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BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

NEW YORK CITY, December 30, 1903.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 12 o'clock m., at the Office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Printed copies of the minutes of the meeting held December 17, 1903, were presented, and adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Mr. Marsh, representing the Comptroller, was present, and in response to advertisements in the CITY RECORD, of date December 17, 1903, bids and proposals were received for the erection and completion of the proposed armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., to be erected on the westerly side of Lexington avenue, between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets, Borough of Manhattan; and for furnishing materials and labor required for repairs and alterations in several armories, viz.: Twenty-second Regiment, Squadron A, Twenty-third Regiment and Third Battery, as follows:

Resolved, That the bid of Carl Heitzner, No. 56 Lewis street, Borough of Manhattan, for materials and work required in the alterations and repairs to the Twenty-third Regiment Armory, Borough of Brooklyn, Alternative "D," amounting to the sum of nine hundred and ninety dollars (\$900), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work, and that the same be submitted to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved, the Chairman of the Armory Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected, and that the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Resolved, That the bid of Peter J. Ryan, No. 314 West Forty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, for materials and work required in the alterations and repairs to the Armorer's Quarters in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, Borough of Manhattan, Alternative "A," amounting to the sum of seven hundred and eighty-eight dollars (\$788), be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work, and that the same be submitted to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved, the Chairman of the Armory Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected, and that the deposits received at this meeting be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts received from the unsuccessful bidders.

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The bids under "B," "C" and "E" were referred to the Acting Secretary, for tabulation and report.

A communication was received from Major Charles E. Lydecker, transmitting a resolution of the Board of Audit of the Seventh Regiment, N. G., N. Y., together with plans and specifications for a proposed electric lighting plant and alterations in the Seventh Regiment Armory Building.

Which were referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from the Brigadier-General of the First Brigade, N. G., N. Y., transmitting a record of the Armorer of the Seventh Regiment Armory, relative to lighting in that armory.

Which was referred to the Committee on Armories for Manhattan and The Bronx.

A communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, of date December 23, 1903, relative to imposing fees on the contractor for the erection of the armory building for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, for landing materials at the dock in front of the armory site.

The Mayor offered the following:

Whereas, At a meeting of the Armory Board, on September 26, 1901, the Committee on Armories reported favorably on a site for the accommodation of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, and at the same meeting the Secretary presented a copy of a communication from the Corporation Counsel, notifying the Comptroller that the title is now vested in The City of New York to the proposed site for this armory, in the Eighth Ward, in the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by First avenue and New York Bay and Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, together with the right, title and interest of owner of the upland in and to the lands and front of said block under the water of the New York Bay, extending to the bulkhead and the pier line; and at the same meeting the Clerk of the Works made a report as to the availability of this site for building an armory, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments offered the following:

"Whereas, The Corporation Counsel has by communication, dated September 13, 1901, advised the Comptroller that the title is now vested in The City of New York, of a plot of land located in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by First avenue and New York Bay, Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, together with the right, title and interest of owner of the uplands in and to the land and front of said block under the water of the New York Bay, by extending to the bulkhead and pier lines;

"Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of section 134, chapter 314 of the Laws of 1901, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to appropriate said plot as a location for an armory and quarters for the Second Battalion, N. G., N. Y., which was adopted; and

Whereas, On October 11, 1901, the Sinking Fund concurred in assigning to the use of the Second Battalion Naval Militia the property so bounded by First avenue, New York Bay, Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets; and

Whereas, The site as concurred in and assigned for the purpose of an armory for the Second Battalion Naval Militia does not, in the opinion of the Armory Board, fulfill the requirements of the statute, and the necessities of the organization; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Armory Board does hereby request the concurrence of the Sinking Fund Commissioners in assigning to the use of the Second Battalion Naval Militia, as an armory site the whole of the upland and land under water, extending from Fifty-first to Fifty-second street, and from First avenue westward to the pier-head-lines.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, to whom was referred a communication from Captain DeBevoise, offering to lease to the City a plot of land, extending from Union to President street, in the rear of and adjoining the site for the new armory, with accompanying conditions as to grading the plot and assuming the taxes, reported.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Resolved, That the report of the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, relative to the leasing of the plot adjoining the armory site for Troop C, be accepted and referred to the Acting Secretary for an estimate of the cost of grading required.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

Brigadier-General James McLeer made a verbal report, for the Committee on Armories for Brooklyn and Queens, on the violations which were served upon the Board, under date of December 3, relative to the necessity for a new stair, as an exit, from the gallery in the Twenty-third Regiment Armory, Borough of Brooklyn.

