door over the entrance to basement of building Nos. 174, 176, 178 and 180 East Fourth street, and to erect a show-case, not to exceed twenty-five feet in length nor to extend more than three feet from the house-line, in front of the same premises, the work to be done and materials supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary. They therefore recommend that the said resolution and ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 183 of article XIII. of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, as amended March 5, 1883, etc., relating to the firing of fire-arms.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That section 183 of article XIII. of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances, approved December 31, 1880, as amended by said resolution of March 5, 1883, etc., be further amended by inserting at the conclusion of the section the following words:

That the premises of the Country Club of Westchester County, situated on Eastchester Bay, in the late Town of Westchester, now New York City, be and the same are hereby excepted from the provisions of section 183 of article XIII. of chapter eight of the Revised Ordinances of 1880.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SIR—On the 27th instant I addressed you a letter in regard to the apportionment of the Thirtieth Senate District, which was by you divided into three Assembly Districts, namely: the Third, Fifth and Seventh.

I then informed you that I had been unable to obtain satisfactory evidence to support the apportionment of that Senate district made by your Honorable Body, and asked you to supply me, at your earliest convenience, with that evidence.

The result of my application for this information was, as I am informed, that my letter was laid upon the table.

This I must take to be a denial of my request for information on this subject.

While my previous letter was, I think, perfectly clear, to avoid any misunderstanding I now write again to inform you that unless your Honorable Body can furnish me with evidence to sustain the apportionment made by you of the Thirtieth Senate District, the proceeding brought by Charles R. Gleason to compel you to reapportion that district will proceed to trial upon the evidence introduced on behalf of the relator, Gleason, as, from the nature of things, I cannot procure any evidence except such as may be furnished by you.

The apparent citizen population of the present Third, Fifth and Seventh Assembly Districts, as shown by the enumeration of 1892, is, as I am informed, respectively 40,196, 39,523 and 35,627. In the absence of any information furnished by you to the contrary, I will have to go to trial upon the basis of these figures, and the matter will be determined on that basis.

It is not my place or my duty to urge upon your Honorable Body any particular course of action in the matter, but it is my duty to inform you very clearly of what the result will be of the refusal of your Board to furnish me with evidence to support your action.

Whereas, The thorough cleanliness of the streets and prompt removal of ashes and garbage are necessary for the preservation of the public health of this city; and

Whereas, It appears from the communication of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, dated July 24, 1895 (a copy of which is hereto annexed), that the unexpended balance of the appropriation for the year for this purpose is insufficient to properly clean the streets and to promptly remove the ashes and garbage; and

Whereas, The Board is advised, by a Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller, the Counsel to the Corporation and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessment, that the additional amount necessary for this purpose for the remainder of this year can only be lawfully appropriated pursuant to the authority vested in the Board of Health by chapter 535, Laws of 1893; therefore

Resolved, That, in the opinion of the Board of Health, the preservation of the health of the community requires that greater efficiency shall be maintained in the cleaning of the streets and the removal of ashes and garbage than can be obtained by the monthly expenditure of one hundred and thirty-seven thousand five hundred and ninety-seven dollars and thirty-two cents, that being the average unexpended balance for each month, for the remainder of the year, of the appropriation for that purpose.

Resolved, That this Board, pursuant to the authority conferred by chapter 535, Laws of 1893, hereby certifies to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the additional sum of eighty thousand six hundred and thirty-eight dollars and sixty-six cents should be appropriated for the month of August for the proper cleaning of the streets and the prompt removal of garbage.

## FIRE DEPARTMENT.

RULES AND REQUIREMENTS OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, FOR THE INSTALLATION OF ELECTRICAL APPARATUS, ETC., FOR ELECTRIC LIGHT, POWER AND HEAT; ADOPTED 1895, AS PROVIDED FOR BY CHAPTER 410 OF THE LAWS OF 1892, SECTION 517½.

HEADQUARTERS FIRE DEPARTMENT, 157 AND 159 EAST SIXTY-SEVENTH STREET.

NEW YORK, August 7, 1895.

Rules and regulations prescribed by the Board of Commissioners of the Fire Department of the City of New York regarding electric wires, currents and appliances for the supply of light, power and heat, within buildings in the City of New York, as required by section 517½ of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1892.

Notice must be given of any intended installation of plants for furnishing electric current, or placing of wires or apparatus for light, power or heat in any building in the city, to the Superintendent of Fire Alarm Telegraph and Electrical Appliances, from whom blank forms may be obtained for the purpose, and no wires, currents, or appliances for use in furnishing electric currents for light, power or heat shall hereafter be introduced into, or placed in any building in the City of New York, unless the same be done in compliance with the following rules:

### CENTRAL STATIONS—CLASS A.

#### For Light or Power.

These rules also apply to Dynamo Rooms in Isolated Plants, connected with or detached from buildings used for other purposes; also to all varieties of apparatus therein of both high and low potential.

