COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 2 o'clock p. m., on Friday, September 20, 1907.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; James J. Martin, Chamberlain; Patrick F. McGowan, President, Board of Aldermen, and John R. Davies, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meetings held July 8, August 8 and 22, 1907, were approved as printed.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of land under water between Third and Lincoln avenues, Borough of The Bronx, to the Central Railroad of New Jersey:

July 22, 1907.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held June 5, 1907, a resolution was adopted leasing to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey certain land under water belonging to The City of New York in the Borough of The Bronx, between Third and Lincoln avenues.

The company now desires an extension of the land under water, of which the following is a technical description and which is shown on the accompanying map:

Technical Description of Additional Area Proposed to be Leased to the Central Railroad of New Jersey at Third Avenue, Borough of The Bronx.

Beginning at a point in the westerly side of the area at present leased to the Central Railroad of New Jersey by The City of New York, between Lincoln and Third avenues, in the Borough of The Bronx, where a line drawn parallel with and two feet southerly from the southerly line of Third avenue intersects the same; and running thence along said westerly side of the present leased area 34 feet, more or less, to a line drawn parallel with and distant 34 feet southerly from the southerly line of Third avenue; thence westerly and along said parallel line 29 feet; thence northerly in a line drawn at right angles with the southerly line of Third avenue 32 feet to a line drawn parallel with and distant 2 feet southerly from the southerly line of Third avenue; thence easterly and along said last mentioned parallel line 40.5 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning; said described area comprising 1,112 square feet of land under water.

The adjoining upland is owned by private parties and the land under water, in question, cannot be reached except over private property. It is, therefore, of no use to any one except the upland owner.

I therefore beg to recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks, of the lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, of the land under water above described, said lease to begin on the first of the month next succeeding the date upon which said lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and to expire July 1, 1917 (the date on which the first plot of land under water expires), with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each, rental for the first term of ten years to be at the rate of ten (10) cents per square foot per annum, the rental to commence on the same date as the commencement of the lease; the rental for the first renewal term to be at the rate of twelve and one-half (12½) cents per square foot per annum, and for the second renewal term to be at the rate of fifteen (15) cents per square foot per annum.

The lessee to have the privilege of erecting on said land under water platforms, etc., in accordance with plans to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of land under water now in use by this Department.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund having adopted the report of the committee to whom was referred the matter of leasing to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey certain land under water belonging to The City of New York, in the Borough of The Bronx, between Third and Lincoln avenues (see minutes of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, June 5, 1907), and the terms of the proposed lease being similar and the premises being adjacent to land under water the lease of which was approved June 5, 1907, I think the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly approve the proposed lease for land under water, as requested by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, of land under water between Third and Lincoln avenues, Borough of The Bronx, bounded and described as follows:

"Beginning at a point in the westerly side of the area at present leased to the Central Railroad of New Jersey by The City of New York, between Lincoln and Third avenues, in the Borough of The Bronx, where a line drawn parallel with and two feet southerly from the southerly line of Third avenue intersects the same; and running thence along said westerly side of the present leased area 34 feet, more or less, to a line drawn parallel with and distant 34 feet southerly from the southerly line of Third avenue; thence westerly and along said parallel line 29 feet; thence northerly in a line drawn at right angles with the southerly line of Third avenue 32 feet to a line drawn parallel with and distant 2 feet southerly from the southerly line of Third avenue; thence easterly and along said last mentioned parallel line 40.5 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning; said described area comprising 1,112 square feet of land under water."

The lease to begin on the 1st day of October, 1907, and to expire July 1, 1907, with the privilege of two renewals of ten years each; rental for the first term of ten years to be at the rate of ten (10) cents per square foot per annum; the rental for the first renewal term to be at the rate of twelve and one-half (12½) cents per square foot per annum, and for the second renewal term to be at the rate of fifteen (15) cents per square foot per annum; the lessee to have the privilege of erecting on said land under water platforms, etc., in accordance with plans to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of land under water now in use by the Department of Docks and Ferries, and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated July 22, 1907.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, advising as to the procedure of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, relative to the

acquisition by condemnation proceedings of title to property for the improvement of the waterfront, pursuant to chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907:

July 1, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication from your office under date of June 24, 1907, enclosing copy of a communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Commissioner of Docks, under date of June 13, 1907, requesting said Board to approve and authorize the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of certain property between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, East river, for the improvement of the waterfront under the new plan adopted by the Commissioner of Docks on January 29, 1906, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund February 21, 1906.

My attention is called to a letter addressed by me to the Commissioner of Docks, under date of March 20, 1907, requesting that in the future the assent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of title to property for the improvement of the waterfront be procured before directions are given by the Commissioner to institute proceedings.

You also call my attention to chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, entitled "An Act to amend the Greater New York Charter relative to the Department of Docks and Ferries," and which became a law on May 27, 1907.

I am requested to inform you "as to the proper method of procedure for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in order that proceedings for the acquisition of this property may properly be instituted by your office, and also advise me whether a public hearing held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund only will be sufficient to meet the provisions of the statute, or will it be necessary for the Board of Estimate to hold a public hearing in addition thereto."

Chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907 reads in part as follows:

"No resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund or of the board of estimate and apportionment approving or authorizing the acquisition of land or directing the vesting in the city of New York of any title to property, and no resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund adopting or approving or consenting to or certifying to a plan or plans, or to any change therein, for the whole or any part of the waterfront within the limits of the city of New York shall be of any validity or effect, unless passed at a public hearing of said commissioners or board, of which public notice shall be given by publication for six consecutive days in the CITY RECORD, not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said public hearing, which publication shall contain, in addition to such information as the commissioner of docks may think proper, a description of the property to be affected by the resolution, a statement by the chairman of the commission or board, of the date, time and place of said public hearing, an abstract of the recommendation of the head of the department, in regard to said vesting of title or adoption or approval or consent or certificate to said plan or plans or change therein, which said plan or plans and recommendation or change therein as proposed, shall be open to the inspection of any citizen at the office of the comptroller of the city of New York at all times during the business hours, from the beginning of publication until the day of said hearing."

Under said act, neither the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund nor the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can adopt a resolution authorizing the acquisition of the title to any lands or wharf property for the improvement of the waterfront until a public hearing thereon shall have been afforded, after due advertisement thereof, as in said act provided.

In answer to your second question, I beg to say that a public hearing held only by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will not be sufficient to meet the provisions of said statute, and it will be necessary for the Board of Estimate to hold a public hearing in addition thereto.

A resolution should be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approving the acquisition of the title to the property in question prior to the adoption of a resolution by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment consenting to the institution of the condemnation proceedings.

The resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing the acquisition of the property cannot be adopted except at a public hearing, of which public notice must be given by publication for six consecutive days in the CITY RECORD, not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said public hearing. This notice, under the requirements of the act in question, must contain, in addition to such information as the Commissioner of Docks may think proper, a description of the property to be affected by the resolution and a statement by the Chairman of the Commission of the date, time and place of said public hearing.

I have been requested by the Commissioner of Docks to prepare forms of public notices to be published under said act prior to the institution of condemnation proceedings and shall comply with said request at the earliest possible moment. I will transmit copies thereof to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate.

In connection therewith the Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix the hour of 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, October 23, 1907, in Room 16, City Hall, as the time and place for a public hearing in regard to the matter, as required by chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, advising that no action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is necessary, in connection with the acquisition of dock property by private agreement:

July 15, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—I am in receipt of a communication from your office under date of July 9, 1907, in which it is stated that "the Commissioner of Docks in a communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of June 21, 1907, recommends that the Board approve of an agreement to be entered into between his Department and the owners of the property between the centre line of Twenty-eighth street prolonged, the southerly line of Thirty-sixth street prolonged, the westerly line of Second avenue and the pierhead line; also the property between the centre line of Fifty-ninth street prolonged, the westerly line of First avenue and the centre line of Sixty-first street prolonged, and the pierhead line, Borough of Brooklyn, for the purchase of the same

at the rate of \$1.10 per square foot, pursuant to the provisions of section 822 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 624 of the Laws of 1903."

It is further stated that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting held on February 8, 1907, adopted a resolution authorizing the Corporation Counsel to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of title to this property, and that Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal have recently been appointed by the Supreme Court in the County of Kings.

You call my attention to chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, entitled "An Act to amend the Greater New York Charter, relative to the Department of Docks and Ferries," and which became a law on May 27, 1907.

That act reads, in part, as follows:

"No resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund or of the board of estimate and apportionment approving or authorizing the acquisition of land or directing the vesting in the city of New York of any title to property, and no resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund adopting or approving or consenting to or certifying to a plan or plans, or to any change therein, for the whole or any part of the water front within the limits of the city of New York shall be of any validity or effect, unless passed at a public hearing of said commissioners or board, of which public notice shall be given by publication for six consecutive days in the CITY RECORD, not less than seven nor more than thirty days before said public hearing, which publication shall contain, in addition to such information as the commissioner of docks may think proper, a description of the property to be affected by the resolution, a statement by the chairman of the commission or board, of the date, time and place of said public hearing, an abstract of the recommendation of the head of the department, in regard to said vesting of title or adoption or approval or consent or certificate to said plan or plans or change therein, which said plan or plans and recommendation or change therein as proposed, shall be open to the inspection of any citizen at the office of the comptroller of the city of New York at all times during the business hours, from the beginning of publication until the day of said hearing."

You also call my attention to your communication to my predecessor under date of June 24, 1907, requesting to be advised as to the proper method of procedure to be followed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under the provisions of the act above quoted, and the answer thereto of my predecessor under date of July 1, 1907.

You further state:

"The matter at the present time before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is the acquisition of the above mentioned property by private agreement, and you are requested to advise me whether, after the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have had a hearing in accordance with chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, and have adopted a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to enter into the agreement aforesaid, any action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is necessary in connection therewith, either under chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907 or otherwise, keeping in mind the fact that heretofore the Board of Estimate has had no jurisdiction where property was to be purchased at private sale for the purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries."

The provisions of the Charter relative to the acquisition of the title to wharf property, for the improvement of the water front, at private purchase are to be found in section 822.

It is there provided as follows:

"The commissioner of docks, with the approval of the commissioners of the sinking fund, is authorized to acquire in the name and for the benefit of the corporation of the city of New York any and all wharf property in the city of New York, as constituted by this act, to which the corporation of the city of New York then has no right or title, and any rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining to any wharf property in the city of New York and not owned by said corporation; and said commissioner of docks may acquire the same either by purchase or by process of law, as herein provided. Said commissioner of docks may agree with the owners of any such property, rights, terms, easements or privileges upon a price for the same, and shall certify such agreement to the commissioners of the sinking fund, and if the said commissioners approve of such agreement, said commissioner of docks shall take from such owners, at such price, the necessary conveyances and covenants for vesting said property, rights, terms, easements or privileges in, and assuring the same to the city of New York forever, and said owner shall be paid such price from the city treasury as provided in this act."