Brigadier-General McLeer offered the following:

Resolved, That the Acting Secretary be directed to return the complaint to the Superintendent of Buildings, advising him to address his complaint to the State Armory Commission.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:

Resolved, That the members of the Armory Board, for the years 1902 and 1903, tender to Mayor Low, its Chairman, their high appreciation of the able manner in which he has presided at the meetings of the Armory Board, and the courtesy he has extended to its members.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A motion to adjourn, subject to the call of the Mayor, was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

NEW YORK CITY, January 6, 1904.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 11 o'clock A. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Brigadier-General James McLeer.

The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the Mayor be made Chairman of the Board. Which was adopted.

Brigadier-General McLeer moved that the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments be made Vice-President of the Board. Which was adopted.

The Acting Secretary read the minutes of the meeting of the Board of December 30, 1903, and on motion of the Mayor, they were approved as read.

The Acting Secretary presented a tabulation of the bids received at the meeting of December 30, 1903, for the erection of the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory and for alterations and repairs to several armories.

The lowest bid for repairs to Squadron "A" Armory, under Item "C," was that of Daniels & Co., at \$2,500, which was found to be irregular and informal. The next lowest bid was that of George Stanton, at \$3,784.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the bids for alterations and repairs to armories, as received on December 30, 1903, under Item "C," be all rejected, and that the Comptroller be requested to return the deposits received with the bids.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Brigadier-General McLeer.

Resolved, That the bid of Jacob Saron, for repairs to the Armory of the Third Battery, N. G., N. Y., being informal, be rejected, and that the bid of Neptune B. Smyth, No. 1123 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for materials and work required in the alterations and repairs to the Third Battery Armory, in the Borough of Brooklyn, Item "E," amounting to the sum of four thousand nine hundred and forty-one dollars (\$4,941), be accepted as being the lowest formal bid for said work, and that the same be submitted to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved the Chairman of the Armory Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected, and that the deposits received be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts deposited by the unsuccessful bidders.

Ryan, No. 314 West Forty-fourth street, Borough of Manhattan, for materials and work required in the alterations and repairs to the colonel's room in the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, Borough of Manhattan, Item "B," Alternative 1, amounting to the sum of two thousand six hundred and seven dollars (\$2,607), be accepted as being the lowest formal bid for said work, and that the same be submitted to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved the Chairman of the Armory Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the Board; that all the other bids be rejected, and that the deposits received be forwarded to the Comptroller, with the request that he return the amounts deposited by the unsuccessful bidders.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) from the appropriation made to the Armory Board for the year 1903, entitled "Care and Maintenance of Armories, Administration," the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation made to the Twenty-second Regiment, N. G., N. Y., entitled "Repairs and Supplies," the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer the sum of two hundred and forty-six dollars (\$246) from the appropriation made to the Armory Board for the year 1903, entitled "Care and Maintenance of Armories, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, Repairs and Supplies, Contingencies,"

the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes thereof, to the appropriation made to the Third Battery, N. G., N. Y., entitled "Repairs and Supplies," the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen and Brigadier-General McLeer.

The Acting Secretary reported the execution of the following contracts:

December 8, 1903—Kelly & Kelley, for grading the plot for the new armory building for Troop "C," in the Borough of Brooklyn.

December 22, 1903—John Kennedy & Son, for the erection and completion of new armory building for Troop "C," in the Borough of Brooklyn.

December 18, 1903—Agreements modifying contracts for coal of the Moquin-Heissenbuttel Coal Company, Brooklyn and Queens, and Thomas F. Farrell, Manhattan.

Communications were received from Charles N. Swift, Frank C. Cooper and Bartholomew Donovan making application for position of Secretary to the Armory Board. Which were tabled.

A motion to adjourn to meet at the call of the Chair was adopted.

BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Governor's Room, City Hall, on Tuesday December 29, 1903, at 11:15 o'clock A. M.