No. 1. Generators—A.—Must be located in a dry place.

B.—Must be insulated on floors or base frames, which must be kept filled, to prevent absorption or moisture, and also kept clean and dry.

C.—Must never be placed in a room where any hazardous process is carried on, nor in places where they would be exposed to inflammable gases, or flyings, or combustible material.

D.—Must each be provided with a water-proof covering.

No. 2. Care and Attendance.—A competent man must be kept on duty in the room where generators are operating.

Oil waste must be kept in self closing metal cans, resting on legs three inches or more from the floor, and removed daily.

No. 3. Conductors—From generators, switch-boards, rheostats, or other instruments, and thence to outside lines, conductors—

A.—Must be in plain sight, and readily accessible.

B.—Must be wholly on non-combustible insulators, such as glass or porcelain.

C.—Must be separated from contact with floors, partitions, or walls, through which they may pass, by non-combustible insulating tubes, such as glass or porcelain.

D.—Must be kept rigidly so far apart that they cannot come in contact.

E.—Must be covered with non-inflammable insulating material sufficient to prevent accidental contact, except that "bus bars" may be made of bare metal.

F.—Must have ample carrying capacity, to prevent heating. (See Capacity of Wire Table.)

No. 4. Switch Boards—A.—Must be so placed as to reduce to a minimum the danger of communicating fire to adjacent combustible material.

They should not be built down to the floor, nor up to the ceiling, but a space of at least 18 inches should be left at bottom and top.

B.—Must be accessible from all sides when the connections are on the back; or may be placed against a brick or stone wall when the wiring is entirely on the face.

C.—Must be kept free from moisture.

D.—Must be made of non-combustible material, or of hard wood in skeleton form, filled to prevent absorption of moisture.

E.—Bus bars must be equipped in accordance with Rule 3 for placing conductors.

No. 5. Resistance Boxes and Equalizers (including supports)—A.—Must be of metal or other non-combustible material.

B.—Must be placed on the switch-board, or if not thereon, at a distance of a foot from combustible material, or separated therefrom by a non-inflammable, non-absorptive, insulating material.

No. 6. Lightning Arresters—A.—Must be attached to each side of every overhead circuit connected with the station.

B.—Must be mounted on non-combustible bases in plain sight on the switch-board, or in an equally accessible place, away from combustible material.

C.—Must be connected with at least two "earths" by separate wires, not smaller than No. 6 B. & S., which must not be connected to any pipe, within the building, and should be run as nearly as possible in a straight line from the arresters to the earth connection.

D.—Must be so constructed as not to maintain an arc after the discharge has passed.

No. 7. Testing.—A.—All series and alternating circuits must be tested every two hours while in operation, to discover any leakage to earth abnormal in view of the potential and method of operation.

B.—All multiple arc low potential systems (300 volts or less) must be provided with an indicating or detecting device, readily attachable, to afford easy means of testing where the station operates continuously.

C.—Data obtained from all tests must be preserved for examination by inspectors and copies furnished when required.

No. 8. Motors—A.—Must be wired under the same precautions as with a current of the same volume and potential for lighting. The motor and resistance box must be protected by a double pole cut-out and controlled by a double pole switch, except in cases where one-quarter horse-power or less is used on low tension circuit a single pole switch will be accepted.

B.—Must be thoroughly insulated, mounted on filled dry wood, be raised at least eight inches above the surrounding floor, be provided with pans to prevent oil from soaking into the floor, and must be kept clean.

C.—Must be covered with a water-proof cover when not in use, and, if deemed necessary by the Inspector, be inclosed in an approved case.

No. 9. Resistance Boxes—Must be as specified in Rule 5 (A. & B.).

### CLASS B.

#### Arc (Series) System—Over 300 Volts.

No. 10. Outside Conductors—All outside overhead conductors, including service, where entering or attached to buildings.

A.—Must be covered with some approved insulating material not easily abraded, firmly secured to properly insulated and substantially built supports, all tie wires having an insulation equal to the conductors they confine. Insulation that will be approved for service wires must be solid, at least 3-64 of an inch in thickness. It must not readily carry fire, and must show an insulating resistance of one megohm per mile after two weeks' submersion in water at 70 degrees Fahrenheit, and three days' submersion in lime water, with a current of 550 volts and after three minutes' electrification.

B.—Must be so placed that moisture cannot form a cross connection between them, not less than a foot apart, and not in contact with any substance other than their insulating supports.

C.—Must be at least seven feet above the highest point of flat roofs and at least one foot above the rigid pitch roofs over which they pass or to which they are attached.

D.—Must be protected by insulated guard irons or wires from possibility of contact with other wires or substances to which current may leak.

E.—Must be provided with insulators of glass or porcelain.