The authority, therefore, under said section, to acquire by private purchase the title to wharf property, is vested in the Commissioner of Docks, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and no action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is necessary in connection therewith.

Chapter 372 of the Laws of 1907, does not in any way change the method which previously existed of acquiring wharf property by private purchase, except that it seems to contemplate that the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to such purchase shall not be given until after a public hearing shall have been had thereon in the manner provided by said act.

Section 822 of the Charter must be read in connection with section 149 of the Charter which, so far as material, reads as follows:

"The assent of the comptroller shall be necessary to all agreements hereafter entered into by any city officer, board, commission or department for the acquisition by purchase of any real estate or easement therein, when such an agreement involves an obligation to pay or an expenditure of any money on behalf of the city."

I beg to advise you, therefore, that no action on the part of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is necessary in connection with the proposed purchase as set forth in your communication.

Bay, in the Borough of Brooklyn, I transmit herewith the original plan approved by the Commissioner of Docks, and also a blue print thereof and technical description. Will you please substitute the blue print and the technical description for that sent you yesterday.

Technical Description of Proposed Change in Bulkhead Line Around Mill Island, Situated in Jamaica Bay, South of Avenue U and Between East Fifty-eighth and East Sixty-eighth Streets, Borough of Brooklyn.

Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line established by the Town Commissioners, established by chapter 670 of the Laws of 1869, as amended by chapter 331 of the Laws of 1872, section 3, said point being at about the intersection of the southerly side of Avenue U with the easterly side of East Sixtieth street, Borough of Brooklyn, and running thence southerly a distance of 976 feet more or less to a point 836 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 520 feet west of the east line of East Sixtieth street, measured parallel with the east line of East Sixtieth street, and southerly line of Avenue U, respectively; thence southwesterly a distance of 588 feet more or less to a point which is distant 868 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 1,108 feet west of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street, thence running still southwesterly 1,100 feet more or less to a point which is 1,340 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 2,120 feet west of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running southerly 672 feet more or less to a point which is 1,768 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 2,640 feet west of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence still southerly 736 feet more or less to a point which is 2,396 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 3,024 feet west of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running easterly 980 feet more or less to a point which is 2,880 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 2,180 feet west of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running southeasterly a distance of 1,260 feet more or less to a point which is 3,892 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 1,452 feet west of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running northeasterly a distance of 1,400 feet more or less to a point which is 3,748 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 60 feet west of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running southeasterly a distance of 520 feet more or less to a point which is 4,168 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 244 feet east of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running northeasterly a distance of 440 feet more or less to a point which is 4,168 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 684 feet east of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running northerly a distance of 200 feet more or less to a point which is 4,024 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 784 feet east of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running still northerly a distance of 852 feet more or less to a point which is 3,200 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 1,000 feet east of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running northeasterly a distance of 372 feet more or less to a point which is 2,828 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 1,032 feet east of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running still northeasterly a distance of 480 feet more or less to a point which is 2,352 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U, and 1,032 feet east of the easterly line of East Sixtieth street; thence running northeasterly a distance of 1,040 feet more or less to a point on the bulkhead line established by the Town Commissioners, as aforesaid, which point is also on the westerly side of East Sixty-eighth street, and distant 2,332 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue U.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Finance:

July 5, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. J. A. Benschel, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication dated June 26, 1907, requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve a new plan adopted by him June 25, 1907, for the improvement of the waterfront at Mill Island, Jamaica Bay, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

I would report that Jamaica Bay is up to the present time practically unimproved and undeveloped in any part. This is the first plan for the improvement of any part of this portion of the waterfront which has been adopted by the Dock Commissioner.

On April 26, 1906, a Commission composed of three engineers were appointed by his Honor, the Mayor, pursuant to a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, authorizing the appointment of a commission to report "upon the general improvement and development of Jamaica Bay, in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, etc."

This Commission, in report submitted May 31, 1907, presented two complete plans showing proposed development of the whole Jamaica Bay, the idea in preparing a complete plan being that any improvement of small portions of the bay from time to time should be in agreement with a well defined ultimate result.

The two plans in so far as they relate to the portion known as Mill Island agree fairly well, but the plan adopted by the Dock Commissioner is entirely different and does not appear to be prepared with relation to future improvements in the bay.

One objection to the Dock Commissioner's plan is that it makes two canals with dead ends, similar to Gowanus canal, instead of a canal open to the bay at both ends, which would tend to flush itself by the combined action of wind and tide.

It appears to me that improvements of any portion of Jamaica Bay should be along the lines shown in one of the general plans already prepared, unless a better plan can be produced.

I would add, that before the bulkhead line proposed by the Dock Commissioner can be legally established, a public hearing on the proposition must be held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the approval of the Secretary of War must be obtained.

1. The premises Nos. 541 and 543 Leonard street, Brooklyn, have been under a lease to the Board of Education for a number of years. This being simply a renewal of the lease upon the same terms and conditions, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a renewal of the lease for a period of one year from October 13, 1907, at an annual rental of \$500. Lessor, St. Paul's Church of the Evangelical Association.

2. The premises Nos. 63 and 65 New York avenue, Brooklyn, have been under a lease to the Board of Education for a number of years. The rent being the same as heretofore paid, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a renewal of the lease for a period of two years from July 1, 1907, with the privilege of renewal for two years, at an annual rental of \$2,200, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, George Rodemann.

3. Premises at Walworth street, near Myrtle avenue, Brooklyn, annex to Public School 54, for a period from August 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, with the privilege of renewal for one year, at an annual rental of \$360. This is a new lease and should be considered together with another new lease of premises adjoining, known by the No. 724 (13) Myrtle avenue, Brooklyn, which is No. 13 on the list of the Board of Education, having the same owner and being an annex to Public School 54, for a term of two years and one month, the date of expiration being July 1, 1909, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$360. The premises No. 724 Myrtle avenue and Walworth street, near Myrtle avenue, are both located in the rear end of a lot 40 feet in width on Walworth street and 25 feet in depth, situated about 50 feet south of Myrtle avenue. It was originally intended to be used for two or three small stores and has two store entrances. It is well lighted front and rear, divided into two class rooms, and contains 78 school desks. The rental asked, \$30 a month, is not excessive, and I would, therefore, respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education in relation to the premises which they call No. 724 Myrtle avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and authorize a lease of the same as an annex to Public School 54, for a period from June 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$360, the lease to contain a clause for the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions. The adjoining premises, which is No. 3 on the list of the Board of Education, that is at Walworth street, about 90 feet south of Myrtle avenue, adjoins Public School 54, to which it is an annex. The request is for a lease for a period from August 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year. This is a new one-story brick building, 20 by 50 feet, and is divided into two class rooms, each 18 by 24 feet, containing 84 school desks. The rooms are well lighted by front and rear windows and skylights and are in perfect condition. The rent is the same as that asked for the premises No. 724 Myrtle avenue, namely \$30 a month. I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a lease of the premises for a period from August 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$360, with the privilege of renewal for a period of one year upon the same terms and conditions, the said rent being reasonable. Lessor, Walter Ryan.

4. Premises located on Richmond avenue and Bennett street, Port Richmond, Borough of Richmond, intended to be used as an annex to Public School 20. These premises have been under lease to the Board of Education for some time. The rent being the same as paid heretofore, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a renewal of the lease for a period of one year from January 1, 1907, at an

annual rental of \$720, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year upon the same terms and conditions. Lessor, Richmond Lodge 66, F. & A. M.

5. The premises No. 197 East Broadway, Manhattan, have been under lease to the Board of Education for a number of years as an annex to Public School 75. The rent has been increased \$250 per annum, but owing to increases in rentals in this vicinity, I am of the opinion that the rent now asked is fair and reasonable. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a renewal of the lease for a period of one year from May 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$2,750, with the privilege of a further renewal for one year upon the same terms and conditions. Lessor, Educational Alliance.

6. The premises No. 57 Nostrand avenue, Brooklyn, have been under lease to the Board of Education for a number of years, and the request is for a renewal of the lease upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the lease of the premises No. 57 Nostrand avenue, Brooklyn, for a period from November 5, 1907, to July 1, 1909, as an annex to Public School 54, at an annual rental of \$420, with the privilege of renewal for a further period of one year upon the same terms and conditions. Lessors, Jacob Jettleson and Mrs. Rose Adenbaum.

7. The premises No. 15 Hamilton street, Manhattan, have been under lease to the Board of Education for some time past and the request is for a renewal upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a renewal of the lease for a period of one year from July 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$420, with the privilege of renewal for a further period of one year upon the same terms and conditions. Lessor, Hamilton House.

8. The premises at Rockaway avenue and Sumpter street, Brooklyn, have been under lease to the Board of Education for some time past and the request is for a renewal on the same terms and conditions. I would, therefore, respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a lease of the premises at Rockaway avenue and Sumpter street, Brooklyn, for a period from October 3, 1907, to July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$450, with the privilege of renewal for a further period of one year upon the same terms and conditions, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessors, A. & S. Rakowitzik.

9. The premises at Pitkin avenue and Watkins street, Brooklyn, have been under lease to the Board of Education for some years past and the request is for a renewal thereof. I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a renewal of the lease for a period of one year from November 17, 1907, at an annual rental of \$1,200, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Hebrew Educational Society of Brooklyn.

10. The premises Nos. 67 and 69 Broadway, Flushing, Borough of Queens, have been under lease to the Board of Education for some time past. They were leased for a period of three years from October 16, 1903, at an annual rental of \$840. During that period the property changed hands and came into the possession of Mr. J. V. Graham, who increased the rent to \$1,350 per annum, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held November 1, 1906, approved of the lease of the premises for a period of one year from October 15, 1906, at that rate. Mr. Graham now proposes to lease the premises for a period from October 15, 1907, to May 1, 1908, at an increase of \$50 per annum, or \$1,400, and to give a privilege of renewal for a period of two years, one at \$1,450 and one at \$1,500, which makes an increase of \$50 a year. I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve

of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a lease of the premises for a period from October 15, 1907, to May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$1,400, with the privilege of renewal for a period of two years, one year at \$1,450 and one year at \$1,500, which, owing to the increased value in Flushing property, I do not consider excessive. Lessor, James V. Graham.

