MESSAGES FROM THE MAYOR. The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following message from his Honor. the Acting Mayor:

No. 1765.

Message of His Honor the Mayor Relative to an Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$22,198.50, with Respect to the Operation of Pumping Stations in the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, May 25th, 1915.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen-I am sending herewith a communication received from Mr. Williams, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in which he states that a serious situation confronts the Department in relation to the operation of the several pumping stations in Queens and Richmond. Mr. Williams states that it will be necessary for him to secure special funds to the amount of \$22,198.50.

I have requested Mr. Williams to attend your meeting this afternoon, so that he will be available to explain the details and the urgent necessity of the appropriation

of the money he requests.

As the situation is urgent, and one that requires prompt attention, I would respectfully request, on behalf of the Commissioner, that you waive your rules and give unanimous consent for immediate consideration. Respectfully,

Hon. George McAneny, Acting Mayor, City of New York:

Sir-A very serious situation confronts the Department and I am appealing to you to lend your aid in relieveing this situation. Unforeseen difficulties in the Borough of Richmond made it necessary to continue in operation several pumping stations which the Department had not anticipated would be in service this year, and it also became imperative to resume pumping operations in several of the stations in Queens in the early part of the year by reason of increased consumption. The force employed on these works has exhausted the funds appropriated for temporary emergency help. I have recommended to the Board of Estimate a modification of one of the wage schedules which will, if approved, provide funds to continue the operations in Richmond until about June 30. The employment of the major part of this temporary force will continue for several months later, and to provide for their wages I submitted to the Board of Aldermen on May 12, 1915, an application for special revenue bonds in the sum of \$22,198.50. There was also included in this same request funds for temporary help during the vacation of the regular per diem

You will appreciate that I wish to avoid any inconvenience or hardship to the employees who are effected. No doubt a large number of them are in circumstances which compel them to arrange for their household necessities and conveniences of their families from week to week, and they naturally look forward for their

wages when they become due.

The urgency of this matter compels me to ask that you kindly send to the Board of Aldermen a special message, urging their immediate and favorable consideration of the Department's application. I attach hereto a copy of my letter of May 12.

The City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, May 12, 1915. Hon. George McAneny, Acting Mayor and President of the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City.

Dear Sir-The demands of the Forough of Queens in the early part of the year became so urgent that the Department had to put into service two of the pumping stations which had been temporarily abandoned. In providing for the payment of the wages of the force assigned for their operation it was necessary to draw upon the temporary wage account which had been appropriated for services to be rendered in Richmond. In the latter Borough certain delays were encountered in the construction of the new Southfield Boulevard station, causing the Department to keep in service certain old stations which it had expected would be discontinued. The expense of the labor thus employed has resulted in reducing the Department's appropriations. To replenish these accounts and to provide funds for the payment of temporary help during the vacation period of the regular Department employees, the sum of \$22,198.50 will be required. The basis for this estimate is set forth fully in the attached schedules. I therefore respectfully request that this money be provided by an issue of special revenue bonds.

This appropriation was passed by your Honorable Board on February 9th and was forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. On May 13th the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized only \$8,875 of the \$25,000 which your Honorable Board requested on Feb. 9th. Of this sum \$6,285 was appropriated for 2,750 days of Labor and 400 days of teams at \$5.00 per day. You will notice that no allowance was made for Climbers and Pruners. The greatest necessity exists in this Department for Climbers and Pruners to transplant upwards of 12,000 trees in the Forest Park nurseries.

During the month of April 12,000 trees were transferred from the Forest Park nursery to a new model nursery which is being established in the police training ground at Kissena Park. There remain in the Forest Park nursery in the neighborhood of 10,000 Oaks and 5,000 Austrian Pines which must be removed this year if

they are to be saved for the City. Failure on the part of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate only part of the \$25,000 granted by your Honorable body leaves this Department in a position where fifteen men must be laid off in the immediate future in order to keep

within the appropriation. This would leave the Forestry Division with only twenty-five men and would make it quite impossible to undertake any tree planting next Fall.

