

#### BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

STATED SESSION.

TUESDAY, October 8, 1878, 1 2 o'clock P. M.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Slevin moved that when the Board adjourns it do adjourn to meet again on Monday next, the 14th inst., at 2 o'clock P. M.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor : EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT-CITY HALL, New York, October 8, 1878.

To the Honorable the Common Council: GENTLEMEN--I herewith return, without my approval, the resolution rescinding the resolution approved by the Mayor December 28, 1876, rescinding resolution approved March 15, 1870, authoriz-ing the justices of the several police and civil courts to appoint janitors, and authorizing the justices of the police courts and the justices of the district civil courts to appoint janitors for each of said rolice and civil courts police and civil courts.

I am informed by the Counsel to the Corporation, in an opinion which is herewith transmitted, that it is not in the power of the Common Council to adopt this resolution, and I am therefore con-strained to withhold my approval.

#### SMITH ELY, JR., Mayor.

Resolved, That the resolution approved by the Mayor December 28, 1876, rescinding resolution approved March 15, 1870, authorizing the justices of the several police and civil courts to appoint janitors, be and the same is hereby annulled, rescinded, and repealed, and that the justices assigned to each of the police courts of this city and the justices of the several district civil courts be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a janitor for each of said police and civil courts at an annual salary as now fixed by law. Alderman Sauer moved that the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, accompanying the Mayor's message he placed on file.

Mayor's message, be placed on file. Alderman Morris, as an amendment, moved that the opinion be printed in the minutes in con-nection with the message from his Honor the Mayor. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said amendment. Which was decided in the negative, on a division called by Alderman Morris, viz. : Affirmative—Aldermen Biglin, Ehrhart, Jacobus, Kiernan, Morris, Perley, Phillips, and Pinchney—8

Pinckney—8. Negative—The President, Aldermen Bennett, Carroll, Foster, Gedney, Guntzer, Hall, Lewis, Sauer, Sheils, and Slevin—11. The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with the motion of Alderman

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor :

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, October 8, 1878.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Pursuant to the request of the committee, I respectfully ask that the communication may receive your earnest attention, in view of the fact that in a few days you will be required to take action upon the estimates of expenditures for the coming year, and the amounts to be expended for the maintenance and improvement of the streets, docks, and public works of the city. While I am in favor of the most rigid retrenchment in the expenses of the city government, I am of opinion that true economy and the best interests of the city will be promoted by undertaking at the present time all repairs and improvements which are now absolutely needed, or which will be required in the immediate future, while the city can have the benefit of abundant labor and low priced materials. priced materials.

The broken and dilapidated condition of the pavements in many of our streets is a source of constant complaint, and the incapacity of the present aqueduct to supply the amount of water absolutely necessary for the wants of our citizens, which inadequacy will increase each year, makes it incumbent upon those who are intrusted with the control of the public affairs of this city to give the matter immediate attention. the matter immediate attention.

Which was laid on the table, ordered to be printed in the minutes and published in full in the CITY RECORD, and, on motion of Alderman Slevin, the Clerk was instructed to acknowledge the receipt of the message, and to inform his Honor the Mayor that the Common Council would co-operate with him and the several departments of the city government, by every means in its power, in all measures tending to promote the objects sought to be obtained by the New York Labor Union.