11. The premises No. 162 East One Hundred and Sixteenth street, Manhattan, have been under lease to the Board of Education, and the rent is now increased \$250 per annum, which, in my opinion, is not excessive. I would, therefore, respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a lease of the premises for a period from November 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$2,250 and water tax, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Emanuel Alexander.

12. Premises at the northwest corner of Avenue S and East Thirteenth street, Brooklyn. This is a new lease and is for the purpose of erecting portable school houses pending the time of the acquisition of property now under contract for the Board of Education and the erection of a school building. The term is from August 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$500, the lease to contain a clause giving a privilege of renewal for a further term of one year upon the same terms and conditions. The land proposed to be leased is a vacant plot 100 by 95 feet on the north side of Avenue S, 100 feet west of East Thirteenth street, and is not, as the Board of Education states, located on the northwest corner of Avenue S and East Thirteenth street. It is already occupied by several temporary school buildings. The present fair market value of the plot is \$6,000, and the rental asked, \$500 a year, under the present conditions is in my opinion not unreasonable. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a lease of the premises 100 by 95 feet situated on the north side of Avenue S, 100 feet west of East Thirteenth street, for a period from August 1, 1907, to July 1, 1909, at an annual rental of \$500, with the privilege of renewal for a further period of one year upon the same terms and conditions. Lessor, Manfred Rockfeller.

14. Premises at Jefferson and Jamaica avenues, Richmond Hill, Queens. The property desired to be leased is a new proposition and the request is for a period of one year, from May 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$400, the lease to contain a clause giving a privilege of renewal for a period of one year upon the same terms and conditions. The property desired to be leased by the Board of Education is a small store 24 by 25 feet in a new concrete and frame building on the west side of Jefferson avenue, 75 feet south of Jamaica avenue, and is used as an annex to Public School 56. The room contains 39 school seats and has been in use since May 1, 1907. The rent asked, \$400 per annum, to include heat, light and janitor service, is fair and reasonable and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize the execution of a lease of the small store 24 by 25 feet in the building on the west side of Jefferson avenue, 75 feet south of Jamaica avenue, as an annex to Public School 56, for a period from May 1, 1907, to May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$400, the lessor to furnish light, heat and janitor service; the lease also to contain a clause giving a privilege of renewal for a further period of one year upon the same terms and conditions. Lessor, Joel Fowler.

15. The premises No. 52 Sands street, Brooklyn, have been under lease to the Board of Education for a number of years past, and the request is for a renewal of the expired lease. I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize the renewal of the lease of the premises No. 52 Sands street, Brooklyn, as an annex to Public School 1, for a period of one year from May 1, 1907, to May 1, 1908, at an annual rental of \$300, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease. Lessor, Asacog Club.

The lease of the last above mentioned premises, No. 52 Sands street, was at the request of the Board of Education approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on May 15, 1907, for a period of two months. It will be necessary for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in approving of the lease from May 1, 1907, for a period of one year, to rescind the action taken for the renewal of two months, adopted at a meeting held May 15, 1907.

No reports from the Bureau of Buildings or the Department of Health have been filed with this office in relation to the condition of the above mentioned buildings, and I assume that they are in a habitable condition for the housing of school children.

1. The premises No. 28 Macdougall street, Borough of Manhattan, have been under lease to the Board of Education for a number of years past, the lease expiring on May 1, 1907. The rent being the same as heretofore paid, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of the lease for a period of one year from May 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$420. Lessor, Richmond Hill House, Incorporated.

2. The premises No. 245 Concord street, Borough of Brooklyn, have heretofore been leased to the Board of Education, and as the rent to be paid is the same as heretofore, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of the lease for a period of one year from July 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$450. This is a new lease. The premises desired by the Board of Education consist of a new three-story and cellar brick building 50 feet front and rear and 27 feet in depth, and covers the entire building. I am of the opinion that \$2,000 a year is the full rental value of the premises Nos. 120 and 122 Livingston street, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education in the selection of these premises for the use of the Board, and authorize the execution of a lease for a period of one year from May 1, 1907, at an annual rental not exceeding \$2,000. Lessor, Charles Schaper.

5. The premises Nos. 509-517 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, Borough of Manhattan, have been under lease to the Board of Education for a number of years, the last lease expiring December 1, 1905. I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the Board of Education and authorize a renewal of this lease for a period of two years from December 1, 1906, at an annual rental of \$3,000. 6. SIR—The City has under acquisition a parcel of land located on Coney Island avenue and East Twelfth street, near Elm avenue, adjoining Public School 99, in the

Borough of Brooklyn. There has been for some time past a great need for additional school facilities in this vicinity, and pending the time of the acquisition of the real estate, the Board of Education desired to erect portable houses upon the property that is to be acquired. The owners of the property did not care to give permission to the Board of Education to enter upon the land, and it was thought advisable, in order to be ready for the opening of the school year, to make a lease of the premises pending the time of the actual acquisition by the City. Negotiations were entered into between the owners and this Department and it was thought that if the owners received the sum of \$180 for the use and occupation of the land, pending the time of the acquisition thereof, that it would be a fair proposition both to the City and to the owners. The owners having agreed to this and the Board of Education having adopted a resolution requesting the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the making of the lease, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the resolution of the Committee on Buildings and of the Board of Education, and authorize a lease of the property from Henry F. Newbury, located on Coney Island avenue and East Twelfth street, adjoining Public School 99, for a period from September 1, 1907, until such time as the title to such land is vested in the City, at a gross rental of \$180, which rent is fair and reasonable.

"Resolved, That the first resolution attached to the report of the Committee on Buildings adopted by the Board of Education November 14, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1851-1853), relative to executing a lease of that portion of the building occupied by the janitor of Public School 52, Manhattan, lying on the property of the Trustees of the Dyckman Library of The City of New York, be and it is hereby rescinded; and be it further

"Resolved, That the sum of ten hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,050) be, and the same is hereby, appropriated for the purpose of reimbursing the owner of record for taxes, assessments, interest, etc., levied against that portion of the building lying partly on the land acquired for the use of Public School 52, Manhattan, on the southwest corner of Broadway and Academy street, and partly on land now or heretofore belonging to the Trustees of the Dyckman Library of The City of New York, said sum of \$1,050 to constitute a full release and acquittance by the said owner of record to the Department of Education of all debt or obligation growing out of the occupancy by the Department of Education of that portion of the said above-mentioned building used by the janitor of Public School 52, Manhattan, up to and including August 1, 1907, situated on the land now or heretofore owned by the Trustees of the Dyckman Library of The City of New York; and that the Auditor of the Board of Education be, and he is hereby authorized to prepare the necessary voucher or vouchers for the payment of the sum of \$1,050, hereinbefore specified; and be it further

"Resolved, That the second resolution contained in the said above-mentioned report of the Committee on Buildings be, and it is hereby, amended by striking out the words, 'June 1, 1907,' in the fifteenth line from the top of page 1853 (Journal, 1906), and substituting in lieu thereof the words, 'August 1, 1907.'"

It appears that Mr. George S. Payson, president of the board of trustees of the Dyckman Library, in a verified petition under date of March 8, 1906, addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, states that he represents the owner of certain premises in the Borough of Manhattan on the easterly side of Broadway, 150 feet south of Academy street, and known on the tax maps as Lot No. 16 in Block 2233, Section 8, and it further appears that The City of New York, for the purpose of providing additional ground for the Academy street School No. 52, situated on the southwesterly corner of Broadway and Academy street, which adjoins the library property on the north, acquired a portion of the library premises by condemnation proceedings. The southerly line of the land thus acquired ran through the building which had been used for library purposes, the order confirming the report being dated July 1, 1899. Since that time the building referred to, which has remained in the original location, the greater portion of which is on the remaining library ground, has been, I am informed from the petition, wholly and continuously used by the Academy street school for school purposes, and the Dyckman Library has thus far received no rent or other compensation for such use. Meanwhile the building has been assessed as an improvement against the remaining property of the library, which has been compelled to rent premises in the neighborhood for its furniture and books.

On January 8, 1906, the petitioner applied to the Department of Finance for the cancellation of taxes and assessments amounting to \$942.08, without interest. This application was denied on February 20, 1906, upon an opinion of the Corporation Counsel dated February 14, 1906, in which he stated:

"It would seem, however, inequitable that the City should enjoy the benefits of the library property and subject the owner to annual taxes without compensation. Although, apparently, no lease has ever been made by the library to the City for use for school purposes, it is possible that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under the provisions of section 217 of the Charter, might deem it proper to make a lease nunc pro tunc at such reasonable rental as would at least offset the charges for taxes, assessments and interest on the property for the years above specified."

After negotiation with the attorney for the petitioner he consented to waive the assessments levied against the property, and at that time offered to make a lease for the years in question for the sum of \$1,027.04, which would be \$858.64 principal on the taxes, and the sum of \$168.40 as interest to date, covering the years 1900 to 1905, inclusive.

The matter was referred to the Board of Education by this office in a communication under date of June 6, 1906, requesting that such action be taken by that Board as may be deemed meet and proper, in order that the Dyckman Library may receive just compensation for the use and occupation of the premises to date.

I am of the opinion that the acceptance of the proposition noted in the resolution of the Board of Education is advantageous, and would properly subserve the interest of the City. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the payment of the sum of \$1,050 to the Trustees of the Dyckman Library of The City of New York as rent for the use of the building upon the land adjoining the land acquired for the use of Public School 52, in the Borough of Manhattan, on the southwest corner of Broadway and Academy street, the said sum of \$1,050 to constitute a full release and acquittance and forever discharge the said The City of New York, its successors and assigns, of and from all and all manner of action and actions, cause and causes of action, suits, debts, dues, demands, sums of money, accounts, reckonings, bonds, bills, specialties, covenants, contracts, controversies, agreements, promises, variances,

trespasses, damages, judgments, extents, executions, claims and damages whatsoever, in law or in equity, which against the said The City of New York the said the trustees of the Dyckman Library of The City of New York, ever had, now have, or which the said the Trustees of the Dyckman Library of The City of New York, its successors or assigns herein, can, shall or may have upon or by reason of any matter, cause or thing whatsoever, from the beginning of the world to the day of the date of these presents, and more especially from any and all claims, demands or charges of any kind or nature by reason of the use and occupation of Lot No. 16, Block 2233, Section 8, on the tax map of The City of New York by the Board of Education of The City of New York, from July 1, 1899, to and including August 1, 1907.

SIR—Under date of April 16, 1907, the President of the Borough of Queens requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a lease of certain rooms in the premises Nos. 250 and 252 Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, for the use of the Topographical Bureau of said borough, and transmits a report of his Engineer in charge, dated April 5, 1907.

