That in view of the continued and unusual prevalence of small-pox and diphtheria within the City limits, and the necessity of employing additional vaccinators for temporary service, and of experts for the investigation of diphtheria and of contagious skin diseases, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be respectfully requested to transfer to the appropriation for health purposes for the current year the sum of \$5,500 for this work from the unexpended balance for 1874.

That the application of James Kehoe for suspension of Order 6,600 on premises No. 433 East One Hundred and Thirteenth street, for sixty days, be granted.

Whereas, By chapter 636 of the Laws of 1874 the exclusive charge and control of the hospitals for the treatment of small-pox, in the City of New York, was vested in the Board of Health of the Health Department: and

Whereas, The Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction are ready to transfer these hospitals to the Board of Health; and

Whereas, Great economy will result from an arrangement by which the steam for heating purposes, the gas, medicines, and house diet for these hospitals are drawn from the Charity Hospital, which is provided with steam-boilers, gas-works, pharmacy, and kitchen; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction are ready to furnish these supplies, and to transport the sick to the Island, and to bury the dead, provided the actual cost of the same can be refunded to them; therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to state to this Board whether they are willing to make, from time to time, such transfers as may be agreed upon, from the Health Fund to that of the Department of Public Charities and Correction.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 2, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,466, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 943 tenement houses, 175 private dwellings, 109 other dwellings, 3 manufacturing and workshops, 14 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 18 slaughter-houses, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 2 dumping grounds, 1 gas-works, 7 sunken and vacant lots, 29 yards, courts, and areas, 24 cellars and basements, 26 waste-pipes and drains, 63 privies and water-closets, 10 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 6 other nuisances, together with 77 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from Inspectors was 315.

During the past week 34 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 105 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 94 houses, 94 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

35 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital and 3 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

23 permits were granted to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this port.

29 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending January 2, 1875, viz.: Typhoid fever, 3; scarlet fever, 56; measles, 11; diphtheria, 136; small-pox, 62; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 1.

98 loads of night-soil were removed by the Night Scavengers from the privy-vaults of the City.

The following amount of meat was condemned by the officers as being unfit for human food: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 7 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 4 carcasses; hogs, 4 carcasses; beef, 110 pounds, and fish, 920 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending January 2, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 584 burial permits for city deaths, 26 for bodies in transit, and 42 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 584 deaths, 154 marriages, 516 births, 42 still-births, 26 applications for transit permits, and 63 returns from the Coroners. There were 20 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths; and 1 transcript of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 14 of death were issued from this Bureau. 3 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—The total number of deaths reported in this city during the year 1874, was 28,621. The number that actually occurred in the three hundred and sixty-five days of that year, as footed up to-day, amounts to 28,727. This shows a decrease of 372 deaths from the total for the year 1873, and 3,935 from that of the year 1872. A few more returns are still due from public institutions, and before the end of the present week will be duly registered, and the classified records will then be submitted to the Board.

The full import of the diminished mortality in the City during the past year will be understood by noticing the large share which the excessive fatality of diphtheria had in the year's mortality record, in which it stands charged with 1,665 deaths; also by bearing in mind the population and deaths in the annexed territory comprised in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards. From this annexed population of the Westchester wards, 764 deaths were reported, and from diphtheria there were 514 more deaths than 1873. The decrease in mortality which has occurred is in all respects favorable to the deserved repute of this City for the healthfulness of its adult population.

The number of deaths reported in the week that ended on Saturday the 2d instant, was 584. The increase of mortality occurred in persons

over sixty years of age and in chronic invalids. There was a slight decrease in fatal cases in the entire group of contagious and infectious diseases.

November 19—Charges having been preferred against Warren Roosevelt, Assistant Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, as well as against the men employed under his supervision, of official misconduct, a resolution offered by Commissioner Budd, to suspend said Roosevelt from duty and pay during the investigation now being had by the Commissioners, was declared lost—Commissioners Westervelt and Gardner voting against its adoption, for the reason that no evidence had been presented leading to the belief that said Roosevelt is guilty of the charges made, but on the contrary, the evidence furnished is entirely unreliable, insufficient, and contradictory, and not such as would warrant any action on the part of the Board, as contemplated by said resolution.