F.—Must be so spliced or joined as to be both mechanically and electrically secure, without solder; the joints must then be soldered and covered with an insulation equal to that of the conductors.

No. 11. Service Blocks—A.—Must be covered over their entire surface with at least two coats of water-proof paint.

B.—Cross-arms carrying electric-light or power wires must not carry wires for other service.

### Interior Conductors.

No. 12. All Interior Conductors—A.—Must be covered where they enter buildings from outside terminal insulators to and through the walls, with extra water-proof insulation, and must have drip loops outside. The hole through which the conductor passes must be bushed with water-proof and non-combustible insulating tube slanting upward toward the inside. The tube must be sealed with tape, thoroughly painted, and securing the tube to the wire.

B.—Must be arranged to enter and leave the building through a double-contact service switch, which will effectually close the main circuit and disconnect the interior wires when it is turned "off." The switch must be so constructed that it shall be automatic in its action, not stopping between points when started, and prevent an arc between the points under all circumstances; it must indicate on inspection whether the current be "on" or "off," and be mounted in a non-combustible case, and kept free from moisture, and easy of access to firemen or policemen. So-called "snap switches" shall not be used on high-potential circuits.

C.—Must be always in plain sight, and never encased, except when required by the Inspector.

D.—Insulation for interior conductors must be solid, at least three-sixty-fourths of an inch in thickness; it must not readily carry fire, must show an insulation resistance of one megohm per mile after two weeks' submersion in water at 70 degrees Fahrenheit and three days' submersion in lime water, with a current of 550 volts and after three minutes' electrification, and bear a temperature of 150 degrees F. without softening.

E.—Must be supported on glass or porcelain insulators, and kept rigidly at least eight inches from each other, except within the structure of lamps or on hanger boards, cut-out boxes, or the like, where less distance is necessary.

F.—Must be separated from contact with walls, floors, timbers, or partitions through which they may pass by non-combustible insulating tube.

G.—Must be so spliced or joined as to be both mechanically and electrically secure without solder. They must then be soldered to insure preservation, and covered with an insulation equal to that on the conductors.

### Lamps and Other Devices.

No. 13. Arc Lamps—in Every Case—A.—Must be carefully isolated from inflammable material.

B.—Must be provided at all times with a glass globe surrounding the arc, securely fastened upon a closed base. No broken or cracked globes to be used.

C.—Must be provided with an approved hand switch (as specified in Sec. G); also an automatic switch, that will shunt the current around the carbons should they fail to feed properly.

D.—Must be provided with reliable stops to prevent carbons from falling out in case the clamps become loose.

E.—Must be carefully insulated from the circuit in all their exposed parts, and so constructed that spark arresters can be adjusted without short-circuiting the lamp.

F.—Must be provided with a wire netting around the globe, and an approved spark arrester which will close the globe so as to prevent escape of sparks, melted copper, or carbon, where readily inflammable material is in the vicinity of the lamps. It is recommended that plain carbons, not copper-plated, be used for lamps in such places.

G.—Hanger boards must be so constructed that all wires and current-carrying devices thereon shall be exposed to view and thoroughly insulated by being mounted on a water-proof non-combustible substance. All switches attached to the same must be so constructed that they shall be automatic in their action, not stopping between points when started, and preventing an arc between points under all circumstances. The use of hanger boards should be avoided when possible, and the lamps hung from insulated supports other than their conductors.

No. 14. Incandescent Lamps in Series Circuits having a Maximum Potential of 300 Volts or over—A.—Must be governed by the same rules as for arc lights, and each series lamp provided with an approved hand-spring switch and automatic cut-out.

B.—Must have each lamp suspended from a hanger board by means of a rigid tube.

C.—No electromagnetic device for switches and no system of multiple-series or series-multiple lighting will be approved.

D.—Under no circumstances can series lamps be attached to gas fixtures.

### CLASS C.

#### Incandescent (Low Pressure) Systems—300 Volts or Less.

No. 15. Outside Overhead Conductors—Where entering, or attached to buildings, must be as specified in Class B, Rule 10. Must have an approved fusible cut-out to comply with the sections of Rules 23 and 24 describing fuses and cut-outs, which must be placed so as to protect the switch required by Rule 17.

No. 16. Underground Conductors—A.—Must end outside of the main walls of the building where possible, otherwise where entering the buildings, or any vault or area connected with the same, must be protected against moisture and mechanical injury and kept free and clear from contact with any conducting material, and kept at least two feet from all combustible material. Must not be connected directly with the interior conductors.

B.—Must have a switch and a cut-out for each wire between the underground conductors and the interior wiring when the two parts of the wiring are connected. These switches and fuses must be placed as near as possible to the end of the underground conduit, and connected therewith by specially insulated conductors, kept apart not less than two and a half inches. The cut-out required by this section must be placed so as to protect the switch.