Present—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel; James L. Wells, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meetings not yet approved was dispensed with.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The assessment list for improvements in Long Island City, Borough of Queens, under the provisions of chapter 644, Laws of 1893, referred back to the Board of Assessors under resolutions, with all of the objections, withdrawals thereof and the various other consents, stipulations and papers in the matter, at meeting of November 13, 1903, for revision and correction by reducing the total amount of the said assessment, including the interest thereon by 60 per cent. thereof, and by reducing the assessment upon each parcel accordingly, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the Board of Assessors with all papers under date of December 21, 1903.

The Board of Assessors stated that the assessment had been revised in accordance with the resolutions of the Board of Revision of Assessments.

Rev. P. A. Walsh, rector of the Church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, was heard in opposition to the amount of the assessment on the church property for the reason that it had previously paid an assessment for an outlet sewer.

No others appearing in opposition to the assessment after notice, on motion of the Corporation Counsel, the objections which had not heretofore been withdrawn were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in the Southern Boulevard, from East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to the southerly line of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and from the northerly line of the New York and Harlem Railroad to Hunt's Point road, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade and objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors, at meeting of May 7, 1903, with instructions particularly to inquire into the amount of the assessment to be levied upon the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as the Board is of the opinion that the assessment already charged is inadequate; and also to inquire into the facts relative to previous assessments made for laying crosswalks, macadamizing, curb, gutter and flagging on the Southern Boulevard, and to make the reductions necessary by reason of former assessments having been paid, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of December 16, 1903, together with a communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx of September 18, 1903, enclosing copy of report made by S. C. Thompson, Engineer of Highways, and opinion of the Corporation Counsel to the Board of Assessors of November 30, 1903, in the matter, and additional objections and briefs filed by William H. Peirce, Edward S. Kaufman and Robert L. Luce, attorneys.

Mr. William H. Peirce, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment in consequence of the excessive cost and expenses of the work and to charging the property of his clients for the work of curb, gutter and flagging which had previously been done and paid for, and, therefore, constitutes a repavement; also that the property should be relieved of the cost and expense of filling, and that the area of assessment should be extended.

Mr. Edward S. Kaufman, attorney, opposed the assessment upon the property of his client, Max Weil, for the reason that by the work his property had been damaged instead of benefited.

Mr. Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, appeared by representative and objected to the apportionment of the assessment and to the excessive cost and expenses of the work, and asked that a portion of the expense be borne by the City, and claimed that the improvement had been made for the benefit of the railroad.

Mr. Charles H. Brush, attorney, appeared and objected to the great cost of the work and the excessive expenses, and asked that some reduction might be made in the assessment.

Mr. Robert L. Luce, of counsel for the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as owner, appeared and stated that he had no remarks to make in the matter.

No others appearing after notice, decision was reserved and the assessment list was laid over until the next meeting of the Board.

The assessment list for sewers and appurtenances in East One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, between Boston road and Mohegan avenue; in East One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Boston road and Southern Boulevard; East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Boston road and Crotona parkway; in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, between Boston road and Honeywell avenue; in Vyse street, between East One Hundred and Eightieth street and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street; in Daly avenue, between East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in Honeywell avenue, between East One

Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of October 23, 1903, with instructions to reduce the assessment by 20 per cent. from the gross amount thereof, and to vacate the assessment upon Lot Map No. 208, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the said Board amended on November 28, 1903, with objections to the assessment as revised of Janette M. Barnett, filed by Leon B. Ginsburg, attorney. Mr. Ginsburg, attorney, appeared and renewed his objections to the amount charged against the property of his client.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections to the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for alteration and improvement to sewer in Twenty-third street, between new bulkhead-line and First avenue, which overflow, and new sewers in Avenue A, between Twenty-second and Twenty-fourth streets, with objections of John Jacob Astor and John Davis, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of November 13, 1903, for further consideration, and to confer with the Corporation Counsel in regard to the questions raised in the objections, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of December 16, 1903.

The Assessors stated that they had conferred with the Corporation Counsel in regard to the matter.