Municipal Civil Service Commissioner of The City of New York, Municipal Building, Center and Chambers Streets, New York, May 17, 1915.

Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of New York: Gentlemen-We have been informed that on April 30th, the Commissioner of Public Charities requested the Board of Aldermen for an issue of spcial revenue bonds in the sum of \$20,070 to pay salaries from July 1st to December 31, 1915, of help needed to replace Hospital Helpers employed in central offices of the department.

The Municipal Civil Service Commissioner is not able to pass upon the question of whether the particular sum requested is the proper sum to appropriate for this purpose. It directs me, however, to urge that the necessary action be taken in order to permit the Department of Public Charities to pay the salaries of the help needed to replace these Hospital Helpers. The action of the department is taken at the request of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, the Commission after investigation having reached the conclusion that the assignment of Hospital Helpers to the services covered in the request of the Commissioner of Public Charities dated April 30th were improper assignments and contrary to the provisions of the Civil Service Law. The Commission is empowered under the Civil Service Law to refuse to certify the payrolls of any employes who are improperly assigned. It has, however, allowed the Department of Public Charties, as it has other departments, a reasonable length of time to secure the necessary budget appropriations to provide for such corrections.

It will not, however, approve the payrolls of any of the Hospital Helpers assigned to work outside of institutions after July 1st, 1915.

Dear Sir-I have the honor to transmit herewith a certified copy of a report and resolution adopted by the Board of Education at a meeting held on May 12, 1915, requesting the Board of Aldermen to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$87,600, for the purpose of providing means to cover cost of making formal promotions from eligible lists to grades of the last two years in day elementary schools for the period from September 10 to December 31, 1915. To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that it is desirable at this time to consider the matter of formal promotions to the grades of the last two years in day elementary schools, and to make financial arrangements so that such promotions may be effective at the opening of the schools in September, 1915.

Briefly, the reasons for the present situation are as follows: On May 27, 1908, the license for promotion to the 7A. 7B and 8A grades was abolished, and new qualifications were provided for the license to teach a graduating class. On April 13, 1910, the promotion license was re-established. The By-Law was subject to the then rights, if any, of persons eligible to teach in grades 7A, 7B, 8A and 8B. Unin graduating classes. In the meantime (June 12, 1912), the Board of Education following opinions of the Corporation Counsel, adopted a resolution directing the City Superintendent and the Board of Examiners to place upon appropriate lists for promotion those holders of licenses 1 and 2, who were found to be eligible. process.

From this direction of the Board of Education the City Superintendent appealed to the State Commissioner, who set aside the resolution in November, 1914. Pendyears have been temporarily filled by teachers who have signed waivers. Since the decision of the State Commissioner, a course of procedure has been outlined for preparing eligible lists and making promotions. At the time of the consideration of the departmental estimate for 1915, the item for promotions was stricken out by the financial authorities, with the understanding, however, that when the matter was finally settled an application for funds should be made.

Your Committee has been advised by the Acting City Superintendent that during the fall term there will be some 1,050 vacancies in the grades of the last two years, and the cost of making formal promotions from the eligible lists will be about \$87,600 from September 10 to December 31, 1915. There is need for prompt action for the reason that a great amount of detailed work is necessary in arranging the

grade changes, transfers, etc., which will follow the promotions.

There is offered for adoption the following resolution: Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby respectfully requested to adopt a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of eighty-seven thousand six hundred dollars (\$87,600), pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Revised Charter, for the purpose of providing means to cover the cost of making formal promotions from eligible lists to grades of the last two years in day elementary schools for the period from September 10 to December 31, 1915; and that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to authorize such issue upon request of the Board of Aldermen.

### Department of Street Cleaning—Request for Issue of Revenue Bonds (\$17,240.89) to Cover Expense of Placing Cart Covers on Ash Cans and Garbage Carts. Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, May 17, 1915.

Hon. George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Dear Sir-I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen pass a resolution authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds amounting to seventeen thousand two hundred and forty dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$17,240.89), pursuant to section 188, subdivision 8, of the Greater New York Charter, to cover the expense of placing cart covers on 735 ash and garbage carts of this department.