The President of the Borough of Queens now occupies all of the first floor and Rooms 16 to 20 on the second floor of said building, which is under a lease authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund July 20, 1904, for a period of three years, at an annual rental of \$2,200, payable quarterly. The new proposition is to take the remaining five rooms on the second floor, covering an area of 1,325 square feet, the rent of which would be \$1,200 per annum, to be paid in quarterly installments. Two windows are to be placed on the west side of the building in the north-west room; the owner is to pay the water rent, heat and janitor service; the City to furnish light.

The reason for the request of the additional room is that the rooms are inadequate for the force of employees, and it is proposed to increase the same about 20 per cent., and these are the only rooms that can be secured in the neighborhood for the purposes desired.

In a communication under date of August 28, 1907, the President of the Borough requests that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the renewal of the lease of the first and part of the second floor in the same building, which lease expired August 1, 1907. The rent asked for the new lease, which is for the front half of the second floor, at the corner of Jackson and Anable avenues, is very close to \$1 a square foot, two of the rooms being 17 by 23 feet each, two 15 by 15 feet 5 inches each and a small room 8 by 10 feet. One of the rooms, 17 by 23 feet, is darkened by neighboring buildings, and it was at the request of the President of the Borough that the owner had agreed to put in two windows in the west side of the building. As I stated before, the present rent of the first floor and part of the second is \$2,200, contains 3,418 square feet, or at the rate of 64 cents a square foot.

In a communication dated August 5 Mr. Trask, the owner of the premises, stated that in response to a communication from us in regard to the matter of the increase in rental of the front half of the second floor, that after the City rented its present rooms in 1904 he acquired the adjoining lot, 25 by 100 feet, and at Mr. Cromwell's earnest solicitation he has refused to sell or build, as it would interfere with the light and air; that he has advantageous offers to build on or sell the property; that the building stands on the corner and has 40 feet space in the rear and at least 28 feet on the side, and at times in the year the sun shines on all four sides and always on three; that he will renew the old lease at \$2,200 and rent the additional front half of the second floor for \$1,200, and make a three-year lease.

Property in this vicinity in Long Island City has increased in rental value, and inasmuch as the City gets a three-year renewal on the old lease, I am of the opinion that the two offices combined under one lease at \$3,400, which would be at the rate of 72 cents a square foot, is not excessive. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the request of the President of the Borough of Queens and authorize a lease of the entire first and second floors, containing 4,743 square feet, in the building Nos. 250 and 252 Jackson avenue, corner of Anable avenue, Borough of Queens, for a period of three years from August 1, 1907, the owner to pay water rent, heat and janitor service; the City to furnish light; at an annual rental of \$3,400, payable quarterly. Owner, James D. Trask.

The purpose of the sixty-day clause, they stated, was that in case they wished to go on with their improvements which are now contemplated, the City would have to vacate the premises in order to permit them to do so, and inasmuch as they intended in the future to make improvements, the fire clause in the lease might compel them to rebuild the premises, when in their judgment it would be better policy to tear the buildings down.

Clay and William Richensteen, to appraise the value of the two properties in accordance with the law, and at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held June 5, 1907 (see Minutes, pages 689-691), upon the report of the said three appraisers, a resolution was adopted authorizing a conveyance to the Long Island Railroad Company of the property owned by The City of New York described in the report to the Commissioners, in consideration of a conveyance by the Long Island Railroad Company

to The City of New York of the property owned by the Long Island Railroad Company in the Borough of Queens, and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the law, to approve the action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held June 7, 1907 (see Minutes, pages 1948-1953), the resolution and report were presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and a resolution was adopted by said Board approving of the action taken by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and consenting to the exchange of the property described in said resolution of the Commissioners. The action taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with said law, was again presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held June 13, 1907, and was ordered printed in the Minutes.

Messrs. Wingate & Cullen, attorneys for the railroad company, state in a communication dated July 17, 1907, that attention is called to the fact that the words "Long Island Railroad Company," with whom the exchange was authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, had nothing to do with the transaction. The City was to convey the property to the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, the owner of the other plot which was to be conveyed to the City.

Since the application was made the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company has consolidated and merged with the Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York Railroad Company, thereby forming the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company, by an agreement and merger made and executed June 5, 1907, and filed in the office of the Clerk of New York County and the Secretaries of the States of New York and New Jersey on the 26th day of June, 1907, and upon the merger, all the rights, privileges, exemptions, franchises and all the property, real, personal and mixed, and all the debts due on whatever account of each of the merged companies were transferred to and vested in the new or consolidated corporation, in accordance with the provisions of said agreement; that the new site will be conveyed to The City of New York by the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company, and the City's conveyance of the old site should be made to the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amend their resolution of June 5, 1907, so that when amended the words "Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company" will be substituted for the words "Long Island Railroad Company," and further, that when such resolution has been amended, that it be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held June 5, 1907, authorizing a conveyance to the Long Island Railroad Company of property owned by the City situated at the junction of Skillman and Rapelje avenues, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, in consideration of a conveyance by the Long Island Railroad Company to The City of New York of property on the block bounded by Skillman and Foster avenues, Heiser and Gosman streets, in the Borough of Queens, be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at meeting held May 15, 1907, adopted the following resolutions:

Whereas, The Board of Education at a meeting held February 13, 1907, did adopt a resolution surrendering to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for sale as property not required for City use, premises owned by it and heretofore used as Public School 3, in the Borough of Queens, located at the junction of Skillman and Rapelje avenues, Long Island City, and bounded and described as follows:

All that certain piece or parcel of land lying and being situated in the Town of Newtown, County of Queens and State of New York, as surveyed November 26, 1864, by P. G. Van Alst, City Surveyor, Brooklyn, and which said piece of ground is described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the northeasterly side of the highway opposite the town landing at Dutch Kills, in the said Town of Newtown, and running thence south seventy-five (75) degrees and fifteen (15) minutes east, one hundred and seventy-one (171) feet nine (9) inches, along land of William Bragaw, to the northwesterly side of the old road leading to the Village of Newtown; thence north fifty-two (52) degrees and forty-one (41) minutes east, ninety-five (95) feet one (1) inch, along the northwesterly side of said old road; thence north seventy-five (75) degrees fifteen (15) minutes west, three hundred and twenty-three (323) feet, along land of Mrs. Aletta Burnett, to the northeasterly line of said first mentioned highway; thence south thirty-six (36) degrees eighteen (18) minutes east, one hundred and nineteen (119) feet three and one-half (3½) inches, along the northeasterly side of said highway to the point or place of beginning, containing eighteen thousand five hundred and fifty-three square feet of land, including the site of the old school house as shown by the annexed diagram colored red, being the premises which were conveyed by Conrad Diestel, of the Town of Newtown, County of Queens, and State of New York, and Elizabeth, his wife, to John Bragaw, John W. Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Skillman avenue with the easterly line of Gosman street, and running thence southerly along the easterly line of Gosman street 398 feet; thence easterly and parallel, or nearly so, with Foster avenue 182 feet to the former easterly boundary line of the Gosman farm; thence northerly 410 feet along said line to the southerly line of Skillman avenue; thence westerly along the southerly line of Skillman avenue 92.94 feet more or less to the easterly line of Gosman street, the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof. It being the intention to convey all the property owned or controlled by the railroad company lying within the area of this block: therefore be it

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 205a of the Greater New York Charter as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund determine that the land turned over by the Board of Education, and hereinbefore described, is no longer needed for departmental or public purposes, and do further determine that the lands of private owners herein in this resolution described are needed for a public purpose; it is therefore

Resolved, That to determine the value of the land of the City hereinbefore described and the land of private owners to be exchanged therefor, the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby appoint George J. Ryan, George E. Clay and William Richensteen, three discreet and disinterested appraisers, residing in the Borough of Queens, who are hereby authorized and directed to appraise the value of the two parcels of land hereinabove described and to report their appraisals within ten days to this Board; and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205a of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, subject, however, to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, hereby authorize a conveyance to the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company of the hereinabove described property owned by The City of New York, in consideration of a conveyance by the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company to The City of New York of the property owned by the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company in the Borough of Queens, which is also hereinabove described, free and clear of all encumbrances, including taxes and assessments, water charges and sales for the same; and be it further

Resolved, That when these resolutions and action of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorizing such exchange have been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare the legal instruments on the part of The City of New York to effect such exchange, and upon said instruments having been prepared and approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel and approved by the Comptroller of The City of New York, it shall be the duty of the Mayor of The City of New York to execute, and the City Clerk to attest and deliver, to the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company the deed of the property owned by The City of New York, upon receiving at the same time the deed of the property owned by the Pennsylvania Tunnel and Terminal Railroad Company.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a sale at public auction of property known as Parcel No. 1 and Parcels Nos. 2 and 8, excepting so much thereof as lies west of Leggett's creek, as shown on the map filed with the judgment rolls entered December 1, 1899, in the matter of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York against the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, which said parcels and portions thereof were included in the deed made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company to The City of New York, recorded in the Register's office of the County of New York in volume 23, page 211, section 10, on the land map of the County of New York:

July 5, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held June 29, 1906, there were two resolutions adopted, one discontinuing the proceedings for the opening of Dupont street, between the East river and Leggett avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, the other changing the map or plan of The City of New York by closing Dupont street, East Bay avenue, Craven street, Worthen street and Edgewater road, from Truxton street to Tiffany street, including a public place at the intersection of Edgewater road, East Bay avenue and Craven street, in the Borough of The Bronx.

A report (No. 4065) of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment acted, states in substance that the Local Board of the Morrisania District recommended that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment change the map or plan of The City of New York by discontinuing and closing the following streets:

1. Dupont street, from Leggett avenue to the bulkhead line of the East river.
2. East Bay avenue, from the land of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad to Tiffany street.
3. Craven street, from Eastern boulevard to Edgewater road.
4. Worthen street, from Eastern boulevard to Edgewater road.
5. Edgewater road, from Truxton street to Tiffany street, including the public place at the intersection of Edgewater road, East Bay avenue and Craven street.

—and further shows that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with section 442 of the Charter, has full power to initiate the changes without the resolutions of the Local Board, and that the whole proceedings should be taken up and treated as a single plan. He states in his report that "the portion of Edgewater road which it is proposed to discontinue and close is stated in the report of the Topographical Bureau to have been acquired," and further states that if that is the case the owners of the abutting property, all of which is owned by the Oak Point Land and Dock Company, should agree to pay to the City the value of the land in Edgewater road, or in other streets, the fee of which has been acquired by the City, and finally recommends that the plan submitted be approved after a public hearing, but that the approval of the Mayor be deferred until a satisfactory agreement shall have been entered into between the petitioners (Oak Point Land and Dock Company) and the City for the payment to the City of proper compensation for the land lying within the streets already opened and which it is proposed to close, and that the question of such compensation be referred to the Comptroller.

