

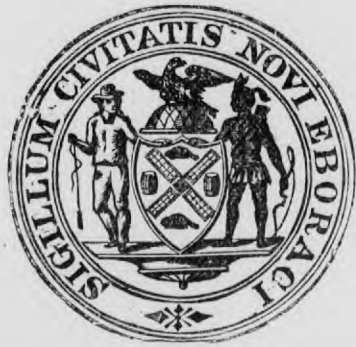

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, etc.:

DEAR SIR—While the large reduction (\$110,884.90) in the total expenditures for the period which this report covers, as compared with the preceding quarter of the year, and the greater quantity of sweeping, 4,993.3 miles, done in it, may be attributed by your Honor, the one to painstaking administrative economy, enforced by necessity, the other to the more favorable climatic conditions of the season, permitting of an increase in machine-sweeping, it would seem to be of more consequence to the public, and a fact furnishing some satisfaction to you, that a portion of the amount has been expended in order to meet the requirements of that part of the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Street Cleaning which suggested the use, in the collection of ashes, garbage and street sweepings, of a covered iron cart.

Prior to the appointment of the Committee, the Department sought the aid of the principal manufacturers of street cleaning apparatus to secure such a cart, but neither in our own nor in any other city was it possible to obtain one with a fixed stationary cover. In December of last year, a so-called dust-proof cart, which, it was alleged, would fill the necessities of the Department, was imported from Europe, but the cover, which was attached to the body of the cart in the form of an inverted letter V, one side of which had to remain open or raised during the process of loading, could not endure the concussion with the string-piece of the dumping-board.

As a means of removing this difficulty, the Commissioner, as appears by a communication addressed to the Advisory Committee, on the 22d of January last, suggested the practicability of building a cart with a low-hung body, constructed so that, by the aid of lugs or trunnions, it would rest in the frame of the cart, and be removable therefrom, by the employment of suitable steam-hoisting apparatus, the object being to permit of the dumping of the load from the bottom, side or tail of the cart, thus securing the intactness of the cover and freeing it from jar or strain.

The practicability of the suggestion has been demonstrated by placing trunnions on the bodies of twenty-five of the old iron carts owned by the Department; steam-hoisting apparatus has been erected at the dump at the foot of East Seventeenth street, by the Lidgerwood Manufacturing Company, of this city, and, with the ready response of the Commissioner of Public Works to the request of the Department to regrade and repave the roadway adjacent to the dumping place, the method of unloading the collections of the Department by the use of steam-hoisting apparatus has been initiated with success.

The results to be realized from this change are:

First.—A dumping cart can be built with a stationary cover, one that shall be as durable as the body.

Second.—A reduction of the wear and tear on horse and cart to the minimum, the steam-hoisting apparatus rendering unnecessary the "haul" up the incline which is characteristic of the dumping-boards of the city.

Third.—A material decrease in the time required to unload collections. The same series of cart bodies, fitting into the corresponding series of frames, a driver arriving at the dump with a cart loaded, finds waiting for him a cart empty, and is accordingly relieved from the necessity of waiting until the load which he has carted has been dumped.

Fourth.—The application of the method, when perfected, in connection with the use of vans of large capacity, to be operated on the tracks of the surface railroads, and conveying the collections to a few suitably located dumping places; thus releasing twelve to fifteen valuable pieces of dock property to the uses of commerce and largely enhancing the value of that which is contiguous to it.

Fifth.—The abatement of the nuisances incident to the collection of ashes and garbage by day, through the employment of the instruments referred to in paragraph fourth, between the hours of 12 midnight and 5 o'clock A. M., when the volume of passenger traffic is nominal.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and

when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

NOTICE OF COMMISSIONER OF JURORS IN REGARD TO CLAIMS FOR EXEMPTION FROM JURY DUTY.

CLAIMS FOR EXEMPTION FROM JURY duty will be heard by me daily at my office, from 9 A. M. until 4 P. M.

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, editors, editorial writers or reporters of daily newspapers, licensed pharmacists or druggists, actually engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; militiamen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible), and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors, are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement and every case will be fully prosecuted.