There are 2,271 steel ash and garbage carts in the department, distributed by boroughs as follows:

Manhattan, 1,164; Brooklyn, 818; The Bronx, 289.

To date, provision has been made for covering 1,536 carts with funds saved in 1914 and a budget appropriation to cover 1,061 carts in 1915. Of the 1915 appropriation for this purpose \$17,868.55 has been expended, and the remainder of this fund (\$6,121.16), will be used to purchase and install additional covers, thus leaving 735 carts unprovided with covers.

The last contract price received for furnishing parts and fitting covers, per

cart, was \$22.34. From information received it has become apparent that the total cost (\$22.34) has not allowed a sufficient margin of profit to the contractors, and it is estimated that \$23.46 per cart will be needed to fit out the additional vehicles.

Attached hereto is a statement showing, in detail, the manner in which this figure is reached, also the number of carts already fitted out with covers, and the cost of same.

The demand for an improvement in the present methods of refuse collection has been widespread, and the covers proposed are the most economical and satisfactory that have yet been tried. It is desirable that all of the carts be fitted with covers before the end of this year, and for that purpose I would ask that your

Ann Kane (14 years at old hospital), Mary Sullivan, Mary Sherritte, Margaret Keane and Eleanor Tammany have been appointed Hospital Helpers at \$216 per annum. Enetta Hammill and Alice Sarles have been appointed Hospital Helpers at \$192 per annum. The old hospital employed this class of help at \$216 per annum under private management. The proposed title and compensation, as well as the work to be performed by the incumbents, fall in the second grade of the Helper Group of the proposed specifications, with an initial salary of \$180 per annum.

'Carlo Delefino, Hospital Helper at \$480 per annum, is employed as Night Watchman without maintenance. The proposed title and compensation, as well as the work to be performed by the incumbent, fall in the second grade of the Helper Group of the proposed specifications, with an initial salary of \$240 per annum, and \$240 per annum in lieu of maintenance.

"The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have appointed employees at practically the same rates as paid at old hospital under private management.

"The schedule as submitted will care for the hospital on present census, but in order that the same may be properly manned it will be necessary that additional positions be established under section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows: Superintendent ..... \$2,100 per annum

Hospital Clerk ..... \$300 per annum Storekeeper ..... \$720 per annum "These positions are to take the place of present positions on the segregated

A reduction in the rates of compensation of the janitor of public schools 98 B and C, Manhattan, from \$1,140 to \$900 is proposed, owing to the abandonment of public school 98C for school purposes; a reduction in the rate of compensation of the janitor of public school 98E from \$900 to \$600 is also proposed because this building has been entirely abandoned for school purposes, and the janitor is serving now merely as watchman.

For public school 38, Manhattan, it is proposed to pay the janitor the sum of \$2.25 for cleaning the snow and ice from the sidewalks of the site of old public school 38, Manhattan, on March 8, 1915.

For the following named schools special rates of compensation are proposed for the janitors for services rendered in connection with activities conducted therein other than regular day schools:

It should be noted in this connection that had there been 36 rooms used, the janitor would have received the same compensation under the adopted schedule as he receives when 78 rooms are used, notwithstanding the fact that the latter calls for the

cleaning of 42 more rooms.

It will be apparent from the foregoing that in the case of very large evening schools the present schedule of janitorial compensation does not afford adequate pay for the work involved, owing to the fact that while the schedule of janitorial compensation has remained unchanged since its adoption the use of school buildings for evening activities has been considerably extended. In view of the above facts and the further fact that the DeWitt Clinton High School houses the largest evening school in this city, when making the 1915 budget for the Department of Education, your Board approved the request of the Board of Education to allow a flat rate of \$9.50 per evening to the janitor of the DeWitt Clinton High School for evening school service, and funds for this purpose were appropriated.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request with the exception of the rates proposed for the after school activities conducted in the three training schools upon which your Committee is not yet prepared to submit recommendations. Respectfully,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen-In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Justices of the Court of Special Sessions on April 15, a request that provision be made for three additional Probation Officers in the Children's Courts of Kings, Queens and Richmond counties, at annual salaries of \$1,200, was presented to your Board at the meeting of April 20th, and referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades. Investigation establishes the following facts:

It has long been recognized that justice demands fuller knowledge of the environment and previous character of the individual prisoner than the evidence presented in court supplies. An understanding of home conditions is especially essential in children's cases. The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children has hitherto investigated all cases of children awaiting sentence, except in the New York court, where this is among the duties of the regular probation officers.