The Oak Point Land and Dock Company, under date of July 5, 1906, addressed a letter to you in which they offer the sum of \$20,000 for the 72,702 feet of land lying within the streets discontinued and closed.

The City acquired title to this property and other property in the vicinity through a settlement of a judgment between the East Bay Land and Improvement Company and the Mayor, Aldermen, etc., of The City of New York, entered December 1, 1899, and the deed from the East Bay Land and Improvement Company to the thirteen parcels owned by The City of New York is recorded in section 10, volume 23, page 211, in the office of the Register of the County of New York.

Parcel No. 1, in Edgewater road, at the junction of Craven street, contains 18,117.55 square feet.

Parcel No. 2, located in East Bay avenue, between Craven street and Worthen street.

Parcel No. 8, located in Worthen street, extending southerly from the southerly side of Eastern boulevard.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held November 14, 1906, a resolution was adopted authorizing a sale at public auction of property known as Parcels 1, 2, 8 and 11, as shown on the map filed with the judgment roll, entered December 1, 1899, in the matter of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York against the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, which said parcels were included in the deed made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company to The City of New York, recorded in the Register's office of the County of New York, December 11, 1899, in volume 23, page 211, section 10 on the land maps of the County of New York, at the minimum or upset price of \$40,000. The sale took place on December 13, 1906, and the property was purchased by Mr. Frederick Fieder, Jr., for the sum of \$40,100. The title was rejected, however, by the purchaser, for the reason that the Title Guarantee and Trust Company refused to insure the title to that portion of the property west of Leggett's creek on the ground that the City's title to the premises failed absolutely, and the Commissioners of the

Sinking Fund, at their meeting held June 5, 1907, rescinded the resolution authorizing the sale and directed a refund of the money.

The Oak Point Land Company, who made the original offer but was not a successful bidder at the sale, now desires to purchase the portion of the property east of the westerly line of Leggett's creek, and offer therefor the sum of \$27,500. The property consists of the entire Parcel No. 1 and Parcels Nos. 2 and 8, excepting so much thereof as lies west of Leggett's creek. The price offered for the property is in my opinion a fair appraisal value, the property being of no use to the City, and could well be utilized for manufacturing purposes. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize a sale at public auction of property known as the entire Parcel No. 1 and Parcels Nos. 2 and 8, excepting so much thereof as lies west of Leggett's creek, as shown on the map filed with the judgment roll, entered December 1, 1899, in the matter of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York against the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, which said parcels and portions thereof were included in the deed made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company to The City of New York, recorded in the Register's office of the County of New York, December 11, 1899, in volume 23, page 211, section 10, on the land maps of the County of New York. Said property shall be sold at a minimum or upset price of \$27,500, upon the following terms and conditions:

The highest bidder will be required to pay the full amount of his bid, together with the auctioneer's fees, at the time of sale. The deed, which shall be a quit-claim deed, to be delivered thirty days after the date of the sale. The Comptroller may, at his option, resell the property if the successful bidder shall fail to comply with the terms of sale, and the persons failing to comply therewith will be held liable for any deficiency which may result from such resale.

I would further respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund rescind the resolution adopted by them on June 5, 1907, relative to requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to restore certain streets to the map of The City of New York, after a public hearing.

"Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held November 14, 1906, authorizing a sale at public auction, after due advertisement for cash to the highest bidder of Parcels 1, 2, 8 and 11, as shown on the map filed with the judgment roll, entered December 1, 1899, in the matter of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York against the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, which said parcels were included in the deed made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company to The City of New York, recorded in the Register's Office of the County of New York, December 11, 1899, in volume 23, page 211, section 10 on the land maps of the County of New York, be and the same is hereby rescinded; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby requested to transmit a certified copy of this resolution, together with a copy of the report of the Appraiser of Real Estate of the Department of Finance, approved by the Comptroller, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with the request that all action heretofore taken thereon, closing said streets be rescinded and that said streets be, in accordance with the Charter, restored to the map of The City of New York, after public hearing, as provided for in said Charter."

Resolved, That so much of said resolution as requests the Secretary to transmit a certified copy thereof to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the request that all action heretofore taken thereon closing said streets be rescinded, and that said streets in accordance with the Charter be restored to the map of The City of New York, after public hearing, as provided for in said Charter, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Which was laid over pending the sale of the property and the payment of the purchase price.

The Comptroller presented the following report with accompanying papers and offered the following resolution, relative to a sale to the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, of the portion of Narrows avenue, between Eighty-third and Eighty-fifth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, as discontinued and closed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment July 8, 1907:

July 15, 1907.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held July 8, 1907, adopted a resolution discontinuing and closing Narrows avenue, between Eighty-third and Eighty-fifth streets, and in the report which was presented to the Board at that time, a request was made that the Mayor withhold his signature of approval of the resolution until such time as he was notified by the Comptroller of The City of New York that all the terms and agreements had been entered into between the Crescent Athletic Club and the City.

The Crescent Athletic Club has presented an agreement duly executed on the 11th day of July, 1907, in which in consideration of the premises and of the performance by the City, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or other proper officers duly authorized by law, to give to the City perpetual underground right and easements to maintain existing sewers, drains, pipes and other sub-surface structures, in, under and through lands included in said Narrows avenue between Eighty-third and Eighty-fifth streets, with the right to repair, rebuild and enlarge the same, and to construct such new sewers, drains, pipes or other like sub-surface structures in, under and through said lands as may hereafter be required by the City, together with the right to enter upon said

premises from time to time as may be necessary for the purpose of inspecting, repairing, constructing or rebuilding the said structures, the City at all times to maintain such sewers, drains, pipes and other like sub-surface structures without cost to the Crescent Athletic Club. In addition to this the Crescent Athletic Club is to pay to The City of New York a sum of money approximating \$2,607.34, which amount is the difference between an award that was made and the assessments levied on said property for the opening of Narrows avenue, and in addition thereto they will indemnify the City against and pay to the City any damages to which any owners of property shall be entitled as may be determined in the proceeding or proceedings for the closing of the aforesaid portion of said Narrows avenue, which shall be instituted as provided by law, and will save the City harmless from any and all expenses of the said proceedings.

For the doing of this on the part of the Crescent Athletic Club, the City is to release all its right, title and interest in and to that portion of Narrows avenue so discontinued and closed.

I desire also that there shall be an additional clause inserted in the deed, and that is that if at any time in the future the Crescent Athletic Club should dispose of their property and it is desired for any purpose to open Narrows avenue, that then and in that event, the Crescent Athletic Club shall agree to deed to The City of New York, free of cost and charges the strip of land described in the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which is by said resolution discontinued and closed.

This agreement made and entered into this eleventh day of July, 1907, by the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, a corporation organized and existing under the Laws of the State of New York, with The City of New York, a municipal corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the Laws of the State of New York (herein referred to as the City), witnesseth:

Whereas, The Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, heretofore submitted to and filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City its petition dated the 31st day of December, 1906, wherein it prayed the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to pass such resolution or resolutions as may be necessary in order that the map or plan of The City of New York may be changed by discontinuing and closing a portion of Narrows avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and that all the right, title and interest theretofore acquired by The City of New York to the lands within the lines of the discontinued portion of said streets be granted and conveyed to the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, the owner of the lands fronting thereon.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and of the performance by the City, acting by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or by its proper officers duly authorized by law, of the following acts and of each of them:

First—That it change the map or plan of The City of New York by discontinuing and closing that part of Narrows avenue lying between Eighty-third street and Eighty-fifth street.

Second—That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, it grant and convey to the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, the owner of lands fronting thereon, all the right, title and interest heretofore acquired by the City in and the land within the lines of the said part of Narrows avenue so discontinued and closed, excepting and reserving, however, permanent and perpetual underground rights and easements to maintain its existing sewers, drains, pipes and other like subsurface structures in, under and through the said lands within the lines of the discontinued portion of such avenue, including the right to repair, rebuild and enlarge the same, and to construct such new sewers, drains, pipes or other like subsurface structures in, under and through said lands as may hereafter be required by the City, together with the right to enter upon the said premises from time to time, as may be necessary for the purpose of inspecting, repairing, constructing or rebuilding the said structures. Provided, however, and the reservation of said rights and easements is hereby agreed to by the said club upon the following express conditions, limiting the said easements and rights: That the City shall maintain all such sewers, drains, pipes and other like subsurface structures without cost to the said Crescent Athletic Club.

Third—That it initiate by its proper officers such proceeding or proceedings as may be necessary by law to discontinue the use of the lands within the lines of the above-described portions of said street, as a public street; the Crescent Athletic Club for itself, its successors and assigns does hereby covenant and agree as follows:

1. The Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn will pay to the City such sums of money as shall hereafter be agreed upon for the grant and conveyance of all its right, title and interest to the Crescent Athletic Club of the lands within the lines of the discontinued portion of Narrows avenue, subject to the easements and rights to construct and maintain sewers, drains, pipes and other like subsurface structures in or under the said lands, the reservation of which by the City is heretofore agreed upon.

2. The Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn will indemnify the City against and pay to the City any damages to which any owners of property shall be entitled, as may be determined in the proceeding or proceedings for the closing of the aforesaid portion of said Narrows avenue, which shall be instituted as hereinbefore provided, and will save the City harmless from any and all expenses of the said proceedings.

In witness whereof the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn has caused this instrument to be signed and acknowledged by its president and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, and the same to be attested by the signature of its respective secretary the day and year first above written.