Mr. Shaw, attorney, appeared and renewed his previous objections to the apportionment of the assessment, and claimed that the Metropolitan Street Railway, which uses the sewers, should be assessed, and that as the work was made necessary by the changing of the bulkhead-line, the City alone is benefited thereby.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging the sidewalks and laying crosswalks in Fordham road, from Kingsbridge road to Harlem river, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors, at meeting of October 30, 1903, with instructions to reduce the assessment by 12½ per cent. from the gross amount thereof, and further to consider the question whether a portion of the cost of the work should be assessed against the corporations making use of the road, or the intersecting streets and avenues, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board under date of December 17, 1903, with objections of Amelia Murray to the refusal of the Assessors to entertain her claim for damages for change of grade, filed by Walter B. Hopping, attorney. Also renewal of the objections filed against the assessment by Robert L. Luce, John J. Brady and A. C. Hottenroth, attorneys, and opinion of the Corporation Counsel to the Board of Assessors, dated December 9, 1903, in regard to assessing any portion of the cost of the work against corporations making use of the road or the intersecting streets and avenues.

Mr. Luce, attorney, was heard in opposition to assessing any amount against the railroad companies represented by him, and asked that the Board reduce the assessment on the lots of the companies to the sum of one dollar.

Mr. John J. Brady, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessments charged against the property of his clients, in cases where the work had been performed by the owners at their own expense, under resolutions of the Common Council.

Mr. James N. Butterly, attorney, in behalf of Walter B. Hopping, attorney, appeared and objected to the refusal of the Board of Assessors to consider the claim of Amelia Murray for damages caused by a change in the grade of the road.

Mr. Andrews, in behalf of A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, was heard in opposition to the excessive cost of the work and expenses, and to the apportionment of the assessment.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the assessments charged against the property, in front of which the owners had previously performed the work at their own expense, were eliminated from the assessment list, all the members voting in the affirmative.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list, as amended, was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in Longwood avenue, from Tiffany street to the Southern Boulevard, together with a list of awards for damages, caused by a change of grade, and objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of November 19, 1903, with instructions to make a pro rata reduction in the assessment in the amount of five thousand dollars, and also to readjust the assessment upon the plot known as Lot No. 54, Map No. 1, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board, amended, under date of December 21, 1903, with renewal of the objections filed by Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney in said matter.

Mr. Andrews, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, appeared in support of the objections originally filed against the assessment.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for paving, with asphalt block pavement, Broadway (formerly Kingsbridge road), from a point 688 feet, more or less, north of One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street to the northerly line of Dyckman street, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of October 30, 1903, for revision in regard to

the apportionment of the assessment, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been returned by said Board, under date of November 30, 1903, together with transcript of testimony taken before it at hearing on November 5, 1903, and opinion of the Corporation Counsel of November 16, 1903, in matter of the application of Mr. J. Romaine Brown, agent for the estate of P. W. Shearer, represented by Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, for an apportionment of the assessment on the property known as Lot No. 840 in Block No. 2179.

Mr. Shaw, attorney, was heard, and stated that since the return of the assessment list by the Board of Assessors, the apportionment of the property which he represented had been made on the tax maps of the City.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to apportion the assessment in accordance with the designation of the property, as shown on the tax maps, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Bryant street, between Home street and Freeman street, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of November 4, 1903, with instructions to make a reduction of twenty per cent. in the assessment, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the said Board, amended, on November 28, 1903.

Mr. Andrews, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, appeared and objected to the excess allowed for inspection, and claimed that some of the property has no connection with the sewer in question.

On motion of the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in West Farms road, between Edgewater road and East One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, and in Bryant street, from Home street to West Farms road, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of October 23, 1903, with instructions to consider the reduction of the assessment in respect to lots that front on two streets or more, so as to make an equitable assessment, and with authority to apply, if the Assessors desire to do so, to the Board of Taxes and Assessments for an apportionment of the tax valuations of such lots, and also to reduce the assessment by 12½ per cent. from the gross amount thereof, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the said Board on November 28, 1903, with objections to the assessment as amended, of Henry D. Tiffany, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney.