The purpose of the creation and existence of this society is, however, the protection of children illtreated by adults, and the volume of work of such nature and the limited amount of funds available now compel withdrawal from that part of the investigational work relating to juvenile delinquents. Investigation of improper guardianship cases and others involving adults will be continued, as also the care of children under detention, the maintenance of waiting rooms in the courts, and the collec-

tion of payments for institutional charges. The number of investigations made for the Children's Court, Kings County, from January 1, 1914, to September 30, 1914, was 1,446. An examination of the nature of the cases and the time devoted to them for ten weeks of this period indicates that an average of somewhat more than the full time of one examiner was devoted to delinquency cases. Though the number of cases in the courts of Queens and Richmond is considerably less, poorer transportation facilities make the time and the

volume of work for these two counties combined about the same as for Kings County.

While the average has been rather less than the full time of three investigators, there

are two reasons why three should be allowed: (1) The volume of work is very variable

and delay means that children must be held in custody, and (2) the superintendent

of the Brooklyn society states that an insufficient staff has for some time made them unable to do this work to their satisfaction. All the present officers paid by the City now have a large number of cases under this supervision, and can undertake no extra duties. As the records show that the probation officers on the schedule now in force make up the entire number authorized by the Board of Aldermen, the creation of three new positions under that title would have to precede any appointment. Unencumbered balances sufficient in amount having been found in certain salary appropriations of the Department of Finance, and the need for the officers requested being immediate,

In the 1915 budget for the office, the positions of Bookkeeper at \$1.650 per annum and Receiving Clerk at \$1.260 per annum were set up for the purpose as Bookkeeper, and Fred H. Schied as Receiving Clerk. Mr. McKenna has performed

the duties of a bookkeeper in the office for the past fifteen years, and Mr. Sheid has acted as Receiving Clerk for the last five years, the titles of both being that of Clerk. The 1915 budget for the office provided a salary of \$1,650 per annum for Mr. McKenna, and \$1,260 per annum for Mr. Sheid. On account of the refusal of the State Civil Service Commission to change the titles of these employees, it was necessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on February 5, 1915, to modify the salary schedule to include positions of Clerk at \$1,500 and \$1,200 per annum, respectively, and carry \$210 in balance unassigned pending establishment of grades of positions at the salary rates allowed in the 1915 budget.'

The request is not only for the above purpose but also to furnish means to make the changes indicated by the Fire Department as necessary in order to render safe

the various buildings of the Willard Parker Hospital.

The Research Laboratory is a six-story building, with one elevator and a stairway winding around the elevator shaft as the only means of exit from the three upper floors. There is a narrow stairway at the east end of the building from the third to the ground floor.

There are about, 125 people working in the building, mainly in the upper floors. In case of fire or explosion of chemicals, with resulting acid fumes, there would be grave danger of loss of life, due to panic and probable inability, under present conditions, to use the one means of exit as either fire or fumes would spread rapidly through the elevator shaft and stairways.

It is estimated that the fire escapes, one at each end of the building, will cost about \$3,000, and an enclosure of fire retarding material around stairway and elevator about \$2,500. The remainder of the work required in the building will cost about

The balance of \$4,000 is necessary to reduce the fire hazard in the Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Measles and other buildings of the hospital. The main items consist of fireproof partitions on stairway landings, the replacing of present wood sash by Kalemein sash at entrance to fire escapes, and a tank on the Administration building

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—On March 12, 1915 you referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee a request from the Commissioner of Charities to amend an authorization of June 26, 1913 for \$60,000 of corporate stock by eliminating the words "remodeling Main Hospital, Kings County, to provide for additional dispensary facilities and toilets for roof gardens" and substituting therefor the words "the erection, completion and equipment of an addition to Nurses' Home, Kings County Hospital.