C.—Must be so arranged as not to shunt the current through a building around any catch-box.

### Inside Wiring—General Rules.

No. 17. At the entrance of every building there shall be an approved switch placed in the service conductors, by which the current may be entirely cut off. Must be double pole, and must plainly indicate whether the current is "on" or "off," and must comply with sections A, C, D and E of Rule 26 relating to switches.

No. 18. Conductors—A.—Must have an approved insulating covering and must be of sizes not smaller than No. 14 B. & S., No. 16 B.W.G., or No. 4 E.S.G., except that in conduit installed under Rule 22, No. 16 B. & S., No. 18 B.W.G., or No. 4 E.S.G. may be used. For work which is entirely exposed to view throughout the whole interior circuits, and not liable to be exposed to dampness, a wire with an insulating covering that will not support combustion, will resist abrasion, is at least one-sixteenth of an inch in thickness and thoroughly impregnated with a moisture repellent will be approved. In so-called concealed wiring, molding and conduit work, and in places liable to be exposed to dampness, the insulating covering of the wire to be approved must be as specified in Class B, Rule 10.

B.—Must be protected when passing through floors, or through walls, partitions, timbers, etc., in places liable to be exposed to dampness, by water-proof, non-combustible, insulating tubes, such as glass or porcelain. Except for floors and for places liable to be exposed to dampness, glass, porcelain, metal-sheeted, interior conduit, and Vulca tube when made especially for bushings, will be approved. The two last named will not be approved if cut from the usual lengths of tube made for conduit work, nor when made without a head or flange at one end.

C.—Must be kept free from contact with gas, water, or other metallic piping, or any other conductors or conducting material which they may cross (except high potential conductors) by some continuous and firmly fixed non-conductor creating a separation which should be not less than one inch.

D.—Must be so placed in crossing high potential conductors that there shall be a space of at least one foot at all points between the high and low tension conductors.

E.—Must be so placed in wet places that an air space will be left between conductors and pipes in crossing, and the former must be run in such a way that they cannot come in contact with the pipe accidentally. Wires should be run over all pipes upon which condensed moisture is likely to gather, or which by leaking might cause trouble on a circuit.

F.—Must be so spliced or joined as to be both mechanically and electrically secure without solder. They must then be soldered to insure preservation, and covered with an insulation equal to that on the conductors.

### Special Rules.

No. 19. Wiring not Encased in Molding or Approved Conduit—A.—Must be supported wholly on non-combustible insulators, constructed so as to prevent the insulating coverings of the wire from coming in contact with other substances than the insulating supports.

B.—Must be so arranged that wires of opposite polarity, with a difference of potential of 150 volts or less, will be kept apart at least two and one-half inches.

C.—Must have the above distance increased proportionately where a higher voltage is used, unless they are encased in molding or approved conduit.

D.—Must not be laid in plaster, cement or similar finish, unless the plaster or cement is laid on fire-proof non-conducting material.

E.—Must never be fastened with staples.

In Unfinished Lofts, Between Floor and Ceilings, in Partitions, and Other Concealed Places.

F.—Must have at least one inch clear air-space surrounding them, and where passing through joists must conform to Rule 18 B.

G.—Must be at least ten inches apart, when possible, and should be run singly on separate timbers or studding.

H.—Wires run, as above, immediately under roofs, in proximity to water-tanks or pipes, will be considered as exposed to moisture. When, from the nature of the case, it is impossible to place concealed wire or non-combustible insulating supports of glass or porcelain, the wires may be finished on the loop system, if incased throughout in approved continuous flexible tubing or conduit.

I.—Wires must not be fished for any great distance, and only in places where the Inspector can satisfy himself that the above rules have been complied with.



J.—Twin wires must never be employed in this class of concealed work.  
No. 20. Moldings—A.—Must never be used in concealed work or in damp places.  
B.—Must have at least two coats of water-proof paint or be impregnated with a moisture repellent.  
C.—Must be made of two pieces, backing and capping, so constructed as to thoroughly encase the wire and maintain a distance of one-half inch between conductors of opposite polarity and afford suitable protection from abrasion.  
No. 21. Special Wiring—In breweries, packing-houses, stables, dye-houses, paper and pulp mills, or other buildings specially liable to moisture or acid or other fumes liable to injure the wires or insulation, except where used for pendants.

Conductors.

