Rules and Regulations Governing the Construction of Outside Fire Escapes on Buildings Hereafter Erected or Altered, and Hereafter Erected on Existing Buildings, and of Protection of Door and Window Openings on Course of Fire Escapes.

The following regulations shall govern the construction of all outside fire escapes and the protection of door and window openings on the course of said fire escapes hereafter erected on all buildings, except as otherwise provided by the Labor Law, the Tenement House Act, and by Articles 24 and 25 of the Building Code.

1. Filing of Plans and Applications. Plans and applications showing the details of construction of the fire escapes and the supports of same, the protection of the door and window openings on the course of the fire escapes, the means of access to the fire escapes from the roof and each floor of building and the means of egress from the termination of the fire escapes to the street shall be filed in the Bureau of Buildings and approved by the Superintendent of Buildings.

2. Required Strength of Fire Escapes. The floors of the balconies of all fire escapes must be designed and erected to safely sustain a live load of 100 pounds per square foot, with a factor of safety of 4 to 1, and the string pieces and treads of all stairways and ladders must be designed and erected to safely sustain a live load of 400 pounds on each step, with a factor of safety of 4 to 1.

3. Construction of Fire Escapes. The fire escapes shall be built entirely of incombustible material. The fire escape stairs shall be continuous from the lowest balcony to the roof of the building, and