It is proposed to add four stories to the two wings of the present Nurses' Home, making it a five story building throughout, thereby increasing the capacity so as to provide for ninety-eight additional persons. The foundations were built with this end

in view.

The bed capacity of the present house is 160, of which 39 have to be used for domestics, leaving 121 for nurses. The bed capacity of the hospital is 1,222, and the average census is over 1,100. In 1914 there were 16,882 cases. This means that, under the most favorable circumstances, with no nurses on sick list and no cases of extreme sickness necessitating constant attendance, each nurse has to take care, on a general average, of about 20 patients. As a rule there are from five to ten nurses sick, as a result of overwork. At the present time there are nineteen sick due to an outbreak of diphtheria.

The report of the Committe on Hospital Inquiry, 1913, states that on the basis of 1,200 beds and 18,000 admissions there should be 240 nurses. Kings County Hospital with 1,222 beds, and 16,882 admissions in 1914, has only 121 nurses. The

proposed addition will permit the housing of 98 more. It has been impossible to take full advantage of the appropriation allowed in the

1915 budget for nursing, on account of the lack of housing facilities. For the purpose of the original authorization, an architect's contract was entered into, on which \$600 has been paid, and for which a contract liability remains of

\$3,586.05. The unencumbered balance in the account is \$55,813.95 The estimated cost of the proposed addition is \$75,000. The Commissioner of Charities on March 3, 1915, requested an authorization of \$20,000 corporate stock for this purpose, which with the \$55,000 to be made available by transfer will furnish sufficient funds for the desired addition to the Nurses' Home.

We recommend that both requests be granted by the adoption of the attached resolutions, one amending the authorization of \$60,000 so as to make \$55,000 available and the other approving the authorization of \$20,000 for the construction and equipment of the addition of the Nurses' Home, Kings County Hospital. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York: Gentlemen—At the meeting of your board on February 26, 1915, his Honor the Mayor presented, with his approval, a request from Rosslyn M. Cox, President of the Conference of Mayors of the State of New York, that New York City contribute \$500 to the expenses of that conference and the State Bureau of Municipal Information for the year 1915. The matter was referred to the Comptroller for examination and report.

This city's annual contribution to the conference has been \$50. The officers and members having become convinced of the urgent need of systematic, continuous. cooperative work throughout the year, it is proposed to establish a State Bureau of Municipal Information having a permanent director and supervised by a council of five mayors. The bureau will gather and distribute to city officials of New York State statistical information on municipal questions, including important reports, details of pending legislative hills, plans for new departures, and the practical results of their application. It will also aim at a uniform system of accounting, the New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, favor of absolute local self government, and the stimulation of public interest in

municipal questions. The reference library of the State will give every assistance possible. The cooperation of city officials, civic organizations, corporations, utility managers, public service commissions and individual experts will be sought.

The expenses for the first year are estimated at \$10,000, the principal items being: Salaries, \$6,400; rent and furniture, \$800; postage, stationary, clippings and multigraphing, \$1,000. The plan apportions \$500 as the share of cities of the first class and the bureau will not be established until \$10,000 has been pledged.

An arrangement by which our cities may profit more immediately and directly by one another's experience is certainly to be desired and the discussions of the conference during the last five years have emphasized the need of just such services as the bureau proposes to render. It is desirable that New York City should participate in this movement.

Another somewhat analogous plan was outlined by Hon. Rudolph Blankenburg, Mayor of Philadelphia, in a letter addressed to the Mayor of this city on March 4 last, requesting New York City's membership in the Utilities Bureau recently established under the auspices of the Conference of American Mayors. The conference, without committing itself for or against municipal ownership or operation, or between state and local regulation of public service corporations, advocates a local franchise making power and control of any municipally owned utilities. The bureau aims at a concerted and comparative study of the problem of public utilities and as efficient a combination of public officials as now exists among corporate interests.