A.—Must be separated at least six inches.  
B.—Must be provided with an approved water-proof covering, as specified in Class B, section 10, and must also withstand injury from chemical compounds or mixtures to which it will be liable to be subjected.  
C.—Must be carefully put up.  
D.—Must be supported by glass or porcelain insulators. No switches or fusible cut-outs will be allowed where exposed to inflammable gases or dust, or to flyings of combustible material.  
E.—Must be protected when passing through floors, walls, partitions, timbers, etc., by water-proof, non-combustible insulating tubes, such as glass or porcelain.  
No. 22. Interior Conduits—A.—Must be continuous from one junction box to another, or to fixtures, and must be of material that will resist the fusion of the wire or wires they contain without igniting the conduit.  
B.—Must not be of such material or construction that the insulation of the conductor will ultimately be injured or destroyed by the elements of its composition.  
C.—Must be first installed as a complete conduit system, without conductors, strings or anything for the purpose of drawing in the conductors, and the conductors to them be pushed or fished in. The conductors must not be placed in position until all mechanical work on the building has been, as far as possible, completed.  
D.—Must not be so placed as to be subject to mechanical injury by saws, chisels or nails.  
E.—Must not be supplied with a twin conductor or two separate conductors in a single tube unless the said two separate conductors or twin conductor having an improved insulation are inclosed in a complete, fully-insulated, continuous iron conduit, and are in circuits installed as per table of capacity of wires (see section 25) for currents not to exceed 100 amperes.  
F.—Must have all ends closed with good adhesive material, either at junction boxes or elsewhere, whether such ends are concealed or exposed. Joints must be made air-tight and moisture-proof.  
G.—Conduits must extend at least one inch beyond the finished surface of walls or ceilings until the mortar or other similar material be entirely dry, when the projection may be reduced to half an inch.

No. 23. Double Pole Safety Cut-outs—A.—Must be in plain sight or inclosed in an approved box, readily accessible. Boxes must be constructed, and cut-outs arranged, whether in a box or not, so as to obviate any danger of the melted fuse metal coming in contact with any substance which might be ignited thereby.  
B.—Must be placed at every point where a change is made in the size of the wire (unless the cut-out in the larger wire will protect the smaller).  
C.—Must be supported on bases of non-combustible, insulating, moisture-proof material.  
D.—Must be supplied with a plug (or other device for enclosing the fusible strip of wire) made of non-combustible and moisture proof material, and so constructed that an arc cannot be maintained across its terminals by the fusing of the metal.  
E.—Must be so placed that on any combination fixture no group of lamps requiring a current of six amperes or more shall be ultimately dependent upon one cut-out, except by special permission in writing in case of large chandeliers.  
F.—All cut-out blocks must be stamped with their maximum safe-carrying capacity in amperes.

No. 24. Safety Fuses—A.—Must all be stamped or otherwise marked with the number of amperes they will carry indefinitely without melting.  
B.—Must have fusible wires or strips (where the plug or equivalent device is not used) with contact surfaces or tips of harder metal, soldered or otherwise, having perfect electrical connection with the fusible part of the strip.  
C.—Must all be so proportioned to the conductors they are intended to protect that they will melt before the maximum safe-carrying capacity of the wire is exceeded.

No. 25. Table of Capacity of Wires—It must be clearly understood that the size of the fuse depends upon the size of the smallest conductor it protects, and not upon the amount of current to be used in the circuit. Below is a table showing the carrying capacity of conductors of different sizes in Brown & Sharp's gauge, which must be followed in the placing of interior conductors:

NOTE.—By "open work" is meant construction which admits of all parts of the surface of the insulating covering of the wire being surrounded by free air. The carrying capacity of 16 and 18 wire is given, but no wire smaller than 14 is to be used except as allowed under Rules 18 (A) and 27 (D).

No. 26. Switches—A.—Must be mounted on moisture-proof and non-combustible bases, such as slate or porcelain.  
B.—Must be double-pole when the circuits which they control supply more than six 16-candle-power lamps, or their equivalent.  
C.—Must have a firm and secure contact; must make and break readily, and not stop when motion has once been imparted by the handle.  
D.—Must have carrying capacity sufficient to prevent heating.  
E.—Must be placed in dry, accessible places, and be grouped, as far as possible, being mounted—where practicable—upon slate or equally non-combustible back boards. Jack-knife switches, whether provided with friction or spring stops, must be so placed that gravity will tend to open rather than close the switch.

Fixture Work.

