

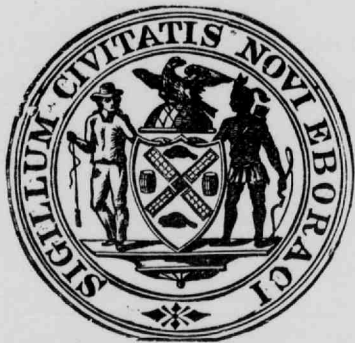

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1882.

CHAPTER 61.

AN ACT to amend section one hundred and ninety of the Code of Civil Procedure, and to provide for the application or such amendments thereof.

Passed April 14, 1882; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section 1. Section one hundred and ninety of the Code of Civil Procedure is hereby amended by adding thereto, at the end thereof, the following additional subdivision, viz:

4. When an interlocutory judgment has been entered on the decision of a demurrer, provided that the appeal shall be taken within sixty days after the service on the attorney for the appellant, of a copy of the judgment and notice of the entry thereof, and provided also that, excepting in the case of appeals now pending, the general term shall certify that in its opinion the question arising is of sufficient importance to render a decision by the Court of Appeals desirable before proceeding further.

Sec. 2. So much of the provisions of the subdivision hereby added to said section one hundred and ninety as precedes the second proviso thereof, shall apply to appeals already pending in the Court of Appeals, as well as to those which may hereafter be brought, excepting that so much of said subdivision as limits the time for the taking of said appeals shall not be applicable to appeals already pending.

The Department of Public Charities and Correction reserves the right to decline any and all bids or estimates if deemed to be for the public interest, and to accept any bid or estimate as a whole, or for any one or more articles included therein. No bid or estimate will be accepted from, or a contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Delivery will be required to be made from time to time, at such times and in such quantities as may be directed by the said Department.