It is believed that the conduct of the bureau for the first year will entail a minimum expense of \$30,000, which has been apportioned among the larger cities on a basis of population, New York City's share being \$2,000. The general information collected will be furnished on request, but there will be a fee for special researches or such assistance as representation of a city before public service commissions, etc. It is thought that after a few years the bureau will be largely self-supporting.

The organization will be purely non-partisian. The sponsors are the Mayors of Philadelphia, New York, Chicago, Cleveland and Dayton. Messrs. Louis D. Brandeis, Frederick A. Cleveland and Charles R. Van Hise, President of the University of Wisconsin, are among the trustees, as was also the late Frederick W. Taylor.

It has seemed well before advising New York City's subscription to either of these agencies for united municipal action, to obtain assurance of the legal soundness of such application of public moneys. I therefore requested an opinion from Mr. Frank L. Polk, Corporation Counsel, whether the municipal empowering act, chapter 247 of the Laws of 1913, would be an authorization, or article 8 of section 10 of the State Constitution a prohibition. As Mr. Louis H. Hahlo, Acting Corporation Counsel, has expressed the opinion that there is no legal impediment, I recommend the adoption of the resolution attached to this report. #### SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by inserting therein an article, known as Article 4, Classification of Buildings, as follows.

> Article 4. Classification of Buildings.

Section 70. Occupancy.

71. Construction.

When buildings are required to be fireproof.

73. When buildings may be non-fireproof. § 70. Occupancy. 1. Classes designated. For the purposes of this chapter all buildings or structures shall be classified, with respect to occupancy and use, as public buildings, residence buildings and business buildings, as hereinafter specified and

defined. 2. Public buildings. Public buildings are buildings or parts of buildings in which persons congregate for civic, political, educational, religious or recreational purposes, or in which persons are harbored to receive medical, charitable or other care or treatment, or in which persons are held or detained by reason of public or civic duty, or for correctional purposes, including among others, court houses, schools, colleges, libraries, museums, exhibition buildings, lecture halls, churches, assembly halls, lodge rooms, dance halls, theatres, bath houses, hospitals, asylums, armories, fire houses, police stations, jails and passenger depots.

3. Residence buildings. Residence buildings are buildings or parts of buildings in which sleeping accommodations are provided, except such as may for other reasons be classed as public buildings, including among others, dwellings, tenement houses, hotels, lodging houses, dormitories, convents, and studios and club houses having sleep-

ing accommodations. 4. Business buildings. Business buildings are buildings or parts of buildings, which are not public buildings or residence buildings, including among others, office buildings, stores, markets, restaurants, warehouses, freight depots, car barns, stables, garages, factories, laboratories, smoke houses, grain elevators and coal pockets.

5. Doubtful classification. In case any building is not specifically provided for, or where there is any uncertainty as to its classification, its status shall be fixed by a rule promulgated by the superintendent of buildings.

6. Mixed occupancy. In case a building is occupied or used for different purposes in different parts, the provisions of this chapter applying to each class of occupancy shall apply to such parts of the building as come within that class; and if there should be conflicting provisions, the requirements securing the greater safety shall

71. Construction. 1. Classes of construction. For the purposes of this chapter all buildings or structures shall be classified, with respect to construction, as fireproof, non-fireproof and frame.

Fireproof. Fireproof buildings or structures are those which are constructed throughout of materials that will resist the action of fire and are constructed as required in Article 17 of this chapter.

3. Non-fireproof. Non-fireproof buildings or structures are those which do not conform to the requirements for fireproof buildings or structures, but which are enclosed with walls of approved masonry or reinforced concrete.

4. Frame. Frame buildings or structures are those of which the exterior walls or any parts thereof are of wood, or which do not conform to the requirements for fireproof or non-fireproof buildings.