Whereas, The Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York heretofore, and on the 11th day of July, 1907, did execute a certain agreement with The City of New York which formed a part of the consideration for the closing of Narrows avenue, from Eighty-third to Eighty-fifth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, One of the conditions of the said agreement required the granting and releasing to the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, on the part of The City of New York, of all the right, title and interest heretofore acquired by The City of New York in and to the land within the lines of the said part of Narrows avenue so discontinued and closed; and

Whereas, The Crescent Athletic Club heretofore and on the 10th day of July, 1907, made application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in which it prays the said Commissioners to determine that the parcel of land heretofore described is not needed for any public use, and prays said Commissioners to sell and convey to the Crescent Athletic Club (the owner of lands fronting on the portion of said avenue so discontinued and closed), the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to the said parcel of land; it is now

Beginning at a point where the southerly line of Eighty-third street intersects the westerly line of Narrows avenue, and running thence southerly along the westerly line of Narrows avenue as heretofore laid out four hundred and sixty (460) feet, more or less, to the northerly side of Eighty-fifth street; thence easterly and along the northerly side of Eighty-fifth street eighty (80) feet to the easterly side of Narrows avenue; thence northerly and along the easterly side of Narrows avenue heretofore laid out four hundred and sixty (460) feet, more or less, to the southerly side of Eighty-third street, and thence westerly and along the southerly side of Eighty-third street eighty (80) feet to the point or place of beginning, be the said several dimensions more or less,

—for the consideration of two thousand six hundred and seven dollars and thirty-four cents (\$2,607.34), and that upon the payment of the said purchase price into the treasury of The City of New York to the credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt and the production of a certificate to be made by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund or a majority of them, as required by an ordinance of The City of New York, it shall be the duty of the Mayor of The City of New York to execute and the City Clerk to attest and deliver to the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn, a proper conveyance of said real estate under their hands and seal of The City of New York, said conveyance to be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel, and to have the approval of the Comptroller of The City of New York; the said deed of conveyance to contain proper clauses excepting and reserving to the City permanent and perpetual underground rights and easements to maintain its existing sewers, drains and pipes and other like subsurface structures, in, under and through the said lands within the lines of the discontinued portion of said avenue, including the right to repair, rebuild and enlarge the same and to construct such new sewers, drains, pipes or other like subsurface structures in, under and through said lands as may hereafter be required by the City, together with the right to enter upon the said premises from time to time as may be necessary for the purpose of inspecting, repairing and constructing or rebuilding the said structures; the said deed shall also contain a clause that the Crescent Athletic Club of Brooklyn will indemnify the City against and pay to the City any and all damages to which any owners of property shall be entitled, as may be determined in a proceeding or proceedings for the closing of the aforesaid portion of the said Narrows avenue, which shall be instituted as provided by law, and will save the City harmless from any and all expenses of the said proceeding; the said deed shall also contain a clause that if at any time in the future the Crescent Athletic Club should dispose of their property and it is desired for any purpose to open Narrows avenue, that then and in that event the Crescent Athletic Club shall agree to deed to The City of New York, free of cost and charges, the strip of land herein conveyed.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions relative to the petition of Susan Leonard, for a release or quit-claim of the City's interest in a portion of the old Cripplebush road, Borough of Brooklyn:

July 9, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held June 13, 1907, adopted a resolution authorizing a release or quit-claim to Susan Leonard of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to that portion of the old Cripplebush road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, included within the area of certain property situated on the southeasterly corner of Bedford avenue and Halsey street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The communication sent to the Corporation Counsel transmitting a report from the Bureau of Real Estate was dated May 24, 1907, the report recommending that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to whether the interests of the City in and to certain property was material or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private adjoining owner. In reply to the communication in question, the Corporation Counsel transmitted an opinion dated June 7, 1907, certifying that the interests of The City of New York in and to that portion of the old Cripplebush road, in the former City of Brooklyn, included within the area of the property described in his opinion was a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner. The said description contained in the opinion, which was also contained in the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, was erroneous, although the same was contained in the petition of the petitioner. The matter was again returned to the Corporation Counsel under date of June 25, 1907, requesting his opinion as to whether the interest of The City of New York in and to the following described property in the Borough of Brooklyn, being a portion of the old Cripplebush road, was material or nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Halsey street where the same is intersected by the westerly side of the former Cripplebush road, distant 65 feet 3 inches easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Halsey street with the easterly side of Bedford avenue; running thence southeasterly along the westerly side of Cripplebush road until it intersects a line drawn parallel with Bedford avenue from a point on the southerly side of Halsey street distant 80 feet easterly from the southeasterly corner of Halsey street and Bedford avenue; running thence northerly parallel with Bedford avenue 125 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of Halsey street, and thence westerly along the southerly side of Halsey street 14 feet 9 inches to the point or place of beginning.

In view of the conditions of the matter, I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund amend their resolution of June 13, 1907, by inserting therein the above mentioned description instead of the one now contained therein.

SIR—I have received your communication of June 25, 1907, in relation to a release or quit-claim to Susan Leonard of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to that portion of the old Cripplebush road in the former city of Brooklyn.

The application of Susan Leonard to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for this quit-claim or release has already been the subject of a communication from the Corporation Counsel to the Comptroller. It seems, however, that in that communication, the property which is the subject of the application, and of the certificate of the Corporation Counsel as to the interest of the City therein was improperly bounded. I am now asked to certify as to the interest of the City in a portion of this old road, which is contained in a description furnished by you. I would say in this relation that in this class of cases I have always relied upon the description furnished in the report of the real estate expert of your Department, and I shall continue so to be guided.

I would refer you to former communications as to the status of this old road, and for the reasons therein stated, I now certify that the interest of The City of New York in and to that portion of the old Cripplebush road in the former city of Brook-

lyn, as is contained in the following described premises, is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, to wit:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Halsey street where the same is intersected by the westerly side of the former Cripplebush road, distant 65 feet 3 inches easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Halsey street with the easterly side of Bedford avenue; running thence southeasterly along the westerly side of Cripplebush road until it intersects a line drawn parallel with Bedford avenue from a point on the southerly side of Halsey street distant 80 feet easterly from the southeasterly corner of Halsey street and Bedford avenue; running thence northerly parallel with Bedford avenue 125 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of Halsey street, and thence westerly along the southerly side of Halsey street 14 feet 9 inches to the point or place of beginning.

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Halsey street where the same is intersected by the westerly side of the former Cripplebush road, distant 65 feet 3 inches easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Halsey street with the easterly side of Bedford avenue; running thence southeasterly along the westerly side of Cripplebush road until it intersects a line drawn parallel with Bedford avenue from a point on the southerly side of Halsey street distant 80 feet easterly from the southeasterly corner of Halsey street and Bedford avenue; running thence northerly parallel with Bedford avenue 125 feet, more or less, to the southerly side of Halsey street, and thence westerly along the southerly side of Halsey street 14 feet 9 inches to the point or place of beginning.

—the Corporation Counsel having certified under date of July 3, 1907, that whatever interest the City may have in the property is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner; and

Resolved, That the interest of The City of New York in and to the same be and is hereby appraised at the nominal sum of one dollar (\$1), and the expense of such release, examination, etc., be and is hereby fixed at one hundred dollars (\$100), to be paid by the petitioner, and evidence produced that all taxes, assessments and water rates now a lien upon said premises, or any portion thereof, have been paid before the delivery of the release.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a sale at public auction of the City's interest, which it has by virtue of a lease from the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend, to the City of Brooklyn, dated December 28, 1895, and recorded in the Kings County Register's office on December 31, 1895, Section 21, Liber 1 of Conveyances, page 500:

June 20, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Louis Gottlieb in a verified petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requests a release of the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to premises acquired by a lease held by the former City of Brooklyn and the former Town of Gravesend, known and designated by the assessment number 13 on the assessment map for grading Sea Breeze avenue from East Fifth to West Fifth street in the former Town of Gravesend.

The petitioner states that he derived title to the said lot by deed from the Town of Gravesend on the premises known as Boulevard Lot No. 24 of the Common Lands, made by William Kowalski, filed with the Clerk of the said Town on September 5, 1878, which said deed to the petitioner is dated May 18, 1885, and recorded in the Register's office in Kings County in Liber 1762 of Conveyances, page 179, on September 23, 1887. The said lease in question was made for a term of one hundred years, and was sold to the Town of Gravesend on January 11, 1893, and was executed by William J. V. Bennett, as Supervisor of the Thirty-first Ward of Brooklyn, late Town of Gravesend, to the City of Brooklyn, for the unexpired period, which lease, dated December 28, 1895, was recorded in the Register's office of Kings County on December 31, 1895, in Liber 1, Section 21 of Conveyances, page 500, the property being sold for the unpaid assessment against the same amounting to \$53.78.

It was provided in the original resolution of the Board of Supervisors that "if no person bid for any such parcel (at a sale held for such assessment) the Supervisor shall bid in the same for a term of not less than 100 years, in the name and for the benefit of the town, and if not redeemed within two years thereafter he shall, as such Supervisor, execute such lease or conveyance to the town as the purchaser, and file the same in the office of the Register of Kings County; if not redeemed within two years thereafter he shall dispose of the same for the sum due, together with interest at 6 per cent. per annum from the time of sale."

The matter of the interest which the City of New York has by virtue of leases for the term of 100 years from the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend, whose title was derived from sales of unpaid assessments for certain public improvements, has been the subject of consideration by the Corporation Counsel in previous similar applications, and in an opinion bearing date June 28, 1900 (see minutes, Sinking Fund, July 24, 1900, in re application of Marcus B. Campbell), he quotes section 16 of the act of the Supervisor of the County of Kings, passed June 13, 1892, as bearing upon the time when such property could be redeemed from such sales (which was two years thereafter), and decides that such time is past; and further states:

"The property under consideration became the property of the City of Brooklyn on the annexation of the Town of Gravesend to the City. The Board of Supervisors of the County of Kings was abolished by chapter 954 of the Laws of 1895. The body having authority in the City of Brooklyn to dispose of this class of City property was the Common Council, that being the Legislative body of the City, and no such power being vested in any other of the officers or departments thereof.

"By section 205 of the Charter of the Greater City the power to sell the real estate of the City of New York is vested in the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. This section provides that the Board must sell City property at public auction for the highest marketable price, after due advertisement and appraisal under the direction of the said Board."

In accordance with the advice it becomes necessary, in this instance, for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to appraise the City's interest in and to this lease for one hundred years. It is my opinion, however, that should the City receive the sum paid out by the former Town of Gravesend, with interest on the same to date, together with a sum sufficient to pay for the expenses which have been incurred on account of this unpaid assessment, such as the advertisement of sale, expenses of sale, drawing and recording of the deed and the further expense now incurred by the sale of this property, that the interest of the City of New York will be fully protected without hardship upon the property owner. This course has been pursued and adopted in all previous cases that have been acted upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the sale at public auction of all the right, title

and interest of The City of New York in and to the following property, which it has by virtue of a lease from the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend, and afterwards conveyed to the City of Brooklyn, which lease is dated December 28, 1895, and recorded in the Kings County Register's office on December 31, 1895, in Section 21, Liber 1 of Conveyances at page 500:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Thirty-first Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, known as and by the number 13 on the assessment map for grading Sea Breeze avenue from East Fifth to West Fifth street, in the former Town of Gravesend, later City of Brooklyn, now Thirty-first Ward of the City of New York, which lease thereof for 100 years was sold on January 11, 1893, for the sum of \$53.78, and which lease was for the unexpired term conveyed to the City of Brooklyn by the Supervisor of the Town of Gravesend on December 28, 1895, and that the interest of the City of New York in and to the same be appraised at the sum of \$101.14, being the sum of \$53.78 together with interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum to the date of the sale; the purchaser to pay the Commissioners' fees and \$100 for the expenses of examination, advertising, etc.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith for your information a report made by one of the Examiners of the Finance Department on the subject of the City's interest in the bed of old roads, a matter which comes within the jurisdiction of this Board through section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter. On the strength of this report I think it would be well for this Commission to require petitioners to present substantial evidence, showing how they or their predecessors in title originally acquired private rights in public property.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In accordance with your direction I submitted to you in July a preliminary report on the subject of the public interest in the bed of old roads. After reading the report, you directed a further investigation of the subject. This has been made, and I now have the honor to present an additional report.