Mr. Flannery, attorney, was heard, and alleged that the instructions of the Board of Revision of Assessments of October 23, 1903, to the Board of Assessors had not been complied with by the latter Board, with reference to the apportionment of the assessment on the property of his clients.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was again referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to consider further the question of the apportionment and reduction of the assessment in regard to the lots which front on two or more streets, in order to make an equitable assessment; and also to notify the property owners whose lots are so situated, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Mapes avenue, between East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, and in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, from Mapes avenue to the Southern Boulevard, with objections, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of November 13, 1903, with instructions to reduce the expenses for engineering and inspecting by one-half, was presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the said Board amended, on November 28, 1903, with objections to the assessment as revised, of William E. Callender and others, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, and of William Coogan and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The assessment list for sewer in Eighth avenue, from Fifty-fourth street to Sixty-second street; in Ninth avenue, from Fifty-fourth street to Sixty-second street; in Fort Hamilton avenue, from Fifty-fourth street to Sixtieth street; and in Fifty-fourth street, from Seventh avenue to Fort Hamilton avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, with objections of James Mooney and others, owners, and report of Superintendent of Sewers of December 2, 1903, in regard thereto, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 4, 1903.

Mr. Mooney was heard in behalf of himself and others in opposition to the assessment on the ground that the work had not been performed in accordance with the specifications and contract.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, building approaches and placing fences in East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh street, from Park avenue to the Southern Boulevard, and objections of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company as owner, and testimony introduced, filed by Robert L. Luce of counsel; Joseph Liebertz and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, and of John W. Cochrane and others, filed by Frank L. Hall, attorney, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on November 28, 1903.

Mr. Andrews, representing Mr. A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, appeared and asked that the assessment list be laid over until the next meeting, as he was not prepared at this time to go on with the matter.

Mr. Luce, attorney, was heard, and objected to placing any assessment upon the New York and Harlem Railroad Company, as it derived no benefit from the work.

The Corporation Counsel requested Mr. Hottenroth, attorney, to file a brief in support of his objections. On motion, the further consideration of the assessment was postponed until the next meeting.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, building approaches and placing fences in East One Hundred and Ninety-fourth street, from Webster avenue to Kingsbridge road, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade and objections of Estate of John Cromwell and others, filed by Salter & Steinkamp, attorneys; Susan S. Tappan, by Abel Crook, attorney; Mary E. Butler, by John J. Brady, attorney; Richard W. Hill, attorney for owners of Lots Nos. 1, 59, 60 and 61 in Block 3282 and Lot No. 32 in Block 3276; and application of Mary A. Conboy for an award for damages, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 16, 1903.

Mr. John J. Kearney, representing Messrs. Salter & Steinkamp and Abel Crook, attorneys, and Mr. Hill, attorney, were heard and urged that some relief be granted in the matter in consequence of the excessive cost of the work and the expenses and for the reason that the assessment exceeds the benefit.

Mr. Hottenroth, attorney, was requested to file a brief in support of his objections.

The assessment list was laid over for further consideration.

At this time—1:33 o'clock P.M.—the Deputy and Acting Comptroller was excused from further attendance at the meeting, and withdrew.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for paving with asphalt blocks One Hundred and Fifteenth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Morningside avenue, and objections of J. Watts De Peyster, filed by William Allan Hoar, attorney, received from the Board of Assessors under date of December 4, 1903, were presented.

Mr. Hoar, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment upon the property of his client, on the ground that the street had been previously paved at the expense of the property owners and that the charge for setting and resetting curb is not properly a part of the assessment, as the work had heretofore been done and paid for by them.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to

reduce the assessment by 10 per cent. from the gross amount thereof, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for sewer and appurtenances in Morris avenue, between East One Hundred and Eighty-first street and Field place, and in East One Hundred and Eighty-second street, from Jerome avenue to Morris avenue, and objections of James Welton and others, filed by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney; Martin Bleser and others, filed by John J. Brady, attorney; and of Margaret M. Bowler, filed by J. C. O'Conor, attorney, were presented, having been received from the Board of Assessors on November 28, 1903.

Mr. O'Conor, attorney, was heard in opposition to the cost of the work and the expenses connected therewith, and claimed that the amount charged against the property of his client largely exceeds the benefit derived by it.

On motion, the assessment list was laid over for further consideration.

At 1:45 o'clock P.M., on motion, the Board adjourned to meet at the Comptroller's office on Thursday, December 31, 1903, at 10 o'clock A.M.