72. When buildings are required to be fireproof. 1. New buildings. Every building hereafter erected shall be a fireproof building, as follows:

a. Every public building over 20 feet high, in which persons are harbored to receive medical, charitable or other care or treatment, or in which persons are held or detained under legal restraint;

b. every other public building over 40 feet in height, or exceeding 5,000 square feet

c. every residence building, except tenements, over 40 feet in height and having more than 15 sleeping rooms;

d. every tenement house exceeding six stories or parts of stories as provided in the Tenement House Law;

e. every residence building having more than 15 sleeping rooms and exceeding 2,500 square feet in area, unless divided by interior partition walls of approved masonry or reinforcea concrete into sections of less than 2,500 square feet area

f. every other residence building over 75 feet in height; g. every business building used as a garage within the fire limits; every garage within the suburban limits exceeding 600 square feet in area or 15 feet in height, or not located as provided in §91 of this chapter; and every garage, outside these

restricted areas, over 40 feet in height; h. every business building used for a hazardous trade as indicated in §§ 171 and 212 of chapter 10 of this ordinance; i. every building over four stories in height used as a factory as defined in the

Labor Law; j. every building or structure within the fire limits or the suburban limits used as

a grain elevator or a coal pocket; k. every business building over 75 feet in height;

l. every business building within the fire limits or the suburban limits which exceeds an area of 7,500 square feet when located on an interior lot or when facing on only one street, or 12,000 square feet when facing on two streets, or 15,000 square feet when facing on three or more streets, provided that when any such building is equipped throughout with an approved system of automatic sprinklers, fireproof construction shall be required only when the areas exceed double those herein specified for the respective conditions, and provided also that when any such building is divided by approved interior fire walls, fireproof construction shall be required only when any undivided area exceeds 7,500 square feet. Buildings of greater areas than herein specified for the respective conditions may, considering location and purpose, be constructed non-fireproof by special permission of the superintendent of buildings, provided they do not exceed two stories in height.

2. Alterations. a. By extending. When any building now existing is to be enlarged by extending it on any side so that the enlarged building would exceed the limits of height or area specified in subdivision 1 of this section for a new building, the extension or enlargement shall be constructed fireproof, provided that, in case the existing building is not of fireproof construction, the existing and new portions of the building shall be separated by fire walls.

b. By raising in height. No building now existing shall be raised in height so as to exceed the limits of height specified in subdivision 1 of this section unless it is fireproof.

§ 73. When buildings may be non-fireproof. 1. New Buildings. Except when required by this article to be fireproof, or when permitted by Article 5 or Article 22 of this chapter to be frame, any building hereafter erected may be non-fireproof.

2. Alterations. Except when required by this article to be fireproof, or when permitted by Article 5 or Article 30 of this chapter to be frame, any building which shall hereafter be enlarged in any manner, may be non-fireproof.

Section 2. Subdivision 3 of § 251 of Article 13, chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby repealed.

Section 3. Subdivision 1 of § 350, Article 17, chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows: § 350. Generally. 1. Structural materials. [Application. Every building here-

after erected or altered, to be used as a hotel, lodging house, school, theatre, jail, police station, hospital, asylum, institution for the care or treatment of persons, the height of which exceeds 36 feet 6 inches, and every other building, the height of which exceeds 75 feet, except as herein otherwise provided, shall be built fireproof; that is to say

AN ORDINANCE relative to Restricted Areas in The City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:
Section 1. Section 94 of article 5 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§94. Moving buildings. No frame, wood or other combustible structure shall be moved from without to within the fire limits [,nor from one lot to another within the fire limits except that when condemnation proceedings have been held and the property has been acquired by the city previous to the enactment of this ordinance, frame buildings located on such property may be moved to any vacant lot within By

the fire limits, provided such building shall be so moved before July 1st, 1915].

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### No. 1751. Communication from the Mayor Disapproving Resolution No. 1751, Entitled "Resolution Authorizing Borough Presidents to Issue Stand Permits."

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, May 25, 1915. To the Honorable The Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen-I am returning herewith disapproved proposed Resolution No. 1751 entitled: "Resolution authorizing Borough Presidents to issue stand permits."

This proposed resolution would authorize the Borough Presidents to issue permits for stands or platfroms "in connection with religious and civic celebrations" on the streets or sidewalks of the city except where the same have been widened under the direction of the city officials.

