

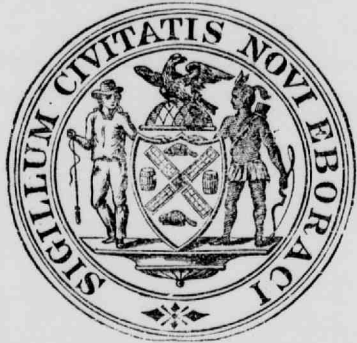

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, August 7, 1877.

The Board of Health met this day.

219 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 47 cases, and for violation of the Sanitary Code in 6 cases.

Reports Received.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on work performed by Disinfecting Corps; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; on application for permits; on work performed by Special Visiting Corps; on work performed by Vaccinating Corps; on certain street pavements, etc.; on certain street pavements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; on application for relief.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 4, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,680, as follows, viz.: 11 public buildings, 637 tenement-houses, 288 private dwellings, 46 other dwellings, 13 manufactories and workshops, 21 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 40 slaughter-houses, 3 manure dumps, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 2 piers and docks, 3 public sewers, 1 roadway, 4 milk inspections, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 71 yards, courts, and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 72 waste-pipes and drains, 212 privies and water-closets, 34 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 6 railroad cars, 2 piggeries, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 13 other nuisances, together with 27 violations of the Code.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 634.

During the past week 187 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 97 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

129 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 33 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 27 houses, 27 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,894 privies and water-closets, 569 cellars, 258 yards, courts, and areas, 186 garbage-boxes, and 126½ miles of street gutters.

The Special Visiting Corps of Physicians have visited 6,113 tenement-houses, 35,830 families, prescribed for 1,197 sick children, and distributed 1,144 excursion tickets, for week ending August 4, 1877.

They also revisited children under treatment as often as the cases required, and distributed "health tracts" with the appropriate advice wherever such attention seemed necessary.

During the week ending August 4, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 650 burial permits for city deaths, 33 for bodies in transitu, and 42 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 650 deaths, 505 births, 42 still-births, 33 applications for transit permits, and 66 returns from coroners. There were 24 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, August 4, 650 deaths were reported to this Bureau, which is a decrease of 67 as compared with the number of deaths reported for the preceding week, but an increase of 41 as compared with the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending July 28 was 718, which is 94 below the average mortality for the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 34.62 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,078,102.

The decrease during the past compared with the preceding week was from the following causes, viz.: Membranous croup, 3; whooping-cough, 5; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 7; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 56; cancer, 5; bronchitis, 11; marasmus and scrofula, 14; convulsions, 11; sunstroke, 3; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; and suicide, 3; while measles increased 1; scarlatina, 5; diphtheria, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; pneumonia, 4; diseases of the heart 11, and hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 6.

In reviewing the mortality for the past six weeks it will be seen that during this period 4,194 deaths were reported to this Bureau, of which 1,906 were children under 1 year, 2,337 under 2, and 2,615 under 5 years; 1 death was from small-pox, 36 from measles, 104 from scarlatina, 74 from diphtheria, 66 from whooping-cough, 4 from typhus fever, 19 from typhoid fever, and 1,633 from diarrhoeal diseases, 1,510 of which were children under 5 years of age. This compares favorably with the total number of deaths reported for the corresponding weeks of 1876, being 948 less, of which 427 were children under 1 year, 580 under 2, and 609 under 5 years; the deaths from small-pox were 17 less, diphtheria 29, typhoid fever 5, and diarrhoeal diseases, all ages, 432, while 482 less deaths of children under 5 years died from diarrhoeal diseases during the 6 weeks ending August 4, 1877, than during the corresponding weeks of 1876. There was an increase, however, of 4 deaths from measles, 18 from scarlatina, 33 from whooping-cough, and 2 from typhus fever. The following table will show the mortality for each of the 6 weeks, with the mean temperature:

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 92 were in institutions, 375 in tenement-houses, 170 in houses containing 3 families and less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, boats, streets, etc.; 14 were on the basement floor, 134 on the first, 195 on the second, 134 on the third, 48 on the fourth, and 23 on the fifth; 645 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 5 non-residents; 64 were stated as single, 121 married, and 58 widowed, and the condition of 407 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age; 238 deaths were of children under 1 year, 316 under 2 years, 349 under 5 years, and 44 were of persons 70 years and over.

The disposition of 635 deaths and still-births, or 96.06 per cent. of the total number reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 15, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 259, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 82, Lutheran (undenominational) 129, Greenwood (undenominational) 37, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 26, Evergreen (undenominational) 42, Woodlawn (undenominational) 19, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 9, Union (Methodist Protestant) 2, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 7, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 3, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 5, Washington (undenominational) 2.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 4 was 73.6 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 65, saturation being 100, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.842 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,165, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.79 inch, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

SIR—There were 650 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 4, 1877, which is a decrease of 67, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 41 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending July 28, 1877, was 718, which is 94 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 34.62 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,078,408.

Every person bidding for a ferry franchise must state what percentage of the gross receipts collected at the landing-place in the City of New York he will pay for the same. All moneys received for the conveyance of passengers, animals, vehicles, or freight from the City of New York, over any ferry route, to any of the opposite shores, to be collected at the landing-place in New York, or, if collected elsewhere, to be included in the receipts upon which such percentage is to be calculated and paid.

The minimum price for which the lease of said wharf property will be sold has been fixed by the Board of the Department of Docks at the following sums, namely:

Wharf property connected with the ferry from Cortlandt street, North river, to Jersey City, has been leased by the Department of Docks to the associates of the Jersey Company for ten years from May 1, 1876, at \$7,510 per annum.

Wharf property connected with the ferry from Chambers street, North river, to Pavonia avenue, New Jersey, is now held under an agreement by the Erie Railway Company, that such company shall have a lease of the same with other premises for the term of ten years from July 21, 1875.

Ferry from Desbrosses street, North river, to Harsimus, Jersey City.

For the bulkhead and short pier at foot of Desbrosses street, North river, being about 65 feet in width along the westerly side of West street, or as much thereof as may be owned by the Corporation, at \$500 per annum.