The subject is so much larger than I at first supposed that I am unable, at present, to make a final report, but a further probing of the matter has served to strengthen the belief that, judged by the facts and common sense of the proposition, the City still owns property to the value of thousands, if not hundreds of thousands, of dollars within the lines of old roads.

This is a bold statement for a mere layman to make in the face of opinions, constructions and other sparks from the legally luminous that flame like beacons along these ancient highways. Nevertheless there are certain facts which indicate that the City owns the land, and facts, I presume, are to be regarded as competent evidence.

It appears to be agreed among members of the bar that if a road existed in 1664, or prior thereto, it was a Dutch road, because up to that year the Dutch were in possession of what is now New York. A Dutch road was the absolute property of the government, without any regard for individual rights, but the question which left a loophole of doubt was how the City could prove by competent evidence that any road was a Dutch road. If any genuine efforts were made in past years in connection with releases to establish this point, the efforts were evidently abortive. Until the Commissioner of Records' office in Kings County took the matter up, no authentic data was readily obtainable, and until you directed this investigation nobody seemed to take sufficient interest in the question to seek facts. Now I believe that the City will be enabled to prove beyond a reasonable doubt that certain roads existed in Kings County prior to 1664. The ownership of these roads passed from the Dutch to the English, from the English to the Americans, first as the property of the State, by which they were conveyed to the Corporation of The City of New York.

The status of the English roads, or those laid out after 1664 and prior to the establishment of American independence, is held by lawyers to differ from the Dutch. The difference is that while the Crown had a right to lay out a road wherever it would, it never became the owner in fee of the land, but merely exercised a right of public easement for highway purposes. When the road was closed the easement ceased, and the property reverted to the abutting owners on either side of the road, according to this theory.

It will be appropriate at this point to quote the opinions expressed on this subject by Mr. Justice Murray Hoffman in his "Treatise Upon the Estates and Rights of the Corporation of the City of New York as Proprietors." Although Judge Hoffman lived and wrote some years ago, his opinions on questions of real estate law and rights are accepted now as authoritative. He was regarded as one of the foremost authorities on real estate law; was the originator of the system known as the "Hoffman Rule," which is frequently employed in the settlement of disputes over real estate values, and his treatise on the estates and rights of the corporation is quoted by Justices of the Appellate Courts, so I think his opinions may have some force when weighed with those of other members of the bar, or even when thrown into the balance with the opinions of an assistant corporation counsel.

The treatise was published in 1867, and the conclusions reached were drawn from a study of all the laws bearing on the subject that had been enacted up to that time. On page 256 of the treatise Judge Hoffman says:

"The history of the acquisition of any estate or power in or in relation to the streets may be divided into four periods. The first from the settlement of the city to the surrender to the English in 1664. The second from that time to the Charter of 1686 and the Colonial Act of October, 1691. The third from that date to the great system under the Act of 1807, laying out avenues and streets, and the statute of 1813 consequent upon it; and the fourth from that time to the present.

"From the facts and law connected with the first period, it is considered that two propositions may be sustained:

"First—That the right and title to the soil occupied by any street in the city opened and used prior to the surrender in 1664 was vested in the Dutch Government; passed to the English Crown, and passed from that Crown or Government, or else from the State of New York to the corporation of the City of New York, and now vests in it.

"Second—That an estate in fee to the soil of any street opened after 1664, and opened through lands comprised in a grant of the Dutch Government made before that date, has become, in like manner, vested in the corporation. That it is so vested, whether such street was opened by public authority, with or without compensation to the owner; and also whether the street was first laid out as a private way and afterward accepted as a public street, or was originally laid out as a public street. I regard this rule as applying to every street laid out down to the year 1813.

"The law of the colony which the Director General was to administer—the rules which were to govern the rights of property and persons, were regulations given by the company through the Assembly of Nineteen; and where the case was not thus provided for, nor fell under an ordinance or regulation of the Director General, then the law of Holland prevailed and was the rule of action.

"This law consisted of the Roman Law and the Imperial Statutes of Charles V and the edicts, resolutions and customs of Holland.

"It is the undoubted rule of that law that highways—via publicae—belong to the sovereign power as a part of the royalties or public rights. They belong to it absolutely. There is no right in the adjacent owners to the soil of the road either during the use or upon a discontinuance.

"Under this rule whoever accepted a grant from the Government did it with the knowledge that it was subject to the exercise of the right of taking a part of the land for highways. He regulated the compensation he gave to the Government accordingly and as there was not in the civil law a trace of the notion of reverter upon a discontinuance, the price or compensation could not have been affected by such expectation.

"There cannot be the least ground for supposing that the surrender of 1664 operated so as to transfer the title of the Dutch Government in the streets to the adjacent owners. It can scarcely be necessary to discuss this proposition. Then, as no royalty, title or interest, eminent or private domain remained in that Government, and such domain necessarily rested somewhere, it must have gone to the British power and by the principles of the British Constitution, that power was the Crown.

"Nor can it be conceived that the surrender had such an effect as to pass the right and interest from the Crown to adjacent owners. No intentment can be made against a state to divest its property or owner.

"Lands then granted by the Dutch Authority were held at the period of the surrender subject to the right of the public power to lay out streets through them with or without compensation; and held in subordination to the settled rule that when streets were so laid out, the fee to the soil passed to the Government."

From the foregoing it will be seen that Judge Hoffman believed that the City owned the fee not only of Dutch roads, but of English roads, and, in fact, all roads laid out prior to 1813. This seems all as clear as crystal until there enters a new character. This is a high sounding device known as "adverse possession." Adverse possession appears to be a sort of genteel member of the gold brick family especially designed for large cities. The operation can be more vividly illustrated than described.

If somebody removes the silverware from your home without your knowledge or consent it is larceny.

If he comes back and takes the house, it is grand larceny.

If he takes the ground, it is adverse possession.

The last should be slightly modified. If he holds the ground for nineteen years, three hundred and sixty-four days, he is a trespasser. If he can manage to hold on for twenty-four hours longer and make his period of residence an even twenty years, the property belongs to him. In other words, if somebody squats on your property for twenty years, he has the land and you have the experience. It is a part of the plan that he must remain in "undisputed possession" for the period, but if it so happened that you were called to distant parts and situated where you could not dispute possession, the property would pass out of your hands as tranquilly as little Eva went to Heaven.

It is on such divine right with modern improvements that many of the claims to ownership in the bed of old roads are based. How any private rights were originally acquired in the public highways is left to the imagination. The fact that a person has been for twenty years in undisputed possession of property that did not belong to him is supposed to eliminate any question of how possession was obtained in the beginning. Though the original act of taking possession may have been utterly illegal and without foundation in justice, it becomes sanctified by the passage of years, the corruptible puts on incorruption and wrong becomes right, in witness whereof The City of New York is asked to acknowledge the same by granting a quit-claim releasing the property for one dollar.

The Constitution of the State of New York confirms all rights in grants of lands that were made by the British Crown and its predecessors prior to October, 1775. Therefore, if Judge Hoffman was correct in his conclusions, the Constitution of the State guarantees the rights of the people in roads that belonged to the Government in the same manner that it insured the rights of individuals in grants obtained from the Government. In view of this it is difficult for a layman to understand how any device like adverse possession can nullify the Constitution, unless it be pointed out by some Solon that this section of the Constitution is unconstitutional.

Adverse possession seems to be a sort of inverted escheat. In adverse possession public property passes to an individual. In escheating, private property passes to the State. This last was formerly a popular method employed by royalty to keep all the land in the family. Royalty was supposed to have blue blood and if any vassal was indiscreet enough to "corrupt the blood" through having been attainted, which is to say getting caught with the goods, he was promptly conveyed to the far side of the moat and his lands "escheated" to the blue bloods. In modern times lands may lawfully escheat to the State as provided by the Constitution, but it is not lawful for public lands to escheat to individuals. Getting land for nothing by sitting on it for twenty years looks uncommonly like land escheating to individuals.

Such is adverse possession. It may be law, but it is a strange variety of justice. If you buy something and pay for it, you are the owner forever unless you choose to dispose of it. It is difficult to understand why an individual is entitled to the permanent enjoyment of things which he owns and the community is not.

It has been suggested that if the City should demand substantial amounts for its rights in old roads, hardships would be imposed on many property owners. That is true in so far as it relates to those who seek releases. On the other hand, it should be borne in mind that an injustice is practised on the community when public property is released to individuals for nominal sums.

One of the best evidences of substantial public interest in old roads is the fact that releases are sought. If the City had no interest it would not be necessary to seek quit-claims. To dismiss the affair with the airy statement that the public interest is a "mere cloud" on the title of a private owner is not convincing. There is still another form of indicating that the City has no substantial rights. When clouds would mar the euphony of a description, the City is said to possess merely "a color of title." I have been unable to ascertain what color a title assumes in its native state, but it seems that efforts have not been wanting to give the City's title in old roads a rich lemon hue.

I have purposely avoided citing cases and authorities in particular actions for the reason that an examination of this feature of the question seemed to lead toward a hopeless tangle. It is to be assumed that all authorities are really authorities, so when a bewildering array of these lights appear on each side of the question, it seems uncommonly like an irresistible force meeting with an immovable body, and I have no desire to umpire a game like that.

As a result of this examination, I would respectfully recommend:

That all petitioners for releases of the public interest in the bed of old roads be required to show by reliable evidence when and under what circumstances their predecessors in title acquired private rights in public property.

That more concise and systematic methods of keeping records of releases be adopted. While it is possible now to trace a given case, there is no convenient means of learning at once what properties have already been released. The records of forty years ago are superior to those that have been kept in the last few years. There are many matters of detail in this connection which need not be included here.