No. 27. A.—In all cases where conductors are concealed within or attached to gas fixtures, the latter must be insulated from the gas-pipe system of the building by means of insulating joints, which must be entirely made of material that will resist the action of illuminating gases, and will not give way or soften under the heat of an ordinary gas flame. They shall be so arranged that a deposit of moisture will not destroy the insulating effect, and shall have an insulating resistance of 250,000 ohms between the gas-pipe attachments; and be sufficiently strong to resist the strain they will be liable to, in attachment.  
B.—Supply conductors, and especially the splices to fixture wires, must be kept clear of the grounded part of gas-pipes, and where shells are used the latter should be constructed in a manner affording sufficient area to allow this requirement.  
C.—When fixtures are wired outside, the conductors must be so secured as not to be cut or abraded by the pressure of the fastenings or motion of the fixture. Fixtures should be wired inside when possible.  
D.—All conductors for fixture-work must have a water-proof insulation that is durable and not easily abraded, and must not in any case be smaller than No. 18 B. & S., No. 20 B. W. G., and No. 2 E. S. G.  
E.—All burrs or fins must be removed before the conductors are drawn into a fixture.  
F.—The tendency to condensation within the pipes should be guarded against by sealing the upper end of the fixture.  
G.—No combination fixture in which the conductors are concealed in a space less than one-fourth inch between the inside pipe and the outside casing will be approved.  
H.—Each fixture must be tested for "contacts" between conductors and fixtures, and for "short circuits" and for ground connections, before the fixture is connected to its supply conductors.  
I.—Ceiling blocks, of fixtures should be made of insulating material; if not, the wires in passing through the plate must be surrounded with hard rubber tubing.  
No. 28. Arc Lights on Low-Potential Circuits—A.—Must be supplied by branch conductors not smaller than No. 12 B. & S. gauge.  
B.—Must be connected with main conductors only through double-pole cut-outs,

C.—Must only be furnished with such resistances or regulators as are inclosed in non-combustible material, such resistance being treated as stoves. Incandescent lamps must not be used for resistance devices.  
D.—Must be supplied with globes and protected as in the case of arc lights on high potential circuits.  
No. 29. Electric Gas-Lighting—Where electric gas-lighting is to be used on the same fixture with the electric-light—  
A.—No part of the gas-piping or fixture shall be in electrical connection with the gas-lighting circuit.  
B.—The wires used with the fixtures must have a non-inflammable insulation; or, where concealed between the pipe and shell of the fixture, the insulation must be such as required for fixture wiring for the electric-light.  
C.—The whole installation must test free from "grounds."  
D.—The two installations must test perfectly free from connection with each other.  
No. 30. Sockets—A.—No portion of the lamp-socket exposed to contact with outside objects must be allowed to come into electrical contact with either of the conductors.  
B.—In rooms where inflammable gases may exist, or where the atmosphere is damp, the incandescent lamp and socket should be inclosed in a vapor-tight globe.  
No. 31. Flexible Cord—A.—Must be made of conductors, each surrounded with a moisture-proof and a non-inflammable layer, and further insulated from each other by a mechanical separator of carbonizable material. Each of these conductors must be composed of several strands.  
B.—Must not sustain more than one light not exceeding 50-candle power.  
C.—Must not be used except for pendants, wiring of fixtures, and portable lamps or motors.  
D.—Must not be used in show-windows.  
E.—Must be protected by insulating bushings where the cord enters the socket. The ends of the cord must be taped to prevent fraying of the covering.  
F.—Must be so suspended that the entire weight of the socket and lamp will be borne by knots under the bushing in the socket and above the point where the cord comes through the ceiling-block or rosette, in order that the strain may be taken from the joints and binding-screws.  
G.—Must be equipped with keyless sockets, as far as practicable, and be controlled by wall switches.

No. 31½. Decorative Series Lamps.—Incandescent lamps run in series circuits shall not be used for decorative purposes inside of buildings.

CLASS D.

Alternating Systems.

No. 32. Converters or Transformers—A.—Must not be placed inside of any building, except the Central Station, unless by special permission, as provided in Rule 33.  
B.—Must not be placed in any but metallic or other non-combustible cases.  
C.—Must not be attached to the outside walls of buildings, unless separated therefrom by substantial insulating supports.  
In those cases where it may not be possible to exclude the converters and primary wires entirely from the building, the following precautions must be strictly observed:  
No. 33. Converters—A.—Must be located at a point as near as possible to that at which the primary wires enter the building, and must be placed in a room or vault constructed of, or lined with fire-resisting material, and used only for the purpose. They must be effectually insulated from the ground, and the room in which they are placed be practically air-tight, except that it shall be thoroughly ventilated to the outdoor air, if possible, through a chimney or flue.

No. 34. Primary Conductors—A.—Must each be heavily insulated with a coating of moisture-proof material from the point of entrance to the transformer, and, in addition, must be so covered and protected that mechanical injury to them, or contact with them, shall be practically impossible.  
B.—Must each be furnished, if within a building, with a switch and a fusible cut-out where the wires enter the building. These switches should be inclosed in secure and fire-proof boxes preferably outside the building, accessible to firemen and policemen.  
C.—Must be kept apart at least ten inches, and at the same distance from all other conducting bodies when inside a building.  
No. 35. Secondary Conductors—A.—Must be installed according to the Rules for "Low Potential Systems."

CLASS E.

Electric Railways.

No. 36.—All rules pertaining to arc light wires and stations shall apply (so far as possible) to street railway power stations.  
No. 37.—  
No. 38.—  
No. 39. Railway Car Wiring—A.—Must always be run out of reach of the passengers, and must be insulated with a water-proof insulation.  
No. 40.—  
No. 41.—Car Houses—Must be wired under the same general rules as apply to central stations.  
No. 42.—

CLASS F.