Mayor Mitchel vetoed a similar resolution on April 19, 1915, except that the former one did not contain the restriction that no such stands should be erected on streets widened and from which all encroachments had been taken away. I note that Mr. Mitchel in vetoing the previous resolution stated that the size of the stands to be erected was not restricted, and gave this as one of the reasons why he deemed the matter unwise. He also stated that two weeks seemed to be a long time to permit these stands to remain in the highway. I note that neither of these two points raised by the Mayor have been corrected in the resolution now before me.

In talking the matter over with the Police Commissioner he informs me that the Police Department now issues all the permits to ministers or others who desire to speak on religious topics in the streets. As the stands mentioned in the proposed resolution would, to a certain extent, interfere with the traffic controlled by the Police Department, would it not be better to have the issuance of permits, both for the preachers and the stands, emanate from the one department.

For the reasons above set forth I return this proposed resolution disapproved. GEORGE McANENY, Acting Mayor. Respectfully,

No. 1751. Resolved, That the presidents of the respective boroughs be and they hereby are authorized, in their discretion, to grant permits for the temporary erection in public streets and places under their respective jurisdictions, of stands, platforms and decorations, for purposes of use in connection with religious and civic celebrations, and upon issuing such permits, to require such security as may be proper to indemnify the City against loss, either during the construction and maintenance of such stands, platforms and decorations, or because of their non-removal, such stands, platforms and decorations to be of such size and style as may be fixed upon the granting of the permit, and such permit to permit such stands, platforms and decorations to exist for a time therein specified, but not exceeding two weeks; provided that such permits shall only be issued when conducive to the general public welfare, and provided further, that no such permit shall be issued for any stand, platform or decoration which shall interfere with the general use by the public through and over such streets and public places, and that no such permit shall be issued for the erection of any such stand, platform or decoration in any street or public place where the removal of encroaching obstructions has heretofore been compelled by competent authority.

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An Ordinance Amending an Ordinance Relating to Dirt Carts.

AN ORDINANCE amending an ordinance relating to dirt carts..

Be It Ordained By the Board of Alderman of The City of New York as follows:

Section 51, Article 5, Chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Section 51. License fee: designation: term. The annual license fee

Section 1. Section 51. License fee; designation; term. The annual license fee for each dirt-cart shall be \$1. Every licensed dirt-cart shall show on each outside

thereof the words "Dirt Cart," or the letters "D. C.," together with the figures of its official number.

Licenses for dirt-carts shall be issued as of August 1, and shall expire on the 31st day of July next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

All dirt-cart licenses now in force, which shall not sooner expire, shall expire on July 31 following the date this ordinance takes effect. All dirt-cart licenses issued between the time this ordinance takes effect and the following July 31 shall expire on said July 31.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. No. 1805.

By the Same— An Ordinance Amending an Ordinance Relating to Junk Dealers. AN ORDINANCE amending an ordinance relating to junk dealers.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 121, Article 9, Chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Section 121, License fee and bond; term. Every junk dealer shall pay an annual license fee of \$20 and give a bond to the city, with sufficient surety approved by the commissioner, in the penal sum of \$250, conditioned for the due observance of all municipal ordinances. Each junk cart or junk boat shall pay an annual license fee

All junk dealers' licenses, including junk carts and junk boats, shall be issued as of November 1, and shall expire on the 31 day of October next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

All junk dealers' licenses, including junk carts and junk boats, now in force, which shall not sooner expire, shall expire on the 31 day of October next succeeding the date on which this ordinance takes effect. All licenses now in force, the terms of which would otherwise bring their expiration to a period beyond the 31 day of October next succeeding the date this ordinance takes effect, may be renewed by the licensees for another term, if presented on or before the said October 31, and for each full calendar month of the unexpired term of the old license a pro rata amount of the fee paid therefor shall be applied toward the payment of the new fee. All junk dealers, including junk carts and boats, licensed between the time this ordinance becomes effective and the following October 31, shall be charged the full fee mentioned above, but may be renewed for another term, if presented by the licensees on or before such October 31, at the pro rata rates heretofore prescribed in this paragraph.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so inter-ested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or cor-porate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