That all unnecessary writing in connection with transmitting petitions between this office and the Law Department be promptly eliminated. The reports of this Department should, I believe, be devoted to discussing the merits of the statements contained in the petition and should further endeavor to provide the Corporation Counsel with any obtainable facts that will aid him in determining the legal status of the road. A long rambling rehash of the petition accomplishes nothing and wastes time.

As a layman I cannot see any element of justice in the adverse possession proposition. It may be recognized by law; so was slavery, but that does not prove either to be just.

While I do not see why the City should not release its interest in many of these cases, there does not seem to be any good reason why a sum approximately equal to the value of the property should not be realized, for I am confident that in many cases it can be proved conclusively that roads were in existence at periods prior to the establishment of American Independence.

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions relative to the assignment of property acquired for playgrounds, to the Department of Parks:

September 3, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Pursuant to the provisions of section 629 of the Laws of 1905, section 47 of the revised Charter was amended so as to authorize the Board of Aldermen to provide by ordinance for the acquisition, construction or establishment of playgrounds in the City of New York, and acting under such amendment, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held May 12, 1905, authorized the issue of \$1,000,000 of corporate stock to provide means for the acquisition and construction of playgrounds in the City of New York.

Thereafter resolutions were adopted authorizing the acquisition of certain playgrounds, of which the following are now vested in the City of New York:

1. Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, Amsterdam and West End avenues, Borough of Manhattan;
2. One Hundred and First street between Second and Third avenues, Borough of Manhattan;
3. Nos. 180 to 184 Cherry street, Borough of Manhattan;
4. Siegel, McKibbin and White streets, Brooklyn;
5. Richard, Dwight, King and Pioneer streets, Borough of Brooklyn;
6. Irving avenue between Woodbine and Putnam avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, —the cost of the same being over \$700,000.

A serious question having arisen as to whether these playgrounds were under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, the President of the Borough in which the playground is located or in the Board of Education where a playground is in the rear

of a public school, the matter was submitted to the Corporation Counsel, who recently rendered an opinion that the revised Charter does not designate under whose jurisdiction the control of these playgrounds should be, and he therefore prepared for presentation to the Legislature a bill known as Assembly Bill No. 2168, which, if passed, would have designated the playgrounds to be under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks. The history of said bill is that it passed the Assembly and Senate of the State of New York and received the approval of his Honor, the Mayor of the City of New York, but in the last batch of bills the Governor did not sign this bill.

A serious question now confronts the City wherein it has expended almost three-quarters of a million dollars for property which has no departmental jurisdiction and with no individual or department with authority to improve the property for the purposes for which it was acquired. Further, in its unimproved condition a number of persons have been injured, caused by the accumulation of ice in front of the property and falling into the unfenced lots, and there are a number of negligence actions now pending against the City of New York as a result of the failure of the City to properly maintain the property.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution assigning the six properties above noted to the custody and control of the Department of Parks of the City of New York for the purpose for which they were acquired, and that the same be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for concurrence.

1. The ground at Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, Amsterdam and West End avenues, Borough of Manhattan.
2. The ground at One Hundred and First street between Second and Third avenues, Borough of Manhattan.
3. The ground at Nos. 180 to 184 Cherry street, Borough of Manhattan.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund subject to concurrence by the Board of Aldermen, hereby assign to the custody and control of the Department of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, the following playgrounds for the purposes for which they were acquired:

1. The ground at Siegel, McKibbin and White streets, Brooklyn.
2. The ground at Richard, Dwight, King and Pioneer streets, Borough of Brooklyn.
3. The ground on Irving avenue, between Woodbine and Putnam avenues, Borough of Brooklyn.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller called the attention of the Board to chapter 740 of the Laws of 1907, being an act to permit The City of New York to sell or lease to the Cooper Union for the Advancement of Science and Art, the block of ground in said city bounded by Third avenue, East Sixth and East Seventh streets and Hall place, with the building thereon.

CHAPTER 740.

An Act to permit the city of New York to sell or lease to the Cooper Union for the advancement of science and art the block of ground in said city bounded by Third avenue, East Sixth street, East Seventh street and Hall place, with the building thereon.

Became a law July 25, 1907, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

Accepted by the city.

The people of the state of New York, represented in senate and assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York shall have power and are authorized to sell or to lease to the Cooper Union for the advancement of science and art the block of ground bounded by Third avenue, East Sixth street, East Seventh street and Hall place, with the building thereon, at such price, if sold, and upon such terms and conditions, for such period of time, and for such rent, if leased, as the commissioners of the sinking fund in their discretion shall deem suitable. In making such sale or lease the commissioners of the sinking fund may, in their discretion, enter into an agreement with the Cooper Union for the advancement of science and art, in the interest and for the benefit of the city of New York, for the use of the said block of ground, the building thereon, and such other building or buildings as may be put thereon as a part of its endowment for its educational or library purposes.

Sec. 2. Any proceeds of such sale or leasing shall, on receipt thereof, after paying necessary charges, be immediately paid to the credit of the sinking fund of the city of New York for the redemption of the city debt.

Sec. 3. All acts heretofore passed inconsistent with the provisions hereof are, so far as they relate to the said block of ground, hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

On motion, the matter was referred to a select committee consisting of the Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the City Chamberlain.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Appraiser of Real Estate, Department of Finance, relative to a proposed sale of the Twenty-second Regiment armory:

September 11, 1907.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—Mr. Robert E. Dowling of the City Investing Company, in a communication dated July 2, 1907, offers to purchase premises owned by The City of New York, located on the entire block from Columbus avenue to Broadway, Sixty-seventh to Sixty-eighth street, Borough of Manhattan, which premises are now used by the Twenty-second Regiment armory and he agrees to bid for the property at public auction at any time prior to September 1, 1907 (I understand that he has extended this period), the sum of \$826,000, payment to be made as follows: Ten per cent. of the purchase price at the auction sale in cash or certified check on the date of the sale, the remainder of the purchase price in cash on the delivery of the deed, ninety days after the date of sale; the City to have the use of the armory for one year from the date of his taking title, rent free, except for an amount equivalent to any taxes, water rates or assessments charged against the property during that time by the City. Also that the City may have the privilege of renting the property after the expiration of the first year, at a rental equal to five per cent. on the purchase price, plus taxes, until such time as the new armory for the Twenty-second Regiment will be completed, but not later than May 1, 1910; the understanding being that the City may give up possession at any time on sixty days' notice, and that if the proposition is favorably received by the City authorities, he is willing to deposit a check for \$5,000 to cover any expense preparatory to sale, on the condition that if he should become the purchaser at the auction sale, the

\$5,000 deposited should apply toward the ten per cent. required on the day of the sale.

Under date of July 23, 1907, this office replied to Mr. Dowling, stating that as soon as you returned from Europe the matter would be given consideration. During your absence in Europe the matter was brought unofficially to the Secretary of the Armory Board, and he was of the opinion that it would not be a good proposition for the City to attempt to sell this property at the present time, because in two years from now the property might bring \$1,200,000. This price is purely speculative as to what the future will bring, as it may bring \$1,200,000 or more, or it may bring less than \$1,200,000.

I do not believe that it is a good proposition for the City to accept Mr. Dowling's offer for the City to pay taxes, water rates or assessments against the property, as I believe the custom has been for the City to sell property and retain possession thereof until such time as the new building is erected. This was the way the matter was handled with a Fire Department and a Police Department site in the downtown district.

I am of the opinion, however, that the offer of Mr. Dowling should be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for certain modifications and conditions, and if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the modifications and conditions, that the Secretary be requested to inform Mr. Dowling upon what terms and conditions the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will dispose of the property, and if he consents thereto, that the matter be taken up with the Armory Board, requesting that the said Board turn over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the premises known as the Twenty-second Regiment armory as being no longer required for regimental purposes, as required by section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, except that the Armory Board might request that the same be sold under the modifications and restrictions as provided by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that is to say, that the property when sold shall be upon the following terms and conditions:

That the upset price shall be \$826,000, 10 per cent. of which shall be paid on the day of the sale, and the remainder of the purchase price on the delivery of the deed, which shall be ninety days after the day of sale; the City to have the use of the armory free of all expense until the new regimental building to be erected upon the property now under contract to the City shall be completed, but not later than May 1, 1910; that during the time of the occupation by the City, the City will pay for the water used on the premises and make inside and outside repairs, but all taxes and assessments levied upon the property shall be a lien thereon and paid by the owner thereof. This would give to the City the sum of \$826,000 principal and interest thereon for two years and six months, which at 4 per cent. would amount to \$82,600. In addition to that, an assessment for the purposes of taxation would be levied upon the property equivalent to about \$700,000, which based upon a 1½ per cent. rate would amount to \$10,500 a year additional, so that the City's income over and above \$826,000 during the period of two years and six months would amount to \$105,000, making a total, providing the property brought only \$826,000, of \$931,000. In other words, the City would be in a position whereby it would sell its bread and still retain possession and eat it.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks submitting for approval a form of agreement to purchase certain property lying in the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, in Astoria, Borough of Queens, and the Comptroller presented a report of the Appraiser of Real Estate of the Department of Finance thereon.

Which was referred back to the Comptroller.

The Hon. George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond, appeared before the Board and was heard at length in the matter of the proposed lease of the footbridge at St. George, connecting the ferry house with Jay street, which the Board declined to authorize at meetings held June 12 and July 8, 1907.

After a discussion of the matter, on motion of the Comptroller, it was referred to the Chief Engineer of the Department of Finance and the Chief Engineer of the President of the Borough of Richmond for a conference and report.

Dear Sir—Your proposition of September 23, 1907, to do the following work for the total sum of two hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$225), work to be started on or before September 25, and to be finished within ten working days; you propose to wash off old kalsomine from all ceilings and cornices in large reception and lecture rooms and library; reception room and library ceilings, cracks to be cut out and properly plastered and to be prepared with shellac where stained and cracked, and both ceilings to receive a coat of ceiling varnish thinned down with turpentine; lecture room ceiling to receive a coat of flat white lead paint; all ceilings to be tinted a cream white as now on; all walls to receive two coats of oil color as directed, first to be a flat color and second to be an egg shell gloss; all woodwork throughout to be thoroughly washed with ammonia and then to receive a rubbing with sandpaper and benzine before any paint is applied; then apply two coats of lead color, first to be flat, second to be egg shell gloss; color of woodwork to be a green cream; shields in reception and lecture rooms to be made to imitate either copper or bronze as will be later selected; work to be done at the New York City Training School for Nurses on Blackwell's Island, is accepted as above specified, and you are hereby directed to proceed with the work.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