No. 43. Storage or Primary Batteries—A.—When current for light and power is taken from primary or secondary batteries, the same general regulations must be observed as apply to similar apparatus fed from dynamo generators developing the same difference of potential.  
B.—All secondary batteries must be mounted on approved insulators.  
C.—Special attention is directed to Rule No. 21, for rooms where acid fumes exist.  
D.—The use of any metal liable to corrosion must be avoided in connections of secondary batteries.

MISCELLANEOUS.

No. 44. A.—The wiring in any building must test free from grounds, i. e., each main supply line and every branch circuit shall have an insulation resistance of at least 25,000 ohms, and should have an insulation resistance between conductors, and between all conductors and the ground (not including attachments, sockets, receptacles, etc.,) of not less than the following:  
Up to 10 amperes, 4,000,000; up to 25 amperes, 1,600,000; up to 50 amperes, 800,000; up to 100 amperes, 300,000; up to 200 amperes, 160,000; up to 400 amperes, 80,000; up to 800 amperes, 22,000; up to 1,600 amperes, 11,000.

All cut-outs and safety devices in place in the above.  
Where lamp sockets, receptacles and electroliers, etc., are connected, one-half of the above will be required.  
B.—Ground wires for lightning arresters, of all classes, and ground detectors, must not be attached to gas-pipes within the building.  
C.—Where telephone, telegraph or other wires connected with outside circuits are bunched together within any building, or where inside wires are laid in conduit or duct with electric-light or power wires, the covering of such wires should be fire-resisting, or else the wires should be inclosed in an air-tight tube or duct.  
D.—All conductors connecting with telephone, district messenger, burglar-alarm, watch, clock, electric, time and other similar instruments, should be provided, near the point of entrance to the building, with some protective device, which will operate to shunt the instruments in case of a dangerous rise of potential, and open the circuit and arrest an abnormal current flow. Any conductor normally forming an innocuous circuit may become a source of fire hazard if crossed with another conductor, through which it may become charged with a relatively high pressure.  
Testing—Companies furnishing electricity from central stations should test their lines for the ground connections once or more every day, and report the result of such tests in such manner as may be required.

SPECIAL RULES IN REFERENCE TO ELECTRICAL HEATING AND COOKING APPARATUS, GLUE POTS, ETC.

No. 45. Electric Heaters, Ranges and Stoves—A.—These must be placed in safe situations (out of easy reach of inflammable materials) and separated from and supported on non-conducting and incombustible standards or bases so as to be at least four inches from woodwork of any description or other inflammable material, unless protected by non-combustible materials, such as sheet metal and asbestos, or the like, so combined as to prevent appreciable transmission of heat, while securing full insulation. The heating wires or resistance of these heaters, etc., must be inclosed in non-combustible cases adapted to prevent accidental contact with any exterior object or material. These electric heaters, stoves, etc., must never be concealed, but must be at all times in plain sight.  
B.—They must have double-pole switches, cut-outs, etc., arranged as required for electric lights or power-apparatus employing the same current and potential.  
C.—The attachment of feed wires to "heaters," etc., must be in plain sight, easily accessible and protected from interference, accidental or otherwise.  
D.—Attachment of conductors to "heaters," etc., must be securely made in the same manner that conductors are attached to motors or generators dealing with currents equal to those employed in these devices, and such conductors must be continuous from the heaters, etc., to the switch or cut-out, which must not be within two feet of said "heater," etc. These conductors must be thoroughly well insulated and also covered with a good mechanical protection.  
Portable Cooking Apparatus, Glue Pots, Curling Irons, etc.—A.—The heating coils or resistance of these instruments must be inclosed in non-combustible cases, which in turn must be mounted on non-conducting and non-combustible bases raising the same at least one inch from any surface on which they stand.  
B.—These instruments must not be attached to lamp-sockets, and when current of more than ten amperes is required they must conform to the same rules as heaters, ranges, etc.



C.—Where currents of ten amperes or less are required these instruments may be connected by specifically approved flexible, double or twin-wire conductors, provided such conductor is composed of two multi-strand conductors, each of which is insulated by a water-proof material and asbestos, while both are surrounded by a covering affording adequate mechanical protection. These flexible cords must also be connected to "plug switches," having double-pole fuses in their sockets which will cut out the circuits if a cross connection should occur in the flexible conductor. Moreover, such "plug switches" must be so arranged that the plug will pull out and break the connection if an abnormal mechanical strain is brought on the flexible conductor.

The leading-in wires of these flexible cords must be connected to heaters or the like at the point of lowest temperature, and where such wires are detachable at the heater, their terminals must be arranged with female ends protected by porcelain extending at least 1/8-inch beyond the metal terminals.

If the connection at the heater is fixed, a separate double-pole connector must be placed in the circuit so that in case an undue strain is brought on the conductors the device will be automatically cut out and disconnected.

Flexible cord connections longer than six feet will not be permitted.

Receptacles for plug attachments must be placed at least six inches above the floor.

Where switches are provided they must conform to the rules laid down in section 26 of the General Requirements.

Where a number of utensils are grouped for general cooking service, installations to be approved must be provided with slate, soapstone or other approved slab or table for utensils to rest upon.

Plug receptacles mounted on slate or other approved material shall be attached to mains running at least six inches above the working service of the table.

Sad-irons and other heating appliances that are intended to be applied to inflammable articles, such as clothing, must be arranged as above, as far as connections, etc., are concerned, and must also be provided with approved attachments which will cut off the current when they are not in actual use.

The leading-in wires to these forms of apparatus must be connected through porcelain connecting blocks, and the cable or cord of the same must be passed through an insulated elastic spiral or spring so arranged as to protect the same from kinking, chafing, or like injury at or near the point of connection.

These conductors must be so placed that they will at all times be at least four feet from the floor, and well protected against contact with water-pipes or other possible ground connections.

The use of flexible cord will not be permitted unless specially approved by this Board.

These rules are subject to amendment at the pleasure of the Board of Fire Commissioners.

The use of wire ways for rendering concealed wiring permanently accessible is recommended; and this method of accessible concealed construction is approved for general use.

It is recommended, when drawing plans and specifications, that provision be made for the channeling and pocketing of buildings for electric-light or power wires, and in specifications for electric gas lighting to require a two-wire circuit, whether the building is to be wired for electric-lighting or not, so that no part of the gas-fixtures or gas-piping shall be used for the gas-lighting circuit.

The foregoing requirements must be strictly complied with in all respects, and a certificate of such compliance must be obtained from the Superintendent of Fire Alarm Telegraph and Electrical Appliances before the introduction of any current for the purpose mentioned in connection with such installations and appliances will be permitted.

In the matter of the application of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York, for and on behalf of The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to acquiring title (wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired), to CROMWELL AVENUE (although not yet named by proper authority, from Jerome avenue to Inwood avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, as the same has been heretofore laid out and designated as a first-class street or road by the Department of Public Parks.

**WE, THE UNDERSIGNED COMMISSIONERS** of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter, hereby give notice to all persons interested in this proceeding, and to the owner or owners, occupant or occupants of all houses and lots and improved and unimproved lands affected thereby, and to all others whom it may concern, to wit:

First—That we have completed our supplemental and amended estimate and assessment, and that all persons interested in this proceeding, or in any of the lands affected thereby, and having objections thereto, do present their said objections, in writing, duly verified, to us, at our office, No. 2 Tryon Row, Room 1 (fourth floor), in said city, on or before the 12th day of September, 1895, and that we, the said Commissioners, will hear parties so objecting within the ten week-days next after the said 12th day of September, 1895, and for that purpose will be in attendance at our said office on each of said ten days at 12 o'clock M.

Second—That the abstract of our said estimate and assessment, together with our damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates and other documents used by us in making our report, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings, in the Law Department of the City of New York, at his office, No. 2 Tryon Row, in said city, there to remain until the 13th day of September, 1895.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces or parcels of land situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz: Beginning at a point on the easterly side of River avenue, midway between Overlook avenue and Endrow place; running thence northerly and along the easterly side of River avenue to its junction with Jerome avenue; thence still northerly and along the easterly side of Jerome avenue to the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Ward line; thence westerly and along the said ward-line to the middle of the block between Inwood avenue and Macomb's Dam road; thence northerly and along the middle of the block between Inwood avenue and Macomb's Dam road to the southerly side of Macomb's Dam road; thence westerly and along the southerly side of Macomb's Dam road to its junction with Cromwell avenue; thence still westerly across Cromwell avenue, and at right angles to the same, to a point distant 125 feet westerly from the westerly side of Cromwell avenue; thence southerly and through the middle of the block between Second avenue and Cromwell avenue to the southerly side of Elliot street; thence westerly and along the southerly side of Elliot street and the southerly side of High Bridge street to a point midway between Marcher avenue and Boscobel avenue; thence southerly and through the middle of the block between Marcher avenue and Boscobel avenue, a distance of about 693.4 feet; thence westerly and about at right angles to Boscobel avenue to the westerly side of Marcher avenue; thence southerly and along the westerly side of Marcher avenue to a point which would meet a line drawn parallel to and midway between Overlook avenue and Endrow place; thence easterly and along said last-mentioned line to the easterly side of River avenue, at the point or place of beginning; excepting from said area all streets, avenues, roads, or portions thereof, heretofore legally opened or laid out, as the same is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.
